A Letter from the Founder

Dear Community of Water Advocates,

When I reflect back on 2023, one word echoes in my mind: adapt. In an ever-changing world, this word has guided our priorities—to adjust and respond to the evolving needs of the climate-vulnerable communities we work alongside. Despite Africa only contributing 2% of global greenhouse-gas emissions, it is the continent that suffers the most from climate impacts. This past year, as we navigated unprecedented climate challenges, we pressed onward, launching our regenerative agriculture program alongside our women-led water microenterprises.

As we continue to shift and adapt, our mission remains steadfast: driving locally-led community development through water and agriculture. This year's annual report stands as a testament to our shared commitment and a celebration of the collective impact we've fostered together in the past 12 years—reaching over 135,000 people and counting.

Behind these numbers lie countless stories of hope, resilience, and empowerment.

And it signifies we're a quarter of the way to our 5-year vision of impacting 500,000 lives.

With our shared vision, commitment, and people like YOU who make this work possible, I have no doubt that we'll get there.

Our newest program, regenerative agriculture, was developed and implemented in 2023 by our in-country team to offer climate-resilient farming throughout Kenya. Through agroecology, we're multiplying farm biodiversity by up to 20X, safeguarding communities during periods of flooding and drought, and creating thriving ecosystems. We can't wait to share their progress as these climate-adaptive farms flourish in the months and years to come.

With community voices at the forefront, our targeted focus on women and girls also remains a top priority. During my return to Kenya last year, I met women like Jane and Emily, who spoke of the days when they walked miles for water, taking up hours of their day. I heard the joy within their voices as they described the life-altering ripple effects of their newfound water source for their families. There is no doubt in my mind that our programs are effective and life-changing.

Recognizing the water crisis as a women's crisis, we've strengthened our commitment to women's leadership across our water and agriculture programs. We've partnered with more women-led microfinance groups than ever before, ensuring 80% of all governance committee members are women.

Our team continues to show up every day with dedication, passion, and a strong commitment to creating a more equitable world. I couldn't be more proud of the work being done, from the creative storytelling and inspiring events, to the detailed curriculums being drafted and more.

The extraordinary individuals who make up our strong and nimble team are already bringing that same energy into 2024, to ensure that your investment creates a long-lasting ripple-effect.



Water + Agriculture = **Economic Opportunity**

Communities use the revenue generated from water and agriculture solutions to invest in more income-generating projects, facilitating the efficient expansion of our impact.



One acre of regenerative agriculture can generate \$4,000 to \$13,000 per year.



One water borehole project can generate \$9,500 per year.

Pathway of Investment

Community Outreach

Youth centers, women's groups, and community cooperatives reach out after learning about us through word of mouth or awareness campaigns.

Project Planning

In-depth vetting occurs to understand specific needs and plan the best-suited project, establishing a governance committee to oversee its implementation.

Land Surveying

Training & Implementation

Training occurs as contractors implement the initial investment, involving activities such as drilling water wells and preparing soil beds.

Community Engagement

Monitoring, Evaluation & Learning

Community completes impact reports on their projects, including health data from nearby medical clinics when relevant, to track progress.

Reinvestments

Community reinvests generated income into new projects, sustaining the cycle of locallyled development.

Water First

Each clean water system comprises of:

- Deep-drill borehole
- Solar tower
- Water kiosk
- Solar-powered pumps
- WASH clinic partnership



Climate Forward

Each regenerative agriculture farm fosters:

- Drip-irrigation vegetables
- Agroforestry fruit trees
- Grains and cereals
- Soil amendments
- Bee apiaries



Leaning Into Green



Nurturing Climate-Resilience

In 2023, we elevated our commitment to climate by launching a new regenerative agriculture program with a dedicated focus on soil health, biodiversity, and carbon drawdown.



Expert-led Training

We introduced regenerative skills training workshops to complement our existing agribusiness and shared investment programs, utilizing a 60-page curriculum developed by our team of in-country experts.



We've always made it our mission to collaborate with the world's most climate-vulnerable communities, and our regenerative agriculture program is designed to further enhance their climate resiliency. Our initiative listens to community needs and revives indigenous practices that have been overshadowed by industrialized approaches.





How it came to be?


Our lead agronomist, Patrick, and our team have worked tirelessly to develop a comprehensive program that includes community buy-in and field training for sustainable regenerative solutions.

In 2023, Patrick deepened his expertise and vision by participating in a regenerative farm apprenticeship on Mount Kenya. This hands-on experience became the final step before launching our new program.





Harvesting Hope: Our 2023 Highlights



Women Leadership

We remain committed to amplifying women's voices across our partner sites to uphold gender equality.

- 100% of our 2023 partners are women empowerment groups that lead their community's water and agriculture microenterprises.
- Across all programming, each project's governance committee is 80% women.



Income Generation

The revenue generated from project sales empowered our partners to independently expand their community impact beyond our direct investments, leading to:

- 6 outdoor farm expansions.
- Water filtration system.
- School and socioeconomic learning center.
- Greenhouse and cattle.



Health & Hygiene

We organized WASH pop-up clinics within three regions of Kenya, incorporating community gatherings, disease testing and hygiene education. Activities included:

- Health tests and referrals.
- Nutritional education about vegetables.
- Awareness on local WMO2H clean water projects.
- Emphasis on hygiene beyond the COVID-19 pandemic.



Program Reach

We expanded our program reach through community-led initiatives and knowledge-sharing.

- Our regenerative agriculture and financial workshops were opened up to surrounding communities.
- We hosted 6 water ceremonies with our partners to raise awareness about their clean water projects.
- Our average project reach has grown by 60% over the past 5 years, advancing us towards our 5-year vision of reaching 500,000 lives.



Flourishing Farms

In 2023, we established seven acres of flourishing farms using our new regenerative agriculture program. In total, we planted:

- 7 drip-irrigation plots with soil amendments.
- 3,500 mixed fruit and biomass trees.
- 14,000 vegetables.
- 2,100 erosion-reducing grass.
- 350 legumes.
- 280 cereals.




