A few short years later, QCFC has a strong team of talented staff, a wide array of impactful community programs, and a large presence in national conversations about food security in the North. I look forward to the upcoming year and to QCFC once again being a place to gather, learn, and grow.

PROGRAMS





IMPACT

The year 2020-21 marked a year of resiliency, adaptability, and community solidarity at QCFC. We saw the demand for our food access programs dramatically rise and fall, depending on the income supports available to our community members affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite this unpredictability and a few local lockdowns, we continued to prepare and serve **20,000 meals**, and at the start of the pandemic we distributed \$150,000 in **grocery gift cards** to low-income households in Iqaluit.

During the brief periods of time when we could welcome the community into the space, our pre-employment skills **training program** had over 20 participants and our **Kids' Cooking Club** saw 24 participants. We were also a strong voice in the **media** to bring attention to the pandemic's affects on our community.


Throughout this particularly trying year we continued to assist local **shelters** and **food banks** with their food access programming, particularly with **country food** and fresh produce. We also increased our delivery of the **healthy food box** to a weekly distribution, reaching an average of 65 households per week.

We hired a **Peer Advocacy Coordinator** to support community members as they navigated the systemic barriers that were often exemplified during the pandemic. We also introduced our **Women's Support Circle**, made for Inuit women, by Inuit women. We began offering **FoodFit**, a new program developed by Community Food Centres Canada, to teach at-risk youth important culinary skills.

Moving forward we are working towards introducing an affordable country food market, establishing a dedicated peer advocacy office, and expanding into on-the-land youth programs. We are also increasing our support for local harvesters by including more country food in our programs, with over 3500 kilograms of **country food** purchased this year alone.

During a time of immense crisis around the world and in our own community, we saw the demand for our programming increase. Due to the unwavering dedication of our nine full-time staff and numerous support staff, program participants, and volunteers, we were not only able to meet this demand but we saw our programs expand in response. To our fellow lealummiut: we hope to be able to safely welcome you back at QCFC to share a good meal and many new stories very soon.


