Chopping their way to success at the Royal



While Mitchell, Emily and Austin Scrivener have won woodchop and sawing ribbons at the Sydney Royal Easter Show in the past, nothing to date has compared to their haul in 2022.

Both Mitch and Austin, who competed every day for twelve consecutive days, were regulars on the podium picking up 20 ribbons between them.

Mitchell brought home two individual blues, winning the 300mm Standing Block and 300mm Open Underhand Handicaps, placing second in a further five events and third in one. Younger brother Austin won three events – the 250mm Standing Block, 275mm Tree Felling and the 275mm Underhand – placing second in four events and third in three. The brothers were also members of the winning North Coast Axemen's team for the annual NSW Inter-

Association relay, and Austin captained the NSW Under 21's Team that finished second to Victoria in a 'best of three' relay event over the Easter weekend.

Earlier at the show Emily Scrivener competed in the final of the Jill and Jill Double Handed Sawing Championship with Cheyanne Girvan (ACT), while in the Jack and Jill Sawing she picked up a second place teaming up with brother Mitch, just missing out on first by a fraction of a second.

By far the highlight of this years Royal for the family was Austin taking out the title of the Most Successful Competitor in Single Handed Handicap Events. The winner is decided by a pointscore system for all axemen and women and on Easter Monday Austin was presented with the winners sash and a specially engraved Trophy Axe.

around the traps

Little has changed on the weather front since the last Traps was written a fortnight ago. The easterly weather hangs on the hills, but we have seen a bit more sunshine than we had through March while temperatures have remained mild and relatively stable. To have arrived at ANZAC day on the calendar and not had a serious frost is fairly unusual. I have no doubt we are very close to a frost event, but with this easterly air flow we have been fortunate to have avoided a good one until now. When we do get a run of frosty nights the feed quality will suddenly go off, and for some reason that is always a shock! This year may be different with the quality of feed we have right now, but the native pastures won't handle the frosty nights, and there is a huge bulk of them this year.

In the good old days, we would have been in the final days before weaner sales in the Walcha saleyards in early May. There were some pretty cold mornings up on the hill with clear skies, frozen gates and no prospect of the temperatures improving before the cattle were drafted and penned. I have to say they are days I miss. There was always a lot of hype around the weaner sales which generated its own level of activity. They were something to look forward to. The laneways crammed with buyers and sellers with so much banter. Weaner sales were simply a great spectacle for Walcha and it was always wonderful to see the pens full of so many quality calves. We will never see that again. With such a great season, some of the calves I have seen recently are exceptional and it does send me back to that time and wonder how the yarding on the hill would present.

Tamworth agents yarded around 7,000 calves last week in their feature weaner sale and from all accounts produced a solid result. I am told good quality, vendor bred weaners were hard to buy and prices held up well. The secondary types with a bit less weight were more buyable which seems to be an emerging trend. Reports from other centres have indicated there is resistance to buy the secondary cattle and prices have become a little irregular for them. The tops of both the steer and heifer calves realised around \$2500 in Tamworth which is pretty much what has been happening in other centres. There have been quite a few sales in the last couple of weeks at Inverell, Glen Innes, Armidale and Tamworth and they have all produced excellent results. It seems to me that it is very hard to buy a well bred British bred steer or heifer under \$2100, while the crossbreds are a little cheaper than that. But not much. I think the buyers are now considering the value down the track and the large numbers of western bred and Queensland crossbreds that have been selling so well are meeting with a little less enthusiasm from southern buyers.

In regular livestock markets we have not seen a sale in Tamworth for a couple of weeks due to public holidays over Easter and ANZAC day. However, the other regular markets have conducted sales and market trends are generally easier for most processing cattle. Rain in Queensland last week may have slowed numbers a little and prolonged what appears to be the trend of a few numbers coming forward and processors being more selective. It does appear inevitable we will reach a time when numbers will increase and values will ease, but it also seems that this will not be a sudden process unless it is forced on the market by poor seasonal conditions. At this point there is still a lot of feed around and as a consequence a lot of buyers. Happy days.

Anyone who saw the 4 Corners report this week about the rise of JBS in the meat business globally would have to be a little concerned for our markets and the security of our local processors. I am not sure why this has taken so long to come to light as the main accusation around the company is the corruption they admitted to back in 2017. They admitted to bribing officials and other corrupt conduct which resulted in a slap over the wrist for the two main players, effectively. The program highlights how this company benefitted from its corrupt activity and has been allowed to grow at an alarming rate through this scandal. JBS is the biggest player in the meat industry globally and in Australia. I am also not sure why our own government has allowed this company to keep taking out the competition, and it does point to how governments can be so easily led by the big companies. However, the 4 Corners argument about the salmon industry in Tassie is not a valid one as it seems to me that JBS is just doing what Huon was already doing. The fact they have taken over Huon is not great, but was Huon or any other buyer going to do anything different in the way they managed this business? I think this was more about the business play, who won and who lost than the pollution created by salmon farming. If you have not seen the program, it is worth going to ABC iView and looking it up.

E-Tag hire no longer available



For more than 14 years the Walcha Telecottage has offered an E-Tag service to those in our community travelling to metropolitan areas, with tags available to hire for a small weekly fee of \$5.00, plus any tolls incurred on their travels.

Earlier this year TfNSW's E-Toll website was updated and now no longer allows easy access to isolate individual tolls incurred by travellers across our numerous tags. Unfortunately with this change the Telecottage has decided to no longer offer this service.

You can open your own E-Toll account three ways: simply go online at www.myetoll.transport.nsw.gov.au, call 13 18 65 or visit a Service NSW centre.

E-Toll offer two account options: an E-Toll Tag account which has no registration or account fees, you receive a tag for your vehicle (like those supplied by the Telecottage) and simply pay the tolls you travel, or a E-Toll Tagless account where fees do apply.

I write in response to the Mayor's column titled "Financial Sustainability of Council being Reviewed" which appeared in the *Apsley Advocate* on 13 April 2022. The column lacks context, is misleading and is extremely disappointing not only for myself, but for the management and Councillors who have served Walcha Council over the past 11 years and have put countless hours into ensuring that Walcha Council is financially sustainable and can stand alone. The Mayor's column cannot go unchallenged.

In the opening paragraph of the column, the Mayor has noted that IPART has recently granted a 0.7% rate cap increase for councils in NSW. I agree that the rate cap being set at 0.7 percent makes it very difficult for councils to balance the budget. However, I can assure you after my 35 years in NSW local government, low rate caps are not new and have been the case for a number of years. Local Government as a whole need to continue to lobby the State Government for a more realistic rate cap.

In the third paragraph of the Mayor's column, he refers to natural disasters that have occurred over the last 5 years putting pressures on reserves, and that these reserves have proved inadequate. Like the rate cap, natural disasters are not new and have not been confined to the last 5 years. Another disaster that occurred, the management of which is worthy of note, was the Global Financial Crisis. I agree that the funding arrangements are not ideal, but I can assure you that prior to 2019, Council was able to manage these events without a detrimental effect on Council's financial position, as demonstrated below

I respectfully disagree with Professor Joseph Drew's view which he has formed after 'delving' into the last 11 years of Walcha Council's finances that, and I quote "a pattern of a decline in council's financial stability has emerged" and "I'm going back eleven years in financial data and can confirm for you that this problem is at least 11 years in the making, it is not something that has suddenly arrived over the last 3 years". During my time as General Manager, Walcha Council's finances were under enormous external scrutiny including a number of Boundaries Commission Hearings, a Fit for the Future examination by the Office of Local Government and a substantial Promoting Better Practice Review by the Office of Local Government. All rural councils face financial pressure from time to time, however after all this scrutiny, Walcha Council was deemed financially sustainable and able to stand alone, an outcome which is in vast contrast to Professor Joseph Drew's "desktop review". Had Walcha Council not had quality governance and proven financial management, I have no doubt that Walcha Council would have been amalgamated.

The Mayor's comment in the fifth paragraph of the column and I quote "Over a minimum of these 11 years council has maintained a tenuous financial position through the revaluations of assets, conversion of assets to cash and reduction in unrestricted cash", does not make sense. Each year Walcha Council is required to complete an audited set of financial statements. These accounts amongst other information include a set of financial performance indicators and, without complicating the issue, one of these indicators is "Unrestricted Current Ratio", which I believe the Mayor is referring to when he states "reduction in unrestricted cash." This Unrestricted Current Ratio is used to assess the adequacy of working capital after excluding all restricted assets and liabilities. The benchmark set by the State Government is greater than 1.5:1.

I have reproduced the ratios below for the last ten years, from Council's publicly available financial statements. The Mayor's statement is confusing to say the least.

In the sixth paragraph of the Mayor's column he continues to say and I quote "from 2014 to 2019 our staff increased by 33%." There is very little context to this comment. The staff numbers did increase over this time for a number of reasons, the most significant being Council was successful in gaining a multi-million dollar, multi-year grant to upgrade the Thunderbolts Way. An assessment of the workforce was undertaken to ensure we had the additional skills and labor required to deliver the project. This assessment also took into account potential staff retirements, to ensure that when the funding ran out Council was not over staffed and as valued employees retired, transfer of knowledge and consistency within the workforce was maintained. I do not believe that Walcha Council was over-staffed in 2019.

Unfortunately, in the past 3 years Walcha Council has lost the majority of the engineering team as well as a number of long-standing employees. The loss of corporate knowledge that goes with these resignations is immense. In this time there appears to have been a need to supplement the workforce with a number of consultants. Perhaps the Mayor can provide greater details of the budget overruns in employee benefits and oncosts of \$750,000 and in administration costs of \$287,000 in the financial year ending 30 June 2021? While I do not have access to the workings of Walcha Council's finances for the last couple of years, I believe these overruns and those of the previous year may go some way to explaining why, in the last published set of Financial Statements, Walcha Council had a negative working funds balance of \$2.459 million

In the ninth paragraph of the column, the Mayor goes on to state that "Of higher concern is Walcha's submission to the IPART Assessment of Council Fit for the Future Proposal in 2014. Under sustainability it states, "In its proposal, the council relies on the successful application for and adoption of a permanent Special Rate Variation (SRV) from 2016 to 2017 of 15.6% cumulative over 2 years (10.5% above rate peg)". As the lead time for a SRV is around 2 years this should have been started in 2014. If this proposal had been implemented as stipulated by council's submission and documented by IPART many of the current issues would have been averted."

I agree that the potential SRV was a part of the Fit for the Future submission, however a number of strategies were proposed and implemented to increase Council efficiency and negate the need for higher rates. These strategies are documented in Council's submission to the Boundaries Commission in 2016 regarding the proposed merger of Walcha Council with Armidale Dumaresq, Guyra Shire & Uralla Shire Councils which stated, "these improvements have resulted in Walcha Council no longer requiring the proposed special rate variation that was included in its Fit for the Future submission to IPART". Over the last five years 83 New South Wales councils have applied for a Special Rate Variation both Armidale Dumaresq and Guyra Councils are amongst these. Our modest infrastructure backlog and lack of need for a Special Rate Variation is a strong testament to our strong capacity in financial and asset management. Our modest infrastructure backlog and lack of need for a Special Rate Variation is testament to Council's strong financial and asset management at that time."

My last task in my role as General Manager was to present, in conjunction with Councils External Auditor the 2019 "General Purpose Financial Statements" to Council. This statement included the following cash backed reserves, which is cash set aside for future use. On top of these reserves, Council also had a working funds balance of \$1,259,000.

Walcha Council may not have been the "richest" Council in the State, but I believe cash reserves of over \$5.9 million at 30 June 2019, would be seen as more than adequate going forward. It is extremely disappointing, given the above facts, that a review of Council's Financial Sustainability is now deemed necessary.

I appreciate these figures may be confusing and I am more than happy to discuss this issue with staff, past councillors, present councillors and more importantly any member of the community.


Both teams are scheduled to play Narwan at Armidale in Round 2 Saturday 7 May.
