Award winning journalist, Emma Partridge, who has covered crime in Australia for more than a decade has released her first book, *The Widow of Walcha*.

The book details the life and crimes of local Natasha Darcy from her arrival in Walcha in July 2006, through the Supreme Court trial for the murder of Mathew Dunbar, and Natasha's subsequent conviction and sentencing of 40 years jail. "In writing the book, I was mindful that Walcha is a small town and I didn't want to cause any more grief to the community," Emma commented.

Emma spent many months in Walcha after Mathew Dunbar's death researching the case, interviewing Mathew's friends, family and Natasha herself at the property, just before her arrest in an attempt to gain an insight into her criminal mind. In the book Emma details the interviews she had with locals, and accounts of her time in Walcha with people welcoming her into their homes, and being very generous with their time and assistance.


"Through the book I wanted to portray to readers a real sense of who Mathew was, a person with a very intelligent mind and generous heart. Someone who just wanted to find love, help people and volunteer his time to the community."

Emma continued to follow the case and sat through every day of Natasha's two-month trial in the NSW Supreme Court. "Part of the motivation to write the book came through the many people who were contacting me to ask what was happening in the trial, hence more than one-third of the book is dedicated to the trial." Emma said.

"I have never come across a case like this, and it is sad to see the effect it has had on the community of Walcha. I don't think anyone will ever fully understand why she is the way she is because she refuses to admit guilt, but obviously she targets vulnerable men to achieve wealth at any cost."

around the traps

It is hard to believe how good this weather has been in recent weeks. Temperatures have been so mild, with few frosts and a few sunny days thrown in for good measure. Over the weekend I travelled down into the central west, one way via Dubbo and back from Bathurst through Orange and Wellington. I have to say I have spent a lot of time in that area over the years and have never seen it look better. Creeks are running, paddocks are brimming with quality feed and the few livestock you actually get a closer look at, look a picture. I did come away with a sense that there is a long way to go before a lot of that country is fully stocked, but maybe that is just because the season is so good.

There is a lot of cropping country south west of Coonabarabran with water still lying in paddocks as a result of recent rain, which can't be good for winter cropping activities. Some farmers I spoke with told me they were desperate to get wheat in the ground, while others who had been lucky enough to get Canola and other crops in the ground are seriously concerned about losing plants in low lying areas. Further north, cotton picking is under way and with a cracking crop, cotton growers are having a shocker with crops sitting on wet ground and harvesters not able to get in to do the job. It is far from easy for the farmers out there right now, but it does appear the rewards are going to be there again this year with global shortages of grains. The world does not need this conflict in Ukraine (a major supplier of grains around the globe) with very dry conditions in the USA preventing spring plantings as well as dry conditions in parts of Asia and Europe. India has just put an export ban on their wheat which speaks to just how dry it is there and how uncertain they see their supply situation. Luckily we are so hopeless at moving our grain and have a lot of grain from the 2020 harvest still in silos, not to mention 2021! Global instability will drive price points this year.

There has been an enormous amount of rain through central QLD over the last couple of weeks which should go a long way to keeping restocking activity at high levels for some time to come. It was suggested by many commentators that rain in central QLD (which had been dry enough) would ignite restocker activity in the north and probably put a stay to any downward pressure on cattle markets for some time. It will be interesting to see if that plays out, but last week on Auctions Plus, restockers in the north did not turn on their computers. Prices for steers in particular were very subdued, but the lack of interest was put down to damage to crops and pastures rather than something more. The inference being, that restockers will be back once the weather has settled down and damage assessed. You would think that grain prices are going to have an impact on feeder markets and feedlot activity down the track. At this point I am guessing the feedlots did have access to a lot of wet grain after last harvest and that may take a while to chew through.

Just reflecting on the averages on AuctionsPlus last week, the steers were harder to sell. The light weights from 200 to 280kg LW ave \$73 less for 2272 on offer. The 280 to 330kg weight range were just \$17 cheaper, but the 330 to 400 kg weight range were \$146 cheaper and the feeder weights of 400 kg plus were a massive \$330 cheaper. Part of that maybe a reflection of what was on offer, but it is a significant drop by any stretch. The heifers on offer were far less volatile and averages in that department were similar to those of the previous week, as were the averages for a good quality lines of PTIC females. However, the clearance rates of the PTIC females was much lower, which would indicate buyers are happy to pay the rate for the best quality cattle, but not so keen on the lesser quality lines.

By this time next week we will know the outcome of the Federal election. The new government may well be a Labor government if the polls are correct. That could be a good outcome if they spend some money on connectivity in regional areas as they have promised to do. On the other side of the ledger it may also mean curtains for the live sheep trade which they say they will shut down if elected. I think that will not be good for producers in WA in particular, but the mutton market generally in my view. We also have to hope this does not carry into the live cattle trade which has been such a constant and so reliable for northern Australia in the Kimberley and the Gulf. That would be a disaster for cattle producers everywhere. I am encouraged though that Labor will put funding back into the Department of Foreign Affairs and aid projects in the many countries that need our support. If the Coalition is elected we will get more of the same and we hope that means continued support for regional Australia. Either way, the candidates in this election have done very little that suggests change or a vision for something better. I don't see any inspiration coming from either side of the political spectrum.

Tiger Moth engineers visit Walcha

Recently Bert Wellfare and John Land visited Walcha with many historical photos and information regarding the early days of superphosphate spreading in the New England region, and specifically in Walcha. Walcha has the first Tiger Moth used for super spreading in Walcha. It was donated by Tom Watson, who formed Aerial Agriculture in Bankstown in 1952 and operated 20 Tiger Moths on topdressing in NSW. Both Bert and John worked for this Company as engineers for almost a combined 100 years! Bert started in 1954 aged 18 and retired in 2000.

This Tiger Moth, VH–PCB, was used in Walcha till they were phased out in 1965 by the Department of Civil Aviation (now CASA). Bert was instrumental in dismantling it, transporting it to Walcha, where he then reassembled it in the shed where it still resides at the Historical Society's premises in Derby Street.

Bert had lots of stories of the old days and interesting facts and figures, plus many photos and articles which will be donated to the museum

The first aerial spreading in Australia was on 'Mirani' in 1951, thanks to the foresight of Mr A. S. Nivison and others. Then Mr Dick Ireland was the first person to spread super commercially on his land 'The Lake'. From then on, aerial fertilising revolutionised agriculture in the area, taking Walcha from relatively unproductive land to the "pasture wonderland" it became, thus making Walcha one of the best grazing areas in the country and greatly increasing the carrying capacity of livestock.


It is easy to forget or be unaware of our history and those pioneers who were not afraid to try new things. We owe them all a debt of gratitude for what we have today.




