# Air Force recognises our Centenarian Veteran

Riverview resident, Walter Foster is the oldest living Gunner who served with the Australian Air Force in World War II. His outstanding contribution to our country was recognised on Saturday with the presentation of a Certificate of Recognition as a Centenarian Veteran by Air Force representatives who travelled to Walcha.

Flight Lieutenant Dave Slattery described Walter as a 'selfless hero' as he made the presentation in front of his family, including grandson Kristian Schmidt, at the special luncheon held at the Commercial Hotel.

Walter, or Wally as he prefers to be known, celebrated his 100th birthday last November, being born on 26 November 1921

In 1941 Wally graduated from Brisbane Women's Hospital as a Pharmacist, but did not register his qualification as he wanted to join the Air Force and he knew if he registered he would become a precious commodity and not be allowed to go to war.

On 9 September 1942 Wally enlisted into the Royal Australian Air Force as a Wireless Operator Air Gunner.

He trained as a part of the Empire Air Training Scheme in Winnipeg Canada. Once he graduated he flew with the Navigator trainees as their Wireless Operator Air Gunner for the next 6-12 months.

He was then transferred to Scotland based near St Andrew's Golf Club at Aberdeen. Wally was part of the B-24 Liberators being used as anti-submarine patrol aircraft. His team would drop air-deployable sonar buoys over the North Sea of Scotland in search of submarines.

Upon his discharge, before heading back to Australia, Wally was approached by the United Nations to work as the Chief Pharmacist as the Belson Hospital in Germany. For the next two years he looked after the survivors from the Bergen-Belson Concentration Camp. While he was there he attended the Nuremburg War Trials.

Once back in Australia, Wally moved to Lismore to practice as a Pharmacist, before marrying Marie in 1949 and moving to Beaudesert. They went on to have two children, Robert and Lyn. Lyn now lives in Walcha with son Kristian at the Commercial Hotel.

Wally loved playing cricket being an A grader for Wynnum Manly in Brisbane. Wally was opening bat, and is very proud of the fact that Alan Border took his batting position when he retired.

He keeps busy at Riverview Hostel, continuing his love of aircraft as he builds model planes.

A selfless hero, with a truly amazing history.

# around the traps

We have been so lucky with the weather to this point, and the luck has to run out! A winter blast this week is going to bring us back to earth with strong winds and snow down to 800m expected in the Central Tablelands. Monday night has seen power outages around the state and many roads cut with fallen trees. Locally, there have been reports of fallen trees in all directions with a lot of damage to trees caused by the wind on Monday night. Once again the Oxley Highway is closed between Yarrowitch and Yarras which seems to be such a regular occurrence these days, that before you drive down to Wauchope you have to check to see if it is open! The rest of this week is looking fairly cold, but hopefully we will see some better days once this change has passed.

After a change in Government I am not seeing anyone too surprised and I have to say change is often a good thing because the focus and issues change with it. Albo has started off with a busy schedule and now he is back in Oz his cabinet will be announced this week. It will be interesting to see who is given the Agriculture portfolio and one can only hope it is someone heavily focused on agriculture and the regions. Without Joel Fitzgibbon, the former shadow minister, it is hard to see any of the other big hitters who have an interest, but time will tell. If there was ever any doubt, I think agriculture has demonstrated in recent years just how important it is to our economy and it should be well supported by the new government.

One move I am happy to see resolved by this government is the matter of the Tamil asylum seekers who have been pushed from pillar to post by the former government at extraordinary expense to the tax payers and huge cost to their mental health. I agree with Albo, we are better than that, and the failure of the former government to find some compassionate grounds to help these people is beyond comprehension, with Peter Dutton and Scott Morrison at the fore. There are always special circumstances and, on the surface at least these people should qualify. They still have a battle ahead of them to get residency status, but surely that will play out in their favour.

On the conservative side of the bench, as expected Peter Dutton has taken the role of Liberal leader unopposed and our member for New England Barnaby Joyce has been ousted by David Littleproud as leader of the Nationals. Both leaders are from QLD which is interesting, and it will be just as interesting to see the direction they take their parties in the coming months. Change is needed with more of the same not palatable to the electorate, and both parties will have to work hard to convince anyone that their attitudes towards women and climate change are behind them. It will be just as interesting to see whether this new independent movement has any capacity to influence the parliament, now the Labor Party has a majority in the lower house. Indications are that they will probably be at least be heard by this government, which was less likely with the last.

Tamworth yarded 1368 cattle on Monday in what was described as a fair to good quality yarding. There were more cows on offer and increased competition to buy them. Market trends were a bit all over the place, but largely unchanged on the previous week. Wagga yarded 2100 cattle on Monday which was down 100 head with a lot less cattle coming in from the west. The yarding was plainer and feedlots were strong on all suitable lines. Processors found it hard to compete with the feedlots, even on the killable cattle. Interestingly the EYCI has shot up again this week to over 1100 c/kg CWT, which would be attributed to recent rainfall and lower numbers I suspect.

Sheep and lamb numbers have eased this week with Bendigo yarding significantly less following Wagga with a reduced yarding last week. Dubbo also yarded 2700 less sheep and lambs on Monday while Tamworth yarded a hand full more. With all the big centres yarding less sheep and lambs you would have to consider that winter numbers are approaching and maybe we will see values lifting on the back of reduced numbers. We live in hope.

# **Trio selected for Country honours**

Three members of The Armidale School's First XV forward pack donned jerseys for NSW Country last weekend, having been selected for the under 18s side to take on Combined High Schools on Sunday 29 May.

Tight-head prop Stirling Munsie (Guyra), who has played for Country previously, was joined by debutantes, fellow prop and Year 12 classmate Eugene Campbell (Walcha), and second rower Fred Kearney from Coonabarabran, in Year 11.

The game was a very physical encounter ending in a 19-all draw. All three TAS boys were picked in the run-on side, with Stirling Munsie named Captain.

The boys were amongst 23 of 130 who trialled last month at Maitland and headed to Narrabeen Sports Academy in Sydney last week for training, ahead of their first clash against CHS. The team will also play GPS White on 21 June, AICES (Association of Independent Coeducational Schools) and Combined Catholic Colleges later that week, before the series culminates in City v Country at Bathurst on 31 August.

"It's good for the confidence to be selected again, especially as the City Country match was canned last year due to COVID. The boys from the bush always have a special bond and it's also good to see a lot of younger talent coming through," Stirling said.

For Eugene it is a dream come true, having trialled in the past.

"I'm looking forward to developing my skills and having tried out for a few years but not making it, this is extra special and was the end goal in my last year at school," he said.

Fred, who last year played for GPS President's XV A, said he was excited at the prospect.

"I was stoked to be selected and it will be fantastic to play at another level of rep rugby. The experience we will get from coaches the calibre of Mike Hays, who used to coach the Queensland Reds Women's team and Gordon, will be awesome."

# Childcare Crisis in Walcha - Not just a problem for working mums

To attract young families to Walcha and to retain them in the community, participation of both parents in the workforce needs to be facilitated. This is both an equity and an economic issue for Walcha and reflects the reality of today's socioeconomic needs.

Women make up a huge part of the workforce in Walcha. We are the doctors, retail staff, police constables, psychologists, dietitians, farmers, accountants, nurses, teachers and administrative staff, and perform many other important roles. Many of these mothers (and sometimes fathers) do not work the hours they would like due to lack of 'work friendly' childcare. By this I mean long day care, pre-school, before and after school care, vacation care.

This is a big loss for the Walcha community and its economy.

Childcare options in Walcha currently are:

- Walcha Pre-School: 59 licensed places for children aged 3-5.
   Open during school term dates only.
- Walcha Central School: after school care commenced in Term 2 2022.
- Armidale & District Family Day Care and KCL Family Daycare Providers: currently no places available for children of any age.

As such, if you have a child under 3 who is not already enrolled with a Family Daycare Provider, there are no childcare options available in Walcha for you at present. Many families are forced to drive to Uralla or Armidale for childcare or rely on informal care arrangements for their children.

I have heard the argument that rural communities such as Walcha are too limited in terms of resources or are too small to establish and maintain the full range of childcare options. However Uralla, Guyra, and Manilla, all towns with comparable populations, are able to service both pre-schools and long day care.

Given this situation in Walcha, a few concerned parents have created a childcare working group. You may have noticed a recent survey in the Advocate. We are trying to establish the true childcare needs of Walcha residents.

#### Results are in...


- We had 81 respondents and of those, 94% felt that availability to childcare services in Walcha was inadequate.
- 63% of respondents needed childcare, where none, or not enough was available. 19 children needed childcare where none was available at all, and 71 children required more childcare.
- 38 respondents, including myself, had children in informal childcare arrangements.
- 77% of respondents needed childcare during school holidays. 43 families needed extended hours of childcare.
- 32 respondents struggled to find care more than once per week, limiting their ability to work.

Many respondents voiced their frustrations at the limited childcare options in Walcha and some respondents had reduced their hours of work in order to look after their children because childcare wasn't available.

These are only a few of the many responses to the childcare crisis that we received in the survey. Full survey results will become available soon and we plan on organizing a community meeting in the near future to help problem-solve this issue in Walcha.

So often I hear that in many aspects of its community and socioeconomic activities Walcha is considered to punch above its weight. Come on Walcha, let's to do the same with childcare!

# "Don't muck around"

Stroke survivor's plea to the community

Tamworth man Joe Miller was trying to eat his lunch at a local shopping centre in 2014 when he noticed something wasn't quite right. "I had no control of my hand and the pie, instead of going into my mouth, hit my forehead."

The 67-year-old was having a stroke. He recognised the F.A.S.T signs (Face. Arms. Speech. Time) and quickly sought help.

"Because I learnt a lot, I knew the F.A.S.T signs, so I realised what was happening." Two weeks later, another stroke struck. This time Joe was at home and couldn't swallow a cup of coffee. Again, he was taken to hospital, but it wouldn't be the last time. Joe had another three strokes, making that five in two years.

He's recovering well and is now using his experience to educate others.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are 1.5 times more likely to die from stroke as non-Indigenous Australians and Joe wants to change that. As part of National Reconciliation Week, which starts today, he's sending an urgent message.

"Don't muck around. The main thing to survival is follow the F.A.S.T rules. Time is of the essence and if you feel like you're having a stroke, ring triple zero and get an ambulance straight away."

Stroke Foundation CEO Sharon McGowan says Joe's message is crucial to improving survival and recovery rates.

# What's the Goss

Early in March this year marked 68 years since former Walcha Central School teacher George Boermans arrived in Australia as an 8 year old from the Netherlands with his migrant family. Back in 2004 'Hazeldean' resident George asked the then Winterbourne School bus driver John Smolders why he had been absent from his job for a while to which John replied he had been attending a family reunion celebrating 50 years since coming to Australia by boat.
