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around the traps

Some beautiful winter days have been wonderful this last week, while the south of the state has still been feeling the cold changes coming through with regular monotony. I must say that after the first couple of weeks of winter, I was wondering what we were in for until September. Thankfully, we seem to have found ourselves with some sun and a run of warmer days after some big frosts. It won't be too long before we are looking forward to a fall of rain again, but at this point I'm keen for some more good days under the sun. I see the BOM still have us down as much more likely to experience wetter conditions rather than drier for the next few months. That is the case for much of the eastern half of Australia with the exceptions being western TAS.

It would be good if we could say livestock markets were as stable as the weather has been over the last week or so. Both cattle and sheep markets have been shedding value daily in the market place for the last couple of weeks. Many market reports are highlighting that not all buyers are in attendance which is interesting. It tells me they are getting enough stock to process without having to attend a physical market. I wonder how this would be playing out if the \$Au dollar was back up towards 80 c US? I should highlight the fact that processors have been paying above and beyond to stay in the game, pretty much since 2016 but with some respite from late 2017 until late 2019 when the drought broke. Market analysts have been saying for a long time that the cattle market in particular was unsustainable and values would correct. For a long time that did not appear to be the case, but numbers are starting to come forward and the tide may well have changed, albeit slightly. The EYCI is back to 1053 c/kg CW which to put it in perspective is still way above where anybody thought possible not too long ago. There is also not a lot wrong with 330 c/kg for a cow, 370 c/kg for a heavy steer, or 600 c/kg for feeder steer if you consider historic values. It is far from a disaster.

Restocker values for cattle have come off the boil significantly in some cases over the last month or so, with all but for the very best quality cattle affected. Last week on Auctions Plus there was a stand out line of Angus heifers unweaned from Speriby North, north of Glen Innes on offer. There were 185 heifers sold in deck lots and the prices ranged from a high of \$3560 down to \$3460. There is no doubt that there are plenty of buyers out there for something special, which these cattle were. However, looking through the other sale results and cattle are much more buyable than they were 6 weeks ago, with plenty of steer and heifer weaners well under \$2000 which was not the case. The very best of the Angus cattle are still selling well, but anything with some cross in it has found the going a bit tougher. Look at it as an opportunity, cattle are getting much more buyable. My guess is that wintry conditions are not all that is going on and maybe some restockers are hesitant, wondering how far this processing job can come back before they see the bottom.

The same can be said for the sheep and lamb markets. A cold start to winter has put some sheep on the market as producers grow impatient waiting for higher values. Having said that the main regional selling centres on Monday all recorded significantly lower numbers, possibly due to the pasting they got the previous week. Quality is becoming an issue at this time and all markets are reporting fewer good quality trade lambs available at regional selling centres. Market values have come off another \$10 to \$15 this last week, but lower numbers this week may encourage a steadying of the ship.

I should point out that there is not a lot wrong with prices we are seeing right now. Livestock values have been at extraordinary levels for a couple of years following the drought. Values we have never seen before and well above global prices if you read some of the commentary on the topic. Analysts have been predicting values to ease well before this, and they have held at elevated levels largely because of seasonal conditions over such a broad area. It will be interesting to follow the market through into spring and see how it evolves. It is expected to remain very strong by historical standards.



After reading Mr Warwick Fletcher's letter to the editor on 15 June 2022 *If nothing changes, nothing changes*, I came to the conclusion that there are two schools of thought with regards to the proposed wind projects for Walcha: one is fiction-based, and the other is pure fact-based.

The current disastrous state of our electricity industry should be a permanent reminder that feelgood concepts eventually get mowed down by the big bus of reality. Unstable supply, blackouts, high power prices, baseload power suppliers driven to the wall are just some of the issues we have created for ourselves with our renewables folly. And taxpayers fund it.

Unfortunately, Mr Fletcher appears to be assembling a "community" line of argument in order to give the proposed Winterbourne Wind and Walcha Energy projects justification for existence. This line of argument is transparent and is used simply to serve a purpose: Mr Fletcher is one of the landholders that stand to gain financially from the projects.

Mr Fletcher's claim that these industrial wind estates will somehow provide Walcha with a strong future and a more economically diverse one is fictional. Let's be honest. This project financially benefits 20-30 landholders in total, and the notion that there is going to be loads of money for the community is fanciful. However, these proposed projects will affect everyone in the town and surrounding areas. We will all see them and hear them!

How is building 526 wind turbines (each of which are 230 metres tall, more than 5 times higher than Sugarloaf Tower in Walcha) somehow supposed to improve the quality of our town, community and life? Worse still, taxpayers end up paying for each megawatt produced by these things, thanks to the system of the Federal Government Large-Scale Generation Certificates (LGCs) and the mandated and legislated Renewable Energy Target (RET). Then there are the cozy NSW Government contracts and deals through the Renewable Energy Zones (REZs) and the transmission infrastructure costs which will be paid for via OUR electricity bills.

Walcha retains a huge number of services for its size. It's a lovely, wealthy, thriving town. The local real estates can't get enough listings, and when they do, they're gone! There are ads most weeks for local jobs, and there are always new businesses starting up, and the Walcha district has a solid event calendar and growing tourist numbers.

According to the NSW Government Population Projections in 19 years' time, Walcha is predicted to have lost... wait for it... 142 people in total (0.24%)! By contrast, Uralla is predicted to decrease by 1223 people (1.15%) This does not appear to predict an imminent population armageddon for Walcha.

The inability to field sporting teams for a few years will happen when many players retire at once, and many young people are running their businesses. Nothing new for many small rural towns. However, it's an odd point to make, given that all members of Mr Fletcher's immediate family have returned to make Walcha their business and family base. And we are all very pleased that they have.

Furthermore, a lack of community engagement is a problem being experienced right across the western world. Turbines won't fix this. Nor will they fix the fact that at any given time in history, businesses have had to deal with fluctuating markets and changing weather.

These proposed industrial wind estates of 526 huge turbines and associated transmission infrastructure (towers and power lines) will force a major change to every facet of our lives in Walcha.

Make no mistake, we <u>WILL</u> see these towers and associated infrastructure from town, in nearly every direction. I'm not sure how many pristine wilderness photos will be posted to the New England High Country Instagram feed once our beautiful local landscapes have been taken over by the turbines.

What about the supposed jobs that will be created? This is wishful thinking. These projects do not provide local employment. Several ABS reports (and experience in other areas) say that employment in large scale wind and solar power is primarily driven by installation activity, rather than by ongoing operation and maintenance. The wind farms do, however, provide employment in China, where the turbines (and panels) come from.... not to mention the fact that over 70% of wind farms in

Australia are foreign-owned... so the profits go straight offshore! China also controls 80% of the world market for rare earth minerals, which are required for solar panels, wind turbines and batteries. We are asking for trouble.

What about the decreased value of land once someone has these monstrosities and transmission lines in their paddocks? Not to mention the neighbours' property values. Who will want to live near these things? What about the noise? In March this year, the Victorian Supreme Court found that the "roaring" noise emanating from turbines at the Bald Hills Wind Farm caused a serious nuisance and various health issues for the neighbours. Bald Hills Wind Farm was ordered to stop emitting the night-time noise and they had to pay \$260,000 to neighbours.

What about the birds that will be slaughtered by the turbines? There is no doubt that windfarms cause the death of wildlife. Who really wants that? It's worth reading the views of well-known biologist and wildlife expert Nick Mooney on this subject.

When it comes to planes and helicopters flying near these turbines, what about the bushfire risk? And supering and aerial spraying? The Aerial Application Association of Australia (which consists primarily of operators of agricultural aircraft) recommends that members do not fly near windfarms. There is absolutely no doubt that turbines make it extremely dangerous and difficult for anyone trying to fight a bushfire, apply fertiliser or do any aerial spraying. And I haven't even mentioned the difficulties of flying near all of the towers and powerlines that will be constructed as part of the REZ infrastructure.

What about our roads and livability? Do we want 120 b-double trucks, 56 HRVs and 200 light vehicles on our roads every single day? And that's only for the Winterbourne project, and they're not peak vehicle movements either! Imagine trying to get from Walcha to Tamworth!

Is this really what we want for Walcha? Remember that these things are not being built in Manly or at Point Piper, and there are very good reasons for that. I think there needs to be a far more transparent debate so that we can sort fact from fiction with regard to these proposed projects.

Our town's future and our quality of life depends on it.

Welcome to WalchaEnergy's second community newsletter.

We have been carrying out the preliminary environmental studies on the RubyHillsWind Project for the Scoping Report which is the first formal planning submission to the NSW State Government Department of Planning and Environment (DPE).

Since the project is larger than 30MW it will be a State Significant Development and DPE will be the determining authority.

Currently WalchaEnergy is focusing on submitting the RubyHillsWind Scoping Report to the NSW Government by September 2022. The Scoping Report involves the process of describing and broadly documenting the overall project including preliminary layouts and briefly covering issues that would require further detailed investigation. The DPE then issues the Planning Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements for the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS).

The Scoping Report is a detailed public document which will be

available at the NSW Governments Planning Portal when it is completed and put on public display. The public and the Council will be able to comment on the proposal when it is put on public display.

This Sunday is a three person Ambrose for trophies donated by Simeon Cross, Fred Henry and David Dunn.


