around the traps

Well, if it wasn't already wet enough the widespread rainfall event that swept through the state last Thursday and Friday filled it to the brim. Widespread falls of between 30 to 60mm around our district had all the creeks running with the Apsley River taking out a few flood fences with it. It didn't seem like a lot of rain, but the already full soil moisture profiles showed us how vulnerable we are to flooding now. The worrying part is that these wet conditions are set to continue into the spring, coupled with some spring and summer storm activity, it just might be the recipe for more major flooding.

The wet winter has really set us up for a huge spring, a spring fully loaded with clover, worms and those darn nodding thistles. I swear nodding thistles are adapting to frost or the chemical is gradually becoming less effective as some of those little bad boys haven't stopped growing all winter. Chemical prices went through the roof last year with China holding onto more product than usual for their own use, but prices have eased somewhat over the winter months. Just being able to get around the country during spring to spray weeds will be difficult enough. The use of drones in agriculture for such things like spraying in inaccessible areas are becoming more relevant and cost effective. LyonAg Drone solutions at Nowendoc is a local business using drone technology for spraying around the district and I encourage you all to make contact to see if they can help you out.

Rural property is still in red hot demand considering the softening of both the beef and sheep markets over the past six weeks. The long term forecast for the red meat industry is looking very positive if we can keep Foot and Mouth out.

We have seen a fall in the residential market values due to the increasing cost of living and rise in interest rates, but the rural property remains strong for the foreseeable future. What a lot of us don't realise is that the push for Carbon farming could be the other string in the bow for the continual rise of rural land values. There are so many unknowns with Carbon farming, but I think it is a way of the future and a way for graziers, especially those with cattle to create an alternative revenue stream in the future. How that looks in terms of values, obviously depends on numerous factors and methods of assessment that aren't clear. Carbon farming has really put a floor in the rural property industry with large industry-based companies trying to invest to offset their Carbon footprint. Carbon farming in regions such as our could be more beneficial than we think as grazing systems can sequester carbon through every kilo of production and this can be increased using deep-rooted perennials and legumes. Carbon Farming is an interesting market that will no doubt evolve over the next decade, and I think all graziers need to keep a close eye on this market.

A week closer to spring and the widespread rain through NSW and Victoria held cattle and sheep numbers back from the online selling platforms and the physical saleyard markets. AuctionsPlus had a reduction of 25% listings resulting in the strongest market seen for two months. Restocking steers lifted on average by \$133/hd, while the market for quality joinable Angus females bounced with 307kg Angus heifers topping at \$2430 each. PTIC cows stole the limelight jumping on average in value by nearly \$500/ hd, while young Angus females with Autumn drop calves at foot reached \$4500 a unit. Saleyard numbers have dropped off considerably with just 217 cattle yarded on Monday in Tamworth and 740 cattle drawn for in Gunnedah. All categories improved in value and hard to compare due to the low numbers but finished cows topped at 364c/kg, up 30c/kg on the week previous. Tamworth yarded 2000 lambs and 826 sheep on Monday with a rise in quality and a lift in prices. Trade weight lambs averaged \$147, selling to a top of \$162, while heavy export lambs averaged \$187 and sold to \$228. Hoggots averaged \$157, mutton averaged \$140 and heavy mutton topped at \$178.


