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## Digging our new dam

One of the most important water infrastructure projects for our region is underway! Work has started on our 300 megalitre Off Stream storage project to help drought proof the town.

Mayor Eric Noakes was very excited to see shovels in the ground. "The new storage dam has been the number one priority for Walcha Council. It will enable us to be better prepared to face the devastation of drought events by providing a safer and more secure source of drinking water."

Costing \$11 million, the project also includes upgrading a river offtake pumping station, upgrades to the water inlet structure, new access roads and fencing, and new pipework to connect the dam to the nearby town water supply pump station.

Early works packages have been completed that include site clearing, fencing and construction of an unsealed access road. The main contract work started on the 15 August with the project expected to be finished by the middle of next year.

Member for New England Barnaby Joyce is very pleased that the dam construction has commenced. "This project is so important for Walcha, giving current and future businesses ease of mind should we face another drought," he said.

The dam has been jointly funded by the Australian and NSW Governments. The National Water Grid Fund Connections Pathway is contributing \$2 million and the NSW Government's Safe and Secure Water Program is investing \$9 million.

In 2019 we faced lengthy and harsh water restrictions because our small 80 megalitre off-creek water storage was not big enough. "The new dam will quadruple the river storage capacity transforming the way Walcha manages its water resources, particularly during droughts," NSW Lands and Water Minister, Kevin Anderson said.

NOTE: During construction there will be increased traffic movements through town and to the site. Council anticipates the impact will be minimal and thanks the community for their understanding.



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## around the traps 💦

Recently I have had to travel through the Liverpool Plains to the central west regularly and I have been amazed at the transformation of the country over the last month. It was very wintry a month ago and with a lot of surface water across the plains and Mudgee to Bathurst looking much like Walcha. But as the weeks have ticked over, first the wattle sprang to life, then clover, and now the grasses are growing rapidly. Spring has begun in a rush right through to the tablelands and the country looks a picture. As I was driving across the Liverpool Plains on Monday afternoon, following a few warmer days the crops have grown enormously, noticeably. It was so good to see the change. Pastures are growing around here too, but we have a long way to go before we catch up.

Livestock throughput is usually at its lowest point for the year in these months and prices respond to that. Lamb numbers have been an exception to this, with higher weekly slaughter numbers than the same time last year and also higher than the year before that. Mutton numbers have continued to fall by comparison and forecasters are predicting we will see values rise for mutton as a result. It will be interesting to watch the lamb numbers as we head into spring properly and how the market responds. To this point I think many producers have been disappointed with prices through winter, given the bullish forecasts late last year.

Cattle numbers have remained fairly static year-on-year for the last few years and values have remained steady. The EYCI has recovered from its low point of around 880 c/kg DW in late July to be sitting at 1021 c/kg DW this week. Restockers have been the mainstay and realising just how good spring and summer are going to be, have been actively back and buying. As the cattle herd has been rebuilding, we have seen slaughter numbers steadily decline since the end of 2019, but we may expect to see more processing cattle about by this coming autumn. If you see some of the stuff coming out about forecasts for the cattle market, they remain very bullish and positive about international demand. It is a very positive outlook brought about by drought in the US and continued demand for protein from developing countries.

There were a couple of extraordinary Angus bull sales in the south last week. Millah Murrah at Bathurst sold 128 bulls to a top of \$160,000 and an all breeds record sale average of \$43,633! According to the report in The Land the first 20 bulls were averaging \$60,300 and the sale grossed \$5.585m. On Friday Milwillah Angus at Young had another extraordinary result with 112 bulls offered and sold to a top of \$200,000 and an amazing average of \$30,450. There were a lot of studs represented in the buyers list at both sales and a lot of repeat buyers which must say something for the cattle. Options to buy bulls are running out and Ben Nevis sale is on this Wednesday. We really hope there are a lot of locals there to support Stu and Erica for their annual sale.

The local forum around wind farms conducted at the Bowling Club last week certainly attracted plenty of interest and thanks to those who organised it. Although a good crowd attended, it was disappointing there were not more people from in town or many involved in the wind farming projects represented in the room. I can understand that many of the wind farm hosts may have thought this was going to be a negative meeting, but it was disappointing to me that there were no speakers involved in the project(s) wishing to express their view. From the meeting it is obvious there is opposition to the projects and a questionnaire many completed after the meeting certainly highlights that. Council has some work to do if they are to represent all constituents. I think that if the returns on these wind towers are as lucrative as expressed in the meeting, the hosts and the community are being hoodwinked. In my view, if we have to have wind farms it is the community that needs to see a quality return, not just individuals as it is set out. It is the community that is being asked to bear a significant load once we enter the construction phase of these projects. Traffic movements alone will be crippling to a lot of business, not to mention wear and tear on infrastructure. The other aspect which is totally objectional to me is the scale of these projects being proposed for Walcha. To have a proposal of 550 turbines in our district is far from satisfactory in my view and not in the interests of the community. This would only create development on an industrial scale, with the combination of towers and high voltage power lines too much to bear. I have tried to keep an open mind with this discussion, but I am having trouble seeing what good can come to Walcha if development on this scale is approved. I don't want to live in a divided community, nor one with lights on every hill in sight. Our community has been our strength and should remain so. In moderation it may work.

## Wind Farm meeting answers some of the community's questions

It was a packed house at the Walcha Bowling Club on Wednesday night when community members, landholders and a panel of speakers informed the community about wind farm projects planned for our district.

Facilitated by Cameron Greig, who explained to the community at the beginning of the evening that the group he has helped form, Renewable Energy Walcha Awareness Group (reWag) is aimed at being an approachable community group who want Responsible Renewable Development. "We are not anti-renewable, however we feel there is a gap in information being provided to the community, which is the aim of this meeting tonight."

KEY POINTS TO COME FROM THE SPEAKERS INCLUDED:

#### Mark Foggarty - Lawyer, Bushtricity

- New England, and in particular, Southern New England (Walcha and district) is doing the heavy lifting when it comes to producing the NSW Government's target of 8GW of generation from the New England REZ.
- You need to have a co-ordinated response to the EIS which is scheduled for release shortly.
- The cumulative impact of these projects on the region is huge.

- Developers will not be able to use Walcha Council's water supply.
- Council is a part of two groups which will assist in working through impacts of these developments. These include Coalition of Councils in the New England REZ (Armidale, Glen Innes, Inverell, Walcha, Uralla); and Coalition of REZ Mayors, which includes Councils in the Western zone (Central West-Orana REZ) as well.
- The Community Fund for Walcha has been set at \$750,000 p.a.

#### Karen Zirkler - Kentucky Farmer and Community Member

You need to rely on the power of your community during the EIS process. It is a huge amount of work, but time is of the essence, as you only have 28 days to respond.

- · Get organised, share the load and support each other.
- Every person and every business can make a submission. Each one has to be unique from each entity's viewpoint.
- · If there are more than 50 objections to the EIS then the Independent Planning Commission (IPC) is triggered.

### Peter Barton - Wellington Farmer and Community Member "A conversation of what large scale renewables look like and the impact on community five years on"

- · Positives of wind turbines in our area included income for landholders, income through the Community Fund, some local jobs - not too many, roads are maintained.
- · Negatives have been: no local long term jobs, no real boom during construction of wind farms, very hard to move livestock, or get to the school bus. It turned neighbours against neighbours, which was the worst impact of all. It was horrible to observe.
- Things to be wary of: Annual payment to landholder at the start these buy your silence. Make sure neighbours are recompensed so the community isn't torn. It certainly does devalue your land. Locals are agents for overseas companies, and the money you are being paid is definitely not enough for decommissioning.

#### Max Mawhinnev

- This is a great turnout and it is great that people are taking an interest.
- There is a lot of money to be made in the production of energy.
- · In the UK the impacts of the electricity price hike with renewables has made it very difficult on pensioners.
- Europe is rationing electricity as they are using more than they are producing. We will have similar price pressures as Europe is experiencing. We will have high energy prices for years.
- The Walcha community should secure a higher benefit from these increased prices.
- · Landholders should engage with their neighbours before signing up.

### **Dear Diary...**

SEPTEMBER 7TH, 2025 Spring has just kicked-off in Walcha. I'd love to go to the new exhibition at the Art Gallery at Tamworth but, of course, there's no way I can get there with the onslaught of 'turbine trucks' blocking the Oxley Highway. Wow, 2025 sure has turned out to be a pretty rotten year.

Sadly, I can't go to Armidale when I feel like it, either. The never-ending stream of turbine-related B-doubles and trucks make it just about impossible to get past the John Oxley fields.

You know, I can still remember that community meeting, way back in August 2022. Good roll-up; about 300 Walcha folk crowded into the Bowlo. I was especially saddened to hear first-hand stories of how Australian employees of overseas developers were being downright unethical in their communications. It was that night that I began to realise the reality of Walcha becoming the

centre of the so-called REZ. By the end of that meeting, it was obvious it should be renamed, Regional Engagement Zilch.

Don't get me wrong dear diary. I understand the imperative around renewable energy. What I don't understand is why the state government didn't respect our community and respect us as citizens of this state. Why didn't they come to Walcha and talk with us (not at us) before the projects kicked-off. With local knowledge and expertise, combined with the experience of wind farm planners, we could have looked at the challenges and solutions together.

But it wasn't to be. The comment, at another meeting, made by a shiny Energy Co. executive: that 'of course, Walcha couldn't use the community chest to buy new footy jumpers' was an 'Ah-Ha!' moment for me. The comment smacked of city arrogance, as well as ignorance about the number of very well-educated people in the Walcha area. I realised that in the desperate quest for the state to have new sources of energy, Walcha is expendable. The message was that we are regarded as proverbial country hicks and surely the sugar-coated community chest should be enough to shut us up.

Now, in 2025, we are living the nightmare.

I can't help but wonder if some of the host landowners now regret their decision. They have had their own challenges and I wonder if the money they are making has made it worthwhile. I actually feel sorry for them. Of course, we'll never know if any of the host farmers did have regrets as their silence was bought when they signed their contracts.

But I feel even more sorry for us folk in town. Of course, some people on the turbine access roads sold up and left town early, when they realised their quality of life would be zero. Hell, there's been so many issues ... many of them unforseen.

Naturally the tourists stopped coming ... too much of a hassle on the roads. Guess it's not surprising that a few businesses have gone under.

Of course, there's been no available accommodation for some time, so anyone planning a Walcha wedding, or any kind of gathering or festival had to scrap that idea.

If stress is the gap between where you are, and where you want to be, there is an awfully big gap in Walcha. I reckon most people in town would give anything to be back where we were in 2022: a cohesive community with a vibrant atmosphere.

Of course, looking back to 2022, I realise we couldn't have stopped the turbine juggernaut. But I can't help wondering if we could have done more.

Could we at least have united together and explored other ideas; such as alternatives to wind turbines, or seeing if there was a way the trucks could completely bypass the town. Could we have done more to ensure that there was clear (no-waiting) access in and out of the town to both Tamworth and Armidale; that goods could continue to be delivered to Walcha; that kids could get to school in Armidale; that Fire & Rescue could get where needed; that people could continue to live and run their businesses unheeded; and that we could stay a tourist destination.

Yes, dear diary, any alternate ideas would have required some out-of-the box thinking, plus time to do that thinking. Unfortunately, we didn't have the luxury of time. Our last hope was the chance to respond to the EIS in September/ October 2022. We had just 28 days to somehow read and respond to the horrendously huge document. That was the key opportunity for the community to speak up; to do our very best to lessen the impact of what was to come.

Ah, I'd better stop raving. It's all too late now, anyway. We're no longer Walcha ... 'where wild rivers run'; we're Walcha ... 'where wild turbines hum'.

Anyway, gotta go. I'm off to Gloucester to do some shopping. Yep, it's four hours round-trip but at least the shops are stocked and it sure is nice to get out of Walcha for a while.

The panel speakers delivered their material and then participated in a Q+A session. They covered topics


- · How the REZ zone legislation was implemented, imposed and fits into the community of Walcha.
- · Details of the EIS process, the projects planned


for our area, and how the Walcha community can and needs to get involved, to help shape Walcha over the next 1 – 2 generations.


- · The risks and important issues that potential hosting landholders need to be aware of.
