Grand champion judge

A bright career in the industry awaits beef Meg Kealey who arrived home in Walcha on Monday morning sporting the trophy for Grand Champion Junior Judge of the NH Foods Angus Youth National Roundup.

The four day event was held in Wodonga on the Victorian border this year after a two year break due to COVID. One hundred enthusiastic participants aged from 8 to 26 years attended sessions feedlot nutrition. auctioneering, retail meat cuts, breeding and genetics, as well as a beef industry career question and answer session.

In addition to this, they competed in Junior

Judging, Parading, Cattle classes and Herdsmen competitions.

On Friday Meg judged four groups of cattle, which included stud and commercial lines, to be named in the top group of judges for her Intermediate age group. She then went on to compete in the Intermediate final, judging four heifers. "We put them in charge of their ring, and they tell the stewards how they would like the ring to run. They are judged on their ring craft, as well as their knowledge, judging ability and speaking on the microphone," Roundup Co-ordinator, Toni Nugent said.

Meg was named Champion Intermediate Judge, and then went on to compete against the Sub-Intermediate, and Senior judges to clinch the top prize of Grand Champion Junior Judge of the Roundup.



In addition to this she was also named Reserve Champion Intermediate Herdsman of the Roundup. This is judged on such things as teamwork and involvement in the four-day program.

"It was a very successful Roundup. I was very happy," Meg commented.

Meg will now be invited to the 2023 National Roundup as an Associate Cattle Judge. "This will be an awesome opportunity as I can shadow the judges and assist them in judging the classes," Meg said. "I hope to learn a lot from this experience."

Meg begins Year 12 this week and has her sights set on a career in agriculture. "I plan to have a gap year, or two, in the Top End before embarking on a Rural Science or Agribusiness degree."

around the traps 😝

The fronts keep rolling in across NSW and the rain continues to fall over our already soaked state as the river systems struggle to contain the run off. The latest front brought anywhere from 30 to 100mm to large parts of NSW that produced major flooding throughout the north and central west. Regional NSW water storage levels are beyond full and a dam such as Burrendong has risen 20% in the last week alone to be at 140% capacity, which is raising major concerns for towns below the dam along the Macquarie River. The state's water storage level sits at an average of 102% this week as our dams begin to spill, rivers continue to run high and the threat of major flooding set to continue with the la Nina expected to last for another 6 months.

Tattykeel Australian White ram sale blew everyone's expectations away selling a ram for \$240,000 which was purchased by a syndicate of Aussie White seed stock producers. Demand is growing for shedding sheep with the rising cost of shearing, lack of shearer's availability and the overall strength in the demand for sheep meat. Tattykeel sale grossed \$4.9 million with their 306 flock rams averaging \$8,704 and their 30 stud rams averaged \$42,666. Regardless if you produce meat, wool or both, there is definitely some serious confidence throughout the sheep industry.

The continual wet weather is playing havoc with livestock supply with numerous amounts of consigned cattle, whether it is to feedlot or abattoirs unable to leave many farms due to the wet weather. Numerous farms have poor wet weather access which makes it difficult to get trucks in and out. Opportunity presents itself at these times for those producers who have all weather access and often a premium paid for livestock that are ready and able to be supplied. If you're considering updating your access then I think it is a wise move as you can not only take advantage of these sharp price spikes at short notice but you can supply your livestock at the designated date as we all have financial commitments to meet.

LDV is set to release an Electric powered Ute later in the year which it supposed to be one of many tools for Australia to meet its net zero emissions target by 2050. Yes there are already electric powered vehicles available but as far as I'm aware this will be the first Ute and I'm holding my judgment on just how these would work for the rural community of Australia. Obviously these vehicles are a way of the future but why aren't we considering hydrogen powered technology over electric power, makes sense since we are supposedly heading towards net zero emissions.

Store markets continued to meet strong demand from restockers as Tamworth yarded over 4000 cattle on Friday with breeder quality Angus heifers the flavour of the day. A consignment of vendor bred Angus heifers ready to join to the bull met strong competition topping at \$2920, while well bred weaner Angus steers made from \$2100-\$2250. It was slim pickings in the cow and calf section with Angus cows with fresh calves topping at \$4025 and PTIC topped at \$2675.

AuctionsPlus seemed to run for an extended period last Friday as buyers continued to chase suitable cattle and have one more bid. Angus weaner steers are hard to acquire at the moment and the prices were indicative of just that with steers selling between 750c/ kg and 900c/kg depending on weight and quality. Feeder steers topped at 584c/kg for 450kg Angus steers and top quality Angus breeder heifers sold to \$2700. Young cows and calves at Glen Innes topped at \$4520 a unit and local 3 year old PTIC Angus cows sold to \$3310.

Applications close 31 December 2022 or when funding is fully allocated.





Exhibition of Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)

The next project milestone is the submission of the EIS to the NSW Department of Planning and Environment (DPE).

We are working to finalise the EIS and lodge it in October. Once lodged, DPE will place the EIS on public exhibition for at least 28 days. DPE determines the length of the exhibition. During the exhibition period, which we expect will be in November and early December, the EIS and all supporting documents will be publicly available on DPE's Planning Portal (www.planningportal.nsw.gov.au/major-projects).

We look forward to hosting another community information event in Walcha during the exhibition period, to provide information about the project and the EIS, and share with you how you can make a submission. We will advertise the exhibition period on our website and through local media.

All feedback, both positive and negative, will be carefully considered and responded to in a Submissions Report to DPE.

Key project benefits



2,100,000 MWh generated per year of clean, renewable energy.



375,000 average NSW homes could be powered by the energy produced annually from the project.



400 estimated full-time equivalent construction jobs at the peak of project construction, creating approximately \$310 million in wages and profits, per year of construction.



16 full-time equivalent operational jobs to be based in Walcha or surrounding communities.

Community Benefit Fund

\$1,000,000 to the Community Benefit Fund prior to the start of project construction.

\$750,000 annually to the Community Benefit Fund from the start of commercial operations through to project decommissioning. The annual payments will be escalated at CPI.*

The Community Benefit Fund will be managed by Walcha Council. Funding will be utilised to support community programs, events and facilities, as well as local businesses, not-for-profit organisations, and services and infrastructure in the Walcha and Uralla Council areas. An advisory committee including community members and representatives from local councils will review and recommend funding applications to support community initiatives.

^{*}Based on a delivered project up to 600 MW capacity. For every megawatt over 600 MW, an extra \$1,000 per MW will be contributed annually to the Community Benefit Fund.





Environmental Impact Statement

Over the last two years, we have conducted rigorous environmental studies in accordance with the Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs) for the project. The studies have been across several technical disciplines and include, but are not limited to:



Biodiversity assessment involving **2,633** hours of surveying across **12** field investigations.



Heritage assessment involving **600** hours of field surveying by archaeologists in partnership with Registered Aboriginal Parties.



Noise assessment involving background noise monitoring and technical modelling to predict the expected levels of noise and vibration during wind farm construction and operation.



Visual assessment involving an evaluation of the visual impact of wind farm infrastructure in the context of dwelling locations, topography, vegetation and the overall landscape.



Social assessment involving targeted stakeholder interviews with a cross-section of the local community to hear views and further understand potential social impacts and benefits.

The assessments have led to extensive changes to the design and delivery of the project to minimise potential environmental and social impacts. A brief summary of some key findings is presented below. There will be much more information in the EIS and we look forward to presenting those findings at the community information session during the exhibition period.

- Biodiversity: The project site mostly consists of exotic grasslands with sparse woodland and scattered trees. Extensive flora and fauna studies have been undertaken since 2019 to identify, and then to avoid and minimise, potential biodiversity impacts. Vegetation clearing will be offset through the NSW Biodiversity Offset Scheme. A Bird and Bat Management Plan will be developed prior to construction to define measures for reducing potential impact to avifauna during project construction and operation.
- Heritage: Eleven sites of Aboriginal cultural heritage value may be impacted during the project. Archaeological management strategies will manage and mitigate the potential impacts. The sites will be either protected (e.g. fenced off); avoided where possible by changes to the project design; or, if impacts are likely, managed appropriately in consultation with the Registered Aboriginal Parties prior to construction.
- Noise: The operational noise at all non-associated residences near the project is predicted to be lower than the NSW Government guidelines. Construction noise will be managed through a combination of work scheduling, community notifications, sound enclosures, and acoustic screens.

- **Visual**: The project layout was designed to minimise visual impacts as much as possible to nearby residences. However, the project will result in changes to the landscape during the construction and operational phases. Planting of vegetation is proposed at various non-associated residences to reduce the visibility of project infrastructure.
- Traffic: There will be adequate capacity in the road network to accommodate the project. A detailed Traffic Management Plan will be prepared prior to project construction, and individual transport permits will be required for all oversize and heavy load vehicles. We are also working with Walcha Council to develop a road upgrade and maintenance plan so that we can maintain the integrity of Council roads used for project traffic.
- Social: Stakeholder interviews identified that there may be minor impacts to daily life and farming practices during construction, which will be carefully managed in consultation with affected stakeholders. The project will create direct and indirect employment opportunities for the local community. Regional businesses will also benefit from localised procurement and from meals, accommodation and services for the workforce.

Digging in for improved town water security

Our new \$11 million Walcha storage dam is well underway and is set to be complete on time in March 2023.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall along with the Member for New England Barnaby Joyce and Walcha Mayor Eric Noakes (pictured) were on hand to celebrate the formal commencement of this jointly-funded project last Friday at the dam.

The first ceremonial sod of soil was turned on the dam which will have a capacity of 300ML. "This will allow Council to store two years worth of average town

consumption off stream," Adam Marshall said.

The project is a joint initiative between the Australian and NSW Governments, with the federal funding portion of \$2 million delivered from the National Water Grid Fund Connections Pathway and the State committing \$9 million from the Safe and Secure Water Program. Mayor, Eric Noakes said it has been a six year journey to get to this point where construction has begun. "This is a game changer for



Walcha and should never see us go into such high water restrictions as what we faced in 2019," he said.

The major phase of this project includes roadworks, increasing the capacity of the river offtake pumping station, upgraded water inlets, fencing and pipework connecting the storage dam to the water treatment plant "We have 16 km away. been able to keep money in our town by using local contractors for these jobs, as well as upskilling Council staff," Eric said.

"This is an incredibly important project for Walcha.

"The Government has changed, but work in the New England is still going," Member for Northern Tablelands," Barnaby Joyce said. "We need to make the place strong and resilient, and move on from rolling water restrictions.

"I would like to commend Eric for his incredible patience and perseverance. It is a great day for Walcha and I look forward to having the dam built," Barnaby concluded.


