around the traps

A few more windy days like those experienced over the weekend and since and we will be looking for rain! I had a drive back through the central west a week or so ago and couldn't believe how much the country had dried out in the previous few weeks. Most of the native grasses are now well out in head and will burn off in the coming weeks as they usually do. More windy weather will certainly accelerate that process but add some heat to the mix and the landscape will be transformed quickly. There is such a bulk of feed on top right now, you would have to think there will be a considerable fire risk if we do see temperatures kick up.

I had a glance at the BOM site temperature outlook for the summer months and we are in a zone where the probability of maximum temperatures being exceeded is fairly low. Much of the south eastern corner of the country falls into this category, but the north western half of the country is much more likely to experience hotter conditions. The BOM forecasts for rainfall continue to be fairly bullish until March at this point. After that it is uncertain, but there has been a considerable change to ocean currents in the north west which affects the IOD and there is some chat that we could return to Elnino by late winter next year. That is not a great thought but there are models out there suggesting this. There is a long running drought in the US (and parts of China) and I am thinking they are wanting this change in weather patterns. Either way, our run of wet conditions is probably not going to last forever.

There is little doubt that confidence in livestock markets is struggling as processors see more stock in front of them and restockers struggle with lower values from both processors and feedlots. The feeder market has lost considerable ground over the last 6 weeks with many feedlot orders struggling to get above \$5 per KG LW delivered to the feedlot. That is a long way back from the \$6 plus of a couple of months ago. With the season as good as it is cattle have reached feeder weights much quicker than they normally would do and cattle usually sold in Feb / March are coming forward now. Processors have also got some options now with more cattle in front of them and the Christmas break just around the corner. This last week has seen some of the export cattle back by as much as 40 c/kg on top of another 20 or 30 c/kg the previous week. If you apply that sort of drop to a 600 kg animal, the difference is more than a drink on a Friday night. Heavy cows have come back from over 400 c/kg a couple of weeks ago to around 330 c/kg this week. The EYCI is now back to 976 c/kg DW which I am still of the view that there is too much feed for prices to come back too much and processors will meet seller resistance, but it is a changing market place and global trading conditions have changed. It does appear there will be plenty of cattle to come forward in the new year whatever happens.

AuctionsPlus cattle numbers came off the high numbers the previous week and restockers were a little more cautious this week. Average prices were lower and clearance rates were lower, but the show did go on and restockers may have turned their attention to breeding stock. Breeding stock are getting a lot of attention as restockers look to a longer term and probably something seen as a little safer.

Sheep and lamb numbers on AuctionsPlus this week were the highest they have been for 2022 at 147,588 head for the week. National lamb sale listings accounted for 63% of the total weekly offering with 93,552 head offered. Part of the increase in numbers this week would undoubtedly be attributed to the flooding in NSW where many sheep regions have been in and out of floods for the last month or so. Values were off the boil for the week, but far from a disaster. There are more numbers to go around and paddocks are either full of sheep or water, so something has to give.

The Wind Farm debate around Walcha is reaching a crescendo as Winterbourne Wind have now lodged their EIS on the State government portal. Members of the Walcha community have until the 15 December to lodge any objection to the project, which to me seems weighted in favour of the developer as it is impossible to actually read the EIS, let alone make comment in the allocated time. This is a huge document by any standard and if you have any concerns, you need to isolate the section you are interested in and make comment on that. My concern is that if we let this first project get established without community expectations and concerns addressed, we have no hope of having our concerns met when it comes to the multitude of other wind projects being proposed. I believe that having anywhere near 570 wind towers around the district in the years to come will be a disaster for our community and not the boon we are being led to believe.



Make sure YOU have your Say

If you really care about Winterbourne Wind Farm, for or against, it's time to have your say by making a submission about the project's Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). I've just read one of the many reports that are part of that EIS, the Social Impact Assessment (SIA). Quite a large document, it deals with Walcha's socio-economic status, highlighting effects of the Project on the community, and measures to mitigate negative impacts. Here I very briefly outline some criticisms on this SIA, by no means all but enough to make several submissions about that aspect of the project. If you want more, follow the link at the end of this article to a video that digs deeper.

VERBOSITY ATROCITY

My first comment is about the length and language of the SIA document. Laborious reading, it is far too long. The net result is a mind-numbing document that effectively prevents the reader from reading it all. This is an important criticism, because there is no doubt that many potential submissions will not eventuate because of this. Trapped in a forest of obfuscation, many readers just won't bother

THAT EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Could it be a ploy to drive readers to the EXECUTIVE SUMMARY? This is a three-page piece which presents a simplistically glowing picture of the wonders that Winterbourne Wind has in store for Walcha. If that is the only bit you read of the 120 or so pages of the Social Impact Assessment, you'll be hugging turbines all the way home.

METHODOLOGY

I also have questions about the methodology for this study. Using *Socio-Economic Indexes for Areas* to establish the Social Baseline is fine, the sort of thing used by the ABS and the Census in their reports.

But it is underwhelming stuff, and frankly lumping Walcha and Uralla in with Armidale and Tamworth really doesn't help build a true Social Locality portrait for the impacted area.

CONSULTATION

And then consultation claims by Winterbourne Wind PL really leave me wondering. If such consultation was so widespread and frequent, I wonder why almost 79% of respondents to the Voice for Walcha survey felt that: "The developer, Winterbourne Wind, has not adequately consulted with the community."

AND WHAT ABOUT THE CCC?

Throughout this SIA a group called the Community Consultative Committee (CCC), is lauded as being a key significant body of local community input and sentiment. Sorry, but that seriously over-states the position of the CCC. With six meetings between 2021 and 2022, its memberships diminished from about twelve to two members actually attending its last meeting. Its three information days attracted about 60 people, which can only be called pitiful, especially when compared to the 520-plus respondents to the Voice for Walcha survey. Surely the CCC has been a non-event. To cite it as a key stakeholder in the Social Impact Assessment has to be a joke.

If renewable energy is so cheap, why do South Australian's (now heavily converted to renewables) pay 25-30% more for power than other Australian states?



Is it because energy generation cost is different to energy delivery cost? Renewables have a couple of inconvenient add-on costs; battery storage (to even out supply) and new transmission infrastructure (allowing for different generation locations and higher surge capacity). These costs have to be added into renewable systems, as the costs are amortised over a period of time, and paid by the consumer. This is the REAL cost to consumers.

To suggest that renewable electricity delivery to consumers is cheaper, simply because the cost of generation is cheaper, is a tad naive, and certainly misleading. Europe, and South Australia, are evidence of this.

This is not an argument for fossil fuel energy production, simply correcting a commonly held misconception that renewables are a cheaper source of electricity.
