around the traps 💦

We could definitely use another drop of rain in the next week or so with the country drying out and the pasture just starting to brown off. Some of the native clover has started to curl with the warmer days and the springs in some spots dried up. Temperature in the mid twenties is forecasted for the next week or so with a chance of thunderstorm rain next week which will be more than welcome. Hard to believe that we are only 20 days from Christmas, where has the year gone?

The closer we get to the end of the business trading year the further the values in both the beef and sheep markets decline. The response from any feedlot or processor is that the end meat selling component for both proteins on the world market is considerably sluggish with some major importers not paying their bills. Honestly, historically it has never been a great time of year to market your stock and I feel now they have the pressure on a sliding market they will continue to hold it until our numbers subside and current glut of livestock work themselves into the system over the next few months. The key market indicators for both proteins for market pricing all look incredibly strong in the near future, probably stronger for beef. Remember that besides the stocking number on your properties, the rest of the industry isn't working at 100% capacity due to long term labour shortages.

The Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA) met for the final time for 2022 on Tuesday and I'm guessing by the time you read the article that another rate rise would have been announced. The lifting of the rate would mean further costs to your mortgages and just before Christmas as well. The RBA is trying to dampen inflation with the Australian job market in tight supply, which has offered increased wage relief for many workers. I can see some rough time ahead for property owners and the possibly of people defaulting on their loans due to the rising cost of living and the increase in interest rates. The housing market has already seen reduced interest and clearance rates in major metropolitan areas due to the current financial states of many households. People stretched themselves to buy their first home or an additional investment property before the rates increased and the government's inability to get the cost of living under control may see themselves in a difficult position next year. The lift in interest rates on \$750,000 loan has added an addition \$1,400 to monthly repayments.

Rural property owners would also be keeping an eye on the interest rate rises and no doubt with the beef and lamb market in decline the squeeze is definitely being put on the profit margin. Those who own rural property know that the cost of living, the rising cost of production and the declining markets mean that producers will also need to tighten their belts. I don't believe rural property values will continue to rise but instead hold firm. All indictors are saying that the Agriculture commodities sector looks promising for years to come but we all know how quickly that can change like the threat of FMD or the next drought.

Next Monday 12 December will be the last prime cattle, sheep and lamb sales, while Friday 16 will be the final store cattle sale in Tamworth for 2022. Tamworth yarded 840 cattle yesterday which saw a cheaper trend throughout the yarding with noticeable buyers absent from the sale. Restockers continued to pull out of the market with weaner steers topping at 590c/kg and weaner heifers topping at 530c/kg. Yearling cattle saw the biggest drop with medium weight feeders falling as much as 30c/kg on average. Heavy steers to process fell by as much as 25c/kg, to top at 360c/kg, while cows remained relatively firm and topped at 314c/kg.

Tamworth yarded 1000 sheep and 2200 lambs, with the lamb job selling to cheaper trends of \$8-10 for trade weights, topping at \$165 and the export lambs fell \$20/hd topping at \$220. Restocking lambs looked value at \$80-\$110/hd, while the sheep market fell in value by \$5/hd and a lot more in places for lightweight mutton. Majority of the mutton sold between \$70-100/hd.

Extra five weeks to respond to Wind Farm proposal

The Walcha community will have an additional five weeks to respond to NSW Department of Planning on the proposed Winterborne Windfarm, thanks to the intervention of the Minister for Planning Anthony Roberts, Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall announced last week.

Mr Marshall approached the Minister earlier last week after fielding concerns from Walcha locals about the short timeframe to respond to the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Winterborne proposal, the largest windfarm project ever put forward in the region.

"This is great news for the community, which will now have until 22 January next year to make a submission in response to the Winterborne proposal," Mr Marshall said.

"The Department was only publicly exhibiting the proposal for one month, which simply was not enough time for the community to read, critically analyse and properly respond to a document and attachments of almost 1,000 pages.

"This is the largest and most complicated wind farm proposal our region has ever seen and so I feel the right decision has been made to extend the period of public comment.

"I thank the Minister for responding so positively and quickly to my request on behalf of the community."

Mr Marshall said the windfarm proponent had years to compile its EIS, so it was reasonable to give the community impacted by the proposal adequate time to respond, beyond the original closing date of 15 December.

"The extra time will allow locals to respond with better quality submissions and give the Department a much better sense of



community views, questions and concerns, which is the whole purpose of the public exhibition period," he said.

The Winterborne Windfarm proposes to construct up to 119 turbines of a blade tip height of 230 metres near Walcha.

The community now has until 22 January 2023 to respond to the Winterborne Windfarm EIS.

\$3.72 million to expand cycling path network



The largest-ever single expansion of Walcha's shared cycleway and footpath network is about to get underway, thanks to a huge \$3.72 million investment by the State Government, announced last week by Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall.

Mr Marshall made the announcement alongside Walcha Mayor Eric Noakes and said the \$3,729,174 grant, from the Get NSW Active program, would be used by council to extend the community's existing shared pathway network by approximately 10 kilometres, in three separate sections.

"This is great news for the local community, giving locals more opportunities to get together and get active but also for tourists to easily explore and enjoy the stunning beauty of Walcha," he said.

"This funding will allow Council to continue to provide safe, connected pathways between key locations in the town.

"Council will be extending the existing footpath on Fitzroy Street, up past the newly-built Walcha Men's Shed to the soon to be renewed Lion's Park, then the entire length of Darjeeling Road past the Walcha Racecourse, cemetery and John Oxley Oval.

"This will complete a 7-kilometre loop of connected pathway which also joins the Walcha Showground, Rose Garden, Quota Park, and Pioneer Cottage Museum to the CBD.

"And finally, \$1,750,254 of the grant will go towards the construction of a new 2.1-metre wide pathway from the township of Walcha towards the Aboriginal community Summervale.

"It's great to see Walcha Council proactively trying to make it easier for residents to pop down to the local shops without jumping in the car, the smooth pathways in particular beneficial for those living with a disability and the elderly."

Cr Noakes said council was extremely pleased and excited to receive the funding.

"I have no doubt the route will be very popular, for tourists, children and ideal for daily exercise," Cr Noakes said.

"The funding for the pathway to Summervale is massive investment towards providing a safe alternative access into Walcha for a vulnerable community.

"The road is windy, narrow and without any defined cycle lane – the addition of a footpath/cycleway will allow a safe alternative to vehicular travel."

Mr Landfear (project director of the Winterbourne Wind Project) confirmed by email in October that there would no longer be a Neighbour Benefit Program. He also confirmed that no money would be paid to neighbours from the Community Benefit Fund.

Yet you only have to get to page 5 of the summary in the EIS to read about the "diversified income stream" neighbours will receive through the Neighbour Benefit Scheme. We have confirmed with Mr Landfear that this scheme does not exist.

In table 6.2 of the Social Impact Assessment, it says "Neighbours and the wider community will also receive financial benefits from the project through establishment of the Community Benefit Fund (CBF)." We again asked Mr Landfear if neighbours would be paid out of the Community Benefit Fund. The answer "No".

The carols evening started back in the 1980s in McHattan Park and has run every year since, mostly in the park until rudely interrupted by the virus two years ago. The carols booklets are still the originals, used over and over and handed back in each year but still functioning despite showing a bit of age and retaining the original spelling mistakes.

Originally the Rotary Club each year organised a piano on the back of a truck to provide the music and was assisted by the Salvos from Uralla (no doubt also on the back of the truck). Luckily for the ageing backs of the Rotarians a much lighter electronic device now provides the tunes. Long term pianist Jan plays and the Walcha Singers lead us in the carols. The very substantially improved Council Park provides a friendlier venue than it did all those years ago. No truck needed these days, but it is a good idea to bring blankets and rugs to sit on, or maybe a chair if the ground is a bit too far down.

Also for many years the local schools have provided a brief performance of a Christmas theme with a great demonstration of massed talent from our primary school children, and in fact quite a few of those child performers from years ago are now watching as parents as their own children and grandchildren perform.

The club caters for the event with a free sausage sizzle and soft drink. If you have a more sophisticated palate you can buy a steak sandwich.

With Christmas falling in storm season the carols have had a number of last minute changes of venue to somewhere more protected. These venues have proved to be a mixed success especially when the candle wax had to be removed from the floor of the hall the next day! It's still OK to use traditional candles in the park and on the night Rotary supplies electronic candles at cost if you wish to use these. In alternate venues only electronic candles can be used. So if rain threatens Rotary will rapidly re-locate the evening to a weatherproof spot, probably the MPC at the Central School. This will be a last minute move so they will rely on the good old Walcha word-of-mouth system to spread the news of any change.

Boosting your defences against COVID 19

It's now clear that COVID-19 virus will be with us forever and we have to learn how to manage it. Australia is now in the midst of a fourth COVID-19 wave of 2022. Infection rates are still rising and so are the hospitalisations and deaths.

Fortunately, we now have the tools to tackle COVID-19 virus and stop it from causing harm. We have vaccines and antiviral medications that have been proven highly effective in preventing serious disease and death in people infected with COVID-19.

Australia has a highly successful vaccination program. Primary course vaccination with any available vaccines is recommended for anyone 5 years and older. Vaccinations for under 5 year olds is recommended for vulnerable groups with underlying health conditions which could increase their risk of serious illness after contracting COVID-19 infection.

A person is considered fully immunised after receiving two shots of a COVID-19 vaccine.

After 3 months of completing a primary course of vaccination or after contracting COVID-19, a single booster vaccine dose is recommended for anyone over 16 years old. For people 50 years and older and people younger than 50 years with underlying health conditions which put them in higher risk of serious illness after contracting COVID-19, a second booster (fourth shot) is recommended 3 months after first booster shot or after recovering from a COVID-19 infection.

Pfizer and Moderna are the two leading vaccine types due to their proven high efficacy and safety profile. They are the only vaccines approved for pregnant women.

Pfizer original, Pfizer, bivalent, Moderna original and Moderna bivalent are all recommended for booster shots. However, the best vaccine is the one you have put in your arm as there is no evidence that the newer bivalent vaccines are better than the original vaccines. So go out and get boosted.

Evidence for booster dose recommendation is still evolving but there is a strong indication from health authorities that we will have annual winter booster shots to protect against expected waves of future COVID-19 variants which are likely to cause outbreaks during winter.

In Walcha GP clinic, we currently have Moderna bivalent COVID-19 vaccines for those interested in having their booster shots. We have re-introduced mask wearing in the clinic as we are currently in the midst of a COVID-19 wave in Walcha.

We have a mini-respiratory clinic for those with COVID-19 like symptoms to be assessed outside. We also have telephone consultations for those who have contracted COVID-19 infection and would like to have anti-viral medications.



Cash to fill our pothole problems

Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall has today announced an immediate \$3.72 million shot-in-the-arm from the State Government to help the region's beleaguered councils, which are struggling to keep on top of the growing number of potholes and damage on local roads.

Mr Marshall said the funding, from the government's oneoff Fixing Local Roads Pothole Repair Round, would be used by councils to cover the extra cost and ease workload pressures for urgent repairs to the most damaged sections of the local road network across the region.

"With almost record rainfall being experienced across our region in the last 12 to 18 months, and two floods thrown in for the Moree district, our local roads have copped an absolute flogging and many are in a terrible condition," Mr Marshall said.

"To make matters worse, the continued wet weather has hampered councils' efforts to undertake any major repairs, instead just patching what they can until the next rain does more damage.

"This extra cash alone isn't the panacea, but it is a welcome boost for our councils and their road crews, who trying to take advantage of the current dry period to complete as much repair work as they can."

Under the funding round, councils were allocated funding based on the size of their local road network:

Gwydir Shire	\$709,204.63
Glen Innes Severn	\$395,357.10

"Councils are responsible for maintenance on the local road network so this extra cash will help ease some of the pressure they are facing and boost the resources they can draw upon to fix the most damaged roads," Mr Marshall said.

"It will also help reduce the number popped tyres, bent rims and other vehicle damage being sustained by motorists as they try to navigate some challenging road conditions."
