around the traps

It is amazing just how quickly the surface water has disappeared following recent windy weather. The country has dried out quickly which points to just how soft it was when rain was delivered every week. I am thinking this has been a record year for rainfall for some districts, but I don't think Walcha has been a long way in front of average when I look at the records I keep. I think the period from April through to July was too dry to be breaking records, but that was offset by the period from August to November to an extent. Wet weather has been absent since early November and dry conditions combined with the wind have burned off native grasses rapidly, changing the look of much of the district as a result. Storms on Monday delivered quite decent falls of rain and I am sure there are plenty like me who have been looking for a decent fall this side of Christmas.

I have been talking with a few grain farmers recently and they appear to be in a better place than they thought they may be when I last had contact. They have certainly had a better time of it in recent weeks with some dry weather, but they would love to see a bit of heat to bring in the last of the crops in wet country. The interesting thing has been how much grain they have recovered from what appeared to be a hopeless situation not too long ago. They have surprised themselves! Most of the grain coming in has some water damage, but it is still going OK and feed quality grain is still attracting a good price. I am told that there will still be a lot of harvesters still going around in the northwest at Christmas time as they try to recover as much grain as possible. It has been a very trying time for a lot of the grain growers out there, but I am sure many of them have been able to strip more country than they ever thought possible a couple of months ago and the value of the water damaged seed has exceeded expectations.

Unfortunately, livestock markets are not finishing the year on the high we would like to see. Sheep, cattle and goat markets have lost their shine in recent weeks and months with significant changes to values. The mutton market has all but halved in value over the last couple of months and where carcass values were around 650 c/kg earlier in the year, they are now floundering around at sub 300 c/kg DW. Goats are another livestock class that has been hammered in recent times. Goats were selling above \$10 per kg DW not that long ago (with seemingly no end in sight). The same article is now selling around 360 c/kg DW which will really knock some holes in budgets in marginal country. There are an awful lot of western graziers have honed their operations for goat production as it was a market heralded as virtually unstoppable. Cattle markets are veritably shining by comparison although they too have suffered significant falls in recent weeks.

I am not sure what to make of all of these reduced values, but we are not being told there is anything but good news about demand for red meats and protein. It is apparently the case our product has been expensive when compared to product in global markets and I guess there are more numbers now available to processors. The real problem for producers will arise if we get pushed into a corner because of dry weather and numbers flood markets.

This will officially be my last "Around the Traps", although I am happy to chime in from time to time and lend a hand to whoever takes up the mantle. I am not sure when it was that I first proposed I would take on the job of writing this article, but I do remember things like memory sticks and even CD's did not exist! I used to type the article out for someone at the Telecottage (then in the old school building – now Walcha General Practice) who in turn would type it out again before printing. The floppy disc came along and we used that many times as a means of transferring the file to the Telecottage computer. The internet was then finding its legs and the old dial up connection was unreliable. I remember plenty of anxious moments trying to access the internet to forward the file on an email as emailing became part of my skillset. Emailing the file was such a huge step forward. I am also pretty sure mobile phones were only a new thing when this article first kicked off and as the local signal was so poor, many people didn't have one. How times have changed.

I have enjoyed writing the Traps over the many years I have been involved. I have enjoyed all the banter that goes with it. Over the years I have had many people contact me and make comment on the contents of the Traps that week. Good and bad! I have also had a lot of people who have encouraged me to keep writing, but it is time for a change, at least for me. I hope everyone has a very happy and safe Christmas break and that 2023 is everything and more than you wish for.

Voice for Walcha gets a Voice with Council

On Thursday December 7, *Voice for Walcha* was granted a session with Walcha Council, allowing the community group to raise several very important issues concerning Winterbourne Wind Farm.

The session opened with a report on the survey of Walcha community's attitude to the wind farm project. Then it followed with a video of a selection of individual community members expressing their feelings and opinions about the various aspects of the project. After that a number of significant failings were highlighted in the 4000 page Environmental Impact Statement published by Vestas, particularly in regard to the depletion of crucial local resources of water and gravel during the construction and post-construction phases of the project, plus a frank outline of looming road and traffic issues as well as a brief look at the major matter of decommissioning twenty years or so in the future. The session ended with a reaching out by *Voice for Walcha* to help Council adopt a clear realistic set of guidelines for renewable energy development in the future.

This was a frank, honest and open meeting that put a number of key, crucially important issues front and centre as needing Council's attention. In fact it was so important that *Voice for Walcha* has decided to make a podcast of it available so that the whole Walcha community can also be made aware of the important matters raised in the Council session.

There will be three audio sessions in the podcast plus a separate video, all of between seven and ten minutes each. The first audio is the Survey report by Kerry Field, an expert in communications analysis; very informative. The second audio deals with the Traffic Impact Assessment of the wind farm project; a real eye-opener! The third audio is *Voice for Walcha's* reaching out to Council; an intelligent call to arms into the future. Then there is the video of some local opinions about Winterbourne Wind; definitely worth watching.

The podcast and video will be spread over two weeks. This really is something you should give some serious attention to.



A LOOK BACK OVER 2022

I feel 2022 has been a good year for your council and therefore this has a positive ripple effect through to the community. Excellent seasons again, farm commodity prices generally being favourable and there has been plenty of rain, but we still all remember the dry times and the issues it brought. COVID has appeared to have backed off a bit and most of the freedoms we were used to have returned, though it still hovers in the background. Our place in the mountains does not suffer severe flooding but winter has had trouble releasing its grip.

It has been a very positive year for Walcha Council. We started off with the induction of five new councillors, elected in December 2021, they came with vitality and a sense of direction bringing passion and new ideas for Walcha. All have proven to have a clear direction and vision to take us into the future and their ability to articulate this in the chamber makes this council a pleasure to lead.

We have been the successful recipient of over \$17m in grants, some that are allocated and others our staff have worked very hard to obtain. The amount of work required to successfully apply for grants and then acquit them still amazes me. We are very fortunate to have the staff in a small council like Walcha that are so efficient at this process.

As part of this positivity, probably the most important step your council took was to apply for a Special Rate Variation (SRV) to keep us financially viable. Much has been written about the history, reason and need for this so I won't rehash that. All of the background information is still easily sourced on council's webpage. This SRV forms part of council's long term vision, strategic direction and supports the sustainability review. Coupled with a positive response from the community of over 90% in favour we can move forward, and we thank you for your support. Walcha as a community has a bright and positive future but it will not come without a measured approach, community vision and at times some sacrifices. Funding for all councils under the current system is tight and only a diligent approach to both income and expenditure will see us remain sustainable. I believe we have the right people currently in the seats to deliver the vision, from the Councillors to the General Manager through to the two Directors under the revised organisational structure. They then lead a committed and capable workforce. Through our public engagement of this process we heard loud and clear that we have some housekeeping to do and I can promise you there are reforms in that area.

Any cultural and organisational change does come at some cost, both financial and personal, but if any business does not reinvent and restructure itself on a regular basis it will fall behind. The necessary and overdue changes currently taking place will streamline your council to deliver better outcomes in a very tight fiscal environment. Until other levels of government recognise the importance of Local Government in the delivery of services to communities and adjust the funding model that allows this to happen councils will continue to fall into administration and/or not be able to maintain their communities' critical needs. They seem to be happy to cap our income capabilities but are also happy to pass on costs they once bore.

The embankment for the new off creek storage is complete. There is still considerable work to be done around the pumping station and associated pipe and electrical work but with the project looking like it will come in on budget and time this is a credit to all involved, but most importantly to the Walcha Council team who have managed the construction process diligently. Aiming at a commissioning date around mid 2023, what is arguably the largest single infrastructure project Walcha Council has



Commonwealth and State Government funding has also had a positive impact on our ability to maintain and update our assets. The acknowledgment by governments that inflation and lack of resources has led to large increases in construction costs has seen the successful application for top up funding for bridges that will allow us to complete five bridges currently in the design phase. A successful application by the infrastructure team for more funding to complete the two ends of Derby Street will see this work start next financial year. The rest of the \$11m work on the Thunderbolts Way Corridor Strategy nears completion and our infrastructure team is chasing more grants to continue its upgrade.

Safety railing on the Blue Hogan bridge, while not everyone agrees with the look of the outcome (compliance) makes this a much safer crossing. This safety feature is complemented by the installation of solar lights on the levee banks to enhance both fitness and outdoor activity. The new picket fence around Peter Fenwicke Oval is a great replacement for the dated chain wire fence. Early New Year will see the skate park and Lions Park upgrades completed and offer the youth of Walcha great facilities. This project is complemented by the roll out of CCTV security on some of council's assets to protect them from vandalism. The need for this slowly infiltrates all communities and I see it as a sad day that it has come to this. Walsh and Middle Streets will also see large rehabilitation projects take place next year.

Walcha Council continues to take a strong advocacy role in the Coalition of Renewable Energy Mayors, a group we initiated to get better outcomes for councils facing the dynamic and disruptive changes from renewable projects. Understanding and working within our role this should lead to better outcomes for Walcha for those projects the State Government determines should proceed.

From my interactions with other councils over six years as Mayor one defining

element I have always been proud of with Walcha is our community's ability to be united in the face of adversity. The motto by our current GM Barry "We are Walcha" has always been at the foundation of what makes us who we are. Untimely loss of lives, support for those who need it, devastating droughts, bushfires, amalgamation attempts and sporting challenges have seen us close ranks and have each other's backs. A shoulder to lean on. With respect to renewable energy I feel we are now being challenged by what is really an outside force, one we have limited input into but very little control over the outcome, yet it is dividing this community. Climate change and associated renewable energy policy evoke strong emotions in people, when this happens sometimes logic and the facts disappear into the mire and we lose track of who we are and our long term priorities. We must remember that any proponents and hosts are only taking advantage of Government policy, with that same Government having the final say on their licence to operate. Whichever way any project goes we need to hold onto our unity, We are Walcha, it gives us our resilience that we will need moving forward as there will always be a challenge to our unity. It would be nice to think that the New Year will bring a genuine undertaking that we aim our frustrations at those who can change outcomes and accept that we all have a diversity of opinion. The outcome will be decided in an office in Sydney, both sides can only fight the good fight but both sides cannot win. Surely we are a better community than to let reactive government policy divide us.

Finally on behalf of Sheree, myself and your councillors I would like to take this opportunity, to wish one and all a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. Christmas can be a challenging and difficult time for some as it's often a time to reflect on the past year. Counteracting this is the joy of catching up with family and friends, something that seems to not happen enough as our lives get busier. 2022 seems a blur, and the long tail on winter does not really evoke a feeling of the lead up to a traditional Christmas but I'm sure that the next ten days will rectify this. The Wind of Change

Something needs clarification. Winterbourne Wind is not a "community-based project", it never has been. It has never had the support of the broader community and only benefits a few directly involved who stand to gain financially.

The proposed community fund is almost an insult when looking at the projected total revenue generated by the project.

Our family moved to the beautiful quiet town of Walcha in 2010 for a change of pace and to live an off-grid lifestyle. Many of our good Walcha friends are "blow-ins" as well. People who have started businesses in the area, work the land, enrich the community through artistic endeavours, volunteer in community organisations and send their kids to local schools.

Over the past twelve years we have made a conscious effort to run an environmentally sustainable agricultural business.

The majority of our electrical power requirements are generated on-farm through our stand-alone solar system.

We try our best to minimise any waste generated going into landfill.

We are truly concerned about the environment and try our best to do our part.

We were shocked to find out in 2020 that our farm would be located at the centre of the proposed Winterbourne wind project. If this goes ahead our serene home will be surrounded by dozens of 230m tall turbines (almost 4 times the height of the Sugarloaf tower), every one of these bird chomping monsters equipped with aviation beacon lights.

We have been kept in the dark about the scale and magnitude of the Winterbourne wind project by Walcha Energy and our involved neighbours. There still seems to be no accurate information available about exactly what will be going where (Turbines, Substations and Power lines).

Why was all of this planned in secret?

Why, at "5 minutes to midnight", do we still know so little?

In the meantime, we're battling our way through thousands of pages of EIS & appendices...

Due to our opposition to the wind farm there is now noticeable strain in the relationships with our neighbours (as most of them are in favour of the project given the huge financial benefit that will be coming their way once they become turbine hosts). The animosity seems unjust as all we are doing is trying to defend our way of life, our home and our investment.

At a recent community meeting we were told "our emotions don't matter as we're trying to save the planet here". What a laughable statement. Your newfound 'environmentalism' isn't fooling anyone. Do you recycle your waste? How big is your existing solar system? What else do you do to minimize your carbon footprint!

I realise that Australia needs to explore alternatives to coal fired power generation, however, proposing to build a wind farm of industrial proportions (one of the largest in the world) in such a small community is absolute insanity. It will destroy the flair of the town, damage our fragile ecosystem, ruin our already terrible roads, kill-off tourism... The negatives are almost endless.

If Walcha wants to do its bit towards a sustainable energy future why don't we look at the development of a local micro grid with a mix of solar and if needed- smaller and less invasive vertical axis turbines and local battery storage. That way, we can meet our own energy demands and generate feasible electricity for our local community. Other towns are doing it already, so why can't we?

The project will also have a huge impact on tourism which is vital for Walcha's economy. Do people really think that a wind factory of industrial proportions will bring tourists to town? How many people drive out to Sapphire Wind Farm on a Sunday to gaze at the towers?

Do we really believe that those "400 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) jobs through the construction period" will bring us 400 new families and help us repopulate Walcha? Will the 39 FTE jobs during Operation, including approx. 16 site – based jobs for the life of the project" entirely go to local contractors and tradespeople?

The divisiveness of this project is ruining our beautiful community.

Johne's Disease

What is it?

Johne's (pronounced 'yo-nees') disease is a chronic wasting disease. It is caused by the bacteria Mycobacterium avium subsp. paratuberculosis. The infection causes thickening of the intestines, leading to the reduction of normal absorption of nutrients and loss of condition (even when on good feed). Death occurs due to starvation or euthanasia is performed on humane grounds. It is found in cattle, sheep, goats, deer and camelids.

How is it spread?

The disease is spread when a susceptible animal eats or drinks something which has been contaminated by infected faeces. Young animals are much more likely to be infected. The bacteria can also survive in the environment for several months (up to 12 months). Infected animals only shed bacteria intermittently and only show visible signs of infection as they get older. It is referred to as a "silent but costly disease" because a Johne's diagnosis is often not made until a significant proportion of the flock are already infected and deaths are occurring. Prevention is the only defence, as Johne's disease has a long incubation period and there is no treatment or cure.

What does it look like?

Due to the slowly progressive nature of the infection, stock may be infected for years before they show any signs of disease.

Bovine Johne's Disease (BJD) - cattle are usually infected when less than 12 months of age, but clinical disease is often not seen until the affected animal is at least 4 or 5 years old. Signs typically appear after a period of stress e.g. calving, poor nutrition or lactation. They usually develop chronic diarrhoea, lose weight and become emaciated (while still maintaining a good appetite) and they can develop bottle jaw. It is important to note that Bovine Johne's disease is more prevalent in the dairy industry, but does occur in the beef industry.

Ovine Johne's Disease (OJD) - sheep can become infected at any age, but young sheep are more susceptible. Infected sheep continue to eat and drink normally until they are too weak to graze and die. A classic sign of Johne's is a mob with a distinct tail (a portion of the mob in much poorer condition than the rest), and the sheep all ranging in condition. Scouring is not a common feature of the disease in sheep (but occasionally can occur).

NOTE: OJD is almost always due to the sheep strain of the bacteria, while BJD is almost always due to the cattle strain of the bacteria, however cross species transmission (sheep strain of bacteria infection in cattle and vice versa) does happen, but very rarely.

But isn't Johne's a "down south" problem?

While Johne's disease has normally been diagnosed in high rainfall areas like south eastern NSW (e.g. Yass and Wagga) and VIC, there have been cases diagnosed in areas where it has not been seen before. It has been diagnosed in the New England and even in Walcha. It is crucial to be vigilant when buying stock in and monitoring your current stock.

So how do I make sure I don't get Johne's on my property?

The main way Johne's disease will arrive on property is on the back of a truck. Introduction of infected animals may result in infected stock on the property, as well as the risk of it spreading to neighbours stock. Johne's is no longer being regulated (since 2018) so it is up to the producer to be aware of this and have an integrated approach to biosecurity (not only to prevent Johne's, to prevent a number of diseases). Consider:

- Implementing and maintaining a thorough biosecurity plan
- · Only purchasing animals with an animal health declaration as well as a vendor declaration
- Actively ask about properties Johne's status and history that you are purchasing any animals from
- · Only introducing low-risk stock onto the property
- Having appropriate quarantine for new stock if there are any concerns they are carrying something upon arrival
- Implement grazing management strategies to prevent the spread of bacteria on farm
- If purchasing vaccinated stock, ensure they were vaccinated before 16 weeks of age, and not as they got onto the truck (sheep mainly)
- Vaccinating stock (mainly sheep) there is a cattle vaccine but it can only be supplied by the State Chief Veterinary Officer and is usually only used in herds where a diagnosis of Bovine Johne's has been confirmed

Vaccinating Sheep

The sheep vaccination is called "Gudair". It offers protection against the development of clinical Ovine Johne's disease and a reduction in faecal shedding of the organism in sheep. A single 1ml dose provides protection for life BUT vaccination is recommended between 4-16 weeks of age, as this timing allows for protection prior to exposure to the disease. These animals are then called approved vaccinates and can be identified with a V in a circle on their National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) eartag. While the vaccine can be given to sheep of any age it is less likely to be as effective or economical in animals older than 16 weeks. This is a killed vaccine, so starting a vaccination program cannot introduce the disease onto your property.

Safe use of the vaccine is important, severe tissue reactions can occur if humans are accidentally injected with the vaccine (e.g. if accidentally injected into the hand it can lead to the loss of fingers or the use of the hand). To assist in preventing human injury, the Gudair vaccine should be administered with a safety vaccinator gun which covers up the needle when not in use. Correct vaccination technique is also important to prevent tissue reactions in the lamb, follow the instructions on the packet including recommended needle size.
