Lachie crowned Australian Champion Mini Bull Rider

Last week the ABCRA held their National Finals Rodeo after an extended season due to COVID. There were five qualifiers from Walcha being Gerard 'Westy' Oversby in the Bareback and Steer Wrestling, Ben Fogarty in the Bareback, Ben Wickham in the Saddle Bronc, Caitlin Harris in the Breakaway roping, and Lachie Provost in the Junior Mini Bull Riding and Junior Steer riding.

'Westy' once again had the crowd on the edge of their seats in both of his events and after solid rides throughout the finals he was crowned runner up in both the Australian Bareback title and the Finals Aggregate pointscore.

Ben Fogarty and Ben Wickham both had some strong horsepower under them and made some great rides throughout the finals to be in the money. Caitlin Harris won the first round of the finals with a blistering time of 2.3 seconds and continued to rope all three head for the finals finishing second in the finals Aggregate and the fastest breakaway time of the week.

Lachie Provost qualified in number three position in the 8 – 11 steer ride and number one position in the 8 – 11 Mini Bull riding. He managed to ride all six head of stock throughout the finals, placing in both events across the three days. He finished fifth in the steer riding finals Aggregate and third overall in the Australian title.

However it was the Mini Bull riding where Lachie kept his eye on the prize. On the second day of the finals he finished a narrow second on 73.5 points and then finished off the year being crowned the Australian Champion 8-11 Mini Bull Rider.

With his hard work and dedication throughout the year he was also awarded Champion 8 - 11 Mini Bull rider in the Bad Company and Central Zones. When asked about what his highlight of the year was he proudly stated winning two from two and getting his first ever trophy buckle at Gresford Rodeo back in August.

around the traps 💦

It appears the black cockatoos that were flying around home last week were a good omen and brought us some patchy rain throughout the district with totals of 30-40mm recorded. It's a timely fall of rain and the prediction of further precipitation next week will be welcomed by all, and yes, I spotted those birds again this morning. Everyone that you talk to outside the district comments on just how dry it is off the tablelands, especially those areas that experienced floods only eight weeks ago. It appears the ground has set extremely hard on top after such a wet year and some hot summer days have been baking the soil, setting a hard crust. Let's hope they get some moisture soon with only one month of summer left and preparation for winter crops get into full swing.

You could tell the forecast of rain looked good last week as I think most people who are planning on planting an annual or perennial crop this Autumn were out burning their paddock getting ready to sow. There were puffs of smoke everywhere as the burning of paddocks, especially the preparation of new paddocks helps reduce the infestation of slugs, mites and disease. These three caused headaches last year for many producers which ultimately resulted in poor germination, costly treatments and overall less crop production. Evidently we had an extremely wet Autumn Winter period which didn't help, but given the different season we are experiencing and the forecast of normal weather patterns we will need as much crop as we can get this year.

The price reduction in both the beef and sheep markets have really got producers thinking about their overall cost of production and their farm running costs. Approximately 25-30% in value has been taken out of the beef and sheep market which in return will slow the spending on improvements and farm production. The interesting part is that the cost of inputs are also on the way down, chemical, fertiliser, steel and diesel have all dropped in price, which has coincided with a drop in commodity prices. It is a welcome relief but I'd be guessing that most producers will be tightening their belts and seeing how the next 12 months play out with interest rates, seasonal conditions and markets.

Producers are feeling some pain with this beef market slide, all the profit from last year that everyone had budgeted on went out the window and into negative territory, especially for traders. The only shining light I can see is the rates that you can now buy back in at which will in return, return your business to positive territory. I understand the economics don't look right but I reckon the bank account will, even if your budgeted profit has gone. I still think our beef market is in somewhat a bottleneck of numbers at the moment and will improve the further we get into the year, but I have been wrong many times before.

The sheep mutton market is now cheaper than what it was during the drought, believe it or not. The most consumed meat in the world; goat is now back at 420c/kg carcass weight instead of 1000c/kg last year. Word is that it has become extremely hard to sell at those prices, with large volumes of cheaper proteins filling those markets from other countries. Our mutton was used to supplement the large goat markets around the world, now with a reduction in goat value our mutton has more than halved in hook value. Kill lambs still seem to be the shining light of all our protein markets with trade lambs to kill quoted at \$8/kg this week. Those values seem very good compared to store lambs at \$100/hd, nearly good enough to convince producers to fatten their own stock.

Locally the ram sales are in full swing with a number of local producers lining up their annual drop of rams over the next couple of weeks. We are really spoilt for choice with the quality of genetics on offer locally. Make sure you take advantage of the local studs if you in the market for some new rams.

Thanks Walcha





\$250 Regional Seniors Travel Card returns

Walcha seniors will soon be saving another \$250 on travel with the return on the NSW Nationals Regional Seniors Travel Card.

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said this was the fourth year the card had been available, and it had proved a hit with local seniors with more than two thirds of local seniors taking up the card in 2022.



"We know that the cost of travel is biting many in our community hard, none more so than our seniors who need to travel frequently to attend appointments, the shops and to visit friends and family," Mr Anderson said.

"The \$250 pre-paid Visa card can be used on fuel, taxis, electric charging stations, pre-booked NSW TrainLink regional trains and coaches, helping those eligible with the cost of getting from A to B.

"Last year, 9,918 seniors in the Tamworth Electorate took advantage of the card meaning almost \$2.5 million in savings for local seniors."

Walcha moving one step closer to becoming timber bridge free

A grant of \$979,000 has been provided to Walcha Council by the State Government to replace another of its dwindling number of ageing timber bridges, Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall announced last week.

Mr Marshall and Mayor Eric Noakes recently drove out on Niangala Road to inspect the half-a-century-old Boxley Bridge, over Pipeclay Gully, which will soon be replaced with a wider, stronger and modern concrete structure, thanks to the latest round of the Fixing Country Bridges program.

"Boxley Bridge has served the region and the surrounding primary producers very well for more than 50 years, but the timber structure is fast approaching the end of its useful life," Mr Marshall said.

"Without major intervention or replacement, council would have likely been forced to impose strict load limits on the structure as it continued to deteriorate - now that won't be necessary.

"Council will use these funds to cover the total cost of replacing the timber structure with a new 4.2-metre-wide and 20-metre-long concrete bridge on the existing road alignment and at the same height.

"This is great news for all Niangala Road users who will soon have a much safer and more sturdy bridge to drive over.

"Replacing the ageing timber with new concrete will also dramatically ease the financial burden on Walcha Council and ensure the continued free flow of agricultural produce to market."

Mayor Eric Noakes welcomed the funding for the new Boxley Bridge.

"We're thrilled to be able to remove yet another one of our district's old timber bridges," Cr Noakes said.

"Without this funding support from the State Government, a project like this would be beyond our council's immediate financial capacity.

"We're making inroads into our program to replace ageing timber bridges with new concrete structures – and we don't have too many left now – which is good news for the community."
