around the traps 😝

The district looks to be in pretty good shape considering the majority of the moisture that has fallen over the past six weeks has been from storm activity. The paddocks have a green bottom and still have a bulk of taller feed which is great for preserving moisture. Talking with multiple producers further north in the tablelands it was interesting to hear that the rain had been very patchy and their dams were getting quite low due to the lack of runoff. It's concerning considering the amount of rain and runoff that we had last year and the large amount of producers that still rely solely on dams for stock water.

The RBA increased the cash rate to 3.35 per cent last week and alluded that there will be more rate rises to come. The average national household mortgage is around \$600,000 and since the rise in interest rates began it means households are paying an extra \$16,500 a year in interest alone. As a nation this means we are paying an additional \$60 billion in interest payments. The RBA is trying to slow spending, and to be honest as far as I can see everyone is still out there spending away. The rise in property equity might be the cushion that we all lean on. We need to think about tomorrow and plan ahead, yes live in today but make some budgeting decisions that will soften further rate rises.

MLA has come out and projected the 2023 Australian cattle herd to hit 28.8 million head this year which is the largest herd since 2014 which I feel is well overstated. Overstating these numbers could impact our beef markets to an extent of lower beef prices as countries sit back and wait for the extra Australian beef to hit the world market. Yes we have had three consecutive years of good weather and herd rebuilding but there have been too many factors that have an effect the nation's herd rebuilding. Interestingly the Australian Bureau of Statistics complete a national census every five years of 125,000 farmers and they stated that the herd had risen only 1%, and sadly the Australian dairy herd had reduced by 10% in the 2021/2022 census. Surely these figures are more accurate, and also worrying as our dairy industry continues to shrink. No wonder a tub of yogurt is nearly \$10 now and milk on the shelf is \$1.50/L.

The largest implications that our economy is still struggling with prepandemic is the lack of labour which is still being felt throughout all industries. We are so short on skilled workers it is making it hard for business to run, even at reduced capacity. It is costly and inefficient. When we look at Agriculture, especially districts and areas such as ours, the young school leavers are not returning home or coming to work on properties anymore. Can we blame them considering the amount of money out there for other unqualified jobs? If we head into another dry spell I think our processing sector will struggle to meet the kill demand, in turn putting more pressure on prices. The government needs to do more on the labour shortage front, we all work long hours and do so as labour is hard to come by and expensive.

1,250 cattle were yarded in Tamworth on Monday which saw a firm to cheaper trend with better quality cattle selling to dearer trends. Weaner steers sold to 514c/kg, Angus feeder steers to 419c/kg, feeder heifers topped at 406c/kg, heavy export kill steers sold to 310c/kg while heavy cows were back 10c/kg and sold to a top of 286c/kg. 3000 lambs and 1000 sheep were yarded in Tamworth on Monday and once again lightweight restocking lambs met a cautious group of buyers selling to cheaper trends. Trade weight lambs sold to \$5/hd dearer, with heavy export lambs topping at \$218. Restocking young ewes made \$153 to go back to the paddock while the mutton was quoted as being \$5 -10/hd cheaper. Dubbo yarded 14,440 lambs with trade weight new season lambs selling from \$158 - 212, heavy weight lambs in excess of 24kg sold from \$208 - 245 and the 7,700 mutton sold to dearer trends with merino and XB ewes topping at \$135 while merino wethers sold to \$144.

ALMOST 83 years after it was constructed, the iconic Kentucky Memorial Hall will soon have a split system air-conditioning system installed, thanks to a \$22,000 grant from the State Government, announced today by Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall.

Mr Marshall said the Kentucky Memorial Hall Committee had long wanted to air-condition the hall, especially in the winter months, for the comfort and enjoyment of locals and visitors who regularly use the hall.

"This is wonderful news for users of the Kentucky Hall and will ensure everyone is comfortable no matter what time of year or day an event is being held," Mr Marshall said.

"Currently, the hall committee makes use of portable gas heaters in winter, which aren't really up to the job of heating such a vast space, are expensive and a fire risk for the hall.

"The funding will allow the committee to purchasing and fit the air-conditioning units and also purchase another battery for its rooftop solar system, which was installed in a previous project, to run the air conditioning off-grid.

"Kentucky is a small community with a huge heart and its hall is the focal point of everything that happens in the district.

"Congratulations to the hall committee on another great project to improve the hall."

President of the Kentucky Memorial Hall Angus Carter warmly welcomed the grant and said heating the large area had always been a problem with several methods trialled in the past.

"Our community will now be able to congregate in a comfortable environment making the day and night functions more pleasant," Mr Carter said.

"The heating and cooling system will help on so many different fronts such as education, mental health and community activities including elections, dances, school concerts, playgroups, weddings and family gatherings.

"It will entice increased community use and encourage interest in local history, some of which is recorded in the Hall, with displays featuring the early days of orcharding and the names and photos of servicemen and women from the district who served in the war.

"Not only is the Hall used by the local Kentucky community, but Uralla and Armidale groups are also attracted by its facilities and spaciousness.

"We are also doing our bit by relying on solar and becoming energy efficient."



Maximise on farm results with DLF Seeds tall fescue varieties

Throughout the New England Tablelands, tall fescue is one of the most valuable pasture grasses sown by local farmers due to its ability to perform and persist in hot summer climates with challenging and varied soils.

Aaron Kemp, DLF Seeds Sales Agronomist says, "Deciding to grow tall fescue is a no brainer as its deep tap root system, explosive early spring growth, and strong summer performance make it an excellent choice for lamb, beef backgrounding and breeding systems. However, knowing which tall fescue variety to sow may not be as straight forward and understanding what traits maximise a varieties performance can help make that decision easier." says Aaron

By understanding the traits within different tall fescue varieties, farmers can improve the overall return on investment, maximise results and optimise their operation. The different leaf types, flowering date and level of insect tolerance are factors that enhance or hinder tall fescue performance.

Leaf type has a significant impact on feed utilisation. Typically, early flowering in tall fescue has been associated with broad leaved, coarse types that have been difficult to manage. Sowing a soft leaved, fine tillered variety will significantly improve the amount of feed stock can ingest, improving liveweight gains.

"Feed utilisation is the key to livestock growth, so I often recommend newer, finer, softer leaf tall fescues such as DLF Seeds Hummer MaxP or Quantica MaxP summer active tall fescues. These varieties are complete game changers when it comes to livestock utilisation, especially when compared to more coarse types such as Demeter. Softer leaf fescues are also more forgiving than the coarse leaf varieties when managing the spring flush and as pastures get rank."

To maintain acceptable utilisation on coarse leaf types, stock needs to be kept on a very tight grazing rotation which reduces feed intake. Fescues with a finer, softer leaf such as Hummer MaxP and Quantica MaxP are more flexible, allowing for a more varied rotation while not sacrificing quality." Says Aaron

In the summer of 2013 and 2014, ^DLF Seeds undertook an extensive grazing trial (Summer active fescue utilisation) in Leigh Creek, Victoria. This demonstrated that the utilisation of Demeter dropped after two weeks of regrowth, while the finer, softer Hummer MaxP maintained livestock utilisation for up to 4 weeks.




Figure 1: 2013 Summer active fescue utilisation

Selecting a variety that combines a soft leaf (for increased utilisation) with an early flowering date can significantly increase yield and maximise return on investment. This is because the flowering date of tall fescue is linked closely to winter production.

As the days start to get longer coming out of winter, an early flowering variety such as Hummer MaxP or Quantica MaxP will build dry matter and produce stronger late winter and early spring yields. "Later flowering types will be slower out of the blocks in spring and produce a spike later. I always recommend using an early flowering variety in environments with cold winters. It can help bring forward your spring flush, snapping your feed budget out of winter earlier." Says Aaron

Insect pressure can significantly impact the performance of a pasture. Selecting a tall fescue variety containing MaxP® endophyte extends the pasture's insect tolerance markedly, which leads to increased persistence. MaxP® endophyte helps control pests such as African Black Beetle, Argentine Stem Weevil Larvae, Root Aphid and Field Cricket*.

An endophyte is a fungus found naturally in many grass species. It protects the plant from insects; in return, the plant gives the endophyte a place to live and reproduce.

"Endophytes are not well understood, and this is caused by the issues seen with the wild or standard endophytes compared to the novel endophytes, like MaxP. Wild endophytes can cause ill thrift, acute toxicity issues and more. But unlike wild endophyte, MaxP has no known animal health issues." Explains Aaron.

A 2015 sown Tall fescue trial in Armidale was run on hard, Ironstone country and demonstrates the advantage of varieties with MaxP endophyte and illustrates the positive impact MaxP has on persistence towards the end of the trial.




Figure 2: 2015 Armidale tall fescue, ground cover percentage after 3 years

Figure 2 demonstrates the ground cover percentage of varieties, with Hummer Max P maintaining a much greater ground cover through the final year than varieties with no endophyte.

In summary, utilisation and livestock performance can be improved by selecting a tall fescue variety with a finer, softer leaf. Total yield or dry matter production can be increased by establishing an early flowering variety for improved late winter and early spring growth. Insect pressure can be reduced and persistence enhanced by selecting tall fescue with a proven novel endophyte such as MaxP.

"At the end of the day, if you aim to maximise your on-farm results, Hummer MaxP or Quantica MaxP tick all the boxes. For New England, I recommend sowing a variety with MaxP endophyte, a softer leaf and early flowering date. All of which help maximise the results of your tall fescue selection and optimise your return on investment.", concludes Aaron.

Welcome to the first edition of WalchaEnergy's 2023 community newsletter regarding the RubyHillsWind project.

It's was a busy 2022 and 2023 will be no different as we continue to develop the proposed RubyHills renewables project in preparation for the Scoping report submission.

We reported in our last community newsletter that we had planned to have the project Scoping report submitted year end 2022, however due to meeting delays with the DPE, we now expect the Scoping report will be submitted late March. This Scoping report will be publicly displayed for a period of 18-24 months at; www.planningportal.nsw. gov.au/major-projects, or Google Ruby Hills Wind Scoping Report.

Walcha Energy plan to present to Walcha Council again (in the near future) to outline and discuss how we can work together in achieving the needs for both council and the wider community key concerns.

Walcha Energy will also be reviewing its community funding proposal with Local Councils and the State Government. Information regarding this review will be circulated and communicated to council.

Energy Co. (Government department responsible for delivering the REZ's in NSW) last year released an EOI, (Expressions of Interest) requesting renewable energy developers within NSW submit an application to become a generation partner. All WalchaEnergy projects have been selected as an eligible electricity generation partner with Energy Co. This now triggers key design discussions between WalchaEnergy and State Government to ensure network infrastructure is built for purpose and considers the work that has been done in the region. This is a significant step for our company giving us the ability to provide sensible input and advice in shaping the network.


