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Water security for Walcha now only months away



A water security revolution in Walcha is taking shape on a guiet bend of the MacDonald River, with work on the new \$11 million Walcha Off Stream Storage facility on track for completion by the middle of the

Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall was last week joined by Deputy Premier Paul Toole and Walcha Mayor Eric Noakes to inspect progress on the 320 megalitre water project.

The project, which kicked off in October last year, is a joint initiative between the Australian and NSW Governments, with the federal funding portion of \$2 million delivered from the National Water Grid Fund Connections Pathway and the State committing \$9 million from the Safe and Secure Water Program.

"This new storage will quadruple Walcha's river storage capacity, not only building an almost two-year water supply buffer against drought, but it will enable to the community to grow and I commend Walcha Council for moving quickly to have this major project constructed.

"The dam itself is almost complete, with the spillway now under construction ahead of the installation of all the new pump and pipeline infrastructure in the coming months.

"Everything is on track for council to begin filling the dam, pumping out of the MacDonald River, by the middle of this year.

"This project is the great legacy of that worst drought on record and will ensure that the community can withstand whatever mother nature throws at it in the future.'

Walcha Mayor Eric Noakes said the project was one of the most important water infrastructure projects in the region's history and would go a long way towards creating a stronger, more resilient community.

"The new storage dam has been the number one priority for Walcha Council because it will enable us to be better prepared to face the devastation of drought events by providing a safer and more secure source of drinking water," Cr Noakes said.

"This project has also been a major win for Walcha's economy because projects of this size create jobs and put more money in the till for local businesses."

Summer was well and truly out in force on the weekend with the thermometer rising into the thirties on Saturday and low forties out on the plains. The heat was enough to brew up a pretty wild storm on Saturday night that dropped anywhere from 20-40mm over some parts of the district. The last week of summer looks to be more than comfortable with our next best chance of rain at the beginning of March. Yes, summer is all but over and we are a mere 6-8 weeks off getting cool.

It's a busy time of year for many producers as the days are becoming shorter and the preparation for winter is well and truly underway. Driving around the district I've have seen alot of tractors and planters sowing crop for the winter months, the weaning of calves has commenced and the pre-testing of females have been booked. The majority of lambs have been weaned and the joining of ewes is just around the corner as everyone ponders if they will have enough feed for winter. No doubt enquires have commenced for hay and grain to supplement the livestock through the harshest parts of winter as we all know how long it can be.

I also wanted to touch on just how bad our phone service still remains to be. I'm gathering I'm not the only one who has a phone that drops out while on a call in town and whose voice messages come through randomly. The phone coverage throughout our district is still terrible and also worrying as the 3G network is set to be shut down in the June of 2024. I hope it will be better with 5G, but alot of people who need cell-fi and boosters in their vehicles and houses to get service all run on 3G as it has a better connection. They have thrown alot of money at a cable that went into the ground and I'm still trying to see the reason why when all the emphasis has moved to more mobile technology and using our phones, ipads and even streaming services. We used to be able to get free to air TV at home, like all the channels and now we struggle to get NBN. Will free to air TV still exist in 10 years or will we be paying for these channels through streaming services?

The EYCI today sits around 750c/kg when compared to 12 months ago, a whopping 1125c/kg, no wonder producers are left scratching their heads. Many weaner producers who are gearing up for the annual sale of their weaners would no doubt be pondering these figures, a price difference of around \$500/hd. That price difference over the entire drop of weaners adds up to a lot of money that won't be available to be spent on improvements or down payments on loans. Tamworth conducted its first of three major weaner sales last Friday with weaner heifers selling from \$950-1250 and steers \$1300-\$1550 depending on breed and quality. Over the hook prices have also followed the same trend, heavy MSA cattle are now around 700c/kg compared to 850c/kg while cows fell from 720c/kg to 550c/kg.

Over the hook lamb prices have remained the firmest over the 12 month period quoted at being 775c/kg 12 months ago to 690c/kg today. Interesting part regarding this figure is that 780c/kg is available for kill lambs at this very moment which I'm guessing was actually higher than this time last year. Mutton has dropped from 530c/kg to 305c/kg carcass weight which is hard to believe mutton was well over 700c/kg 2 years ago.

The first ever Walcha Truck and Machinery Show was held over the weekend and by the sounds of it they had an extremely successful event. It was great to see some real history on display with those old tractors, trucks and motors all still in working order. Amazing how far technology has come, but always great to revisit the past. Well done and I look forward to seeing this event become an annual event for the town.

New look Golf Clubhouse by the end of the year

Walcha Golf Club last week obtained a monster \$161,305 funding putt, courtesy of the State Government, for the refurbishment and upgrade of its clubhouse, Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall announced.

Adam Marshall was joined by Deputy Premier Paul Toole at the club to deliver the good news and said the NSW Stronger Country Communities Fund grant was an exciting win for the 86-year-old Walcha Golf Clubhouse.

"The renovations will provide the Walcha community with a modern and vibrant building that will be used regularly by golfers and also to host many community functions," he said.

"This is a great win for the community of Walcha and everyone who uses these facilities.

"A project on this scale is simply beyond the financial means of a volunteer-run club, so I'm delighted this funding has been secured and I congratulate the club."

Walcha Golf Club President Allan Green said the club was delighted to receive the funding and thanked the State Government for the opportunity to apply for it.

"This grant will be used to modernise and restore the ageing building," Allan said.

"It will include the replacement of windows, external cladding with colorbond, upgraded heating, renovation to the women's and men's bathrooms, installing a disability toilet and the installation of a disability ramp.

"The upgrade of our Clubhouse will provide an appropriate physical facility to service the needs of the golfing community within Walcha and surrounding district.

"It will also cater for visitors' needs when tournaments and functions are held at the Club.

"Small clubs such as ours cannot

survive without these grants being available.

"Our Club is mostly run by volunteers and as experienced by the last few years with drought, fires, mice and then COVID.

"It has proved its worth in boosting the wellbeing and mental stability of our community members."

The Club has a builder ready to start the refurbishment, alongside local contractors, and hopes to have the project completed by October this year.

AWI Shearing Update

Australian Wool Innovation's Chairman Jock Laurie says extensive work continues to tackle the challenge around shearing. "Shearing is the number one issue facing many growers and AWI is doubling down on efforts to tackle the problem.

We are doing this through helping roll out modular race delivery systems, increasing training and retention programs for shearers, investigating robotics and working on improving biological defleecing.

The beauty of the modular race delivery system is taking out some of shearing's most physically demanding task – the catch and drag.

As sheep have got bigger that is additional stress on the shearer's body, the modular system removes that.

AWI is working with six engineering companies to take the AWI led design and make them commercially available to growers around Australia.

Interested growers are either looking to retrofit or construct a new shed incorporating the system to reduce costs in upgrading, utilising or replacing older infrastructure".

AWI applied for and received a grant of \$45,000 from the WA Government to further develop the Race Delivery System with a manufacturer in Western Australia. With matching funding from AWI, this will bring the total investment to \$90,000 in 2023. The funding is now being used to engage with RW Engineering and developments are underway to innovate the design and uptake of the Race Delivery System.

Rotary Youth in Agriculture (RYAG)

The Walcha Rotary Club is set to welcome more than 30 agriculture students studying in Years 9 to 11 across northern NSW to an exciting RYAG camp. The camp will provide students the opportunity to discover a wealth of information about the modern wool industry and sheep meat industry, potentially guiding career decisions.

The 4 day camp begins on Tuesday 28 February. Rotarians and friends of Rotary will be kept busy with supervision and preparing delicious food to satisfy hungry teenagers. Students will camp dormitory-style at the Walcha Showground and travel to farms where they will get handson experience under the guidance of experts in numerous fields, all of whom are generously donating their time.

The packed program includes ram judging, wool classing, fibre testing, genetics, butchering, livestock transport, shearing, embryo transfer, pastures, micro-organism analysis, working with sheep dogs, technology in farm management, low stress stock handling and much more.

The camp culminates on Friday 3 March with a Gala Dinner at the Walcha Golf Club, including a wool fashion parade with students strutting the catwalk.


Armed with loads of knowledge they launched into action.

Let's make a bit of noise about noise ...

The first thing to concede is, the Voice for Walcha (VfW), doesn't have a enough answers to the complex question of turbine noise and how it will impact on your life. Not at this point in time, but rest assured we are working towards clarity. We have justifiably challenged Vestas's EIS regarding their noise assessment and potential impacts. We feel that their noise assessments methodologies and conclusions are inaccurate and are to the detriment of community members in the development footprint. We do so, mindful that non-compliant noise from wind turbines remains of paramount health concern for the community. The history of wind farm development confirms it is pervasive in terms of its unfortunate ability to drive residents out of their comfort of their homes and their communities of choice. We of course acknowledge that Vestas has legitimately a right of reply to our submissions and so the onus is on them to refute our submitted concerns

We do say this, there is little point in building the project, installing the 119 wind turbines to find out the project and/or at least the existing turbine configuration is **non-compliant in regards to noise pollution.** We say the Community needs to be further informed about this crucial issue. So, whilst we await Vestas's response, we urge the Community to continue their inquiry as to what the accuracy of the EIS predictions might mean for their impacted residences. We outline some conclusions hereunder.

Background

The Voice for Walcha – has made a detailed submission to the Project EIS outlining its concerns on the excessive environmental impacts of the Winterbourne Wind Project. This submission can be viewed online at https://www.planningportal.nsw.gov. au/major-projects-Winterbourne Wind (DPIE Portal). Vestas's Noise Assessment was undertaken by Sonus - this Assessment Report is also included in the Winterbourne EIS at the DPIE Portal. This Assessment references as Noise Sensitive locations 170 Non Associated Dwellings locations and 51 Involved Dwelling locations. The latter, Involved Dwellings being those which have a commercial or pecuniary arrangements with the Developer. The Winterbourne EIS confidently concluded that based on predictions from the Sonus Assessment the noise criteria for non-associated dwellings will be compliant. The VfW doesn't **buy this conclusion.** We believe that a more robust application of the Noise Guidelines will reveal **non-compliance across the Project footprint.** Secondly, we also don't buy the conclusion that Host, or Associated Landowners, are excluded from the Bulletin's compliance. We look forward to Vestas's response to this VfW conclusion and to the findings of the commissioned Peer Review.

The EIS Assessment

As to compliance, the EIS Assessment is conducted against the NSW Government's – *Wind Energy: Noise Assessment Bulletin* (Bulletin). It provides for the full adoption for the *SA Environment Protection Authority Environmental Noise Guidelines (SA 2009)*. These Guidelines specify that predicted equivalent noise level should not exceed **35dB(A)** or the background noise by more than **5dB(A)** - whichever is the greater, at all relevant receivers for wind speeds from cut - in to rated power of wind. Receivers being dwellings in the Project footprint.

The Vestas EIS's Appendix H includes the full Sonus Assessment Report. On behalf of the Community, VfW took the prudent opportunity to secure a **Peer Review** of the Vestas/Sonus assessment report. This Peer Review is at Annexure A -Part G Response to Health Impact of the VfW Submission. Acoustic Engineering is complex in its technicality however it is

important that we detail the main conclusions and how this might assist the Community shine a little more light on the EIS's accuracy - whilst we await Vestas's considered response. So, what makes VfW sleep with one eye open on Vestas/Sonus Noise Assessment some key points are as follows:

- If the Peer Review's analysis is validated then Vestas/Sonus's noise assessment has significantly underestimated the noise impact in the community by at least 14dB. Given the predictions on offer in the EIS, including a number of dwellings already with marginal predictions, it is highly likely that many dwellings will be non-compliant ie experiencing noise levels greater than 35dB or background noise plus 5dB. This presents Vestas and many Hosts landowners with a problem which can only be addressed by a significant reconfiguration of the turbine layout.
- The crux of the VfW's concern is Vestas/Sonus has seemingly created EIS convenient data interpretation which increases the ceiling limitation for background noise, and which conversely induces lower noise prediction for respective residences.

 As we have found in reviewing Vestas's EIS approach is it's unfortunately short on sufficient detail enough to

make full sense on impacts. The Noise Assessment is consistent with other reports in the Winterbourne EIS, that is, the noise assessment presents as a scoping study. The Developer has presented an unfinished EIS. This makes assessment challenging and is procedurally unfair to the Community. By way of example as alluded to the Sonus Assessment at section 11 there is little point in putting the Community through an EIS if pre-construction noise assessment results in further contemplation of turbine selection. The

accurate noise assessment for relevant dwellings – turbine layouts etc. In this regard the EIS is deficient as it did not consider different turbine layouts as required by the Guidelines. **These are all critical issues that can't be considered by the Community after the EIS.**

EIS must include technical studies and

Essentially Vestas were required to follow the Bulletin to its key requisites of accuracy and conservationism in their assessments and these were in short supply in the Noise Assessment. VfW relies on all the conclusions offered in the Peer Review. Some examples are:

 Vestas/Sonus conducted background noise motoring at 7 dwellings across the project site. These were conducted from 28 November 2021 to 1 February 2022. This assessment was undertaken in summer months when background noise is elevated and should have been conducted in winter months when there is minimal background noise.

 Vestas/Sonus offered no consideration of the proximity of 'side effects' in their assessments. Side effects being topography and other turbines etc.

 Vestas/Sonus avoided strict application of the CONCAWE model as required by the Guidelines. This artificially elevated background data.

 Vestas/Sonus failed to justify in the EIS the location of the met masks and their correlation to background data analysis.

 Failure to ensure background measuring equipment was deployed in keeping with the accuracy requirements of the Guidelines.

The VfW would like to offer a drop-in opportunity for the community to attend a Noise Workshop on 1 March, 5 - 7pm upstairs at Walcha Vet Supplies. This will allow the Community to understand both the predictions offered by the EIS and an understanding of the concerns raised by VfW from a dwelling by dwelling perspective. Hosts are welcome.
