Family Skate Park underway

Tenders are out, and by the end of this year Walcha families will be able to enjoy a brand new skate park thanks to almost \$1 million in funding from the State and Federal Governments.

Member for Northern Tablelands, Adam Marshall visited the skate park vesterday to test his ability on the skateboard and announce an additional \$100,000 which will allow Council to fit out the park with seating and landscaping making it a great family play area. "This funding is from the Stronger Country Communities Round 5, and will provide an amazing facility for the town," he said.

The current skate park will be completely demolished and the new facility will be triple the size running from Fitzroy Street through to its current location. "It will incorporate a basketball half court; scooter run with various pump bumps, ramps and transitions; and an enclosed bowl with beginner to intermediate ramp heights," Walcha Council Interim General Manager, Phil Hood said.

"The whole site has been designed to focus more on younger children. It will be a great family area," he said.

Walcha Council received \$866,964 from the Federal/ State Governments as a part of the Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund, and with the additional \$100,000 announced yesterday, the project will come in at just under \$1 million.

Council expects to award the tender in mid April, with construction to commence soon after. It is expected to be ready for use in late 2023.

around the traps 🔧

The Walcha Show lived up to its reputation over the weekend as being one of the best country shows. If you didn't attend, well you missed out, it was such a family friendly environment and it was the annual catch up for many locals. There was no doubt that the hotly contested annual Dog Jump, Demolition Derby and the Peanut Drop were by far the favourites for most, especially the kids. I knew firsthand what a sugar high, adrenaline rush and exhaustion looked like after the big event for a four year old - a meltdown.

The weather was extremely kind to all on the weekend with the rain holding off until dark on Saturday night. Falls of 20 to 100mm fell throughout the district with the heaviest of falls south of town. Everyone I spoke to mentioned how dry it had become and that they were sweating on some much needed moisture for winter crops. Falls of 25 to 70mm were widespread through the Central North, with places like Tamworth receiving up to 100mm and other parts like Inverell getting under their first decent fall of rain for some time. The rain is a good start but we all know we need decent follow up rain, especially when temperatures are forecast to reach close to 30 degrees for Walcha at the end of this week.

Northern Australia has been hit with another deluge of rain, with places receiving beyond 500mm causing widespread flooding. For some northern parts this is the second flood for this wet season and by all reports, another costly flood. Queensland's Gulf of Carpentaria has seen catastrophic losses to livestock and infrastructure after experiencing one of the biggest floods in history. It will be weeks before the water completely recedes, people can then start to rebuild. Speaking with some producers a long way further south of the deluge in central and southern Queensland, they stated that they have had one of the best seasons for some time and the latest front has only improved their grazing position for the rest of 2023.

The Brazilian beef industry is entering its fourth week of suspension into China after a case of atypical BSE in a cow was detected. The suspension hasn't created waves of interest from China in Australian beef, but it sounds like there has been increased enquiry for Australian beef from other countries like USA and Korea. The lean grinding beef market has improved over the last month and could continue its rise, especially with the USA herd numbers so low. The Australian beef market could further improve if the imposed ban remains over Brazilian beef entry into China for an extended period of time. Watch this space, but I can still see some price resistance ahead given the dearest of cattle, the long fed cattle are about to hit the market.

Tamworth yarded 1300 cattle on Monday after a wet weekend with all classes except feeder steers firm to dearer. Weaner cattle to restock sold to 486c/kg for Angus steers, while heifers topped at 464c/kg for a consignment of EU Angus heifers out of the Horton. Yearling steers back to the paddock topped at 442c/kg while heifers to feed made up to 355c/kg. Heavy export cattle to kill made 326c/kg while cows topped

2200 lambs and 2000 mutton were yarded in Tamworth on Monday, which followed the trend of the southern markets selling to cheaper trend. Trade lambs to process topped at \$176, 660 to 735c/kg while heavy export lambs sold to \$230, 730 to 750c/kg. Better conditioned sheep with a good jacket sold to dearer trends, topping at \$143 for crossbred ewes and \$94 for merino. Last Thursday Wagga varded 38,000 lambs and 40,000 sheep with trade weight lambs quoted as selling between 640c to 670c/kg carcass weight, back \$10 to 15hd cheaper in comparison to the previous sale. Heavy export lambs remained firm, selling from 680 to 730c/kg carcass weight. The large yarding of mutton sold from \$69 to 140.

Roadwork on Oxley Highway

Walcha motorists are advised of changed traffic conditions from this week on the Oxley Highway to carry out essential maintenance about 17 kilometres east of Bendemeer.

Work to repair and renew the road surface, started on Monday 13 March, and will be carried out from 7am to 5pm on weekdays. The work is expected to be complete in June 2023, weather permitting.

Traffic control, single lane closures and a reduced speed limit of 40km/h will be in place during work hours, which may affect travel times

Motorists are advised to allow extra travel time, drive to the conditions, and follow the directions of signs and traffic control.



Moving up to the next level

Megan Scrivener had no idea the path that lay ahead in 2013 when she offered to pencil at a Show Jumping event. Encouraged to consider judging, in 2014 Megan went to a JNSW Clinic in Quirindi and sat the first of many exams she would undertake.

Acquiring her Probationary Certificate she was required to judge assisted for six months to attain her National Level 1. Since 2015, Megan has attended numerous clinics across the state and judged classes at Ag Shows, Pony Club events and Interschools, as well Show Jumping competitions at the Australian Equine and Livestock Events Centre, the Sydney International Equestrian Centre and the Sydney Royal Easter Show.

In the seven years to 2021 Megan has moved through the rankings and attended her last National Level 3 Clinic in Canberra in 2021. During this time she has been mentored by Tamworth Judge Cheryl Backhouse and one of Australia's highest ranking judges, Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI) Level 3 Judge Michael Archer from Canberra.

Encouraged by Equestrian NSW, Megan along with several other judges across the

country, commenced their journey with the FEI Campus in late 2022. This involved four online components and final exam, an English Proficiency test and a final interview in February with Course Directors Frances Hesketh-Jones Triulzi (ENG) and Stephan Ellenbruch (GER).

"The online interview was daunting, I was extremely nervous for days in advance", Megan said. "Frances and Stephan interviewed me late in the evening via Zoom from an event they were at in Dubai, while I was at AELEC".

On 1 March, Megan received notification from the FEI that she had fulfilled all requirements to become and International Judge, and would be listed as an FEI Level 1 Judge - Jumping.



As many fled their homes and country in Ukraine, some animals such as dogs and cats were able to be taken along with their families across into other countries. However many were abandoned and have died of starvation.

What is not widely known are the courageous people who have stayed behind because they would not abandon the hundreds of animals in their care. Ukraine has many overflowing shelters. These brave volunteers have gone into the remains of bombed cities and gathered as many stray and abandoned animals as they could find to rescue and feed them. Some shelters and zoos have also been bombed.

A number of animal rescue organisations have been on the ground doiing what they can. Despite the danger and difficulties some food and supplies do make it through. Many shelters are privately run and also rely on donations to feed their dogs, cats, horses and other animals. They have posted their heartbreaking stories on social media. One such shelter is in Kyiv. They were bombed but managed to open all the cages to release hundreds of dogs and cats. They are trying to rebuild the shelter, as well as feed them. 


