The heat we were all complaining about last week seemed to help build some moisture with some decent falls of rain falling over the weekend. Falls of 30-60mm fell throughout the tablelands while isolated falls of 100mm were recorded in the central west. The forecast for the next 10 days looks to be promising for more moisture and the temperatures look to be staying relatively warm for the month of April, giving us a chance to grow some soft autumn feed for winter.

NSW Government is set for a change with Labor winning the NSW election and being the first time in power since their last win in 1995. The Labor majority may be slim with a much larger crossbench than past elections, just like last year's Federal Government win. The victory has occurred with an increasing number of minor party and independent votes, the largest crossbench in modern NSW history. The Northern Tablelands and North West are still in the National Party hands with Adam Marshall and Kevin Anderson sweeping the floor and retaining their seats. Our members will have an uphill battle as they sit on the opposition benches for the first time and try to get the best outcomes for our regions.

China has finally resumed its beef trade with Brazil after it was voluntarily suspended following a reported atypical case of BSE. Not only have China re admitted Brazilian beef exports it has also approved four additional beef plants that can export to China. The beef trade between Brazil and China is the largest in the world with more than 55% of Brazilian beef exports heading to China last year. While the suspension was in place it was noted that Brazilian beef farmers were losing up to \$25 million a day and now they have another four processing plants with a tick of approval from the Chinese government. Looks like China is putting a strangle hold on its supply of affordable beef from the largest beef producer in the world.

The Australia United Kingdom Free trade agreement has been given the tick of approval by the UK Parliament, removing tariffs on over 99 percent of Australian goods exported to UK annually. This is good news for Australian farmers and gives the people of the UK a sustainable option of high quality Australian produce on their supermarket shelves. Beef and sheep producers are set to benefit with immediate access granted for duty free quotas and a substantial rise in quotas over the next 10 years.

Tamworth fat sale more than halved on Monday with 810 cattle selling to mostly dearer trends on the back of some follow up rain. Restocker cattle met stronger demand selling up to 10c/kg dearer with Angus steers topping at 470c/kg for 251kg. Angus feeder steers made 408c/kg while feeder heifers topped at 375c/kg. Cows were in demand selling to a top of 276c/kg for some empty fat Angus cows out of Walcha. The rain didn't help the sheep and lamb market with numbers well back on the previous sale. A yarding of 2500 lambs met weaker competition with trade weights selling to a top of \$168, back \$20/hd and extra heavies topping at \$200, back \$60 from the previous week. Mutton also met reduced competition topping at \$130 for XB ewes to head back to the paddock. Majority of the mutton sold from \$70-100/hd.

Opener Grills finalised the match in fairly abrupt style when he belted their opening bowler B Swilks to the boundary before lifting the final delivery of the game out of the ground.

The grand final was postponed for 24 hours due to the rain but on Saturday the 3rd grade did start on time and lasted 15 overs before it was called off with Walcha/Uralla and Guyra declared joint premiers.

Council's role in Renewable Energy

Over the last couple of months and especially since the close of submissions for the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Winterbourne Wind Project I have heard and read a lot of comment about where your Council stands in relation to both the Voluntary Planning Agreement (VPA), sometimes called the Community Benefit Fund, and the Road Infrastructure Agreement (RIA).

Firstly, Walcha Council has not signed off on either of these documents. VPA's are described as "negotiated between a Developer and a Council, for the provision of infrastructure to support communities". Vestas has presented both Uralla and Walcha Councils with a draft VPA and we are currently reviewing that document. It can be noted that in Vestas' public information the offer is \$1m on financial close and \$750,000 for 600 megawatt plus an extra \$1000 for every 1000mw annually when generation starts. If the project is successful in moving forward there are varying start dates but it may be two years at least.

Whatever name they go by, these forms of community compensation are nothing new. They exist in some form in the mining industry, large developments and many other projects.

Currently Walcha Council and Vestas have a very respectful engagement in all areas of this project and the negotiation around this VPA should be the same. Obviously the more we can extract the better for our community and Vestas have a commercial pathway to follow.

While the funding amount is important there is a lot of background negotiations that form how the agreement works for the life of the project. This structure is yet to be finalised but we will keep you updated on the proposal and place it on public display for your input.

Obviously the RIA is a much more complicated document and we are relying on assistance from the Coalition of Renewable Energy Mayors, our engineers, and the Department of Planning for experience in this area. We have spoken to Councils who have not had watertight agreements and have paid the price. The Oxley Hwy from Bendemeer to the sale yards is a Transport for NSW issue but we take over from there and have a minimum of 70kms of roads, culverts and bridges to protect. Depending on where water, gravel, sand etc are sourced could mean more of our local roads come into play.

Last week Interim GM Phil and myself had a zoom meeting with Clay Preshaw and Nicole Brewer from the DPIE and they are very open to information sharing and answering our questions. I believe we have a very respectful and open dialogue with both "the department" and Vestas. Council's neutral position on WWF does not mean we will not disagree or defend what we see our community needs. Moving forward each project will be assessed by Council on its merits. There has been a lot of discussion around the number of submissions that each "side" received. DPIE made it plain that only relevant and informed submissions are taken into account. The pathway for these projects is well worn and does not work on emotion.

A quick update on the progress through DPIE. Currently Vestas is responding to submissions and as was indicated in our zoom session there has been an extension of time granted because there were so many. When DPIE are satisfied they will make a recommendation to the Independent Planning Commission who will once again engage with our community in Walcha before determining the outcome. While they will not put a timeline on this it could take a while.

Taxi

It was a pity to see a thumbs down to our taxi service last week. What is probably one of the greatest social assets for our community, it delivers far and beyond what it is obliged to do. To drop patrons, who are sometimes frail or elderly outside the door of the business they wish to enter, wait for them and help them back in defines what special people they are. The service has probably saved licences, marriages and maybe even lives. Available 24 hours a day and always with a smile. Julie, Mick and your drivers thank you for your service. This community appreciates it. If anyone deserves a thumbs down maybe it should be the people who park in their designated park.

Skate Park

Disappointing too was the thumbs down to the Skate Park. There was a lot of public engagement in this process and Council's Manager of Project Delivery negotiated strongly with the project designers to bring the local input to the table. The "focus more on younger children" is about adding areas for them and not taking away from older children who have also had items added for them. It will be a great facility suited to all ages and encouraging families to visit.

As part of the Exhibition of Winterbourne Wind's EIS in November 2022, the Department of Planning and Environment (DPE) asked a number of Government agencies to report their findings about that document. Those findings also available for all to read, many pages of them, but not a positive word for Vestas and Winterbourne Wind to hide their perfidy behind.

You're welcome to read all those reports; there are links on the Voice for Walcha website (www.voiceforwalcha.com). But to cut to the chase, here are direct quotes from those agencies dealing with six main areas of major deficiency in that EIS, as well as two truly damning assessments by our own Council and Uralla's.

Be aware that what follows is not what some would happily call rumour-mongering and fact-fiddling by a bunch of divisive radicals. THESE ARE FACTS - cold hard undeniable facts from thorough reports by experts in their various fields - verbatim, word-for-word, straight from the (many) horses' mouths! So if it's the facts you want, read on.

Advice on EIS from Dept of Planning & Environment – Water Insufficient information has been provided to confirm operational water take for the project. Insufficient information has been provided to understand the ability to obtain relevant entitlements in the required water source. Clear demonstration is requested as obtaining these entitlements can be a risk to the project.

Advice on EIS from Heritage NSW - Aboriginal

Based on the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment Report (ACHAR), provided in support of the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS), there is insufficient information provided for Heritage NSW to advise the Department on whether the management recommendations are adequate and if the ACHAR substantially complies with the SEARs. In any event we believe the Dunghatti have rejected the ACHAR as a flawed process.

Advice on EIS from Transport for NSW

TfNSW has reviewed the development application and supporting documentation submitted and **is not satisfied** that the proposed development has adequately addressed the anticipated construction traffic impacts on the NSW state road and rail networks.

Advice on EIS from Dept of Primary Industries

We note the extension of the EIS submission timeframe to January 2023. Effort should be made to mitigate the issues arising in Walcha, for example workforce housing arrangements, community benefit fund distribution, local procurement, visual impacts, use of water resources, disruption to transport routes, decommissioning and rehabilitation.

Walcha Council

Council has reviewed the documents and appendices to the EIS and for reasons outlined in further detail below, considers that it is substantially devoid of critical information and data required to enable a thorough and informed assessment of the environment impacts associated with the Project. The information provided in the EIS in respect of the Project is inadequate, inaccurate and inconsistent.

Uralla Council

Council lodge an objection to the development of Winterbourne Wind Farm on the grounds that the following issues, that may impact substantially on residents of Uralla Shire, are inadequately addressed by the Environmental Impact Statement:

- Failure to adequately address quantities, sources and transport routes associated with road base, aggregate and sand associated with road, hardstand and tower foundation construction.
- Definition of mitigating measures in a qualitative rather than quantitative manner.
- Failure to adequately address disposal of general waste and solid non-recyclable waste management issues or to address the impact of their transport on Council roads.
- Failure to adequately address the cost and responsibility for decommissioning.
- Failure to identify the source of water, nor take into account the potential impact on Council roads and road users of water cartage for concrete production and dust suppression.
- Negative impact on visual amenity.
- Failure to adequately address significant heritage items

Advice on EIS from NSW Biodiversity Conservation Division

For biodiversity, the land category assessment is incomplete and has not considered critically endangered ecological communities and flora, avoidance and minimisation of impacts on biodiversity values is insufficient, vegetation mapping and vegetation zones are inaccurate, vegetation integrity scores may have been reduced by surveys undertaken during inappropriate seasonal conditions, the extent of impacts on serious and irreversible impact (SAII) entities is unacceptable, bird and bat utilisation data are insufficient to inform the assessment of impacts on these species, threatened fauna and flora surveys for some threatened species do not accord with the Biodiversity Assessment Method (BAM) 2020, fauna species polygons for some threatened species are incorrect, the assessments for koala and greater glider have not considered the current listing status of these threatened species, prescribed and indirect impacts have not been offset, and impacts arising from the haul route have not been assessed or offset.

For NPWS estate, the assessment of the impacts on aerial firefighting and park operations has not addressed the issues raised by NPWS during consultation with the proponent, in its current form the proposal will impede NPWS firefighting capabilities and operations, the bushfire assessment has not sufficiently addressed the impacts on NPWS estate, the landscape and visual assessment is incorrect and does not sufficiently identify or avoid visual impacts on the declared wilderness, the noise assessment does not consider noise impacts on camping in the wilderness and does not sufficiently identify or avoid noise impacts on the declared wilderness, the impacts on habitat connectivity with NPWS estate have not been sufficiently mitigated, and electromagnetic interference with NPWS communications has not been sufficiently mitigated.

It is impossible to imagine that the above issues can be satisfactorily addressed by Winterbourne Wind. These professional evidence-based reports make it clear that this is a poorly delivered EIS for a poorly designed project. In the words of these professionals ... Insufficient, inadequate, inaccurate, inconsistent, inappropriate, incomplete, unacceptable, a failure.

We believe this 'failure' continues to waste community time and money.
