

around the traps

It's hard to believe we are already at Easter and winter is not far away, especially with the fresh crisp air greeting us in the mornings. Whispers of a small frost in places last week have the chainsaws firing up, as up until now the cool weather has evaded us. We are in April and I think we have been lucky with the temperatures and of course the rain with the district fairing well over the past fortnight. April looks to be kind at the moment for temperatures with pastures and grasses still growing nicely, as I mentioned to someone the other day it almost feels like our weather pattern is a month behind.

Weaner sales are in full swing and there has been a lift in prices after last week's rain by 10-20c/kg for the lighter cattle. Weaner steers 200-250kg are making 900-1150 depending on breed and quality while 250-300kg are now making \$1150-\$1400, when only a fortnight ago it took a heavy weaner to make beyond \$1200. Light heifers look to be still value with heifers 200-250kg making \$700-\$900/hd, while 250-300 are making \$900-\$1150 for the better breed lines of females. Congratulations goes out to the team at Nutrien Boultons and Nutrien Armidale for listing the most ever cattle on Auctionsplus in a standalone sale last week. Cattle sold to purchasers from Victoria, NSW and QLD with a couple of the buyers admitting the evening sale was bad for their health.

The coolness in the air has brought on a flurry of fodder trucks entering the district and I'm sure you have all realised just how dear hay has become. Large hay producing areas were wiped out during the floods in November and December. Hay is anywhere from \$300-\$450t in the paddock plus the freight home while silage is 90-\$120 a bale. Regardless of the price most producers use hay during the winter months and most producers have already made these purchases but I still am hearing of people looking for fodder.

New South Wales and Federal Governments have seized 38 tons of illegal meat from a warehouse in western Sydney that posed an unacceptable risk of introducing disease for plants and animals. Beef, chicken, duck, pig meat, turtle meat, avian meat, frog meat, raw prawns, plant products and soil were all products seized in the illegal operation. What are these people actually doing importing these products, I'm guessing they would not even have the faintest idea of the implications that these illegal products could have on our Agricultural sector or even care. The scary part is that these products slipped through our borders in shipping containers. It's operations such as this that pose a huge risk to Australian agriculture and by the looks of this evidence we are heavily under resourced.

I experienced our first LPA audit just last week and I can tell you that the information required to be accredited is all relevant and just. One part I'm guessing that most producers like myself don't put enough emphasis on is your farm biosecurity, such as a simple log book with people entering your properties. I think we all believe our border controls will do the job in protecting us but clearly from the seized product in western Sydney it's a struggle. It's small measures like this that could one day help trace or stop the spread of an infectious disease outbreak getting onto your property.

If you're a sheep and lamb producer and you think that our local market was tough well think again. Producers in WA currently are experiencing lamb hook values in the mid to low \$5/kg and mutton values in the mid \$2. The lack of processors in WA are extremely concerning, especially if they close the live sheep trade. There just isn't enough competition on their sheep and lambs from processors due to their lack of capacity to process their livestock.

Walcha Rose Garden - This is a simple name - one of the nominators for this name stated "lovely entrance to Walcha and we should be proud to name it after our town".

Charles Erratt Rose Garden - This suggestion was first received by Council in August 2021 and gave the idea of putting a name to the garden. Information supplied: "He was a champion of the 'underdog', he often guaranteed bail for people apprehended by the Police; paid for funerals for those that could not afford them; understood the hardships of living off the land by supporting graziers from one wool cheque to the next; was an astute businessman, played a big part in the development of Walcha; Australia's longest living working executive and always wore a fresh flower in his buttonhole.

Olga Lisle Rose Garden - all nominations advised that Olga was dedicated to the beautification of Walcha; the Walcha Garden Club, Horticultural Pavilion at the Walcha Show and her openness, kindness and generosity with her knowledge and love of plants.

Bev Betts Rose Garden - Nominations spoke about Bev's kindness, generosity and devotion to Walcha and the community.

Police operation uncovers weapon and cannabis

About 5.45pm on Thursday (30 March 2023), officers from Oxley Police District executed a search warrant at a home in Jamieson Steet, Walcha, as part of investigations into alleged weapons offences.

During a search of the property, investigators located a gel blaster pistol, cannabis plants and cannabis. These items were seized to undergo forensic examination.

A 24-year-old man was arrested at the property and taken to Tamworth Police Station, where he was charged with possess unauthorised pistol, not keep firearm safely-pistol, armed with intent to commit indictable offence, and cultivate prohibited plant.

He was refused bail and appeared at Tamworth Local Court on Friday (31 March 2023), where he was granted strict conditional bail to next appear at Walcha Local Court on Friday 21 April 2023.

MAYBE DO OUR OWN THING

More than twenty years. That's how long Walcha has been huffed and puffed and stuffed around by those wind farm Vikings and their OZ off-siders. And what have we got to show? Basically bugger all. Don't take our word for that, though. Take the facts; all the many government agency reports delivered to the DPE about Winterbourne Wind's unspeakably shoddy EIS. And if Ruby Hills et al are any indication it looks like we might expect more of the same, a lot more.

Yep, more than twenty years. That's a long time to keep doing the same silly things in the hope of getting somewhere. You'd have to call it flogging a dead horse, wouldn't you? At the very least it shows what total mugs we are - Walcha Community - because there really are far better ways to build a town's renewable energy future. Surely it's time we opened our eyes and minds to at least some of those better ways.

Probably the best way to do that is to consider the concept of community energy. At its core, community energy is based on the belief that everyday people should have power over how their energy is generated - including its environmental and social impacts - rather than allowing big corporations to take control and pocket the profits.

The notions of community involvement, consensus and ownership in energy creation have really taken hold in Europe over the last decade, and increasingly so in North America. Community-Owned Renewable Energy (CORE) projects are now commonplace in Scotland, growing in Germany and the Netherlands, and Denmark has even mandated that future wind farm projects must involve at least 20% community ownership. Hear that? Denmark! Home of Vestas!

Australia has been slower to take up community-based projects, but we're getting there. Our first such project, Hepburn Wind, began generating power in June 2011. Since then, many more communities across Australia have banded together to develop their own solar, wind, biomass, micro-grid and other efficiency projects. Now, with well over 100 community-driven energy outlets, the movement is really ramping up.

Projects come in all shapes and sizes: household solar bulk buys, small-scale community solar farms (<100kW), or community wind farms like Hepburn Wind, and are managed by social enterprises, cooperatives, not-for-profit organisations. or a mix of various approaches, the bottom line being to establish what works for a given "community".

Here are just three examples. The small WA town of Katanning, southeast of Perth, became its own power station in 2021 with a project launched by a local cocky. "If we generate energy from a community base," says Katanning Shire Executive Officer, Julian Murphy, "we're in control of our own destiny." The Katanning project is based on a model pioneered by Indigo Power, an energy company in northeast Victoria that grew out of a local community-energy group called Totally Renewable Yackandandah (TRY). That company is now being contacted big time by community-energy groups around Australia who

want to go the same way. Then there's the NSW regional centre of Goulburn which joined the energy revolution by coming together to build its own 4,000-panel solar farm, where everyday citizens can buy shares in the venture.

And the economics of community energy are worth considering. At



Yackandandah, for instance, \$160m could leave the region every year in paying electricity bills. But once the community produces and owns that electricity the economics are very different. Also, a town owning the electricity is suddenly able to capture new businesses with attractive power discounts.

Community Energy is definitely "a strong movement for everyday people who want to see the true benefits from what is an inevitable renewable energy boom," says Helen Haines, the independent federal MP for Indi, which includes Yackandandah. It's about "ensuring everyone benefits from a local renewables project, rather than just the farmers whose land is used for the solar panels or the wind turbines. Just about every renewables project that's going to be created in Australia is going to be in regional Australia." Thus it's a no-brainer that regional Australia should be benefiting from that.

So is Community-Owned Renewable Energy for Walcha? It is certainly something worth considering. Of course it would involve serious researching and soul-searching. It would mean the whole community getting together and behaving as adults. It would mean our council consulting at street level, establishing what the community wants, and acting accordingly. And it would require following facts rather than fiction. But surely it is worth considering, certainly better than the raft of large scale ad-hoc projects which now dominate our approach, and definitely a million times better than flogging a dead horse ad nauseam

WALCHA GARDEN CLUB CLIPPINGS

What a wonderful start to Autumn with all the recent rain. Such a good time to be out and about in the garden and attending to all the jobs prior to the onset of winter. Firstly, take every opportunity to enjoy all the wonderful autumn leaves which will be surrounding us in the weeks to come. After so much rain it may be a while before we have the full enjoyment of Autumn. A good time to look at all the deciduous trees if you are thinking of planting new trees in late winter. Remember to place your orders for bare rooted trees as early as possible to avoid disappointment.

Soil preparation should be in full swing for spring flowering bulbs. It is best to have all your bulbs planted by no later than mid-May. Bulbs like free draining soil and full sunlight. If they are grown in part shade then they are usually taller and their stems much softer. Some bulbs like dappled sunlight such as Spanish Bluebells, grape hyacinth, and the larger flowering hyacinth. For the most effective result it is best to mass plant these bulbs under deciduous trees such as flowering cherries or Moss White birches that are grouped together. Bulbs can also be planted in areas where they can naturalise. Container plantings of bulbs near your front door can make an amazing visual impact in spring. Combine plantings of bulbs with violas, pansies, or primulas. When planting containers try and extend the flowering season by layering the bulbs. Bulbs can be planted quite close to each other. Plant tulip bulbs, daffodil bulbs then Dutch Iris followed by Grape Hyacinth then Anemones. Once the flowering season has finished the bulbs should be transplanted into the garden. For mass planting in even blocks I suggest you try the following idea. If you have a square egg tray that holds 30 eggs then use this as your guide. Pierce the bottom of the holes in the carton. Dig an area in your garden at least 15cm-20cm in depth. Place the carton in the hole. Wet the carton well. Place your daffodil or tulip bulbs in each hole. Cover with soil and mulch. Water well. When foliage starts to appear sprinkle some bulb food and water in well. Cartons can be broken up to make perfect circles too. A simple but effective landscaping idea.

It is nearly that time of year when vegetable growers are picking pumpkins and digging potatoes. Wait till after the first frost to pick pumpkins. A frost will harden their skin and gives the pumpkin more flavour. Potatoes can be left in the ground for a few more weeks. When you dig potatoes leave the dirt on them and store in a dark, cool dry place. Discard any potatoes that have green skin on them as they are very toxic to humans. Pears are in season now. They will not readily ripen on the tree. Pick and place in a warm part of your home and in a few weeks they will be ready to consume or preserve. If you are lucky enough to have or know someone who has quinces or crab-apples then now is the time to harvest them. There is nothing nicer than taking a bottle of home-made preserves to friends when you visit.


