Mitch takes out **Champion of Champions**

At this year's Sydney Royal Easter Show, axeman Mitch Scrivener was named the 2022 - 2023 NSW Axemen's Association's Champion of Champions.

Each year from April through to the following March, NSW axemen who compete in State Championships accrue points. Points are allocated for their placings in these events which are held across the State, with first place receiving five points, second four and so on.

Mitch travelled to shows across NSW to contest these Championships and picked up maximum points at four - Dubbo Show in the 375mm Underhand, Grafton the 325mm Underhand, and the 275mm Tree Felling and 500mm Butcher's Block at Lismore. He also gained points at Camden and Wollombi.

On the 9 April at the Royal, Mitchell was announced the winner of the Title, after gaining most points. For taking out the NSW Champion of Champions Mitch received a \$1000 cash prize and was presented with a shirt by NSWAA President Graham Shepherd.

Mitch and his younger brother Austin had outstanding success at last year's Royal, so in 2023 it was always going to be tough to repeat. This year Mitch placed third in the First Division 600mm Team of Two Butchers Block with Lindsav Hewitt (QLD). and made the Final of

the 275mm Tree Felling and the 375mm Single Sawing Handicap. Both Mitch and Austin cut in the NSW North Coast team, which placed second in the Inter-Association Relay. To the delight of the crowd, Austin climbed a fast and near flawless tree, catching his team up to the Central Coast who seemed to have cut their way to a certain win. Austin looked in good form, and while he competed well in the relay and the NSW Under 21s team that placed second in the State of Origin tri-series, he unfortunately had to sit out for several days with injury.

What's next for the brothers? Austin will be attending the Stihl Timbersports® qualifiers this weekend hoping to secure a spot in the 2023 Stihl Rookie Series (U25). He's also been named in the Australian Under 21's team to take on New Zealand at the 2023 Adelaide Royal. Meanwhile Mitch has several events to attend in preparation for the Ekka and Adelaide, and will be hoping to once again gain selection in the NSW Open Team later this year.

around the traps 🚱

The weather over the last few days has reminded us we do live in Walcha with a top of just 8 degrees recorded on Monday and that didn't include the wind chill factor. The whole East coast shivered through the cold front with reports of a small dusting of snow around the high country and even some south of town. Up until the weekend the frosts had been few and far between but we have now had a couple of big ones in a row. The rest of the week looks to be pleasant starting out a little frosty in the mornings with the daytime temps rising to around 15 degrees. It only takes a couple of frosts to turn the grass brown and suck up what moisture is about on the surface and i think we could all use another drop very soon.

The Labor government will have delivered its first budget in nine years on Tuesday night by the time this article is read. We have heard snippets of what their intentions are — helping with the cost of living for numerous Australians, but it will be another cash splash that could affect inflation and further interest rate hikes. The worrying part is that they are overhauling the current infrastructure funding and it is set to be sliced and diced which won't be any good for anyone living in country areas. A surplus is set to be announced due to surging tax revenue in iron ore, coal and gas and agricultural commodities which sadly will be largely spent in metropolitan areas.

The RBA announced another interest rate hike last week with mortgage holders taking another blow to their pockets and putting further pressure on the rising cost of living. All four big banks have passed the interest rate rise on in full and interestingly they have all made a combined profit of approx 16 billion in the first half of the year, up 12 per cent on the previous 6 months. If you have money in the banks or are a shareholder then this rise in revenue will put money back into your pockets but let's face it, how many people actually have large amounts of money in the bank when they are dealing with their current living environment.

The EYCI has continued to soften in 2023 with it falling below 650c/kg for the first time since November 2020. The EYCI sits approx 460c/kg below the same time 12 months ago as the supply continues to put pressure on the price with extra numbers continuing to show up. These extra numbers are always about in May after a month of short weeks during April and generally we see a rise in values the closer we get to winter. Feeder cattle prices have remained firm and have picked up in values slightly over the last few weeks with feedlots now quoting 415c/kg for Angus steers. Word is this will improve as we move through the winter months and into spring before the normal run of cattle come off crop.

The UK Parliament has approved the legislation to bring the Australia –United Kingdom free trade agreement into effect in the UK. We are just waiting on an actual commencement date but numerous feedlots are now chasing EU accredited Angus cattle and offering a premium. This premium for EU accredited Angus steers was seen on Friday when EU Angus steers, 300kg made over \$1500, north of \$5/kg which was an exceptional sale on a market that is currently receding for most classes of restocker cattle. There hasn't been a premium about for EU grass fed slaughter cattle for some time but I'm guessing it will only be a matter of time before we see it.

The May sell off has continued with 2160 cattle yarded on Monday in Tamworth while Gunnedah drew for over 3000 cattle. The market was cheaper with varying trends in the light restocker cattle. Light cattle back to the paddock sold to much cheaper trends, especially heifers averaging 267c/kg while the steers averaged 310c/kg. Feeder cattle sold to cheaper trends, down almost 20c/kg topping at 384c/kg for steers and 354c/kg for heifers. The cow market continued its downward trend, down 15c/kg topping at 257c/kg. 5200 sheep and lambs were yarded in Tamworth with all lambs to restock and process selling to cheaper trends. Trade lambs topped at \$178, back \$10-15/hd to average around the \$150-160/ while heavy lambs sold to \$240. The mutton market softened, back \$5-\$10/hd with XB ewes topping at \$114 while merino wethers sold to \$120.

Jack's Creek in gold medal class with Rocala Wagyu Steer

Jack's Creek is owned and operated by the Warmoll family from Werris Creek NSW. It has won many awards worldwide including The World's Best Steak on two occasions. This time they have taken out first place in the gold medal Purebred Class and were placed third in the Fullblood Class of the Australian Wagyu Association's Branded Beef Awards. Silver and bronze medals were attained in the crossbred sections. These prestigious awards are held annually and announced at the Wagyu conference, which this year was at Sydney's Darling Harbour. What makes this new award special to our region is that Jack's Creek did it with a fullblood steer that was bred by locally owned and operated Rocala Wagyu. The relationship Rocala has with Jack's Creek stretches back to 2007.

"The ROC" ROCFP00810 was the Sire of this steer and he was bred from carcass data received back in 2013. He is the mainstay of the Rocala herd and has bred most of the Rocala award winning animals. He is a dual-purpose bull, bred on his sire's side for the marbling trait which is rather easy to get in the Wagyu breed. His Dam carries a line that boosts size and that's the key to the future of Wagyu. The Dam of this steer ROCFP00809 has all the leading foundation sires in her pedigree, TF151, 003, TF148 and Itohana 2.

The steer himself had an equally interesting start to life. Because the birth of all animals are recorded on property, DNA'd and parent verified through Neogen lab's, each animal is tracked throughout its life. This steer was born to a first calf heifer at around 9pm on the night of 29 June 2020.

While doing the final rounds of the calving heifers late in the evening, the spotlight from the torch picked out two eyes that were bobbing up and down in the middle of the dam. Not knowing what it was Dave Woodley drove in for a closer inspection. Seeing it was a calf, he

stripped down to his birthday suit and went for a swim to get the little guy out of the freezing water. Niangala nights at the end of June are not the time or the place to be swimming in a dam. The little calf was retrieved and spent the night warming up next to the fire in the living room with some much-needed saved colostrum.

Next morning the young heifer wouldn't take him. Sukhee Woodley, known for her ability and empathy with cattle persevered with the calf and his mother. Eventually she smeared one of the heifer's cow pats on the little fellow ... with the right smell the mothering up was completed. He was aptly named Aqua Boy!

Wind Turbines **Unintended Consequences**

.....

It was with some concern that I watched the Landline story on 16 April 2023 about wind turbines in the Walcha area.

Solar and wind power renewables are fashionable at present which, in itself, could be a problem. Fashions come and go and when people tire of a given fashion life, it can be financially difficult for those left "holding the baby". Consider the Australian firms left holding PPE equipment, PCR and RAT testing units they can no longer sell since the COVID pandemic was suddenly (1 January 2023) declared over out of fashion - by the Federal Government who no longer wanted to pay for it or its ancillaries.

The Landline program seemed to be quite pro wind turbines and at no time was the infrasound produced by these turbines mentioned.

Given the large number of wind turbines planned for the Armidale, Uralla and Walcha areas, there will be high levels of infrasound produced over a wide area.

Infrasound is not known to affect everyone, however it is known to affect more people the longer they are exposed to it and it can, over time, quite literally drive some people crazy. This is well documented. Others become sleepy, anxious, headachy, disoriented, docile, confused, vulnerable to suggestion, with some claiming they "hear things".

Many psychiatrists automatically prescribe antipsychotic (psychotropic) drugs for their mentally disturbed patients. Antipsychotic medications may control the conditions for which they are prescribed, but there can be a cost: they can interfere with nutrient metabolism and cause new mental abnormalities to appear. Some forms of schizophrenia, for instance, can be triggered or exacerbated by a vitamin B6 deficiency.

Long term or high-dosage therapy with the phenothiazines and other antipsychotic medications cause tardive dyskinesia, a disease characterised by rhythmical involuntary movements of the tongue, face, mouth, arms or legs. This makes the driving of motor vehicles and the operating of machinery risky. Going off the medication is the only treatment on offer and with no guarantee of 100% symptom abatement: according to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, who first registered these medications.

It's possible that over the longer term some of those with wind turbines on their property could be paying out significant damages to mental and physical health impaired litigants. It would have been helpful if the Landline story had mentioned that this practice could, in time, become as fashionable as wind turbines are now.

For this observer, the unfolding events bring to mind Ovid's prescient warning in his deification of Julius Caesar - Grasp All Lose All.

This could be a genuine olive branch from the Turbine Team in what has been a divisive issue, a serious attempt to seek the social licence their wind farm will unquestionably require if it is to not only pass the pub-test, but to actually succeed at all. Good on them.

I say good on them because possibly the most important point here is that this could be a real opportunity for Walcha community to start taking charge of its own renewable energy future, a key starting position for how we can solve the energy dilemmas that are already dividing us, and will continue to divide more. So be there at the Showground tomorrow, from 5.30 (at the latest) and you can begin to be part of our energy solution. Take on board questions that members of Walcha community have asked us to present to Walcha Energy about the RHW project. Ask your own questions, if you wish, and hopefully come away with a better idea of what might lie ahead.

We've presented Walcha Energy with a comprehensive list of key questions about the RHW project. These included questions about: the Cumulative impact of the project; Noise effects; Biodiversity; Traffic impacts; Resource issues like gravel and water; estimated kilometres of internal farm tracks; Social licence; the Ownership structure of RHW; the proposed Community Benefit Fund; actual area of RHW and farms involved; the power size of the project; decommissioning issues, and more. No doubt there will be questions from locals who turn up as well. So it should be a truly information-packed two and a half hours.

I urge you to grasp this opportunity to be part of the solution to Walcha's renewable energy future. Of course you can do nothing. No one is forcing you to come along. But if we in fact do nothing as a community, our energy future will be decided for us, make no mistake. And if we let that happen, you can moan as much as you like, because by then it will already be too late; it will be GAME OVER. You'll not only have to accept what you're given; you'll have to keep accepting what they give you, because you will have effectively told them you're a "walk-over".


