around the traps 🚱

We have had some beautiful weather over the past week but it has all started with some thumping frosts. Minus 8 was the recording in town over the weekend and with more frosts forecast over the net week it is really sucking the moisture out of the soil. There is no rain predicted for the net week and not much chance of moisture over the net month.

Talking with numerous producers around the district and the general consensus is that their winter feed will run out sooner rather than later and they will be hand feeding if we don't get any rain soon. We live in a cold climate and I think hand feeding is a strategy most producers are accustomed to doing every winter, but it's a summer like the one we just had where the grass didn't get a chance to get ahead. We were lucky to get a break in March, otherwise we would be hand feeding already and would be selling livestock in store condition, not fat. If anyone has been looking for fodder then we would all realise just how dear it's becoming, coupled with the cost of freight we are paying similar prices as during the drought. U st browsing around I saw most hay prices are \$350-\$450 a ton on farm while cotton seed is being quoted as \$400 ton ex the gin.

If you haven't already checked your crops this year I suggest you do so with reports of mites and some slug investigations around the district. It's not as bad as last year but it does affect the ability of your crop and pastures to grow. Given a year like the one we are having we could all use the ex ra growth and it is vital to have a healthy plant when moisture may be limited.

The dry start to the year in other areas have seen consignments of store stock hit the market in recent weeks, especially runs of store cows which we haven't seen for a few years. Store cows are the best feed converters and if you're looking for some quick cash flow or turn over, I suggest looking into these if you have fattening feed.

Producers are looking at the forecast ahead and judging by the large yarding of weaners in Armidale on Monday everyone is selling exe ss numbers. The prices reflected the current seasonal conditions with 3092 head averaging \$833.96/hd, compared to the last weaner sale average of \$1179.67/hd just 5 weeks ago. Last Friday AuctionsPlus catalogued its largest listing of cattle for 2023 and only managed a 38% clearance rate. It's been a while since we have seen weaner steers sell well below \$1000/hd and PTIC Angus heifers out of the Hunter as low as \$1250/hd. Word on the grapevine is that parts of the Hunter region are really struggling and judging by the condition of the cattle I'd say it's correct.

I mentioned last week about Labor slashing its rural investment infrastructure program and a large project on our door step has already been knocked on the head. The cancellation of the Dungowan Dam project is set to save the Federal Government \$635 million of tax payers money as they have withdrawn the funding. The government are stating that the cost benefit ratio of the dam isn't recommended to be put on the infrastructure priority list as it would take 10 years to build and fill the dam. They are saying there are better alternatives to Tamworth water issues like piping between ex sting dams and water efficiency management for example, but regardless we need to store more water as piping dams that all but went dry during the drought doesn't seem like an educated resolution. We need not only more water for the our towns but plenty more for growing food, fodder and drought resilience. Lets be grateful that the Walcha water storage facility is already underway and we can store more water for our community, otherwise the funding may have been ripped away from us for so called more beneficial infrastructure projects.

Tamworth yarded 1727 cattle on Monday with prices easing further due to the dry conditions. Steers 330-400kg topped at 361c/kg, while quality Hereford steers to kill, 494kg topped at 390c/kg. Heavy bullocks, 776kg made to 220c/kg while 2 tooth steers made 281c/kg for 608kg. Feeder heifers made to 290c/kg while heavy fat cows, 671kg topped at 235c/kg. 5500 sheep and lambs were yarded in Tamworth with ex ra heavy lambs selling to \$235/hd, trade weights to \$187 and heavy XB mutton sold to \$150.

Employer, Brian Smith cannot speak highly enough of Steven's dedication. "When Steven was still at school he dropped his resume into our office, asking for any work that was available. He would work at the yard on the weekends and through his school holidays," Brian said.

Brian signed Steven up as a School-based trainee, and now he is in his second year of an Automotive - Heavy Commercial Vehicle Mechanic. "I am very proud of Steven and I am honoured to be able to support young people through TAFE courses and their apprenticeships," Brian said.

Two other employees at Brian Smith Timber Transport are also completing TAFE courses, with qualified mechanic Daniel Lordanic upskilling into

heavy vehicle mechanics, and Ben Moran currently studying as a first year apprentice. "The training for these two mechanics is all completed at our office which means they don't have to travel and miss a week of work, which is extremely beneficial to all of us, as well as saving them on travel and

Consider natural health care for immunity

Local Chiropractor, Samantha Goor submitted this article to promote natural health care for our immunity.

Natural Immunity is something we are all born with. Our genetics, diet and lifestyles can all influence our immunity.

Here are some pointers that may help you strengthen your immunity safely:

- Breastmilk contains loads of natural nutrients and immune enhancers for you as a developing baby
- Adequate sleep gives your body and immunity the time needed to repair and regenerate. Adults should be aiming for 7-8 hours a night in a dark room.
- Whole plant foods like fruits, vegetables, nuts, seeds, and legumes are rich in nutrients and antioxidants that may give you an upper hand against harmful pathogens. The antioxidants in these foods help decrease inflammation by combatting unstable compounds called free radicals, which can cause inflammation when they build up in your body in high levels. Chronic inflammation is linked to numerous health conditions, including heart disease, Alzheimer's, and certain cancers. Meanwhile, the fibre in plant foods, feeds your gut microbiome, or the community of healthy bacteria in your gut. A robust gut microbiome can improve your immunity and help keep harmful pathogens from entering your body via your digestive tract.
- Eat healthy fats. Extra Virgin olive oil, coconut oil, flaxseed oil, butter, all may help with reducing chronic inflammation which hinders immunity. Olive oil, which is highly anti-inflammatory, is linked to a decreasedriskofchronicdiseaseslikeheartdiseaseandtype2diabetes. Plus, its anti-inflammatory properties may help your body fight off harmful disease-causing bacteria and viruses. Omega-3 fatty acids, such as those in salmon and chia seeds, fight inflammation as well.
- Fermented foods are rich in beneficial bacteria called probiotics, which populate your digestive tract. These foods include yogurt, sauerkraut, kimchi, kefir, and natto. Research suggests that a flourishing network of gut bacteria can help your immune cells differentiate between normal, healthy cells and harmful invader organisms.
- Reduce sugar. Higher sugar intake can be linked with higher disease expression
- Moderate exercise may reduce inflammation and improve immunity, helps reduce stress
- Drink plenty of fresh clean rain water
- Deal with your stress levels. Chronic stress reduces immunity
- Supplements may help. However, some studies indicate that the following supplements may strengthen your body's general immune response:
- Vitamin C. According to a review in over 11,000 people, taking 1,000–2,000 mg of vitamin C per day reduced the duration of colds by 8% in adults and 14% in children.
- Vitamin D. Vitamin D deficiency may increase your chances of getting sick, so supplementing may counteract this effect.
- **Zinc.** In a review in 575 people with the common cold, supplementing with more than 75 mg of zinc per day reduced the duration of the cold by 33%.
- Elderberry. One small review found that elderberry could reduce the symptoms of viral upper respiratory infections, and more research is needed.
- **Echinacea.** A study in over 700 people found that those who took echinacea recovered from colds slightly more quickly than those who received a placebo or no treatment.
- Garlic. A high quality, 12-week study in 146 people found that supplementing with garlic reduced the incidence of the common cold by about 30%. However, more research is needed.
