When Clancy rode down the Cooper, Ned Kelly went on the run and Hugh Jackman's Drover headed for Darwin, they all rode in an Australian stock saddle.

The history of this Australian icon has been compiled into a beautifully presented book, *Wild Ride* which was launched at the State Library in Melbourne recently.

Walcha saddler Bernie Brady attended the launch with a section of the book dedicated to Bernie's work, specifically the Tom Brady Poley saddle which Bernie named in honour of his father Tom.

Bernie explained that the book was the brainchild of Michael Drapac who grew up riding in a stock saddle. Michael's love of stock saddles has seen him travel throughout Australia sourcing some of the best examples to place in his private collection in Melbourne. Bernie was honoured to create a saddle for the Drapac collection, with only 20 saddlemakers in Australia having this honour. "Australian stock saddles are appreciated both as the best saddles in the world and as examples of unmatched craftsmanship," Michael Drapac said. "I'm honoured to have the work of some of the world's best saddlers represented in my collection and in this book."

 $\ensuremath{\textit{Wild}}$ $\ensuremath{\textit{Ride}}$ tells how and why the stock saddle developed, a story that is inextricably linked to

Australian history and the opening up of the big stations.

It details the history of the earliest saddlers like Brush and Quail, the more familiar names like Wienike, Kinnear and RM Williams, and ones from modern times

Bernie was honoured to be included in the book, however with numerous prizes at Sydney Royal as well as being elevated to the Showcase of Excellence twice, he is one of the top saddlemakers in the country.

Bernie made his first saddle at the very young age of 13 and has been crafting custom made saddles for people across the globe ever since.

As Michael Drapac commented in the foreword to the book "The Australian saddle industry is full of the most capable people who are keepers of this craft and history. This book is an invaluable record of Australian stock saddle history and the people behind it."

Horse lovers or anyone interested in Australian history are encouraged to buy a copy of *Wild Ride, the Story of the Australian Stock Saddle by Fiona Carruthers.* It is available online or in book stores.

The frost on Sunday morning will take some beating, wasn't it a bell ringer with reports of minus 11 along the river. It's no wonder we are among the coldest towns in NSW and it would be great to see an actual recorded weather station so we can really get an accurate reading for the town. I travelled north, to the west of Inverell on the weekend, and it looked marginal all the way. Those areas seem to have a reasonable stand of dry feed but nothing underneath it. The crops are out of the ground and are just lacking a good fall of rain to make them grazable. Looking at next weeks forecast there is a change coming through which will hopefully drop some much-needed moisture but don't hold your breath.

The New Zealand government have plans to tax methane and nitrous oxide emissions from livestock. New Zealand farmers might be faced with a new so called burp tax which is scheduled to come into effect as of 2025. The government are putting the heat on their farmers to reduce stocking capacities and grow more trees to offset the livestock emissions. Come on, a burp tax, I think it's just another way for a government who is looking for more money. Yes, I agree with planting more trees and better grazing management, but lowering stocking capacities in a world that is becoming hungrier by the day is not the way to go. Word is large pine plantations are being planted on productive agricultural country throughout New Zealand by large multi-billion-dollar companies. These companies are offsetting their emissions as the government hasn't set any boundaries with carbon credits, hence why they can keep emitting elsewhere.

Australian Meat Group have all but finished an extensive upgrade to a facility they purchased back in 2020 in southern NSW that will soon be able to process 1000 cattle plus 7500 sheep and lambs per day. The investment in this facility is a boost to the livestock industry as we struggle to currently find enough space to process livestock and add another player into the market. Once again, we also need another processing facility up here in the north of NSW, especially for sheep and lambs to give producers more competition on their livestock.

Online machinery clearance rates are trending down as the downturn in the livestock markets hits everyone's pockets. The second hand market for machinery was red hot for a while but with rising interest rates, a drier season predicted and cattle values almost halving we have seen a huge drop in clearance rates.

The EYCI has dropped below 600c for the first time since 2018, dropping a whopping 525c in just 12 months and it has halved since the heights of 1200c/kg back in 2021. Not since the drought have we seen numerous weaners sell for below \$600/hd and PTIC females for less than \$1000/hd which was seen at last Friday's store cattle sale in Tamworth. The current weather conditions and the long-range forecast have a lot of pressure on both the beef and sheep restocking markets and if you're willing to take a gamble there are some real opportunities on offer.

Tamworth yarded 2430 head of cattle on Monday with weaner steers selling to dearer trends, topping at 384c/kg for 268kg while the heifer portion struggled to remain firm. Yearling cattle sold to softer trends while feeder steers lost as much as 16c/kg to top at 348c/kg for 437kg. Domestic kill cattle topped at 326c/kg for 538kg while the best of the cows remained firm to top at 230c/kg. 12,000 sheep and lambs were yarded on Monday in Tamworth with lamb prices weaker due to an oversupply in the processing chain, while the heavy mutton gained some ground. The oversupply in the lamb chain has seen hook prices fall to 640c/kg and the wait period extend out by 3 weeks which I don't think we have seen the bottom yet. The very best of the heavy lambs puffed out at \$200, back \$40 while trade lambs made from \$120-150/hd. Heavy mutton topped at \$155 for ewes while heavy wethers made to \$173/hd.

Changed traffic conditions Oxley Highway west of Mount Seaview

Walcha are advised of changed traffic conditions from this week on the Oxely Highway west of Mount Seaview to carry out drainage improvement and pavement rehabilitation.

Work starting on Monday 29 May will be carried out from 7am to 5pm on weekdays and is expected to be complete by mid-July, weather permitting. Single lane, alternating traffic flows will be in place 24 hours a day, 7 days a week for drainage improvement work and during work hours only for payment rehabilitation. A reduced speed limit of 40km/h will also be in place for the duration of both projects for the safety of workers and road users.

Motorists are advised to allow extra travel time, drive to the conditions and follow the directions of signs and traffic control.

Last Thursday (May 25) VoiceForWalcha (V4W) conducted an important teleconference with the NSW Department of Planning and Environment (DPE), addressing issues of critical concern to the Walcha community regarding the Winterbourne and Ruby Hills Windfarm projects. The DPE was represented by two high level bureaucrats. The Walcha team, allowed five vocal locals, consisted of what I call the group's Centre Forwards - Rachel and Cameron Greig, Simone and Damien Timbs, and Michael Luchich - with Kate Durack as a silent unseen Back. I was a fly on the wall, my preferred position. It was a remarkable event.

The DPE officials were known experts in their field. Adept at dealing with the public, quietly polite while strictly observing protocol, they were a formidable pair. Nonetheless, our team performed superbly. For over 45 minutes they presented searching questions, impeccably researched facts and informed comments that left those bureaucrats in no doubt as to the professionalism of VoiceForWalcha. Not only did the DPE pair say as much in conclusion, but they agreed to actually visit Walcha in the future to gain first-hand understanding of the many wind farm issues facing our community.

That alone is enough to make a great finale to this tale, great for Walcha. But there's more. Something happened during that meeting which caught me off-guard. It wasn't just that the V4W team was so unfazed and focused; it was that they possessed an added zest, a confidence and positivity I hadn't seen in them for a while. It puzzled me, until I realised where it came from: from all those people who'd agreed to "support the actions of Voice for Walcha" by becoming members of the community group.

You see, earlier that week (May 23), VoiceForWalcha had invited people to join the group. The response was impressive; almost 180 members within about twenty-four hours (most with super supportive comments). I'm not sure what the new numbers are now, but along with the already

500 Facebook supporters and the many emailers, it all means that V4W can no longer be called a minority mob of radicals, a tiny troupe of trouble-makers. It is now time they were recognised as a real Voice for Walcha. That is what put the smiles on those six V4W reps last Thursday: being recognised at last for their hard work; for fighting the fact deniers; for putting People, Place and Proper Planning before Profit. Thank you, Walcha, Your support means mountains.

Of course we definitely need more supporters, so that we can keep doing the best for this great little town. We ask nought but your support.

Investigative Learning at Walcha Central School

Students in K-2 are very excited to be at school every Wednesday period 5. Why? Not because it's the last period of the day, because it is Investigative Learning time.

Investigative Learning is play-based inquiry learning, allowing all students to engage and learn through something that interests them. There are approximately eight stations set up in the classroom, allowing students to find something that suits them. Some examples include a special interest activity, for example sewing, a patterning table, art table, writing table, tinkering tin, maths, reading corner, construction and dramatic play.

Investigative Learning promotes all the social capabilities along with English and Maths. A great example is the Dramatic Play station. Students interact by role playing in the Dramatic Play station, for example a Gym, a CAFÉ or a home kitchen. They practise their social skills alongside English and Maths by writing down orders, directions for a set, filling in gym application forms, reading a stopwatch or clock, recording the number of exercises they have completed using tally marks, the list is endless. In the meantime they are practising their fine motor skills through writing, threading needles, manipulating playdough to make food and using knives and forks to cut up their 'gourmet playdough food'.
