The King's Birthday long weekend was well and truly enjoyed by many. People taking the time to head away for a few days or participate in one of the numerous sporting events held. Sadly, numerous lives were lost on our roads over the weekend but none more horrific than the wedding bus crash in the Hunter. Our roads are such a dangerous place, and you can never be careful enough, but that bus crash was just a freak accident that will imprint that poor couples wedding day for the rest of their lives.

I know we are still looking for more moisture but a trip to Coonamble over the weekend made me think we are in not too bad a shape in comparison. The majority of the crops were short but germinated, compared to ours that have already been grazed. What I did see from the road was that there was still a good amount of dry feed in the paddocks and while talking to a few locals, their main concern was once they have finished calving then the pressure will really come on. An area such as Coonamble normally takes on large volumes of agistment stock but like us they are calling around looking for agistment. Word is that parts of the Central West are having as good an Autumn as they can remember, and no doubt are fielding calls daily for agistment.

Last week's front that came through didn't yield a lot of moisture for us, but it sure did help. It doesn't take a lot of moisture through the winter months to keep the crops and pasture healthy. Weather like we have had over the past 2 weeks helps keep the frosts at bay and the livestock seem to enjoy those warmer nights. Last week parts of Victoria and Southern NSW got a decent fall of rain, but it was very patchy. The rain event was enough to hold back some lamb numbers in the south with Wagga Wagga yarding 20,000hd, compared to 33,000 the week before. Trade weight lambs topped at \$155 while 25kg dead lambs jumped \$18/hd and heavy export lambs gained \$15-27/hd topping at \$235. The rain event also had price rises for the cattle market with cows in Dubbo last Thursday lifting 18-24c/kg, topping at 255c/kg for heavy kill cows. No market this week in Tamworth but I'm sure there will be a larger yarding of cattle in Tamworth next Monday.

Its nearly bull sale selling season and all the local bull studs are on the down hill run to their sale days. We are very lucky to have such high quality seedstock producers throughout our district and be sure to get in contact with these producers and inspect this season's draft of sale bulls if you're looking for a new bull.

Walcha business keeping our housing market in timber

Local business, Brian Smith Timber Transport plays an integral role in the Australian timber industry. Brian has just commenced a new contract with Forestry Corporation which will see 90,000 tonnes per year for the next three years of timber being transported to Werris Creek railway station where it is loaded onto trains bound for Wagga Wagga, and then trucked to Tumut and Tumbarumba for milling. Each train will carry a massive 2800 tonnes of plantation softwood timber which equates to 70 B-double loads which will no longer be on the roads.

This timber is sourced from Forestry Corporation plantations in Nundle and Nowendoc, with the company working with Forestry Corporation for over a year to bring this contract to fruition. "Five trains have already gone to Tumut, with all of the timber being used for the domestic building and furniture markets," Brian explained.

"We have some of the highest structural grade softwood in Australia here in the Walcha area, so the majority of it will be used for housing," he said.

Brian explained that most of the softwood from this area was previously being exported to China. "With the export market closed at present, combined with the huge areas lost around Tumut to bushfires, the demand for our high-quality structural timber has never been higher," Brian said.

The company carries over 250,000 tonnes of plantation softwood each year from the forests near Nowendoc and Nundle to all parts of NSW for milling. 90,000 tonnes of 'rubbish timber' (from the heads of the trees) is transported by Brian's trucks to Borg's manufacturing facility in Oberon where it is made into particleboard, MDF and melamine for kitchen cupboards and building materials. "This saves wastage and is a great way to use the smaller timber," Brian said.

The softwood plantation timber utilises radiata pine and is a completely

renewable industry. "I have been working

with Forestry for 48 years and I have harvested some areas three times," he said.

In the last five years Forestry has replanted 3500 hectares of radiata pine. "They have completely replanted the areas we have logged." This provides a future for both Brian's business and the Walcha area for employment in the timber industry.

Mayoral Column



REZ TRANSMISSION LINES

Last Thursday saw the public release of the Energy Corporation of NSW (EnergyCo) draft corridor for the new transmission lines to link the old Bayswater Power Station site to the New England Renewable Energy Zone (NEREZ). This will see two 550kVA lines built and as expected one will enter the Walcha LGA north east of Tamworth, turn near Tallara Road and exit towards Wollun. A spur line runs south east to near the junction of Wauchs Road and Thunderbolts Way. The map, although somewhat difficult to

interpret, is available on EnergyCo's website.

Residents affected by this path should have by now been contacted by EnergyCo in regards to the impact on land and operations. If you feel you may be impacted and haven't been suitably informed, please reach out to myself or Council and we will give you the details on who to contact. EnergyCo committed to keep everyone informed and if this is not happening we need to know so we can both maintain pressure and let EnergyCo know where their communication gaps are. These lines are just part of 10,000 kms of new transmission infrastructure, integral to the restructure Australia's power grid as we move towards a renewable energy future. Already delayed by two years, reduction in generation capacity and with budgeting pressures the path forward for NEREZ will not be all plain sailing.

The Winterbourne Wind Project faces its own delays with answers to submissions pushed until at least mid-December. While Council unanimously maintains a neutral stance on this project we are constantly reviewing its impact on our LGA, be it social, environmental or to infrastructure, and will continue to represent our constituents in the best way possible.

The renewable energy march rolls ever onward, with the disruption to our community becoming more palpable as each step is taken. While my role is not one of being the social police I believe we need to remember the core values that make Walcha's community what it is and hopefully will be into the future. Ultimately, it is State and Federal Government policy and legislation that is driving the transition and facilitating progress, and they are the ones that can change it.

Following this, Interim General Manager and myself had an hour long Zoom meeting with the Department of Planning (DP) last Thursday. This meeting formed part of our three monthly catch up with them and offers us an opportunity to engage with the people who design the path forward for renewable energy in our region. We sought clarification how our Development Control Plan can be referenced to inform the process, provided input into submissions around the Oxley Highway and the work and social impacts of accelerated traffic volumes, bio security issues and covering financial costs and benefits to our community.

Last week's closure of the Walcha 'tip' due to lack of staff to open it on Friday and Sunday understandably caused a reaction around the community. As Council we are committed to supplying a reliable service and the closures were a failure of that commitment. It was opened Monday to compensate, but this doesn't alleviate the problem. Staff shortages due to illness and leave cannot always be avoided, but there is immediate action being taken to train more staff in this area as a backup. I often hear "there can't be much training needed", but there is. Compliance with EPA and WHS make the operation of this facility challenging and this will only become more onerous moving forward. Staff connected to this facility receive praise from our regulators and all users have a responsibility to make this a smooth path. This applies to our outlying transfer stations as well.

In relation to our waste issue, last week Council put on public display our Draft Waste Strategy. This document took many hours to research and compile and is now there for your comment. One of the hot topics around the tip is always opening hours, and these are addressed in this draft document, so this is your opportunity to comment and express your views. The implementation of a voucher scheme for rural residents is also explained and there is 28 days for feedback.

Moving forward it is imperative that all our facilities in this department cover their costs and avoid cross subsidisation.


DRAFT BUDGET


While on the topic of public exhibition of documents Walcha Council's Operational Plan 23/24, which includes the budget, is out on display and also open for comment. An integral part of our community engagement meetings a couple of weeks ago it forms an important part of our commitment to tighten internal financial controls following application for a Special Rate Variation.

On behalf of Council and Councillors thank you to all people who attended these meetings. Your feedback is taken seriously and obviously roads were the main focus. We have been the recipient of multiple rounds of additional road funding, and although inadequate for all our requirements, will improve many of the worst sections of roads over the next year.

OFFICE OPENING HOURS

A proposal came to council last week to adjust the opening hours for the main office. Recognition of "power up and power down" time of modern workplaces will see face-to-face and Service NSW interactions being slightly reduced to 9am to 4:30pm weekdays. General phone enquiries will still be available from 8:30am to 5:00pm. The change will improve operational efficiency and also brings Walcha Council in line with most other regional councils.
