

Remembering the best dressed Doctor in town

A tribute to Dr Ronald Mackinnon —

For over 30 years Dr Ronald Mackinnon served the Walcha community, whether it be day, night, weekday or weekend.

It was with sadness we learned of his passing on Sunday 11 June. 'Ronnie' as he was affectionately known by his family and friends, strictly requested that he wasn't to have a funeral, so his family farewelled him over the weekend at a very small Celebration of Life. Rev. Roger Chilton described Ronnie as a very, very dedicated doctor, and a consumate professional who knew his General Practice very well.

Dr Mackinnon's son David described his father as "quite a character". Many locals would remember seeing Dr Mac chugging up the old hospital hill in his Volkswagen Beetle dressed impeccably - with tie, coat and polished shoes. It was always such a relief to both the nurses and patients to see him walk through those sliding glass doors.


Dr Mackinnon's son David said he loved serving people and being in a profession he loved. "He wants to be remembered as the guy who was always on the patients' side" David said.

Following are memories and words from his daughter Rachael and dear friend Kerry.

Exerpts from Rachael's eulogy

He made his departure very easy for us, and we knew how much he was looking forward to meeting Jesus and being reunited with our mother Ruthie.

He was very adamant that he didn't want a funeral, opposed to 'Gilding the Lilly', with eulogies brimming the quirky humorous details of the recently departed soul. Instead he said "I Ron Mackinnon, have elected not to have a funeral, during which attempts are made to use humour and call out the idiosyncrasies of the person, but rather give a tribute to all the people who have enriched my life". He dictated and I scribed.



He did consent to David and I hosting a Celebration of Life, providing we drank the good wine he'd left in his pantry.

He wanted to thank Roger Chilton for all his teachings and his ministering to the patients during his time in Walcha. He also thanks Kerry Goulston and family for his incredible 70+ years of friendship. I have looked upon both Dad and Kerry and consider with great fondness how the two always reminded me of The Muppet characters Statler and Waldorf, especially when they were both attending an event in their tuxedo's. Cantankerous opinions, a shared penchant for heckling, both finding themselves

It's been a week of thumping frosts around the district and the New England tablelands with places such as Dubbo on the western plains even getting as low as -4°C. At Wollun -11°C was recorded by someone over the weekend and the effect of these continual huge frosts are really being felt by graziers as we see the first of this season calves hitting the ground. Rain is predicted for the end of the week with a forecasted total of 10mm, but we also have a chance of follow up rain the following week. The black cockatoos have returned with eleven of them roosting in the gum trees at home yesterday, maybe the old wives' tale is a better prediction.

The southern part of the East Coast is set for another drenching with good falls of rain predicted for southern NSW, Victoria and South Australia once again. Speaking with a southern agent he mentioned it has become quite wet again in Victoria and there are parts of South Australia which are having as good a season they've seen. Still agistment is extremely hard to find, nearly impossible and the hay trucks are heading further south to retrieve hay. The hay itself is reasonably priced per ton, but the freight is starting to really hurt. I have found some square bale silage in the Hunter if anyone is looking for it.

New legislation regarding the Aboriginal Heritage Act is set to come in as of the 1 of July in Western Australia. Mining giant Rio Tinto destroyed the culturally significant Juukan Gorge in the Pilbara three years ago and this new legislation will hopefully stop this from ever happening again. The interesting part is that farmers are also bound by the new legislation and are extremely confused. There has been a request to delay the new legislation by six months after land holders would like some clarity about how they can get on with doing business while protecting Aboriginal cultural heritage. The consultation between the Government and the people affected by the new legislation has been extremely poor with a 'suck it up and see' approach. Penalties for causing serious harm to cultural heritage include jail time and fines of up to \$10 million.

The Murray Darling Basin Authority has warned there will be less water available to irrigators and the environment due to CSIRO modelling for the basin predicted at 20 to 30 per cent decrease in future river flows due to climate change. Government water buybacks will be a financial benefit in the short term but will have significant long term effect to many industries. Cotton growers, citrus orchards, dairy farmers and other horticultural growers that grow large volumes of food and fibre from these water allocations will see significant reductions in production. Not only will you see price increases and shortages of products, but you will see less jobs and less people in these rural towns. The Goverment need to look after the environment and the flows within the Murray Darling river system, but it also need to look after the hand that feeds everyone and find better solutions.

The long weekend held back a few cattle numbers with Tamworth yarding 2,160 on Monday and Gunnedah 1,990 on Tuesday. Looks like a convoy of trucks leaving the Walcha district on Sunday to the Tamworth sale yards with producers continuing to offload. Restocking steers and heifers sold to dearer trends and so did feeder steers, topping at 344c/kg for 456kg too for Angus steers, up 20c/kg. Heifers to feed sold to a cheaper trend topping at 326c/kg for 394kg. Export kill cattle sold to cheaper trends, as much as 15c/kg less for the best cows topping at 215c/kg. Tamworth yarded 5,200 sheep and 4,900 lambs with the market being quoted as being cheaper throughout both markets. Heavy lambs in excess of 65kg sold to \$194 while trade weight lambs sold anywhere from \$100 – 130/hd. Heavy XB ewes sold to a top of \$122, while extra heavy XB wethers topped at \$180 and the best of the merino ewes puffed out at \$105.

A shining light in the cattle market was the Speriby North unweaned commercial Angus heifers that sold last Friday on AuctionPlus, approx 330kg for in excess of \$2,000 for over 300 head. There is definitely some confidence somewhere in the beef market.

With reference to the letter "Suggested Reading", published in the 17 May edition of the Apsley Advocate, the people of Walcha, indeed of the wider region, have good reason to be asking the developers of wind projects AND the NSW Planning department for answers.

We are told that our area has "excellent wind resources", we are going to be a "hub of green energy" and all the progress that goes with that. We are also a region with relatively few voters so if things turn sour the political "green saviours" will have a larger gain of votes in urban areas to compensate. I cynically feel that the information sessions offered to the public in Walcha isn't so much about information: it is more about how to coerce a community to go ahead with their plans. Our region was volunteered as Renewable Energy Zone by government planners who were trying to facilitate the growth of an industry and all the extra powerlines that went with it.

So what is the problem with the wind turbines? Apart from the shadow flicker that will taunt people in their homes in the early morning and evenings, the wider issue is noise. How bad might that noise be? I recently stumbled upon a doctoral thesis by Karl Bolin of Stockholm, Sweden, which was written many years ago when wind farms were much smaller in both size and numbers to the current proposals around the Walcha region.

Bolin examined the presence of audible low frequency noise. His concerns included that "the increase of wind turbines may thus be particularly problematic in quiet areas with low ambient sound levels" – something very relevant to our region in general. Bolin also looked at options to mask wind turbine noise with pleasant natural sounds, like wind passing through conifers or deciduous trees, and sea waves. He was surprised to find that masking wind turbine noise was rather difficult. Tree breaks were only partially effective at the best. Wind turbine noise is unfortunately rather more intrusive and annoying than almost any other industrial source of noise.

The other issue Bolin touched on was that wind noise guidelines generally appear inappropriate - they should be based on existing background noise rather than arbitrary limits. The NSW guidelines on wind farm noise suggest 35dBA as the lower limit of noise. The problem with this limit is that it is way beyond the background noise of the average rural area and perhaps the township of Walcha itself on a quiet frosty night. Even the EIS of the proposed Winterbourne wind farm suggested background noise was as low as 18dBA. The data gather by Bolin also suggested that under certain weather conditions, the attenuation of the audible noise emissions from wind turbines was so poor that even at 10km away there was a possibility that the noise could at times be as loud as that 1-2 kms away from the wind farm.

This is not a comfort for those living in Walcha, indeed anywhere in the region. If wind farms go up, we will discover something beyond what Bolin did. He examined the impact of 19 wind turbines of 2 MW capacity. Instead, we risk living with the reality of hundreds, possibly thousands of wind turbines and of three times greater capacity. Wind turbines will smother our rural lands, cover our hills, dominate the landscape, drive people off their farming lands, and have significant impacts on the welfare of wildlife and farm animals. This doctoral thesis was not about the mysterious and controversial aspects of infrasound – it is about highly audible low frequency noise that is invasive, gets through most barriers and can't be easily masked. It wasn't a thesis about attacking the wind industry, rather the research needed to find solutions that would help it proliferate.

The choice for Walcha is quite clear: the risks associated with wind farms around Walcha include noise, particularly nocturnal noise, in Walcha itself. Can the developers and the NSW Government guarantee that this won't be an issue? Can they put in concrete plan for noise abatement should it become an issue? Can they formulate a plan that prevents the increased risk of fatal car accidents associated with sleep deprived, angry, depressed, locals who may have not had a decent sleep for many days – thanks to the "quiet" thumping and roaring sounds that wind turbines are known to generate?

He talked at length about the Walcha Hospital staff who looked not only after him, but their exemplary care of Ruthie who was taken from him too soon. He was close to and admired his long-standing partner Dr Graeme Dodd. To Barbara Burnett, Matron Noble, Marie Marshall and all his 'angels', thanks to all who he held so dearly in his heart, and to Lesley Officer who he described as a lovely colleague and who kept him out of trouble every time. He wanted to thank all the citizens of Walcha, who he said honoured him by allowing him to be involved in their lives during times of tribulation.

The Remember Walcha Facebook posts have been a beautiful account of how he was regarded by the community, and David and I wish to thank you all for your messages and words of kindness.

He wanted to thank the Taylor family for Jeff and June's kindness and care before, during and after Ruth's illness, and to Dawn Stier, Wendy Galvin, and to Ilse Hughes who he regarded not only as a mother figure but also his receptionist. He loved his visits with Ilse and Peter from Canada.

Ron was Darrell Parson's number one Volkswagen customer – there's no doubt that Ronnie so looked forward to his chats on the way home on motor mechanical mysteries. We know Darrell how much you must have quivered at 5:30pm, Walcha dark and cold, when you heard that Beetle pull into your driveway – you were in for the long haul.

I know how much he loved David and I and how he told everyone who'd listen that we were his gifts of God. He made an enormous impact on my morals and attitudes in my nursing practice, singing the mantra of "Being on the side of the patient". He exemplified excellence, questioning, challenging the information, using the evidence, and heckling the health financial bean counters who obstructed the care of patients — a wonderful legacy which I will carry on.

Coming out of the anesthetic after his head and neck surgery, Ronnie looked up at me very groggily and said with the most extremely disappointed face "Oh I thought I'd be seeing Ruth, not you".

My friend Narelle sent me a message that said "She envisaged my father seated next to Ruthie overlooking a beautiful vista, telling Ron what a sterling job he had done raising their two children" and when Ron updated Ruth with stories of their children David and Rachael, Ron would add in stories about the two grand-daughters to which Ruthie screamed with delight, "Oh Ronnie"she says clapping her hands, "do tell me more".

Words from Ron's dear friend, Kerry Goulston

I met Ron Mackinnon at the end of 1953, 69 years ago, when we were conscripted into National Service in the Australian Army at Singleton and Maitland. We were in different platoons, but we would have worked at the same time shovelling mud out of flooded homes.

In the years that followed I used to catch the train at Wollstonecraft Station, looking out for Ron so that we could travel to Sydney University together. He always wore a tie and his shoes were stunningly polished.

There were over 600 students in Med 1, but only 400 made it through to the next year. We were both in the same small student group of eight at Sydney hospital for three years and had inspiring teachers.

I became an intern at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital, while Ron went to the Royal Newcastle Hospital where he spent four years.

I got to know Ron well and I remember a number of visits to see him at the Royal Newcastle Hospital – or rather in his small flat which of course he shared with Ruth. He then went to Walcha – almost by chance – but perhaps it was pre-determined. Over the 40 years that followed I visited Walcha a number of times. I met David and Rachael as kids and watched them turn into very impressive, honourable people.

Ron was a legendary rural General Practitioner, upset when bureaucracy told him he could no longer deliver babies or give an ananaesthetic. He served with devotion the people of Walcha and surrounding districts seven days a week, day and night for so many years.

He was beloved by all. He never hesitated to engage in politics. One of his many lovely stories was when when he took on Doug Anthony,

leader of the Country, now National Party, at a local political meeting and trounced him.

Then Ruthie got sick with acute Multiple Sclerosis. It was all very sudden. Ron was in Sydney for a medical meeting but when she told him on the phone of her symptoms, he immediately went home. By the time he arrived it was obvious that she was very unwell indeed. Ron got her to Newcastle hospital, but within a few days she was paralysed and could not speak. After some terrible weeks, Ruth was transferred to Walcha Hospital. She did not recover and for the the next 17 years he visited her twice daily in the little local hospital in Walcha where she got wonderful care. I visited them a number of times, I remember them so well. Ruthie could not move or speak, but she got extraordinary and loving care in that little hospital.

Ron succeeded so well, despite some bumps along the way, in bringing up Rachael and David single handed.

My last visit to Walcha was when Ruth died. I remember being so impressed by an extraordinary crowd in the local Church. Each one of the towns-people at the end of the service came up and gave Ron a tearful hug. The love and appreciation brought unusual tears to my eyes.

In retirement Ron eventually came back to Sydney and in the years that followed the best thing for Ron was attending the Opera House and watching operas and other musical shows. He loved music and had an extraordinary knowledge of classical music.

In Sydney, he went every Sunday to the Anglican Cathedral and in recent years listened to the service online. I would often visit Ron – usually for lunch – and walk up the road to his favourite coffee shop. I was always amazed at the number of people passing by the coffee shop who would stop and chat with Ron. He made so many new friends. He sold his beloved piano eventually, but would listen to the opera and Sydney concerts every afternoon on the radio. I learnt never to ring him during this time!

In later years, Ron taught medical students at Royal North Shore Hospital, teaching them so well. He also delighted in writing numerous Letters to the Editor of the Sydney Morning Herald — usually not published!

Ron had integrity and was trusted by so many. He had devotion to his faith and to his two children, David and Rachael. Ron had an amazing memory but unfortunately resisted my pleas to dictate his memories regarding rural general practice. It would have made a Best-Seller.

He was blessed with his deep spirituality and Anglican belief. Ron spent his life helping others. His two wonderful children, Rachael and David, who gave him much joy and they loved him deeply ,as he did them.

Ron was the best doctor I ever came across and I do not say that lightly, I have known so many. Ron and I came from completely different backgrounds, we were different in so many ways, but we had a trusting and close friendship for 69 years. I will always treasure those memories.

Totally Tricked with Transmission

While a shock to many it is no surprise to Walcha Energy. Walcha Energy have been lobbying the government for years to bring powerlines to the Walcha district. Make no mistake - these powerlines are following the Walcha Energy projects based on advice from Walcha Energy. And this is just stage one. We understand there are likely to be more powerlines coming through the Walcha LGA in later stages of development.

Why is the Walcha district becoming the powerline capital of the state?

Because Walcha Energy have told EnergyCo that ... "It would be realistic to provide for the development of 10,000MW of renewable energy and pumped hydro generation in this area alone." 1

This is the equivalent of <u>over 14</u> Winterbourne Wind Projects around Walcha.

It is because Walcha Energy are touting the ... "Walcha Energy Project" as a "a mini-REZ within the recently declared New England REZ." ²

The map (top right) defines Walcha Energy's ... "ultimate development concept", from a submission made to AEMO in 2022. ²

Note ... this is a recommendation from Walcha Energy, not EnergyCo.

If EnergyCo follow recommendations by Walcha Energy, we are likely to see **2 double 500kV lines** and a **double 330kV line** traversing our LGA. This is what 330kV and 500kV towers look like, up to 80m high (right).









We have real concerns that Walcha Energy are facilitating the construction of the main Queensland NSW Interconnector Line through the Walcha Plateau. Rather than following the existing path from Queensland via Armidale and Tamworth down to the Hunter, the double 330kV Line would go via Inverell, through the Uralla Hub and down through the Walcha LGA.³ Did Walcha Energy consult with the Walcha community about this?

Walcha Energy have suggested changing the route "due to its sensitive terrain and impacts on threatened species, forested land, small rural communities, and rural residential areas near Armidale." ³ What about the

impact on Walcha??

This is a plan submitted in 2019, and another example of Walcha Energy lobbying for powerlines to be brought through the Walcha LGA. The map of this plan, submitted by Walcha Energy, is shown right.



Is this **what we want** for Walcha?

The only reason these lines are coming to Walcha is because Walcha Energy have been promoting overly ambitious unrealistic levels of renewable development in our LGA and lobbying the government to divert powerlines through the Walcha LGA. Walcha Energy claim that these decisions have been made by EnergyCo and are out of our hands. This is not true. These powerlines are following the projects being proposed by Walcha Energy.

Is there a choice?

Because transmission lines are critical infrastructure, landholders can not refuse to host the lines. However, if landholders refuse to host renewable projects, there will be no need for the lines to follow these projects. No projects – no powerlines. If you do not want to host powerlines, do not agree to host wind turbines or solar projects. If there are no new projects in Walcha, the new transmission infrastructure will follow the existing lines well west of Walcha. Surely this is the *sensible option for Walcha* - and for taxpayers.

Why have Walcha Energy **not spoken** to the Walcha Community before lobbying for this transmission plan? Why has Walcha Energy claimed that *they are simply placing projects* where Energy Co are likely to run transmission lines? when this is simply not the case.

Why are Walcha Energy devising such *major disruptions to the Walcha landscape*, affecting everyone, behind closed doors?

What can we do?

Importantly, attend the EnergyCo meeting Thursday 11-2 or 3-6pm Walcha Bowling Club, to demonstrate that Walcha does not want this invasive infrastructure built here. Also talk to your neighbours, have the necessary conversations. Without community input into the conversation, the red carpet will be rolled out for the developer. Secrecy erodes community, and it is not our style.


St Patrick's Primary Students take on Polding Cross Country Trials
