Walcha bred horse wins Winx Guineas

The Queensland winter racing carnival was finalised on Saturday with the running of the Group 3 Winx Guineas. Walcha bred horse, *Knight's Choice* has caused much excitement in the racing industry with a very convincing win in the big race.

Bred by Norm and Di Bazeley at Elswick Park, the three year old was sold at the Magic Millions as a yearling, with this preparation being his first, and what a carnival the gelding has had!

From his seven starts he has won his last four races. "Only eight weeks ago he placed fourth in a maiden at Kilcoy, followed by a second at Ipswich, and then four wins in a row," Norm explained.

Norm and Di bred *Knight's Choice* from their mare *Midnight Pearl*, with the sire being the highly renowned *Extreme Choice*. "This win means we have now bred a Group winning horse in both Australia and Singapore," Norm said.

Knight's Choice is trained by John Symons and

Sheila Laxon, with this win being on his home track at the Sunshine Coast. Symons revealed post-race that owners had knocked back offers of up to \$1 million for the three-year-old Extreme Choice gelding, but those offers have swollen substantially following this win.

Sheila Laxon made history when she won the Caulfield – Melbourne Cup double with Ethereal back in 2001. She has been very impressed with *Knight's Choice.* "He is a seriously nice horse. To do what he did today was awesome, he just won so easily. This horse could be anything," she said.

Knight's Choice is now headed for a well-deserved spell whilst his trainers think about where to go next with him. "We might look at the Melbourne spring or there's the Magic Millions in January."

Meanwhile back at Elswick Park, Norm has been buoyed by the win and is looking at his options for sending *Midnight Pearl* back to stud.

The rainfall thus far has been perfect as the latest front passes through our district and stretches as far north as western Queensland. The predicted 10 - 20mm is a fair way short of the original 50 - 75mm predicted, but any rain now is good rain, especially on top of our June totals. Numerous areas across central and Northern parts of Queensland have received impressive winter rainfall, with falls of 50 - 70mm recorded between Emerald and Barcaldine. Parts of western NSW have already received decent winter rain and this front could be the icing on the cake to start growing some decent winter herbages for livestock and get those crops out of the ground and firing.

New reports are out that the average age of farmers has now risen to 63, which to me comes in line with our entire ageing workforce and the rising age of the baby boomers. I think the main issue for younger farmers today is sourcing sufficient finance to be able to acquire land. Land values have continued to rise and to acquire more property you need more assets and equity, which generally come later in life to acquire these multi-million dollar farming businesses. The new data is also suggesting that the two generational family farms are making a comeback with growth through technology, more business opportunities and the fact that rising land values have helped farming families purchase the neighbours to increase the size for the next generation. Increasing debt is something a lot of farming families have dealt with their entire lives, but the increasing cost of living, rising interest rates and volatile commodity markets are now added pressures on already highly geared operations.

When they state that land values increase in value by 6% every year well you could say that might be an understatement. The high rainfall zone throughout Australia has risen from \$1600/ha in 2010 to \$4689/ha in 2022 on average. That figure would be closer to 20% a year rise in values but this has only been seen throughout the high rainfall zones. The rest of rural Australia, being the wheat sheep and pastoral zones, have seen their values double over the last ten years.

Telstra has signed a deal with Elon Musk's Starlink to help boost connectivity for rural Australia which will put huge pressure on other telco providers such as NBN'S Skymuster. Telstra is reportedly the first telco in the world to offer bundles using Starlink and I hope Telstra do not stuff this one up. Starlink satellites use a low orbit of around 550km from earth, hence why you can see the satellite trains in the night sky. There is in excess of 4,000 Elon Musk satellites flying around the world which gives you faster download. NBN Skymuster uses a very high earth orbit, 36,000km which means it only needs two satellites to achieve a wider coverage, but its download speed is ridiculously slow, and this is why your voice calls and videos calls have connection

1,476 head of cattle were yarded in Tamworth on Monday with extra re-stocker competition noticed throughout the lighter steers and heifers. Weaner steers sold from 288 - 370c/kg, while the heifer portion made from 200 - 286c/kg. Yearling feeder heifers and steers sold to a cheaper trend with steers topping at 326c/kg and heifers to 276c/kg. Heavy steers to process made to 277c/kg, while heavy kill cows sold from 185 - 214ckg, down 9c/kg on last week. The cattle market in Victoria on Monday was significantly dearer in comparison, with Angus cows topping at 265c/kg, 390kg Angus Limo steers made 426c/kg, while their sisters to feed made 426c/kg. Heavy heifers to process made 342c/kg, which could be a sign of things to come for us, especially when they can get through the backlog of Queensland cattle to process. Tamworth yarded 1900 lambs and 300 sheep with reduce buyer activity as Fletchers are currently on a two week shut down for maintenance. Lambs 18 - 22kg carcass weight sold from \$92 - 122 for better condition lambs, while the 22 – 26kg made from \$121 – 138. Heavy lambs in excess of 26kg carcass weight topped at \$151, while heavy mutton topped at \$106.

Prior to this appointment, Neil and Steph were at the Wee Waa Anglican Church for 21/2 years and prior to that in Narrabri for two years.

Neil will commence at the Church next week on Monday 10 July, with his induction being held on Friday 21 July at 6.00pm. "We would like to invite the community along to celebrate Neil and Steph's arrival, and welcome them to Walcha," Brian Wellings said.

Neil grew up in Tamworth, with his parents still living there. "I remember coming to Walcha as a young boy to play soccer out at John Oxley sportsground," Neil recalled.

Steph is a trained nurse and will be doing some work in Armidale which is close to two of their children who live there. Neil and Steph's



other daughter is in Newcastle and their son lives in Narrabri, so Walcha will be quite central for them.





OPERATION PLAN AND BUDGET

During the June Council meeting on Wednesday 28 June, Council adopted the 2023/24 Operation Plan and Budget. This includes the 36.5% Special Rate Variation (SRV) which IPART approved for Walcha Council in full. Council would like to thank residents for their understanding and support during this process – we are committed to remaining a sustainable Council into the future while continuing to deliver the services that make Walcha such a great place to live.

Council continues to push hard to maximise the grant funding opportunities available to us – with a significant \$28M capital works program planned for 2023/24. This includes almost \$1M to seal Aerodrome Road and undertake improvements to the airstrip, almost \$5M in bridge renewal work, \$1.2M in gravel resheeting, \$3.5M to complete the Off-Creek Storage Project, \$3.5M in new pathways and \$6.5M to renew Derby Street. Council are also investing in some much needed plant replacement, with a new grader, roller, loader and trailers on the books for this year. Last month, Council took delivery of our Jet Patcher – a critical machine that will enable us to undertake our own spray sealing works rather than Council engaging contractors every time. This will assist with preventative maintenance of sealed roads, and Council are also looking to use the machine for private works in the future – both of which assist our budget bottom line.

WASTE STRATEGY

Council also endorsed the Draft Waste Strategy in our June meeting with it now on public exhibition from Thursday 29 June to Friday 28 July 2023.

WCS Waste Warriors receive \$13,500 boost

Reduce waste and increase the harvest is the catch-cry for Walcha Central School, thanks to a \$13,500 State Government grant for new student-led sustainability initiatives, announced last week by Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall.

Mr Marshall said the funding, secured under the Sustainable Schools Grant program, would be used to purchase new waste sorting bins for classrooms, install an outdoor greenhouse and extra 10-cent collectable bins around the school's playgrounds.

"The Waste Warriors are a group of Years 3-6 students who conducted a waste audit around the school, guided by Thalgarrah's Environmental Education Officer Matt McKenzie," Mr Marshall said.

"It was wonderful to hear about the student-led initiatives underway at Walcha Central to ensure less waste goes into landfill and more diverted to be recycled or used in the school's gardens.

"The project Reduced Waste, Increased Harvest involves many hands-on activities to improve sustainability within the school and is aligned with the curriculum.

"I'm excited to see the students learn about waste diversion and recycling by literally getting their hands dirty and encouraging their peers to do the same."

Walcha Central School teacher Jennifer Grayling said the program was an opportunity for students to learn the importance of sustainability practises and how small changes could have a big impact.

"This project is giving our students knowledge and skills they can implement at home including the importance of sorting their waste to reduce landfill and the ability to grow their own food," Ms Grayling said.

"It will expand existing infrastructure and establish a permanent selfsustaining garden that generates seasonal produce all year round in an alpine climate."

Ms Grayling said Reduced Waste, Increased Harvest was aligned with the K-10 curriculum and the fresh produce would be used in the school canteen and food technology classes.

Money raised from the 10-cent collectables was used to fund the school's breakfast club program and would go towards funding the 2023 Hands on Learning program in the high school.

OFF-CREEK STORAGE

Council have completed Package 1 of the Off-Creek Storage project, being construction of the new dam embankment and spillway. The new dam is starting the 'first-fill' process, while works will now continue on the pump station and river offtake works. So far, the project overall is tracking under our \$11M grant funded budget, with \$9M from NSW and



\$2M from the federal government, though overall progress is lagging a little behind schedule. However, dams are complicated projects to deliver from a regulatory perspective, so the project team have done an exceptional job in keeping this one on track - with opportunity to deliver additional water infrastructure improvements with the 'savings'. Over \$2M has been spent directly in the local economy as well which is a fantastic result.

DERBY STREET UPGRADE

One of the most exciting projects to be undertaken this financial year will be significant rehabilitation and upgrade of Derby Street, both north and south of the Oxley Hwy, with a combined \$6.5M of grant funding from the NSW and federal governments assigned to the project.

Collins Williams are the design team engaged by Council who are already on the job, reviewing previous works to date and undertaking geotechnical comprehensive survey and assessment to inform the new, revised design which will include storm water improvements, water main replacement, new kerb and gutter, additional marked car spaces and an asphalt surface. Concepts for Derby Street will be available for review in coming weeks and Council are keen to get as much community feedback as possible to make sure we get this right particularly as all works need to be completed by June 2024. Stay tuned.

Walcha Garden Club Clippings

The main topic on everyone's lips is how cold it has been in Walcha these past few weeks. For some plants this is of great benefit. Bulbs enjoy the winter as it helps with their flower development. On the other end of the scale, we have plants that enjoy being dormant in winter. Any deciduous trees, shrubs and certain perennials will not grow or leaf up unless the soil is warm enough. As one of our former local gardeners used to say, "the garden is resting until the next major show begins in spring". In the meantime, keep warm and enjoy reading those garden books you've been collecting!

As we have passed the shortest day of the year it is time to think about planting, moving, and pruning roses. Mid to late July is the best time for this. Choose a site that will have at least 6 - 8 hours of sunlight in the growing months. Roses that have leathery thick leaves are a good choice as they have better disease resistance. Hopefully you have prepared your site a few weeks ago to plant new rose bushes. Incorporate plenty of compost or aged manures along with some blood and bone to the bottom of the hole. Cover with fresh soil and make a mound in the centre of the hole. Rehydrate your rose plants in water for 24 – 48 hours prior to planting. Trim the thick roots and leave the fine hair roots. Some plants may not need this. Place the roots of the plant downwards over the mound. The graft should be 2.5cm above ground level to prevent suckers growing. To make it easier, some people use a leveling stick. Partially backfill the hole and water in well. After a few minutes completely backfill and gently firm down the soil. Give the rose plant another water. Mulch plants well with either lucerne or sugar cane. Make sure the mulch is slightly away from the stem to prevent any fungal disease. Aftercare is to water new plants regularly at the base of the plant. Your new rose plant won't require fertilising until it flowers. Moving rose bushes can be a daunting task. Here are a few things to remember. Firstly, prepare your new site as explained above. Water the area around the old rose well. This helps with an easy removal. Prune before you move. Remove all old and diseased canes that have a greyish look. Leave three of last season's outward facing canes on the plant and prune back to 15 – 20cm in height. Complete your planting as described above.

Pruning can also be daunting so let's make it easy. Your pruning equipment should be cleaned and well maintained. Sharp secateurs, loppers and saws all help in making the job easy. It's also best for your plants. Prune as above. Don't be afraid to reduce the plant as this helps rejuvenate them. It won't kill them! After you have finished pruning then spray with lime sulphur to help prevent fungal disease, pests such as scale and mites. Lastly, remove all old prunings to prevent spreading disease.
