around the traps

We really have had good weather so far this winter when compared to last year's miserable wet and cold winter. Minus 12 was recorded one morning last week south of town, but it goes to show you how cold it was when east of Yarrowitch last Thursday there was still frost lying in the shade come 11am. The forecast ahead for August looks to be dry with very little moisture predicted which is when we need it the most to get a decent start to spring. Let's hope it's wrong and we can jag a few more fronts as we don't want to be buying any more fodder than we have too.

Livestock emissions seem to be the cause of plenty of unrest among farmers in the UK, particularly Ireland after reports their government had plans to cull 200,000 cows to meet their emissions target. Culling the cattle would be one way to help them cut their emissions by 25 per cent but it just seems ludicrous that they would even consider this. Other countries in the EU are negotiating the position of their farmers as initially any farmer with only 150 cattle would be included under their industrial emissions. It just seems ridiculous considering they have a pasture-based livestock system. At least for the time being the UK farmers have contested the possible legislation and had the threshold lifted to 350 head.

The consensus around the future of Australian beef prices is strong with the majority of people believing we have seen the bottom of this beef price cycle. The outlook for the next five years looks good, especially with all the factors that dictate our prices looking positive. Overall, the prices come down to the old general rule of supply and demand. Australia has recently had an increase in supply due to parts becoming quite dry after three good years of herd rebuilding. Increased supply has caused a bottle neck in our kill space as Australia still struggles with the labour shortages to process these animals. Looking at global markets, the world is hungry for beef and the current oversupply could be largely due to the ongoing drought in USA, which will essentially cause a global shortage in time to come. Consumers like China still have large volumes of beef in cold storage which has created an oversupply for the time being and a sluggish export market. Latest predictions from a top market analyst could see the prices of feeder steers head back towards the \$6/kg range in the next few years due to a beef supply shortage on the world market within the next 5 years. Considering the current feeder market is at a top of \$3.80/kg for an Angus steer, it looks like there are a lot of upsides to our current values when the best price just two years ago was \$6.20kg, it seemed we may never see it again. Australia needs to invest further in abattoirs and get the labour issues sorted before we enter these periods of high supply, hence why investments by processors into robotics is key. Weather will also be a huge factor in the market regarding these price predictions, a rising tide lifts all boats which could only mean good things for lamb and mutton as well.

The Red Fire Ant is on our doorstep being only 12km north of the QLD and NSW border. Red Fire Ants are venomous and can kill humans and livestock through allergic reactions and anaphylaxis. These little devils can cut cropping yield down by two thirds and reduce livestock production by 40 per cent as the ants' tunnel through the plants' roots and stem. The Red Fire Ant found its way into QLD back in 2001 and ever since has been building in numbers and marching south. The Federal Government has only allocated \$60 million a year to control it and clearly, it's a drop in the bucket compared to what's needed. When they breach the border and by the sound of it they will, then the coldest areas like Walcha should be safe as reports show they don't like the cold weather. We also thought that Buffalo Fly wouldn't come into these cold climate regions, but they seem to be adapting which could be a possible scenario of these Firey Red Ants.

A Maple Tree to remember Trish

The Walcha Tennis Club ladies recently visited Trish's garden at "Warren Park" Walcha to plant a beautiful Maple Tree in her memory. Trish Partridge, who they played tennis with for many years, was a dedicated member of the Walcha Tennis Association committee and is missed by all.

The tree planting was organised by Jenny Hoy and the ladies also enjoyed a cake, baked by Jenny, in celebration of Shelley Marchant's birthday on the day.

The club has also held a Tennis Day in remembrance of Trish. Her husband Lance would like to send a huge thank you to all those involved in both events for their care and kindness.



Champion Fleece for 'Shalimar Park Merinos'

Walcha Resilience stories

Another story from Walcha Council's Disaster Risk Reduction Co-ordinator Kruthika Nagananda who is compiling stories from locals as to how they survived recent disasters to help people learn from each other, and for the community to realise they are not alone as everyone has different ways of coping.

Interview with Edwina Payne - Owner of Cafe Graze

Introduction

Edwina moved to Walcha as her husband grew up in Walcha. She has lived in Walcha for 20 years, and owned Café Graze for 18 years. She bought the Café 2 years after she moved to Walcha. "It was already a furnished 3-year-old café then. I was lucky to get such a fabulous place. I added gifts and homewares to the Café, since that was my background in Sydney. It was great to go into an existing business", she said. Retail was her expertise, and she had no background in hospitality. "As time went by, I picked it all up, thanks mainly to my employees who are all great, clever women."

Edwina thinks she has been lucky to have community and her employees who supported her business during all these years. She said, "There have been ups and downs with adversities, but we have always bounced back. The business has remained steady, even grown with time." She has always had her staff support and stick with her through these years. She recalls there are 3 of her current staff that have worked with her for over 10 years, for which she feels grateful.

Period of Drought, Bushfires and COVID

Tourism has developed immensely over 18 years in Walcha, and she has seen changes in clientele; but always had steady amazing community customers which never wavered. COVID was the only time she felt unsteady with the business. "Do I shut, or keep it going? I wanted to keep it going for the town, and for my staff. So, we kept it going! We had a window open for few hours a day, the hard part was shortening my staff's shifts from 4 days a week to 4 hours a week. This went on for 6 months!" During COVID, Edwina was able to keep the business and pay her staff as usual through JobKeeper payments from the Government. Café Graze kept their business to a minimum; coffee and basic food during COVID. Additionally, they also had dinner meals, "Locals were amazingly supportive of that, we had curries and casseroles. They tried hard to support the business, I could tell, they even thanked us for keeping the Café open!" It took a while to get the business back on track post COVID. "It was hard to figure out what the pain points were during COVID, since so many things were happening in Walcha, but it slowly picked up; now it all feels like a dream!", she said.

COVID has taught her to be patient and look outside the square. It taught Edwina to be determined to keep the business going for her community and her staff. It brought their staff closer. "It was a scary time financially, but was a special time in terms of learning. It was all we could do at that time", she said.

During drought and bushfires, the business went up and down; however, it did not impact her business. The community still came and supported the business, "People still came in, I could see the locals trying to be supportive during these times, they kept the Café going", she said. "The morale of the community during that time was so low, it was an awful time. Having said that, I loved that the Café was our little space outside of those hustles. It gave the community a space to gather and escape into another world while running into people you know." The Café was also impacted during the highway shut down, which saw a decline in the regular traveller clientele. "But to what degree? I don't know, I kept on going. I could tell when it was closed though", she said.

Current and future thoughts

With increasing cost of living, small businesses are impacted the most; and Edwina thinks the next few months will be tricky in

terms of people dealing with the increased cost of food, rates, electricity, and rent. "These things impact cafés immediately. It is easier to cut down

on coffees if you are watching your expenses. How do I keep my business? I don't want to increase the cost of my coffee. I don't want to pass that onto my customers, onto this town", she said. She also mentioned that businesses in town have to pay higher rates compared to the house property. Her strategies to survive next few months are-looking at the cost of food and tailoring the menu for food around the 'specials'. 'Pushing through hard times, learning to pivot, change direction when needed. Put things behind, focus on what you do, and being able to bounce back after adversity', is the way she defines resilience. She insists on following this over the coming months. In future, she has small plans to improve her business, and renovating upstairs of her building; she would love to keep the business as is.

Edwina buys most of her ingredients locally. "I'd rather spend my money locally, they support me, I find ways to support them. It might not be always cost-effective; but there are ways to make it work." She has always been interested in local, and Australian made - hence the homeware and gifts are mostly Australian made or owned, it is also her passion and love. She thinks it also adds to the tourism, and her business. She would love to see Walcha tourism supporting the small businesses in town, through advertisements and strategies to be shown outside the town. "It will also increase the awareness of the town along with the increased businesses. Other than that, I always felt supported from this community", she said.

"It is amazing little place, Walcha. It is the people! I would be lost without them, we are a closely knit community. It is all thanks to them that my business is still going after all these years, they have been incredibly supportive!", she said.
