Old Walcha Hospital site haunted by inaction

Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall is pressuring the State Government to act decisively and resolve a 16-year battle over the abandoned and derelict Old Walcha Hospital site.

Mr Marshall was joined by Walcha Mayor Eric Noakes and Acting General Manager Phil Hood at the old hospital recently to see firsthand the abysmal state of the buildings.

"Since the hospital was decommissioned more than 15 years ago, it has been the site of vandals, trespassers and squatters, with local police making daily scheduled visits," Mr Marshall said.

"The old hospital was closed in June 2007 when a new modern and purpose-built Multi Purpose Service opened at a new location in town.

"It has since become the focus of a longstanding Local Aboriginal Land Claim, which remains undetermined.

"There is also a significant amount of disturbed asbestos on the site."

Mr Marshall said the old hospital sits on a hill overlooking Walcha and was a focal point for much of the town as well as prime real estate.

"The abandoned buildings today only seem to have one use, as a thrillseeking adventure for youngsters who get their kicks out of hits on social media," Mr Marshall said.

"I have made representations to the

Minister for Health Ryan Park on behalf of the Mayor and the Walcha community to resolve this as a matter of urgency and get the whole site cleaned up so it can be used for something positive.

"Whether this is social housing, an aged care facility or to be developed as residential properties, the community just want this eyesore removed.

"This is a high priority for the Walcha community and as their newlyminted MP, following an electoral redistribution in March, I am determined help to find a solution.

"I hope the Minister will intervene and resolve this 16-year battle for the people of Walcha."

The last week of weather has once again been very nice and the sun has been shining like it is almost spring. The wattles are starting to flower on the Moonbi ranges, and I have noticed the trees at home are beginning to bud up like spring isn't too far away. I don't think July has been cold, as I recall being outside without a jumper more often than on, and the week ahead looks fine with a potential shower over the

Indonesia has suspended live cattle imports from Australia after they detected a small number of Australian cattle had Lumpy skin disease. The Indonesian Government has paused imports from four Australian pre-export facilities pending further testing of animals. Lumpy skin disease is highly infectious and has been spreading through Indonesia since March 2022, while Australia has never had a positive test to this day and remains free. Authorities are stating the positive tests have come from cattle that have spent some time in Indonesia already and further testing should clear the suspension. Since the detection of Lumpy skin disease in Indonesia, Australia has continued further surveillance and testing across the northern cattle industry and to this day remains disease free.

Bull sales are well under way and the confidence in the beef industry is still extremely high when a yearling Angus bull last week at Auction smashed the Australian all breeds price selling for \$360,000. The majority of the bull sales are averaging from \$9,000 - 13,000 which seems to be what producers are happy to pay for a new bull after the recent drop in the beef market. Fat bulls seem to be still making good money and offer good change over value as investing in new genetics is a whole lot cheaper than twelve months ago. Remember we have some of the industry top seedstock producers on our doorstep who offer industry leading genetics and cattle that are bred for our conditions. Keep an eye out for your bull stud of choice's sale day.

The sheep and lamb industry cannot take a trick now as prices continue to slide and what seems to be a bottle neck of supply and less demand. It's only been a month and both the lamb and mutton hook prices have dropped over a dollar per kilo while the wool job has also taken a turn for the worse. Historically late winter is when we would see a kick in the kill market due to lower supply, but it's far from what we would normally expect. The sheep industry is really starting to buckle under the pressure of supply and the re-stocker market is even harder to comprehend. A report on the ABC Country Hour stated light merino restocking lambs made from \$5 - \$12 per head at a saleyard on Monday, which means they basically gave them away. I don't think things are that hard, it's just that there are so many negatives around the sheep and lamb industry. It's very hard to make decisions around the sheep and lamb market when one of the two major processors who compete on all kill lambs and mutton has only just announced they will be shut for the month of September for maintenance. Just more added pressure to our markets that don't have enough competition due to lack of kill space when compared to the south. Let's hope that processors can pass these low values onto consumers so they can get some much-needed relief form the price of living. Like, come on – it still looks too dear on the supermarket shelf and at these kill prices someone is gauging the consumer.

Foxes still seem to be in huge numbers around the district even after recent baiting programs. I think its vital to bait for foxes even if you're a cattle producer as I've seen first-hand what a fox can do to a calving cow, especially one that is having trouble. I know it's essential to bait if you're a sheep producer, but regardless I think we all need to do more in terms of fox control.

Tamworth yarded 1,120 head of cattle on Monday with lightweight steers selling to firm while heifers sold to cheaper trends. Yearling heifers topped at 310c/kg to feed while feeder steers made to 344c/ kg for 441kg. Heavy kill steers sold to 294c/kg for 660kg while cows remained firm selling to a top of 225c/kg. The cow market in the south kicked yesterday with heavy cows selling to a top of 278c/kg.



Mayoral Column

VALE CLR GREG SCHAEFER

By now I believe the whole community would be aware of the passing of Clr Greg Schaefer. Too many times we don't realise the worth and contribution of people until we reflect on it. Greg was happy being a Chief or an Indian, whatever was required to get the job done. He leaves a hole in both Council and the community which seems harder to fill these days.

Greg's funeral will be held on 11 August at 11am at St Paul's Presbyterian Church Walcha.

UNDER GROUND LINES

The impression I get from the many conversations I have is that a lot of our community is tiring of the constant renewables discussions. Despite this your Council continues to navigate the way forward and to advocate on behalf of the community in order shape the outcome of any successful projects in our LGA. With this in mind I will continue to give transparency through this column of what we are doing.

Last Thursday Interim GM Phil Hood and myself attended a Senate Inquiry into placing large transmission lines underground. This was instigated by a Bill put forward by Adam Marshall and will report back within a month. Walcha was included with both Uralla and Armidale Councils and I believe the Senators from the LNP, Labor and Cross Benches were interested in the impact of both transmission and renewable projects and their impacts both financially and socially on communities. One strong and recurring theme in most meetings we have with any group is that Walcha is becoming known State wide for the disruption being caused to our small community.

Showing what I believe is a severe lack of understanding of community engagement is that at no stage has there been any flow of information to the public about the pros and cons of the different types of transmission infrastructure. Information is key to good decisions. My closing remark to the Inquiry was that we need to change the idea that giving information constitutes engagement, but this is what I feel is constantly happening.

This week we also meet with our local engagement officer from EnCo, both individually and again later in the week with CoREM. Through Country Mayors we will have an audience with the State Energy Minister the Honourable Penny Sharpe. We still await a direct meeting with her.

THE OLD HOSPITAL

You may have noticed that the derelict State Government asset, our once proud hospital, is in the news again. With a change of State Government and a new State Member that is showing interest in a solution, I wrote



to the Health and Housing Ministers to try and speed up an outcome. Everyone seems to want to divest themselves of this building, but no one with the power will step up. It's a hot potato that keeps getting passed around. The condition of this facility has deteriorated to a disgrace and if it belonged to anyone else, with its potential for contamination, it would probably be the government itself that enforced its rehabilitation.

It's now been sixteen years and I believe we are behind where we started. I saw the Health Minister comment on the NBN News the other night in relation to it and his response did not exactly inspire me.

Adam Marshall is on leave for a couple of weeks but when he returns the Minister is happy to meet with him. I will also look into a petition to be tabled in Parliament if this is Adam's advice. I don't think we will get the 10,000 signatures required for it to be automatically read but at 500 it can be tabled. It's a bit more complicated than one might think but we can get advice on how that works.

INFRASTRUCTURE UPDATE

Our Off Creek Storage continues to fill, albeit at a slower rate due to a temporary pumping arrangement, but it is filling and securing our future day by day with dry times predicted. Tenders for necessary pump station upgrades are being advertised now after a frustratingly long period in design.



- At our last meeting the first, revised concept designs for the two sections of Derby Street were tabled. Well done to our team for the excellent outcome (which will be worth the wait).
- Also tabled was the concept design for the footpath along Darjeeling Road to link the John Oxley Sportsground footpath back to the upgraded Lions Park.
- Council is in the process of tendering for the resheeting of approximately 55kms of local roads. Addressing critical needs for both safety and accessibility is the focus of this spend and while not every unsealed road will get improvement this time, an almost \$1.7M in gravel resheeting investment (thanks to grant funding boosts) will be a welcome shot in the arm for our local road network.
- Coupled with this is the recently purchased Jetpatcher that you will see out and about on sealed roads. This machine will patch holes but also seal larger sections of road rehabilitation.
- If you are traveling east on the Oxley Hwy over the next few months check for road closures that may impact your travels.
 They are manageable but better to understand before leaving.


