If luck was on your side last week then a handy storm swept through the district on Wednesday night dropping anywhere from 5-15mm which was a great top up. There was plenty of lightning in the storm which can spark spot fires and cause plenty of headaches for the Rural Fire Service, luckily, I don't think there were any. Fifty thousand lightning strikes swept through southern QLD yesterday in a front that didn't drop much moisture, yet probably caused a few problems. These wild storms are only the start, and part of the reason why we are already seeing total fire bans, especially given the amount of vegetation that has grown over the last three years. Temperatures are already starting to hit the low thirties in places which will also ramp up the need to be cautious about potential fires.

The Live export trade with Indonesia is still at a stand still after an additional eight head of Australian cattle tested positive to lumpy skin after their arrival in Indonesia. The longer this plays out the worse it can become for us. The only thing we are being told is that all the cattle that have been tested prior to leaving Australia have tested negative. Sounds like the Australian Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry need to test these cattle prior to leaving the boat to figure out where the infection is starting from biting insects, but the Indonesian Authorities are continuing to point to the incubation period which could be up to 28 days. I'm hoping it could be literally on arrival as they are unloaded but still this needs to be sorted out directly as Indonesia is Australia's largest market for live cattle with more than 300,000 head exported annually. No doubt other countries who trade with Australia due to its disease-free status will be keeping a close eye on this developing story.

The downturn in the beef trade globally has seen a real market developing in Australia for retail beef sales. Large cold storage warehouses have been set up to sell whole primal cuts and bulk beef at low margin, high volumes to clear some of the backlogged product. It's a great opportunity to buy top quality beef that would have normally been too expensive and destined for the high-end restaurant trade in other parts of the world. People are very price sensitive now and plenty of consumers are happy to buy quality meat and entertain at home instead of heading out to restaurants and pubs for dinner, thus saving money. These warehouses are selling pallet loads of top quality primal which are literally half price compared to 6 months ago and people are flocking to the products. We have an excellent product and it's nice to see that people can afford to eat it. Why haven't we seen this with the sheep and lamb sector, why doesn't someone start to wholesale lambs and get a heap of product out, low margins but value for the consumer? It's seriously working and I'm sure people would love to be buying full racks of lamb, or bulk lamb chops at wholesale prices while we have an oversupply in our current markets.

Word is a producer from southwestern Queensland sent a B-double of merino ewes to Dubbo sheep sale last week and the sale of the sheep didn't cover the cost of freight. No wonder we are hearing whispers of producers shooting their sheep as they have no value or are too light in condition to sell. Alarm bells are ringing from WA as Merino wether lambs are nearly unsaleable due to no competition, well all I can say is things must be bad in places if we cannot find a market for stock. These producers are no doubt faced with dry conditions, expensive hay and freight which doesn't add up, hence the stories circling that people may have been putting their livestock down.

Tamworth yarded 1960 head of cattle with the off load of young cattle continuing due to the dry forecast. Light restocking weaners sold from 162c-278c/kg, while feeder steers topped at 308c/kg and the heifer portion made to 242c/kg. Heavy steers to process topped at 278c/kg while heavy kill cows topped at 229c/kg. Victorian cattle markets still seem to be a mile in front with heavy bullocks to process making 304c/ kg, while the best of their kill cows topped at 265c/kg.

Farmers' Market celebrates ten years

Ten years ago, when Olivia Nivison and Paula Jenkins saw a gap for supporting local and backyard producers, along with a demand for organic, diverse produce, the Walcha Farmers' Market was born.

The first market was held on 21 September 2013 in South Street, with the move to McHattan Park made in 2014. When forming the markets some of the aims were; to support independent primary producers, hobby farmers and gardeners; to provide seasonal and regular supplies of fresh food; and to encourage sustainable environmental practices.

Initially the committee ran the community stall, barbeque and homemade lemonade stall, but after two years the BBQ was outsourced to local schools and groups, and is now run by Walcha Rotary.

Over the years the committee have held numerous cooking workshops, gardening demonstrations, talks on animal care and welfare, and local Fire and Rescue have been in attendance to talk fire safety. For the children colouring competitions have been held, a fun Kids' Corner, face painting, old fashioned races, along with visits from Santa and Easter egg hunts. For the big kids the committee organised a MKR competition at the Walcha Show many years ago, teaming up a Men versus Women battle which was enjoyed by all.

Other market staples have included the community stall, which is always popular and a great way for locals to sell excess produce. The second staple music has seen musicians and singers entertain market-goers. Howard our banjo man has done so for years, with Barbara Dunn joining him in recent times.

Over the ten years, the committee has gone from twelve strong to now half its original size, all working very hard and donating funds back to the community when they can. In recent years droughts, fires and COVID have all played havoc.

They are always on the look out for volunteers on market day to lend a hand on the community stall for a few hours. If you are interested please contact Market President Denise Cox on 0429 692 214.

Which way Oxley Highway?

Last Wednesday Voice for Walcha gave a presentation to Walcha Council regarding what can only be called disturbing impacts by the Ruby Hills and Winterbourne projects upon the Oxley highway between Bendemeer and Walcha. The presentation covered four main areas: (1) the impact of Over Size Over Mass (OSOM) trucks used to deliver turbine components; (2) the impact of other Heavy Vehicles during wind farm construction; (3) the transport of cement and steel for tower footings; and (4) the upgrades required for the Oxley Highway to cope with this increased usage.

Delivered by Damien Timbs, the presentation was impeccably researched, all claims thoroughly checked. So what Council received were straight-forward verified facts, not opinions. Facts. And these facts are an absolute eye-opener. Even though already aware of them myself, I was still left stunned at the presentation, and felt sure the councillors had to be as well. For that reason alone I just have to briefly summarise those facts here, so you can judge for yourself their significance to Walcha.

Start with the OSOM trucks, those long vehicles that will bring wind tower components from Newcastle for the 283 turbines mooted for the Winterbourne and Ruby Hills projects. We'll need 3,679 such truck movements for that little show, plus 16,555 pilot vehicles. It means the Oxley Highway will be crowded by 30 such truck events per week for at least 104 weeks. Two years. And those trucks will have to return empty to Newcastle as well.

Then there's the tsunami of trucks required during wind farm construction. (If this doesn't knock you for six, nothing will.) The Winterbourne construction phase will last about 30 months, add say 40 months for Ruby Hills. The combined truck movements for that will come to: 235,400 B-Doubles, 116,600 semis and 368,500 light vehicles. Pause for a mo to absorb those figures if you're feeling wobbly.

Once you've done so, consider the truck movements required to build the cement and steel footings for the 283 wind towers. The concrete alone will require 41,000 concrete trucks, while the 42,450 tonnes of steel will need an army of trucks as well. It's head-aching stuff, and that's only the footings we're talking about!

But there's a nasty catch to all this that makes it truly horrific. Access. The above mind-numbing multitude of trucks and other vehicles will all have to use the Oxley Highway for access. And that access is not only seriously unsuitable for the task, but would need a great deal of work to ever be made so. What's more, NSW Roads & Traffic have very little interest in prioritising that highway for such difficult upgrading. You have to slam on the brakes when you hear that, and ask: Who is gunna pay for this to be done? As my mate Rupert says: "It'd be a joke if it wasn't so scarv."

All of this is why Voice for Walcha concluded its presentation by asking Council to conduct a cost/benefit analysis of the impact of such a massive wind project, using Oxley Highway access, upon Walcha's existing well established industries. But more than that, it is also why Voice for Walcha made it known that they would themselves engage a consultant to look at the economic impact of project traffic on the Oxley Highway and to identify pinch points on the road.

'Airlie Merino' fleeces take out Supreme Champion

The AWN Open Fleece Show was held last week in conjunction with the Rabobank National Merino Sheep Show and Ram Sale in Dubbo. There was a magificent showing of 93 fleeces from all over the eastern states of Australia. Organiser Brett Cooper said that one industry stalwart described it as "possibly one of the best showing of merino fleeces that he had seen".

Walcha's Airlie Merinos took out the Supreme Champion fleece in the superfine ram class with a final score of 94 out of a possible 100 points, making it the highest scoring fleece in the competiton. The fleece weight score received full marks with 30/30, which is almost impossible to receive. This score is based on the gross weight of the fleece as well as the expected clean yield. Without being awarded a high weight score, it is difficult to be in the running to win the class. Glenburnie Merinos, also from Walcha, followed very closely behind receiving a score of 93.5.

In addition to this, Airlie was also awarded the champion medium wool fleece with a score of 91. Judge Andrew Holgate, mentioned that 91 is a very high score considering it is a medium weighted fleece and Airlie was a strong contender to take out Grand Champion in this category as well.

Both judges were very impressed with Airlie's supreme fleece and it was a standout amongst the others. It showed outstanding colour, character, style and handle, scoring very highly in every section not just the weight.

Murray Power of Airlie Merinos said, he was going over to Dubbo anyway for a look so thought he would roll up a few fleeces and take with him.

Andrew also mentioned that the number of fleeces increased by over 30 compared to last years competiton. "None of these fleeces looked out of place on the grandstand, they were all of a very high standard, making it very difficult pick out the best ones".


