around the traps 🚱

The extra warmth over the last week has really applied more pressure to our season that's on a knifes edge. The warmth is ideal if we could get some more moisture but there doesn't seem to be anything on the forecast for the next 2 weeks. Total fire bands are in place over some parts of the state with even schools on the south coast forced to close their doors to children on Tuesday. Speaking with numerous graziers its hard to find someone with any optimism about rain or the current livestock markets.

The dry weather is really starting to put extreme pressure on both livestock markets with numerous feedlots still on a no quote basis and kill space stretching out to beyond 6 weeks. Talking to a processor regarding kill space they are still struggling to find labour. They mentioned if they had the labour, they could kill an extra 2000 head of cattle a week and over the 2 abattoirs they operate they could kill an extra 5000 head if they had the work force. If all abattoirs across the country had the labour than then we may be looking at a different market, but it also would mean further pressure on the export market to sell the product. Domestically selling the product isn't a problem speaking to a domestic processor and they also mentioned that the profit margin now was huge. They also couldn't see themselves dropping the self-price much as the consumers are already accustomed to paying the current prices. Consumers who shop at these large retail grocery stores are made to believe through smart advertising that the so-called price drops, like the price being slashed by 7 percent is a bargain when the actual animal is now purchased from the producer at 40 percent less

Livestock numbers look to be starting to swell in the sale yards as people decide to offload at any cost deciding not to feed. The cost of fodder and grain look to be as dear, if not dearer than 2019 and our livestock prices are nearly back to a value which doesn't pay to feed them. The dry weather has also forced numerous grain crops to be cut for hay as there isn't enough moisture to fill the seed head properly for grain. This may provide some price relief for fodder prices but judging by the prices I have seen advertised it is dearer than the south, regardless of the extra freight. One thing we have learnt from the last drought is that we should now be more efficient in feeding our livestock. If you are set up to feed than the current market offers some great opportunities to trade some stock and made some money. If you are planning on selling before Christmas, I urge you to be proactive and make plans now given the waiting times on feedlot and kill space.

The sheep and lamb job look like it will still get worst before it gets better as supply heavily outweighs demand and the ability of processors to process the extra numbers. I spoke not too long ago about farmers shooting their sheep as they had no value, well its true and I have also heard of farmers shooting goats, mainly because they are prolific breeders, and the market is terrible. Majority of the goat market is backed by the harvesting of feral goats and those people who are shooting the animals probably captured them which means they never had to pay for the animal.

Cattle number almost doubled in Tamworth on Monday with 2697hd yarded due to a falling market and further concerns regarding the weather. Once again demand was weaker from restockers, feedlots and processors resulting in a significantly cheaper market throughout all categories. Light restocking heifers struggled to attract any competition selling from 95-188c/kg, while feeder heifers topped at 234c/kg. Weaner steers made from 160-240c/kg while feeder steers topped at 264c/kg. Domestic kill cattle made to 240c/kg while the best of the cows made to 188c/kg, back 30c/kg compared to last weeks sale. If you thought the cattle sale was tough well don't read anymore, 4600 sheep and lambs meet reduced competition with the best of the lambs topping at \$122 for heavy new season lambs. Trade weight lambs in excess of 22kg carcass weight made from \$50-80/hd, restocking lambs under 18kg carcass weight made from as little as \$6-30/hd. Mutton was extremely tough making from \$10-40/hd.

The program also ensures all students have a sound understanding and knowledge on how to perform an emergency response plan in a time of need.

The many costs of Wind

Wind basically took off as a source of renewable energy a bit before the year 2000, and the period up until now (2023) has basically seen the vast majority of wind energy capacity globally installed. That period also basically aligns with a wind farm's life cycle - 20 to 25 years manufacture, construction, maintenance and decommissioning. Which means that we've effectively reached an historical point where we can seriously assess wind energy and make sound judgements about the Good, the Bad and the In-between of that technology.

Which is exactly what's happening. Quality studies into industrial wind farms are at last emerging. These can provide evidence-based information to help developers, governments and communities make better decisions about what that technology can do for them. Or not do for them. For that reason I want to highlight these studies, and will kick off with an excellent one from the Pusan National University of Korea - by J Dorrell and K Lee - a large comprehensive peer-reviewed study of scientific literature covering industrial wind developments around the world from the year 2000 to 2020, focusing on a raft of negative impacts. Analysing almost 150 articles, it's a serious study.

The study's main thesis is that: "As wind energy has expanded, the negative impacts have become more evident." Those negatives are mainly economic, but not entirely. Unemployment is one to begin with, despite popular misconceptions. Yes, wind energy creates jobs, especially in manufacturing, but "the net employment impact for the economy as a whole is negative." Market Volatility is another negative. "As wind farms have increased, so has overall intermittency of electricity supply", along with "higher levels of volatility in the electricity market". Higher Energy Costs have been another negative impact of increased wind farms, sometimes extremely so. Take Germany, for instance: "The national energy transition has almost doubled the price of electricity in just 15 years."

Government subsidies for wind farms are another negative; there has been greater dependence on subsidies in many countries with the growth of wind projects. Declining efficiency of wind turbines over their life time is another (often hidden) negativity. So too are significant decreases in residential house values due to proximity, visibility and size of wind farms, especially in rural areas - a multifaceted matter, including issues like noise, shadow flicker, electromagnetic fields, visual obstruction, and more. Last but not least is a negative impact of wind farms that's often overlooked: transition to grid connection. "Massive infrastructure investment is required for industrial scale electricity transmission lines, driving up electricity supply cost."

The study also found that winds farms globally involved ecological and biodiversity impacts. "These negative externalities include bird fatalities, human health impacts, bat deaths, ground animal ecosystem disruption, and habitat loss." On top of that: "The construction phase of wind farms has also been found to cause significant detrimental effects on residential well-being.

But wait. Be aware that the above negativities are essentially ones that have only become evident over the last twenty-odd years of wind energy's global expansion. The technology already comes with huge onboard economic baggage. As the study emphasises: "upstream processes such as the extraction of raw materials, production of finished materials and components, transportation, and manufacturing as well as the downstream activities such as decommissioning require massive amounts of capital."

That's why this study ends by emphasising that in order to fully and fairly assess the entire economic performance of wind energy, its entire life cycle from use to disposal has to be understood. We are beginning to grasp that fact from quality research like this study. But we really do need to take serious notice of such research. Anything less is head-in-the-sand stuff. Ain't no future in being an ostrich.

Walcha Resilience Stories

Another story from Walcha Council's Disaster Risk Reduction Co-ordinator Kruthika Nagananda who is compiling stories from locals as to how they survived recent disasters to help people learn from each other, and for the community to realise they are not alone as everyone has different ways of coping.

Louise Clarke with her partner Bill Croll

We have been residents of Yarrowitch for over 20 years, managing Glenferrie, Red Hill and operating a Farmstay named Red Hill Organics. I am a Company Director and currently Chair the Board of Centacare New England Northwest, and a Director on the boards of Rural Assistance Authority, Hastings Co-Op, and P&N Bank.

Our management practices on the properties include rotational grazing, ensuring healthy soils and Low-Stress Stockhandling. Bill is a passionate advocate of low-stress stock handling having studied with Bud Williams. The principles we adopt are to ensure we have ground cover and adequate trees for shade and our stocking rates are adjusted to suit the climatic conditions. During the drought, we focused on our ground cover to ensure we weren't diminishing the feed in the paddocks through overuse and overstocking.

When people come to stay here, they not only see the Werrikimbie National Park but we're able to share with them our farming practices. It allows people to see how we manage a property, to improve the livestock's well-being, the soil and life in a small rural community.

During Bushfires

It was a period where we had a combination of drought, high winds, hot temperatures during the day and very cool nights. We lost about 90% of our properties' when the fire came through, however, we consider ourselves lucky that we did not lose our houses and our main assets. For everyone in the community, it was a harrowing experience.

Red Hill and Glenferrie had two big fires during that period. The first fire, we spent a week managing and we were very lucky our fantastic neighbours, Murray O'Keefe and his son Riley came to help us. The second fire came through, with winds of 120km. I was here on my own, I rang Bill to say, 'It's very dark and eerie here at the moment'. Within half an hour, all the property was on fire. I had to focus on making sure all the animals were safe. I cut our fences as well as our neighbours to allow the stock to get away from the fires. Kangaroo Flat Road was impassable due to the fires so I could not get help until 5.30 pm that day from fire crews from Western Australia.

We took a very positive perspective on the event. We had neighbours who were far worse off than us losing their homes and all the machinery and other assets. We considered ourselves lucky to have survived. One of our observations post-fire was that our management practices had supported us. The areas that we had grazed slowed the fires down. We border National Park and what we observed in the fires there was due to the amount of fuel present. The fires were more destructive and fiercer and the animals were unable to escape.

A positive snippet

During the second fire, we had a group of heifers that just had their first calves. When the fire came through, I opened the gates so they could get away from the fire. The cows were coming down the hill and the fire was pushing behind them. Our neighbours, Margaret and Michael had their dog tied to our front gate, which was an exit for these cows. We saw a few of these cows trying to go past the dog to get back that evening to where I'd let these cows out that morning, but they couldn't go past the dog. The next morning, at about 06:00 these cows tried again and this time they could go past, the dog didn't stop them. Twenty minutes later, each of those cows came back with a calf at foot. They had all survived. They are very resilient; they've got an instinct for what they do in an emergency.

Post Bushfires

Erica Halliday and I set up the Blaze Aid camp. It took a lot of effort to get a team to Yarrowitch, but persistence paid off. The volunteers gave their time over different periods with varying levels of skills. They always had time for listening. Blazeaid hosted a community dinner every Saturday night for volunteers and residents. This provided an avenue for people to share their stories. Storytelling allows people to share lived experiences and lessen the trauma. Backtrack and the Army Reserve from Brisbane also spent considerable time working in the community. They brought different skills but the same level of support and care for everyone.

The community Hall received grant money to host barbecues post-fires. Some people attending those BBQs we may have been familiar with, but until that time we had not had a great deal of interaction. That's the positive thing, it has certainly pulled the community closer together.

Our preparedness

The last bushfires taught us to be always prepared, we've got a 1000-litre firefighting tank on a trailer. Every weekend we start the pump to ensure it's working. We have a large tank on a hill that gravity feeds to a quick-fill hose. This was invaluable during the fires when there was no power.

Having firefighting equipment and tools in the same place is an important step during an emergency. We've got fire extinguishers around the house, but we've also got them on the tractors. Ensuring they work is very important. There is no point in having non-working fire extinguishers.

Biggest learning

I learned from Bill, who has spent a lifetime in bushfire scenarios that he slows down during an emergency. During the fires, I thought I was the only one fighting the fire, whereas Bill methodically worked through what we had to do. My reaction was initially to go into a panic and to try and get everything done instead of taking the time to reflect to sit back and think about it. This is what Bill was doing, that's where you get the
