around the traps

I know we would all like it to be raining, but sadly the Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) just last week declared the El Nino weather pattern to be active over the Pacific. The El Nino and another significant climate driver, a positive Indian Ocean Dipole has also developed, meaning hotter, dryer weather for the eastern parts of Australia. We are already experiencing these warmer temperatures and dryer conditions, but this announcement has come with a stern warning about extreme heat and less rainfall for the Spring/Summer period ahead.

No matter how you look at the costs of hand feeding it still doesn't stack up for a lot of people when hay is at \$450 - 550/tonne delivered. I completely understand why people retain their females, but I can also see the benefit of cutting your losses and selling. We are seeing a lot of pressure on both markets as producers continue to offload numbers, especially cattle due to these costs.

Sitting down and working out that it will cost between \$600 - \$800 worth of hay per breeder for 20 weeks of feed is a hard pill to swallow when the current drop of weaners is worth less than that feed. We have been in this situation before as the EYCl drops to 374 and at this exact time last year it was at 1068c. One thing we should all be able to do now is feed efficiently, and there are plenty of options in the current market if you decide to buy and feed. Producers are looking at shifting their position, say from a breeder with a calf at foot in exchange for two light weaners, or just selling heavier cattle to buy lighter cattle to halve your DSE.

Word is a large producer in Western NSW has offered to take 50,000 sheep at no value instead of people shooting them, which is a great option. I'm sure they have been inundated with offers, especially because any sheep that are light in condition have nil value to kill and the cost of feeding would not stack up. Imagine the shutdown of the live sheep trade on the West Coast and the issues it will cause to the already crumbling processing sector. They can't process the numbers on offer now, let alone another one million sheep that are sold as live trade. Without rain and no grass, buyers in the sheep and lamb industry have some painful times ahead and I don't want to think about it if it's still dry come store lamb selling season for the New England.

The banks are beginning to tighten the screws on everyone, considering that your beef or sheep herd is now worth one third of the value it was last year. Cash reserves are drying up as the dry continues to strengthen, and not only are the livestock producers feeling the pinch, but grain growers are staring down the barrel of poor yields – if any. These current markets are putting a lot of downward pressure on property sales, as buyers are exiting the property market due to their banks pulling their reins back the worse these market conditions become. No doubt we could see a drop in property values soon, just purely based on the ability of someone being able to pay the debt back from current farm profits. I think we will see less impact in the high rain fall regions than the marginal areas and could possibly see more interest in time to come once we get out of these cycles.

The constant strain of no quotes and the availability of kill space has pushed more livestock numbers onto the physical market this week and as a result a further drop in prices. Tamworth yarded 2,700 head, Wagga 5,000 head of cattle on Monday, while Gunnedah yarded 3,000 and Inverell 1,100 on Tuesday. Both Tamworth and Wagga recorded drops of 20 – 50c/kg on multiple categories of cattle, with feeder steers averaging 221c/kg and feeder heifers 162c/kg, while heavy kill cows topped at 191c/kg in Wagga and 188c/kg in Tamworth.

The prices in the south now seem to be aligning with ours with less kill space and no feedlot quotes. Word is that there is plenty of grass in areas down south, but no one wants to take agistment, nor purchase stock given the state of the market. 4,200 sheep and lambs met weaker competition in Tamworth on Monday with drops of \$5-10 across all categories. Heavy lambs topped at \$108, trades to \$72 while mutton topped at \$55.

The riders said local towns along the way were very generous, filling their eskys with donations. Thursday saw them spend the night in Walcha and enjoy a meal at the Walcha Bowling Club. Here they were joined by members of the Walcha Westpac Support Group, along with Richard Jones – Westpac Rescue Helicopter's Head of Community Engagement.

Run for RUN DIPG Childhood Cancer Awareness Month

September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month and was first proclaimed in the United States in 2010. Since then it has become a global initiative, raising awareness for childhood cancer. Each year, more than 1,000 children and adolescents in Australia and 300,000 children worldwide are diagnosed with cancer.

Yarrowitch locals, Emily and Austin Scrivener, did their bit to raise funds for childhood cancer by taking part in this years 'Run for RUN DIPG' on Sunday 24 September held on the Fernleigh Track in Newcastle. The family have been supporters of RUN DIPG since 2021 when a friends daughter Amber was diagnosed with Diffuse Instrinsic Pontine Glioma (DIPG) at the age of 16. She sadly lost her battle in October 2022, just over 12 months after diagnosis. Some in the Walcha community may have seen the 'Posties with a Purpose' go through town in December of 2021 or spotted the RUN DIPG touch football team in this years comp, these have been in support of 'Team Amber', RUN DIPG and raising awareness of this deadly childhood cancer.

'Run for RUN DIPG' raised \$105.804 which will be used to assist with the advancement of DIPG/DMG research. With the support of friends and family from far and wide, Team Amber's contribution of the total raised came to \$29,709.

What is DIPG? Diffuse Intrinsic Pontine Glioma is a brain tumour that forms in the 'pons', the brain's control centre located atop the spinal cord. A type of 'Diffuse Midline Glioma' (DMG) the cancer is usually diagnosed in children and young adults. Primarily affecting children, with most diagnoses occurring between 6 and 9 years of age, it makes up 10 - 15% of all brain tumours in children, with about 20 - 25 new diagnoses each year in Australia. Unfortunately, fewer than 10% of children survive two years from diagnosis with a medium life expectancy post-diagnosis of 9 – 11 months.

DIFFUSE: Spread throughout an area, not well contained.

INTRINSIC: Forming from within, growing through the brains network

of neuron making it impossible to remove.

PONTINE: Referring to the region of the brain known as the 'pons'. **GLIOMA:** A tumour arising from 'glial' cells, the connective material

Who are RUN DIPG? When Josie, the daughter of GP, Dr Phoebe Hindley and Biomedical Scientist, Professor Matt Dun, was diagnosed with DIPG, they along with her oncologists set out to understand everything they could about the cancer. It soon became clear to Matt that very little was known. To address this, Matt's own cancer research group (previously leukaemia-focused) at The University of Newcastle and Hunter Medical Research Institute set about creating their own program of DIPG/DMG research and RUN DIPG was formed. Josie passed away 22 months after diagnosis aged four.
