When and where to vote for the Referendum

The 2023 Referendum will be held next weekend on Saturday 14 October. Places to vote in our area 14 October.

Hundreds of early voting centres will be in operation across Australia during a two-week early voting period which commenced vesterday.

Australian Electoral Commissioner Tom Rogers is encouraging voters to plan their vote for the first referendum Australia has had since 1999.

"Federal referendums are in-person events just like elections - this is the first time the country is coming together in nearly a quarter of a century to have their say on potential Constitutional change." Mr Rogers said.

"If you can vote on October 14, then that's what you should do. However, if your circumstances might prevent you from doing that then you need to think about the early voting options available and vote according to your circumstances."

"Remember, it is compulsory to vote for all enrolled Australians."


Postal voting is available for anyone not able to make it to vote in-person, either on voting day or during the early voting period.

The long weekend has sadly come and gone with the shorts and sunscreen out for the nice weather. The black cockatoos have been hanging around again which I hope only means rain with the forecast for the next week looking promising. The forecast of 15-20mm on Wednesday will hopefully be the start of a change in the weather pattern. The next fortnight looks like moisture will be hanging about even if it's just in storms like the one that east of town got on Monday. We really need those storms to eventuate to have any hope of keeping the grass a little fresh, surprisingly it's still growing a little. The improved pasture paddocks are already under moisture stress and starting to go to seed early which is just another sign of a dry season.

The south looks to be in for a wet couple of days with large parts of Victoria and the southwest slopes of NSW set to get a drenching. Falls of between 25-100mm are forecast and it must be coming given the extra interest we have had in listed livestock for sale over the weekend. It's amazing that the beef market has fallen this far so quick, and we are now seeing prices which might force people's hand to feed. The EYCI continues to drop with it now sitting at 344c, which is a fall of 740c since the same time last year. If we get a break in the season these little light restocking cattle will disappear, but if we don't, they will continue to flood the markets with the spring drop calves soon big enough to wean.

Rural crime statistics are on the rise with numerous properties closer to larger rural towns seeing multiple items go missing. Fuel would be one of the main items that people tend to steal as it is very hard to track and easy to use without selling it. Generally anything that could have a value is being taken and I urge all landholders to be vigilant in locking their homes, fuel tanks, sheds and vehicles. Majority of people don't even lock their homes, especially those on rural properties that have a lot of expensive items needed for the day-to-day operation on their farms. Even though we are in a secluded area, it's only a matter of time before we see the issues on our doorstep. I've heard of fuel being taken around the district but no major thefts. Some property owners have already invested in security cameras, this technology is at our fingertips and well worth looking into, the detail they can show is amazing.

Mutton and lamb price predictions look like we are still in for a tough 18 months with the market well oversupplied. The oversupply coupled with the dry season has put extreme pressure on the kill sector and will continue to do so for the next 18 months. Once Australia can liquidate some of the numbers we will see a gradual rise in the market from 2025, with values predicted to be double from what it is today by 2027. Another huge player in the protein market is the sluggish world economy with large consumers such as China, USA, Japan and Korea all struggling to get their economies going. Take for instance, China has a huge manufacturing export-based economy and if their exports improve, our protein market will also. China takes 42% of our mutton production so whilever they have a slow economy, their imports will be sluggish. Less money in their economy means their local demand for protein will be subdued, especially the high-end products such as wagyu and lamb. Word is, lamb in the USA is on the slight improve which will hopefully only mean good things for the Australian lamb industry long term.

Last Friday 1500 head of cattle were yarded in the fortnightly Tamworth store sale that met a tough field of buyers. Angus yearling steers topped at \$790 while genuine Angus weaners from the west, 6-9 months made \$640 for the steers and \$400 for the heifers. Steers sold from \$200-\$500 while the heifer portion sold from \$150-\$400/hd. The PTIC market was tough with PTIC heifers selling for \$375 or less, while PTIC cows top at \$690. Angus heifers with autumn drop calves at foot topped at \$1275, while older cows with calves made from \$320-\$600.



Garden Club Clippings

Even though our thoughts are turning to how to maintain our gardens in these dry times there are still some beautiful spots of colour coming into flower. The beautiful Judas trees Cercis canadensis 'Forest Pansy', flowering along the Oxley Highway towards the Golf Club is a great example of this. The flowers are followed by purple red heart shaped leaves. Their autumn foliage gives it another dimension in shades of orange, bronze, and red purple. Cherry trees are also coming into flower. Flower and colour forms include double and single in pinks and whites and even a green flowering variety called "Ukon". The "Ukon" flowers change from green to pink over the course of flowering then fall to provide a very pretty carpet of spent blooms. Prunus serrulate 'Kanzan' has double pink blooms which are in flower now. An avenue of these beauties under planted with bulbs and hellebores make a spectacular sight in spring. In autumn the beautiful red and orange hues give these trees another time to shine. Weeping varieties are also very useful to plant as a focal point. Prunus 'Snofozam 'Snow Fountain' has a weeping habit and is one of the earlier flowering varieties. The highly perfumed lilacs are another shrub that are certainly worth considering. Colours include white, pink, deep purple, blue and a purple with white edges. There are at least 28 varieties available in Australia. Dogwood trees and shrubs are another flowering variety that does well in a sheltered position. Available in pink, white and red depending on soil type. There are also red or yellow stemmed varieties which provide another dimension to a garden during the winter season. In a large garden, the variegated Dogwood 'Controversa' is certainly worth growing. It is aptly named the 'Wedding Cake' tree due to its spreading growth habit. It provides a very spectacular display especially with an evergreen background. Lastly, the magnolias. We are spoilt for choice with these beauties. Either deciduous or evergreen they are certainly worth a try. Shelter them from hot westerly winds, mulch well and keep moist. They are best planted in spring because their roots get easily damaged and will have the summer months to repair as they won't grow over winter.

October is a great time to plant the vegetable garden. Remember to rotate your garden bed planting to avoid diseases. Incorporate plenty of well-rotted manure or compost into the garden beds prior to planting. If you're transplanting seedlings, then it's a good idea to give them a drenching of Seasol liquid fertiliser to assist with transplant shock. Use organic mulch to keep plants moist. Tomato seedlings can be planted



deeper as new shoots will grow along the stem and help to anchor the plant better. Mulch with lucerne hay to provide nitrogen and keep moist. Peas - bush or climbing including snow peas, beans - bush or climbing, potatoes - early producing varieties, corn, lettuce - try staggering your plantings, tomatoes - acclimatise your plants if they have been in a hothouse before planting, radish - good for children to plant and harvest in a few weeks, beetroot - don't plant near beans as they have an aversion to each other, carrots, silver beet or Swiss chard and all herbs, especially blue flowering varieties like rosemary and borage to attract the bees.
