If you live in the Woolbrook or Bendemeer area then you got right under the bulk of the storms that passed through last week receiving anywhere from 60-70mm. South of town notched up close to 40-50mm on the Topdale Road while sadly closer to town only got the 8-15mm, which all still counts. You could smell the confidence growing in everyone that it still can rain, and the forecast for the next 10 days looks encouraging. The hard pill to swallow is that I personally looked at the forecast rain which totalled 80mm over 3-4 days, the next morning it was back to 10mm. I really don't think they know what is going to eventuate but the new story regarding the El Nino is that it will break down over summer and the long-range forecast looks promising for next year.

Queensland is literally alight with 28 bush fires currently burning across the state with some of the worst fires located in southern QLD. The fire raging around Tara has destroyed 44 homes, killed 2 people and burned over 20,000 hectares. These conditions aren't over yet with QLD set to simmer through high temperatures into the late thirties this week. An urgent plea from a Droughtmaster stud in southern QLD has asked to sell their entire herd to whoever, after being burnt out completely. They asked not to ask a price on the cattle but make a decent offer which can be found on social media. Numerous people are calling for the government to do more, especially the fact that residents in the Tara district mentioned there had been no controlled burning completed for 10 years, that is a fire storm waiting to happen. We have a long hot summer ahead with a predicted below average rainfall which I'm guessing we will only see more of these devasting fires to come.

The EU free trade agreement has stalled before it began with Australia not agreeing to the terms that the EU had tabled. The Australian red meat industry would have been at a disadvantage when compared to other countries such as New Zealand, Canada and South America. Canada for instance has a duty-free access for 50,000t for beef. Australia has access to 7,150t high quality beef quota with a 20% in quota tariff and shared access to a further 48,200t of grain fed beef. Currently we have 19,186t quota of sheep and goat meat with no in quota tariff and all Australia is trying to do is get an agreement that puts us on parity with our competition and increase quotas. These markets are very important for Australian beef and sheep, especially if we can increase the tonnage into the EU without tariffs. Word is that the EU would like to be more specific in terms of grass-fed quota to grain fed which I think we need to be a part of considering the quality of our grass-fed beef and lamb.

Mr Albanese is enjoying spending the Australian tax payers money visiting the United states just last week and is soon to head off to China, being the first Prime Minister in 7 years to do so. I understand that we need to forge new relationships and trade agreements, but Australia cannot and shouldn't be the negotiator between these two heavy weights. Lets hope he can get these large countries buying more of Australia's great produce and not just our minerals.

The beef market responded to the rain event even though it wasn't as wider spread as hoped. We saw a better clearance online on Friday considering cattle sold on Friday which didn't get a bid the week before. I believe we have seen the bottom of both markets and will see some great improvement in the new year, but only if it rains. 1800 cattle were yarded in Tamworth on Monday with a firm to slightly dearer market for the quality stock. Angus weaner steers topped at 246c/kg while feeder steers made to 225c/kg. Feeder heifers topped at 190c/kg while heavy kill cattle made to 218c/kg. The best of the cows made to 189c/kg, up nearly 10c/kg on the previous week. 3450 sheep and lambs were yarded in Tamworth on Monday and sold to a slightly cheaper market. Young trade weight lambs sold from \$70-105 while heavy export lambs topped at \$146. Heavy mutton sold to dearer trends, topping at \$52 for merino wethers while light mutton lost ground and sold from \$14-18. The better conditioned sheep made from \$30-50.

In Walcha, more customers visit the branch in the morning, with almost three-quarters of senior customers and more than half of small business customers doing their banking before 1pm.

"We are proud to serve the local community and are here to help customers find easy and convenient banking solutions as they adjust to our new schedule," Anne said.

Outside of the new trading hours, Bank@Post will continue to be available for local customers who prefer face-to-face banking at the Walcha Post Office. The branch's deposit ATM will also remain available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.



By December CBA will have almost 400 branch staff across regional Australia working in 113 multichannel branches, to support customers locally and across Australia. This will be a 40 per cent increase in the number of regional branch staff who also have specialised training in helping customers on the telephone, broadening their skills and career opportunities.

However the tasks that remain do require the power to be switched off, to ensure the safety of the crews.

Due to the nature of the work to be completed, it is not possible to safely undertake the works at

All you need to know about Nuclear Energy

Next Thursday, 9th November, you will have the opportunity to hear from one of Australia's leading experts on Nucelar Energy in Armidale. Founder of Nuclear for Climate Australia and past President of the Australian Nuclear Association, Robert Parker will be speaking at the Armidale Bowling Club on 'Avoiding an Energy Blunder Downunder' from 6pm.

Rob holds a Master of Nuclear Science from the Australian National University and has travelled the world visiting nuclear power plants, attending meetings, conferences and conducting study tours. Rob conveys his immense knowledge in plain, easy to understand terminology, with this talk being a must to inform yourself on all there is to understand about nuclear power generation, which could be up and running within 11-15 years if Australia acts now.

Rob explained that there are 33 countries worldwide harnessing nuclear power from 440 reactors. He said that nuclear power is growing strongly in China, Bangladesh, Pakistan, India, Turkey, Egypt and Romania. "Australia is the only G20 country that hasn't gone nuclear."

Rob will speak on four topics in Armidale:

- A brief restatement of our need for emissions reduction. A discussion on the incredible energy density of nuclear fissions compared to all other energy sources and why this results in our most sustainable and environmentally beneficial energy source, supported by results from United Nations studies.
- 2. The economics and operation of both electricity energy systems based on 100% renewables with ones that include nuclear energy. "In essence, a reliance on 100% wind and solar will cost at least twice that of a system that includes nuclear energy and will be ten times more materials intensive."
- 3. Looking at a clear concept for teaming up with Canada to power Australia with nuclear energy. Canada has similar laws, cultural values and is an equal economic partner in any future energy projects. "We visited Ontario in August, met with Todd Smith, the Energy Minister, the Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission, Ontario Power Generation and General Electric. Together they are constructing the first of four BWRX 300 small nuclear power plants at Darlington on the shores of Lake Ontario beside their existing CANDU plant. The safety and economic benefits of these new small plants will be discussed.
- 4. My talk will conclude with an outline of the benefits to rural and regional Australia from a program of nuclear energy based on both some small and some larger plants. We will look at how it benefits community growth, stability and education. Best of all it eliminates the need to industrialise our landscapes and requires very few changes to our existing grid.

Robert's concluding remarks were: "Nuclear is the most expensive way to create cheap electricity, whereas Renewables are the cheapest way to create expensive electricity."

Garden Club Clippings

The drier than usual season has now thrown up another set of challenges for local gardeners. Water restrictions mean we need to think again about how waterwise our gardens really are. It is always best to give plants a deep soaking rather than a dribble of water. Only water when the soil feels dry. Some plants are good indicators of when to water. Yarrow (Achillia) is one example of this. It is



often referred to as the 'water timer' plant. Grey leafed plants in general are excellent to grow as they can withstand the heat and generally need less water. Lavenders, lamb's ear, Centaurea ('dusty miller'), Convolvulus cneonorum, eremophila (Emu bush), Teucrium fruiticans (Tree germander), Gazanias, Santolina (cotton lavender), pigface (these come in a multitude of colours), and wormwoods are all excellent choices. Dierama or Fairy Fishing Rod, is another plant that does well once established. It can nearly thrive on neglect once it is established. It has waving wands of flowerheads which come in in tones of white, pink, salmon, purple and red. They look fabulous planted next to a pond. Once established, all these plants add both colour and contrast in the garden. Remember to mulch your garden as much as you can to help with moisture retention.

The ever-changing weather conditions we've been experiencing means we need to look at how we can maintain our gardens with healthy growth and flowering conditions. If you are lucky enough to have a lawn that needs mowing, then consider leaving it longer as it shades the grass. It is best to mow less often and on a higher setting and leaving the grass clippings in situ is an excellent idea. Water early in the day to reduce humidity and the chance of developing fungal diseases. If the soil is becoming hydrophobic (water repellent) then there are a couple of things to do to allow better hydration for the plant. Soak the soil with a wetting agent then use your garden fork to loosen the soil. Follow up all this with some compost and finally some mulch. Staking plants when there is high wind is very important as well.

In the veggie garden it's time to plant out your tomatoes. We have still been experiencing the odd frost in some areas of the district so have some sort of protection on hand ready to cover your plants. Frost cloth is readily available from your hardware store. As tomato plants are big feeders it is best to prepare the soil by adding aged manure and compost before planting seedlings. Place your stake in the ground before planting so as not disturb the roots later. Tomato plants can be planted deeper as they will grow more roots along the stem which in turn creates a stronger plant. Once planted, water them in with a fish emulsion solution. If possible, mulch with lucerne hay as it provides nitrogen to the plant.

NOTICE OF LEVEL 2 WATER RESTRICTIONS

Section 137 Local Government (General) Regulation 2005

Due to warm weather conditions and the reduced water levels/flows in the Macdonald River; Level 2 Water Restrictions have been put in place for consumers connected to the Walcha town water supply. Level 2 Water Restrictions have taken effect from: -

Wednesday, 25 October 2023 (Adopted by Council on this day)

- 1. Dripper systems and hoses may be used for up to 2 hours per day.
- 2. Unattended watering systems of any nature, including sprinklers and underground watering systems; may not be used.
- 3. A permit is required for filling a swimming pool or spa over 2,000L. Top up via hoses is only allowed for 2 hours per day.
- 4. Properties with alternate water supplies must display a sign clearly visible from the street.

Note: No restrictions shall apply where there is a risk of an accident, fire or hazard to health, safety or the environment.

Use of water contrary to this notice may result in restriction of the water supply and penalties.

INTRODUCTION OF LEVEL 2 WATER RESTRICTIONS

The water level in the Macdonald River has dropped to 3.25m over the past three weeks, which is the trigger point for the implementation of Level 2 Water Restrictions; as per Council's Drought Management Plan Rev D (DMP). This DMP was adopted by Council in December 2016.

The implementation of Level 2 Water Restrictions was adopted at the Council meeting held on Wednesday 25 October 2023, and came into effect immediately.

Ongoing operational monitoring is in place to monitor the MacDonald River and Off Creek Storage 2 levels, on a weekly basis.

The DMP for the Walcha town water supply system includes primary triggers for initiating each drought response level, as well as total system water consumption targets for each level. The consumption targets for Level 2 are 220-260 litres per person per day. See Table 1 & 2 - Walcha Council Water Restrictions Policy extract below.


