Mondays fall of rain was just what we ordered with falls of 20-40mm widespread around the district. The paddocks have already turned and now have sufficient moisture to continue to grow which will only magnify if we can land more of the predicted rainfall over the next 2 weeks. The rain has fallen over a large area and is still predicted to fall in the same parts over the coming weeks with the potential of heavy falls causing flash flooding. Areas northwest of Moree got more than 100mm and places like the Darling Downs region notched up similar figures. The areas that were on fire got some much needed rain to help put the bush fires out. Let's hope the precipitation continues and forecasters are right in saying some areas are in for 150-200mm of rain. I wouldn't like to be in Western Australia right now as a predicted heat wave moves over the state.

The fall out over the Optus phone coverage debacle is continuing with the CEO resigning from the top job on Monday. I don't think she is to blame but it comes after the entire network had a blackout for an extensive period. Sadly, this outage prevented their Optus customers from dialling triple 0 which put numerous lives at risk. Another wake up call for everyone should be that without network coverage, all the cashless payment services are unable to be used. It is worrying on many levels considering a cashless society is the direction that we seem to be evolving towards. As much trouble as we have with our service, I don't think the outage would affect people in the country as much, as we already tend to function without service a lot of the time.

Mining magnate Twiggy Forrest has bought the iconic Australian hat brand Akubra which is manufactured in Kempsey on the Mid North Coast. Twiggy is planning on ramping up production and keeping the manufacturing of Akubra in Kempsey instead of going off shore. I think this could only mean good things for Akubra especially after he also bought R M Williams back in 2020 and has increased its workforce by 500 people. I'm guessing the downside of the acquisition is that we will see a price rise in the cost of these iconic hats as I know if you have seen the price of the R M Williams boots and clothing, it's top quality but not cheap.

The housing market in 2024 is set for a downturn with experts tipping that the continual rise of interest rates has finally taken its toll on the property market. The housing market has really defied all the odds to date with markets continuing to get dearer due to lack of supply and high demand. They are saying that even though demand will remain high, more people will be forced to sell due to interest rates and increasing cost of living. The rural property market is also tipped to come under some pressure purely because the sums don't add up. Depending on equity ratios, the profit from farming businesses, especially livestock now aren't enough to the cover the cost of production. The high land prices that have been paid over the last two years have really put a lot of equity into farming business, but it will be an interesting period when the slide happens the other way and your equity reduces.

The rain has had the desired effect on the cattle market with all categories in Tamworth on Monday quoted as being dearer. Tamworth yarded 850 cattle with weaner steers selling to 320c/kg while the heifer portion topped at 290c/kg. Feeder cattle saw rises of up to 35c/kg with heavy feeder steers topping at 276c/kg while the heifers sold to 255c/kg. Trade weight kill cattle topped at 260c/kg while cows broke through the 200c/ kg barrier topping at 212c/kg. 1800 sheep and lambs in Tamworth meet a dearer market due to the limited supply. Best lambs topped at \$128 while mutton topped at \$77. It's always good to hear farmers in the west getting trucks bogged and unable to get kill lambs to the works so other lambs are brought forward to fill the space. I wonder if there are some holes appearing in the lamb supply chain. Forward contracts are now also available with \$6/kg being quoted in the New Year for heavy lambs but given the season, I'm guessing they will be plenty of space at that weight and hopefully we have also seen the bottom of both the beef and lamb markets for some time.

The motorbike festival was by all reports a ripping success and judging by the amount of bikes in town over the weekend, hopefully plenty of money injected into local businesses.

Power outage this Sunday

Essential Energy crews will complete maintenance works on the electricity network that supplies Uralla, Walcha and surrounding areas, from Armidale this weekend.

Operations Manager Ranges, Paul McWilliam, said the works would ensure that the electricity network remains safe and reliable for the region.

"This important maintenance had been originally scheduled for a Monday in early November, however was rescheduled to a Sunday following community concerns about the impact of a planned outage on the affected communities on a weekday."

To enable the works to be completed safely, a planned power outage affecting more than 4,200 customers in Uralla, Walcha, Yarrowitch, Nowendoc, Woolbrook, Kentucky, Arding River, Rocky River, and surrounding rural areas, will take place on **Sunday, 26 November 2023 between 8.30am and 5.00pm.** Affected homes and businesses have been notified in advance.

"Essential Energy appreciates that power outages can be inconvenient, and we understand that this reschedule may not be the ideal time for some communities and businesses, and we thank them for their understanding and patience while we complete this important work," Paul said.

The works will see crews replace three power poles and 12 pole crossarms, along with 15 insulators and various other network components that have reached end of life.

"Crews and equipment from Armidale, Glen Innes, Tamworth and Walcha will work together to ensure the works are completed as quickly as possible," Paul said.

The work is dependent on weather conditions and may be postponed if conditions are unfavourable or unforeseen circumstances arise.

"We appreciate that planned power outages can be inconvenient, and we thank customers for their understanding as we work to ensure the electricity network remains safe and reliable," Paul said.



Denmark's Wind problems

I've always considered Denmark and Wind Power as inseparable, like a horse and carriage, a marriage made in a renewable heaven. That's why I was recently stunned by another high quality study that tells a disturbingly negative tale about the Danes and Wind. The work mainly focuses on ageing and performance variations plus failures and major breakdowns in three generations of turbines: (1) small ones with a capacity of less than 1 MW; (2) larger ones of 2+MW; and (3) offshore ones of 3.6 to 6+ MW capacity.

The data largely comes from the Danish Energy Agency's register of wind turbines, which at the end of September 2019 held information on more than 9,500 turbines. Statistical and econometric work is by Professor Gordon (from Edinburgh University's School of Economics), the ex World Bank senior advisor on energy and environmental policy who headed the exacting study into 350 UK wind farms operating between 2002 and 2019, the same time frame as this study, And just like that UK study, the findings of this Danish research could also be called sobering.

Professor Gordon makes it clear that the smaller turbines aren't a problem at all. For those with a capacity of less than 1 MW the combined but offsetting effects of ageing and technical progress lead to only minor declines in average load factors as turbines get older. It's the larger 2+ MW onshore and offshore turbines where age-related decline in performance rears its ugly head, with a decline of about 3% annually for onshore turbines and as much as 4.5% for offshore machines. This means that by Age 16, an onshore wind farm will only produce 63% of its Age 1 performance, while for offshore rigs that drops to 50% of peak output. In other words "the economics of keeping a turbine or wind farm in operation look increasingly unattractive once it passes an age of 16 years."

Pretty crook, eh? But it gets crooker. For starters, all those more reliable small turbines have effectively reached end of life, leaving the larger less reliable and poorer performing onshore turbines to run the show, alongside the even larger, even less reliable, poorer performing and more costly (to maintain) offshore rigs. And to make things even worse, according to the Professor, "manufacturers are contemplating a shift to yet another generation of 12+ MW offshore turbines with all the likely problems" linked with that.

There are plenty of lessons to take home from this study, but perhaps the most salient is the patent untruth that large-scale wind power generation is nearly costless. It most certainly is not. At the very least it involves seriously expensive engineering and economic trade-offs that must not be ignored. For that reason alone, those who seek to promote large-scale wind projects like operators, governments and official bodies - need to engage in honest and open cost/benefit discussions that acknowledge and factor in such serious trade-offs for any worthwhile analysis of wind as a viable renewable technology.

Once again, as with the Edinburgh University study of 350 UK wind farms, Australia should take on board this invaluable free lesson from Denmark, and begin thinking about more viable, more reliable and more desirable sources of energy.

School Student Broadband Initiative

To boost education opportunities and narrow the digital divide, the Australian Government is providing up to 30,000 eligible families with no current internet at home a free National Broadband Network (NBN) service. Originally a 12 month commitment, the initiative has been extended meaning that the period in which a family can nominate to receive a free service is to 31 December 2024.

The duration of free services will continue until 31 December 2025 for all existing and new families.

To be eligible, a family must have a child living at home that is enrolled in an Australian school in 2023, have no active broadband service over the NBN network, live in a premise where they can access a standard NBN service and not have had an active NBN service during the previous 14 days.


