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Come along tonight to see how to use new community defibrillators

Walcha now has two new defibrillators thanks to the generosity of the Walcha Lions Club. They purchased and recently presented these to IGA and Walcha Council Community Care (WCCC). The HeartSine Defibrillator is a Semi-Automatic defibrillator (AED) that analyses the heart rhythm and delivers an electrical shock to victims of Sudden Cardiac Arrest in order to restore the heart to normal rhythm. The Lions Club chose these defibrillators as they are user-friendly and provide easy to understand visual and voice prompts guide the rescuer through the entire resuscitation process.

One defibrillator is located at IGA, just inside the front doors at the left, near their Community Noticeboard for use by the whole community. The other defibrillator was presented to the WCCC Rooms, with it being a mobile one, which allows them to take it on their outings.

To assist the community in knowing how to use the defibrillators, the Lions Club have a speaker at the Bowling Club tonight to demonstrate their use and talk people through the steps in using them to assist those suffering a cardiac arrest. "It is a 30 minute demonstration, which will commence at 8pm," Lion John Wark said. He encourages as many people as possible to come along tonight, and apologises for the late notice, however this was the only date available for the trainer. "It is very handy to see how they work, and what to do in times of emergency," John said.

Treating Sudden Cardiac Arrest

If you ever see someone suddenly collapse, fall unconscious and stop breathing, they are experiencing SCA. To increase their chance of survival, they will need fast intervention in terms of CPR, rescue breathing and treatment from a defibrillator from anyone close by.

Of course, you should always call 000 first and follow any advice provided by emergency services.

The next thing you can do is call for an AED. This equipment is highly effective and able to perform a controlled shock to restore the electrical system of the heart and re-establish a healthy heart rhythm.

Survival rates decrease by 10% for every minute that a person goes untreated.

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around the traps

Summer has well and truly moved in with the heatwave delivering some hot days, with the tablelands climbing into the mid-thirties and the plains hitting early forties. If you were lucky enough it did brew up some storms with isolated falls of 25mm not far from town. The heat has got everyone looking towards the next fall of rain with forecasts bouncing around about reasonable rain later next week. Cyclone Jasper is due to make landfall in the early hours of Wednesday morning and will be sure to stir up some moisture for Queensland and potentially an early start to their wet season.

It was great to see the Reserve Bank leave interest rates on hold for the time being as we enter the Christmas spending spree period. I don't think it will help our inflation figures as Australians are set to fork out 30 billion this festive season, a 10% increase on last year.

Last week I touched on the Australian Government's commitment to an ambitious emission reduction reaching net zero by 2050. I decided to do some further homework into how the values might sit on the shelves for consumers and I can say if you're happy to pay a 25% premium for carbon neutral beef now, then you can purchase the product from Coles. Currently premium grass-fed scotch fillet steak is \$44/kg while the carbon neutral scotch fillet is \$56/kg. I did mention that these extra costs will be passed onto the consumer as someone, other than the large corporations, will not only be offsetting their emissions but also the costs to do so. I also wonder how this product will sit globally as we produce a product that is more costly than the premium grain and grassfed products we already sell. Currently they tell us the economies are not tracking well, especially the larger populated countries who import large volumes of protein. We have enough trouble being on parity with other competitors as we try to sell into the same global markets, let alone an extra cost for producing carbon neutral proteins. Regardless we all need to keep up with this changing space as graziers will play an important role in being carbon neutral by 2050 and your farming practices may have to change.

It was great to hear that the new off river water storage is completed and Walcha water storage capacity has quadrupled. It's a big bonus for our small community, water security is everything and I hope it brings new business to town that helps grow our economy. Our population is forecast to drop over time, but new businesses and new industries, especially those that rely on water security could mean big things for Walcha in the future.

The final livestock sales are being completed around the state this week and with the extra heat has brought out more numbers than expected putting pressure on the beef market. Majority of the saleyards are out of action for the Christmas break until around the 8th of next year, a 3-4 week break which when the season is on the line can be too long to wait. Wagga yarded 7000 cattle and Tamworth 2798 on Monday while Inverell yarded 1970 and Gunnedah 2060 on Tuesday. Last Friday Tamworth yarded more than 6000 cattle in their final store sale while AuctionsPlus hit a 13-month high with 23,775 listed.

The extra numbers yarded around the state resulted in Tamworth on Monday selling to cheaper trends as numbers subdued the processors and the heat beat the restockers. Weaner and yearling cattle sold from 10-20c/kg cheaper, topping at 317c/kg for Angus steers weighing 325kg, while feeder weight steers made to 315c/kg. Heifers to feed sold to 266c/kg while domestic kill cattle topped at 278c/kg. Cows sold firm to slightly cheaper with the best of the cows topping at 222c/kg.

The shining light this week so far has been the improvement in the lamb market with kill lambs quoted dearer right up the eastern seaboard. Lambs in the saleyards yesterday made from 620c/kg to 670c/kg, with some new season trade weight suckers selling to 700c/kg. Tamworth yarded 6000 sheep and lambs with 3500 lambs meeting strong demand as heavy suckers topped at \$175, while the extra heavy lambs finally cracked the \$200 barrier and topped at \$230. A large run of new season 2nd X store lambs made to \$81. The best of the XB mutton topped at \$82, Merino ewes to \$88 with a decent skin while hoggets made to \$140.

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

Update on WWF from DPE

Extension to community submissions to 29 March 2024

Where is Vestas? Has anyone heard or seen them lately? Surprise – surprise – Vestas' pushes responses to submissions back again to the plethora of objections to the Winterbourne Wind Project – with yet another extension granted to 29 MARCH 2024. They have now had 15 months and two extensions from the end of the public exhibition to try and manipulate a response to the community's many objections.

Rather than accept this Vestas excuse, as just another 'dog ate my homework', we need as a community to seriously contemplate and question whether these delays go to the Project's viability.

We acknowledge the Government is desperate to keep any projects on the table, as serious cracks are emerging as to the viability of the REZ rollout. However, an inability to close many of these projects raises serious questions as to the quality of the projects – environmentally and economically and/or the skill sets of the developer in making poor site acquisitions and development decisions. A situation exacerbated when the developer is Vestas who is really just the turbine salesmen with minimal development experience. They have been in no man's land on profitability for the last three years.

So, the Elephant in the Room in contemplating Vestas's ongoing delays asks two pertinent questions;

- Firstly, is the Winterbourne Wind Farm (WWF) project from an environmental and socio-economic assessment perspective a compliance or a consent dud? That is, the environmental issues it raises are just insurmountable conflicts project consent is just too hard or just not possible. There are too many fatal flaws its Environment Impact Statement (EIS).
- Secondly the Elephant inquires as to just how economically bankable is Winterbourne Wind Farm? Wind Turbine technology costs have escalated 38% since 2021. The average price of seven of the most significant critical minerals for the wind industry has increased by 93% since January 2020. WWF promotes for 50km of grid connection with transmission costs having escalated by up to 40%. From a revenue perspective who knows - no one has sighted the wind data - not at scoping - not at EIS - not even the DPE by their own admission at the recently held Community Consultation Q&A held at Walcha Vet Supplies. The Developer's claim that the site produces acceptable wind profile at night is untested from independent review sources. How do we know once constructed and commissioned whether the WWF project is an ongoing commercial value proposition or stranded assets? The dollar value of any offtake agreement is uncertain as the Federal Government keeps changing the ground rules. The latest consideration announced by Chris Bowen - the Capacity Investment Scheme - asks more questions than it answers.

So, from an investors perspective this project might just present as 'in the too hard basket' – add to the mix significant disregard to Indigenous Culture, dodgy non-compliant noise assessments, insurmountable road and traffic issues – no identified resources of water and gravel. Vestas advised two years ago that Winterbourne Wind Farm Project had new owners – it had been on sold to Copenhagen Infrastructure Partners (CIP). Has anyone ever seen or heard from CIP – ZERO?

Successive delays must also create some unease amongst Host Landowners. The DPE at its recent Q&A referenced that Host Landholders on issues of decommissioning stepped into developers' shoes. This maybe an accurate conclusion which could increase the Hosts' exposure, coupled with onerous obligations to bonds, insurances, and caveats etc.

Message from the Mayor and Councillors

As many in our community will now likely be aware, Presbyterian Aged Care are in the process of divesting from all aged care services and have so far been unsuccessful in attracting a suitable operator to continue the operation of Apsley Riverview Aged Care Facility. Walcha Council has been approached to consider either becoming the operator or assisting in finding a suitable operator to ensure continued operations of the facility. Presbyterian Aged Care have advised Walcha Council that if no suitable operator is found, the facility will close. Council is now looking at the option of becoming the operator. This brochure contains important information to inform the community about the key risks and opportunities of this option and are asking the community to consider the following question:

Should Walcha Council become the operator of Apsley Riverview Aged Care Facility?

RISKS – NEGATIVE

Staffing — Feedback provided across regional facilities is focused on the difficulty in recruiting and retaining staff with high use of agency staff resulting in disproportionally high labour costs and operational challenges.

Governance – Council does not have experience running a residential aged care facility and has limited internal expertise in this area.

Financial & Operational Risk — Ongoing sustainability of the sector is under pressure and the environment is considered challenging. Financial and operational risks go hand in hand with available labour and its costs having a direct impact including 24-hour registered nurse requirements. Additional changes in regulation can also require large investments in facility maintenance and improvements.

Regulation – Changes in aged care regulations and funding with no control over changes and impact.

Financial - No capacity to expand the facility.

OPPORTUNITIES – POSITIVE

Reputation - Apsley Riverview is fully accredited and has a good reputation in the aged care community.

Infrastructure - Current premises are in good order with no major repairs or upgrades needed at this time.

Operations – Taking over existing business with established processes and procedures being a well-run facility fulfilling its governance obligations.

Direct Community Control – Apsley Riverview would become a community run facility through Walcha Council.

Local Administration – Direct functional support through Walcha Council administration functions including human resources, finance, facilities maintenance and billing.

Local Decision Making – Walcha Centric decision making to ensure alignment with community aspirations and goals.

Council have completed a reforecast of what a typical operating year could look like in the current environment. A small surplus appears possible however there is significant risk and significant effort required.

There is limited scope to create additional revenue with costs needing careful management. The operation would require ongoing review of its sustainability given Council would have difficulty supporting consistent year on year losses out of general rate payer revenue.

It is anticipated that operation of the facility would be passed to Council with no net financial liabilities — i.e. enough operating cash to cover existing staff leave, resident deposits, etc. However, it may be the case that if unforeseen expenses were incurred at the outset, Council would need to offset any losses from ratepayer funds. This has not been included in our Long-Term Financial Plan, nor considered in our previously approved Special Rate Variation application.

Operating losses would need to be covered by rate payer funds.

Resident deposits are approximately \$2,500,000 with staff leave liabilities of approximately \$260,000

Tourism Insights 2023

Walcha Tourism has been busy this year welcoming visitors to the region and promoting Walcha as a desirable destination to visit.

Walcha Tourism's role is to develop and coordinate the overall marketing and tourism activities, and associated product development for Walcha Council and coordinate the day-to-day operations of the Visitor Information Centre (open 364 days of the year).

The small tourism team who work at the Visitor Information Centre consists of, the Tourism Coordinator (3 days per week) and Tourism Officer (2 days per week) who staff the centre weekdays. Weekends at the centre are covered by our wonderful volunteers. Patrick Dogan has recently joined the team as a casual to cover staff leave time. Based in the Council office is the Executive Manager of Community & Tourism.

An average of 300 - 400 people visited the Walcha Visitor Information Centre per month this year and were assisted by our friendly staff and volunteers.

Tourism marketing campaigns for Walcha have been undertaken in the following publications this year (both digital and print): Australian Traveller magazine, Link Airways – Inflight magazine, Tamworth Country Music Festival magazine, Go55s magazine, Australian Geographic magazine, FOUND Regional magazine, National motorcycling publications.

Most campaigns were general Walcha tourism promotion, with some targeted to a particular demographic, such as cyclists, motorcyclists, caravanners.

Walcha Tourism now have 12 evergreen promotional videos promoting Walcha. These have been rolled out on social media and some on the Walcha Tourism website www.walchansw.com.au

They cover: Food & beverage, Art, Shopping, Motorcycling, Cycling, Prominent Local artists, Autumn, Winter, Pioneer Cottage, Apsley Falls and Tia Falls.

During Spring we engaged with Luke Lambley, a travel digital

content creator with 169K followers, who stayed in Walcha and captured content, collaborating with Walcha Tourism and sharing travel content on Walcha.

Our collaboration with New England High Country (NEHC) saw successful tourism marketing campaigns for the region delivered in

the following publications (both digital and print): The Wanderer magazine, We Are Explorers, Australian Traveller, Campervan & Motorhome Club of Australia, Australia/NZ Cyclist magazine.

We have also been busy updating and producing several tourism resources/ brochures including; a



new Visitor Guide & Map for NEHC, Walcha Visitor Handouts on bushwalking, fishing, eating out and accommodation.

Mayoral Column

DAM OPENING

With the "soft opening" of what has been referred to as Off-Creek Storage 1, but can now revert back to what it is, a dam, and probably the largest single infrastructure build for Walcha Council, is now filling with water. Over the years I have written a lot about the path to secure funding and construct this dam, and when filled should give town water security well into the foreseeable future. Adam Marshall's comment that this is the first



dam completed in NSW since Split Rock Dam in the 80s is a credit to the combined lobbying and push by this community. It proves the process, while convoluted and technical at times, works. Some plumbing work to be completed and the project will be signed off on and fully operational.

DERBY STREET

The public display day for the draft concept design of Derby Street upgrade went well with plenty of people taking the opportunity to review and have input into the plans. With around \$6.5M to spend on this project we need the outcome to align with our community's vision. Obviously the road structure, drainage and surface treatments are questions that are beyond most of us, but the footpaths, parking, street-scaping, signage, etc. are all open for input. There is an opportunity to have your say until the end of the month and work will commence straight after the Women's World Sand Green Golf Championships held right here in Walcha in April 2024.

GOLE

On the subject of the golf tournament, what a coup it is for our local golf club and the flow on effects for the community that this event will be staged here. It's hard not to be impressed by the course as you head west of Walcha and obviously NSW Golf felt the same. It is a credit to the Board and members of the club. World wide recognition of our community and its facilities can only prove to be great advertisement for our town.

PADDLES

The recent passing of Phillip Chandler, more affectionately known as Paddles, takes another great community member from us. Paddles worked for LP Cross for a long time and then became an integral part of Council's workforce. Always with an infectious smile, a little cheek or banter his presence always lit up a room. I believe Paddles would have left this world without an enemy and Council's thoughts and best wishes go to Olive and her family at this challenging time.

DRAFT WIND GUIDELINES

The Department of Planning have released their draft guidelines in relation to renewable energy for comment. Of particular interest to our LGA are currently the Wind Guidelines, Transmission and Community Benefit Fund sections. Following a public meeting in Walcha a couple of weeks ago these are out on display for comment until the end of January 2024. While these are only guidelines they will nevertheless be used by the Department in the assessment stage of these projects in the ever expanding renewable energy future.



How much that input will ultimately be able to shape (or halt) individual projects is yet to be seen, as the overall commitment to transition to renewables has been set politically and can really only be changed at that level. As I have said before, it is my view that this change is coming in some form and as a Council and community we need to make sure we get the best outcome for us. The draft Guidelines are easily found on the DPIE website.
