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75TH ANNIVERSARY OF WWII BATTLE OF MIDWAY TO BE COMMEMORATED AT WORLD WAR II MEMORIAL

A wreath will be laid at the Pacific Arch of the Memorial to honor more than 300 Americans killed during this battle.

Washington, DC – On Saturday, June 3, 2017 at 11:30 am, the Friends of the National World War II Memorial will host a brief ceremony and wreath presentation at the World War II Memorial's Pacific Arch to mark the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Midway.

Just six months after the attack on Pearl Harbor, the United States defeated an attacking fleet of the Imperial Japanese Navy near Midway Atoll in one of the most decisive naval battles of World War II. The Japanese had planned to capture Midway to use as an advance base, as well as to entrap and destroy the U.S. Pacific Fleet. Thanks in part to major advances in code breaking, the U.S. Pacific Fleet surprised the Japanese forces, sinking four Japanese carriers and inflicting permanent damage on the Japanese Navy. Often called "the turning point in the Pacific," the Battle of Midway victory allowed the United States and its allies to move into an offensive position in the Pacific campaign.

During the ceremony, more than a dozen World War II veterans – including six survivors of the battle – will present wreaths at the Pacific Arch of the Memorial in remembrance of the more than 300 Americans killed during the Battle of Midway.
