




Understanding Gender Inequality


 The unequal treatment or perceptions of an individual based on gender

- Manifests as...
 - Professional obstacles
 - Limited mobility
 - Feticide and infanticide
 - Political participation
 - Gender based violence



Gender Based Violence (GBV) in context

- "... the most pervasive human rights abuse in the world today, happening in all countries" (UN Women)
- Direct result of gender inequality
- 1 in 3 women will experience GBV in her life



Determinants of GBV

Table 1: Risk factors for GBV through a social-ecological framework

 Poverty Economic, social and gender inequality Social norms that support violence 	 Community norms Poor safety in public spaces Traditional gender roles 	violence Low socio- economic status	 Family history of GBV Unemployment Disabilities

We must address the structural cause of GBV.



Women's Empowerment & GBV

- Higher rates of GBV where women lack power
- Empowering women directly counters GV
- Female involvement in the political process advances progressive agendas.
 - E.g. Advancement of progressive legislation in Argentina

- MDG 3: Gender Equality
 - Primary school enrollment
 - Wage gap
 - Political representation

The Standalone Gender Goal (UN Women)

- Incorporate gender into all targets & indicators
- A transformative and inclusive approach to gender equality and development:
 - I. Freedom from violence
 - II. Capabilities and resources
 - III. Voice, leadership and participation

Women's Advocacy Day

- NC women brought to Legislative Building
- Appointments with legislators to advance agenda
- Specific recommendations

Looking back

- Gender inequality:
 - Reduces women's agency
 - Creates spaces where GBV is accepted
- Women's Empowerment counters gender inequality
 - Political participation
- Current global approaches have been insufficient
- Best practices models such as NCWU provide evidence in support of a Standalone Gender Goal
