MAY@R'S CORNER

n behalf of our city council and staff, I thank all our residents who participated in our recent "Brainstorming Workshop" at City Hall. Its purpose was for us to hear your ideas and concerns, rather than for us to express ours. Even though some of our fellow residents sometimes had different points of view, they treated each other with respect. It was a dialog, not a debate.

Concerns were expressed about public safety, park maintenance, park access that complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), code enforcement, the need to inform new residents about our codes, road conditions and repairs, and the need to improve interactions between residents and City Hall.

Public safety concerns

Public safety concerns included reducing fire hazards (e.g., see the "no fireworks" notice on page 5); formulating a comprehensive emergency evacuation plan; ensuring timely access to fire, paramedic and other emergency services; improving crime prevention; and more effectively discouraging speeding and other unsafe driving practices on our narrow, winding roads.

Several residents suggested working with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department to help Heights neighborhoods reinstate Neighborhood Watch and Neighborhood Disaster Preparedness groups. However, as one long-time resident pointed out, for such "neighbor helping neighbor" groups to be effective, not only do neighbors need to meet each other, they must also maintain social contact with each other on a regular basis in order to build and maintain trust.

Code-enforcement concerns

Code-enforcement concerns included obtaining building permits before starting construction, enforcing our "Dark Skies" policy, abiding by requirements to plant and preserve trees and other vegetation as a condition of approval for standards modifications, and preserving our rural environment as defined by our General Plan. Much of our code enforcement is "complaint driven." The intent was to allow those living in a neighborhood—who would therefore be most impacted—to decide whether or not a particular violation is merely a "no harm, no foul" technical violation (e.g., an "offender" has one too many dogs, but they are not causing any problems).

Unfortunately, the complaint process can be abused, and occasionally an individual uses it to harass a neighbor out of personal spite. Some complainers simply dislike certain aspects of our rural environment. Last year, a relatively new resident made numerous complaints about barking dogs, but no one else in the neighborhood regarded this as a problem. While there can always be too much of anything, one wonders why someone who hated barking dogs decided to move to a city with a General Plan that explicitly encourages animal ownership. The complaining resident has since moved.

However, such abuse of the code-complaint process weakens the trust among neighbors that is vital for the long-term viability of Neighborhood Watch and Neighborhood Emergency Preparedness groups, thus undermining public safety in general.

ERE ARE THREE FUN, EDUCATIONAL GARDEN PROJECTS TO HELP keep kids busy this summer—and they're fun for adults too! For all three, you'll need a level area that receives full sun most of the day. Calculate how much space you'll need (the photos will give you a good idea), including pathways and planting areas. Amend the soil with compost and level out the areas. Then you'll be ready to build and plant!

SUNFLOWER HOUSES & TOWERS

To create easy-to-grow sunflower houses and towers, you'll first need to decide how high you want structures to be, because different varieties grow to different heights. For example, Mammoth varieties grow to seven feet or more, and Skyscraper sunflowers can easily top 12 feet! Check seed packets to find out final heights. (See the photo *above*, *right*.)

On the ground, mark off where you want your structure. It can be any size or shape—square, circular, triangular—but leave an open "room" in the middle. Sunflower stalks will form "walls." Use a shovel to trench around the perimeter and clear away weeds and grass to form a planting bed about a foot wide. Dig down about a foot to loosen the soil, but don't dig in a two-foot-wide area, which will become your doorway. Form a floor by removing weeds and grass from inside the perimeter and cover it with mulch to retard weed growth. You can improve the floor by adding paving stones. If children will be sitting on the floor, you might want to cover it with an old blanket, quilt or piece of canvas.

Plant sunflower seeds about an inch deep every 10 to 12 inches. If you want really dense "walls," plant two rows of seeds, leaving a foot between rows and staggering seed placement so that leaves from individual stalks will overlap. Water seeds daily, keeping the soil moist, and sprouts will appear in a week or so. At this point you can add fertilizer; a blend of liquid kelp and fish emulsion works well, as does standard granular fertilizer containing nitrogen (especially important), phosphorus and potassium. Once your young sunflowers have a few sets of leaves, gently mulch around stalk bases to keep down weeds and grass. Your sunflowers will reach full height in around 10 weeks, and your new house will be ready for playtime!





When you buy bean plants or seeds, be sure to get *pole* beans—not bush beans—that produce long vines that will climb up poles and trellises (bush beans don't have such vines).

You can purchase poles at garden centers, but any long, slender piece of wood—including trimmed tree branches—will work. Bamboo poles are ideal and available online and at local stores, and you can also use PVC pipe. The pole length should be about six feet, but use longer poles if you



want to make a taller, wider-based structure that can hold multiple kids. The number of poles you'll need will depend on how big you want the base of your finished structure to be.

The easiest bean pole tent to make is a "teepee." Mark out a four- to five-foot circle and dig six-inch-deep pole holes that are one foot apart. You'll need about a dozen poles. Lean all poles toward the center and overlap them to form a pointed-top frame (see the photo *below*, *left*). Lash poles together securely at the top with sisal twine, zip ties or wire. String twine or wire around the outside of the framework, leaving about a six-inch gap between strings, to create a trellis for bean vines to climb. This trellis doesn't need to be all that precise—bean vines are very agile!

At the base of each pole, plant your bean plants or sow bean seeds.

Add water and wait for vines to start reaching out and climbing! You'll be

surprised how quickly they grow (about two months), and kids will enjoy checking on their daily progress.

You can get creative by using thinner, more-flexible sticks and branches to make smaller, curved-top structures (*left*). Whatever tent shape you choose, kids will love crawling inside their leafy green hideaway.

CORN MAZE

A corn maze can be adapted to whatever space you have available. It can be in the form of a circle or other geometric shape, a spiral or a simple winding pathway.

Decide whether you want your pathway to be wide or narrow. Trace your pattern out on the soil and sow corn seeds according to planting instructions on the seed pack, usually about 10 to 12 inches apart.

Protect seedlings by covering them with plastic strawberry baskets to discourage birds and rabbits from eating them. Mulch pathways to keep out weeds, help retain soil moisture and reduce mud on shoes when it's time to navigate the maze in two to three months.




