Complaints about farm animal noise



Our General Plan makes it clear that an integral part of our rural residential character is the "keeping of horses and farm animals." At a minimum, this means that life in La Habra Heights will necessarily include more farm animal noise than in most other cities.

During the last several months, some residents have complained about animal noise, and a few have even asked that all roosters

be banned—even when some residents have had roosters in the Heights longer than the city has existed. The Planning Commission has held well-attended public hearings about these requests. Of the residents who spoke, the overwhelming majority—many of whom do not have roosters—strongly opposed such a ban. The city council met, made a minor clarifying change in our existing ordinance and agreed to revisit the matter in six months.

As is often the case in our city, the most constructive idea came from one of our residents during public comment. Joleen Gibbs announced that she and several other experienced Heights animal owners (including a professional animal trainer) have formed an "Animal Advisory Committee" on which residents can call to help deal with potential problems.

If invited by a resident, members of this committee would be willing to visit the property in question and advise where and how to build safe animal structures and to minimize noise that might bother a neighbor. This would not be an official city committee but a group of resident volunteers just trying to help out—in keeping with the finest Heights tradition.

The Moon has been putting on a spectacular show lately in our Heights sky, including a recent, exceptionally rare Super Blue Moon (left), which won't occur again until 2037.

There are two types of Blue Moon, neither of which has anything to do with the color of the Moon. A seasonal Blue Moon is the third full Moon in a season that has four full Moons. The next one of these will occur on the night of August 19, 2024. A monthly Blue Moon refers to the second full Moon within a single calendar month—you won't see another one until May 31, 2026.

Because both types of Blue Moon occur infrequently, we sometimes say that a rare event only happens "once in a Blue Moon."

A Super Moon means that a full Moon occurs close to perigee, the point when the Moon comes closest to the Earth during the Moon's eliptical orbit—so the Moon appears larger in the sky. When a Super Moon also happens to be a Blue Moon, we see a really unusual event: a Super Blue Moon.

Fall means beautiful dark skies in the Heights

ne of the great things about our rural environment in La Habra Heights is the beautiful night sky, and there's no better time to enjoy it than in autumn, when Daylight Saving Time has ended and we've returned to the natural diurnal cycle of shorter days, earlier evenings and longer, cooler nights.

That's why it's so important for all Heights residents to help protect our unique ambiance and to abide by our community's long-standing "dark skies" policy.

Throughout our small city, you'll notice a marked absence of streetlights and other bright, high-level light fixtures that could obscure starry skies that we all enjoy viewing from our yards, decks and patios.

Some newer residents, used to conventional urban living, might be inclined to install high-intensity lighting systems that might provide a heightened sense of security to those unfamiliar with the pleasures of rural living—but which can also become a major annoyance to neighbors who moved to La Habra Heights expressly to avoid urban glare.


To help preserve our cherished dark skies, our city ordinances have this to say about security lighting: "External lighting fixtures must not create any light trespass or spillover impacts [onto neighboring properties]. This lighting may not remain on all night and must be equipped with motion sensors and adjusted to detect motion only within the lighted area."

If you're planning to install outside lighting, please contact the Planning Department at La Habra Heights City Hall and familiarize yourself with our city's ordinances. It will save you time and money.

If you already have outdoor lighting installed, please check it and make sure that you're following these simple dark skies guidelines:

- Use subdued, low-key outdoor lighting.
- Shield all light fixtures and aim them downward.
- Direct light away from public roads and adjoining properties.
- Keep bulb intensity to a minimum (a universal dimmer switch will help).
- Check to see how your lighting looks from your neighbors' properties, and make sure your lights won't keep neighbors awake at night or interfere with their Moon and star gazing.
- Always turn your lights off promptly when they aren't needed, which also saves money. Installing a timer is an excellent idea.
- If someone in your neighborhood is violating our dark skies policy, please report it to city officials (see page 16 for their contact information).

We think you'll find that this more considerate, neighborly approach to lighting will not only be more attractive and appropriate to our rural environment, but that it will provide plenty of safety and security as well.


