New engine for LHH Fire Department

A new \$878,000 Pierce Saber Triple Combination type 1 fire engine is being purchased for the La Habra Heights Fire Department. Type 1 firetrucks are large pumper units that carry water and firefighting and rescue equipment required by the National Fire Prevention Association (NFPA). Including associated equipment—hoses, extrication system and specialized radios that synchronize with other Los Angeles County firefighters—the total cost will be \$1,036,537.



The new engine will replace our current type 1 truck, purchased in 2008 and nearing the end of its useful life. A subcommittee composed of Fire Chief Mitch Brookhyser and City Councilmembers Brian Bergman and John Pespisa made price comparisons and determined that this was the best value.

State Senator Bob Archuleta obtained a state grant of \$1,075,000, which covers the entire cost of the engine and equipment. We sincerely thank him.

This new engine and our recently dedicated heli-hydrant (see the related story on page 8) significantly enhance firefighting capabilities in our city and region. However, *your* individual contribution—clearing brush and removing flammable items from your property all year long—is essential to reducing chances of a fire disaster in our hilly, brushy town.

Traffic light project update

The Avocado Crest/Hacienda Road traffic light project continues to inch forward and is now projected to be ready for bid after the February council meeting.

Since some affected areas are in LA County (the southeast halves of Avocado Crest up to Citrus and Hacienda from

Avocado Crest to the southern city boundary) and because additional grant monies were obtained in 2023 from Caltrans, each project design change required approvals by three different agencies. Once the contract has been awarded, our chosen contractor will order traffic poles and other necessary equipment and keep us updated about lead times.

Faster permit processing

In response to concerns about delays in permit processing, the city will be working with our contract engineer and will soon have a person on-site one morning each week to interact with residents and speed up the process.

New faces at City Hall

City Attorney Todd Litfin is our new counsel. He is from the well-established law firm Rutan & Tucker. Todd is 6'-6" (he played basketball for Harvard University), has a great sense of humor, has been city attorney for Villa Park (a small, oursized community) since 2006, and advises Yorba



Linda (another city with oil wells). His experience makes him an excellent fit for our community. Thanks to former mayor Stan Carroll and former planning chairperson Greg Stefflre, both attorneys, for helping with the selection process.

Acting Assistant City Manager Tom Robinson will step in to provide added support and expertise to help with many projects. He is the retired city manager of La Mirada who previously worked in La Habra Heights as an interim city manager. Rafferty Wooldridge, former LHH assistant city manager, is acting as our interim city manager.

LA County Sheriff's Deputy Hector Beltran, who previously worked in La Habra Heights, is once again our assigned deputy and glad to be back. There have been staffing changes at the main Industry Sheriff's Station, and we hope to have an open house for residents soon so that you can meet our law-enforcement folks and discuss any questions or concerns you might have.

Finally, I should introduce myself. I grew up in the Heights, attended La Habra High School, obtained a law degree from UCLA and moved away—only to return. I served on the city council from 1994 to 2001, and I am currently serving out the term of the late Jane Williams.

City government is extremely interesting and challenging. It really stimulates brain cells and forces you to think. Yes, it can be frustrating, but taking in opposing ideas and opinions retrains your mind and focuses your energy. Staff and council continue to work on improvements so that constituents will be better served, and we welcome your input.

We are fortunate to live in such a unique and beautiful community, and I encourage more of you to take an active role.

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Ruth Janet Wolfarth (1930-2023)

uth Janet Wolfarth (née Brink), 93, a resident of La Habra Heights for nearly 60 years, passed away on December 31, 2023, in Anaheim after moving to a senior living community there in 2022.

Ruth and her late husband Charles Wolfarth (1929-2010) played significant roles in the long struggle to protect rural living in La Habra Heights and to incorporate the community as a city.

Ruth was born on April 18, 1930, in Minneapolis, Minnesota, the daughter of Arthur Sven Brink (an emigrant from Sweden) and his wife Hildur Brink (née Almquist). Ruth graduated from Roosevelt High School in Minneapolis. In the summer of 1948, she met a young man from Mount Prospect, Illinois, named Charles Wolfarth during a visit to a Minnesota lake. They married in 1950 and initially made their home in Illinois.

In 1953, the Wolfarths moved to California, and Charles and Ruth started a landscape contracting business. Charles did landscape designs, estimates and installation work, and Ruth served as bookkeeper and business manager for their growing enterprise.

Attracted by plentiful trees and the rural quality of life in La Habra Heights, they bought a lot in 1959 with plans to build a house, but they later decided to purchase an existing home into which they moved in 1963.

The couple quickly became active in their new community. Ruth volunteered to help in all the organizations in which their three children were involved, including Hilltoppers 4-H Club, Highland Riders Equestrian Club and Scouts. The Wolfarths were members of the Lutheran Church, and Ruth taught Sunday School for many years.









Charles and Ruth also became highly active members of the La Habra Heights Improvement Association (LHHIA), which was dedicated to preserving the independent rural lifestyle of the small community against threatened suburban development and possible annexation by nearby cities. Charles became president of that organization, which spearheaded a challenging, decade-long drive to incorporate La Habra Heights as a city.





When the incorporation effort succeeded in 1978, Ruth was serving as LHHIA president. Wolfarth Landscaping received the first business license in the new city. Charles was elected to the first city council, on which he served for the next 10 years, and he was mayor twice during that period.

One of the founders of the La Habra Heights Historical Committee, Ruth served as chairperson for many years. She worked diligently on an oral history of the Heights, personally conducting numerous interviews with longtime Heights residents. She also collected and cataloged historical images and designed historical displays for local events, including periodic Avocado Festivals. For her decades-long efforts, she received multiple citations from the City of La Habra Heights, Los Angeles

County and the California State Senate. She wholeheartedly continued her community-building work even after her husband passed away in 2010 just a few days after their 60th wedding anniversary.



A stalwart member of the Rancho La Habra Republican Women's Organization, Ruth served several terms as president and board member. She volunteered at the polls for every election for an astonishing period of 50 consecutive years, finally retiring in 2020 at the age of 90 (left).

Ruth loved to travel. She and Charles visited many parts of the United States, as well as Germany, Sweden, Mexico, Canada, Israel, Egypt, Russia and China. She enjoyed outdoor activities, especially snow skiing and bike riding, and she was a talented cook and an accomplished seamstress who sometimes made her own clothes.

A devout Christian and patriotic American, Ruth was known for her duty, responsibility, organizing skills, hard work and resolute dedication to her family and the many organizations in which she served.

Ruth is survived by her sister Mary Phillips, daughter Cindy Cartwright, son Ron Wolfarth and his wife Elizabeth Linaman, son Richard Wolfarth, granddaughter Jamie Wolfarth, granddaughter Kathryn Cartwright and her husband Dane Piai, granddaughter Melissa Harper and her husband Christopher Harper, granddaughter Michelle Wolfarth, granddaughter Alexandra Wolfarth and her husband Victor Band, grandsons Jeremy Wolfarth and David Wolfarth and four great-grandsons: Parker Gaston, Kane Piai, Jackson Harper and Lucas Harper. Her sisters Karen Zuel and Gloria Gooden preceded her in death.

A service celebrating Ruth Wolfarth's long and productive life will be held on Saturday, February 17, at 10 a.m. at Emanuel Lutheran Church, 150 N. Palm St., La Habra, CA 90631. The family asks that in lieu of flowers a donation be made to Emanuel Memorial Fund of Emanuel Lutheran Church, La Habra, or to Wounded Warriors, two of her favorite charities.

Heights Heli-Hydrant officially dedicated

Representatives from the California
Senate, Los Angeles County, La Habra
Heights, Whittier, Hacienda Heights,
Rowland Heights and the Puente Hills
Habitat Preservation Authority (Habitat
Authority) took part in a dedication
ceremony on December 15 for the new
Heli-Hydrant that provides water to fill
tanks on helicopters that fight wildfires in
the Heights and neighboring areas.

Situated on a hilltop in eastern La Habra Heights, the hydrant is on property that is part of the 3,870-acre preserve managed by the Habitat Authority, including 724 acres within the boundaries of La Habra Heights. The site was chosen as the most suitable location by helicopter pilots from the Los Angeles County Fire Department.

Ivan Sulic, chairperson of the Habitat Authority board of directors, was master of ceremonies for the event. Speakers were Los Angeles County Supervisor Janice Hahn, Los Angeles County Fire Chief Anthony Marrone, State Senator Bob Archuleta, La Habra Heights Mayor Carol Engelhardt, La Habra Heights City Councilmembers Brian Bergman and Dennis Laherty, and La Habra Heights Fire Chief Mitch Brookhyser.

"The operative word for today is *collaboration*," said La Habra Heights Councilmember Dennis Laherty, who, along with Councilmember Brian Bergman,

spearheaded efforts to get the Heli-Hydrant approved, funded and installed. Laherty noted that planning and negotiations were especially difficult and time-consuming since so many agencies and organizations were involved. He and Bergman both recognized and thanked Supervisor Janice Hahn for helping to negotiate agreements and secure grant funding for the project.

Executive Director Andrea Gullo of the Habitat Authority was also heavily involved in negotiations that led to ecologically acceptable site preparations and installation of the important new firefighting technology.

Pam McVicar, board vice president of the La Habra Heights County Water District, was the first to advocate installing a Heli-Hydrant in our community after learning how effective such equipment had been in fighting wildfires in Orange County.

Supervisor Hahn said: "During a firefight, precious minutes matter! We're grateful that we can provide you with this new tool to help protect this beautiful La Habra Heights and surrounding communities."

Senator Bob Archuleta reminded the audience that La Habra Heights is the first city in Los Angeles County to install a Heli-

Hydrant and called it a reminder of ongoing commitments to protect the Heights from wildfire. He also praised fire academy students who serve as volunteer firefighters in the La Habra Heights Fire Department. "La Habra Heights, you're the mothership for all these young firefighters who learn their trade here and then move out to serve other communities." he said.

Los Angeles County Fire Chief Anthony Marrone and La Habra Heights Fire Chief Mitch Brookhyser explained the vital role that timely water drops play in bringing wildfires under control quickly.

How it works Water is drawn through a dangling hose into a tank on the helicopter and then dumped onto fires. The helicopter returns to the Heli-Hydrant to When approaching refill as often as the Heli-Hydrant, the necessary. pilot sends a remote signal to the pump that fills the large tank with water. The signal activates into the tank, filling an automated valve it as often as needed by helicopter firefighters. water system.

In the past, helicopters fighting fires in the Heights either had to land in Schabarum Park for difficult manual refilling or travel to local reservoirs such as Puddingstone Lake. The convenient location of our new Heli-Hydrant creates a force-multiplier effect, allowing a single helicopter to perform many more water drops in a shorter period of time. A small helicopter holds 350 gallons; a large Chinook CH-47 (see the photo on the cover) holds 3,000 gallons.

Made by Whaling Fire Line Equipment (Canyon Country, California), the patented Heli-Hydrant system features remote, radio-activated, helicopter pilot-controlled valves that rapidly fill and drain the 8,600-gallon tank, which is 8 feet high and 15 feet in diameter. The tank has no lid so that it remains dry when not in use to prevent stagnant water and to keep wildlife and people safe. During Red Flag Fire Alert days, the La Habra Heights Fire Department has the option to prefill the tank as an extra precaution.

Having a Heli-Hydrant the Heights enables helicopter firefighters to suppress fires sooner and keep fires smaller. This technology increases protection not only for our city, but also for surrounding communities, constituting a significant contribution to our Mutual Aid Agreements with neighboring agencies.

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
