I. THE MESSAGES TO THE SEVEN CHURCHES (Revelation 2:1 - 3:22)

A. The Repeating Pattern Of The Messages

- 1. A description of the character of Christ.
- 2. A description of what Christ knows about each church, with a word of commendation for their strengths and a word of rebuke for their sins of commission and omission.
- 3. A call to repentance, with a warning of consequences if they don't repent.
- 4. A description of the reward promised for faithfulness and overcoming.

B. The Message To The Church In Thyatira (2:18-29)

- 1. The historical context of Thyatira:
- a. Probably the least significant of the seven cities, yet it received the longest letter.
- b. It is the most difficult of the seven letters to interpret due to our limited knowledge of the city.
- c. It was founded as a military outpost, but in John's time it had evolved into a town of trades and craftsmen; in our thinking, a blue-collar, manufacturing hub.
- d. It was a city of tightly knit-trade guilds (first century unions). You couldn't survive professionally in the city without being a member of one of the trade guilds.
- e. Each guild (all of them being tied to the patron 'god' of the city: Apollos) had social obligations, which included ceremonies of worship to Apollo at sexually-charged feasts.
- 2. The specific message to the church in Thyatira:
- a. Beginning with a description of the character of Christ:

"To the angel of the church in Thyatira write: These are the words of the Son of God, whose eyes are like blazing fire and whose feet are like burnished bronze." (v. 18)

- i. Christ is shown as One who eyes can penetrate hearts and whose feet can deliver justice.
- b. Then followed by a description of what Christ knows about the church:
- i. First, a word of commendation...

"I know your deeds, your love and faith, your service and perseverance, and that you are now doing more than you did at first." (v. 19)

1.) They were growing and maturing in discipleship.

ii. Secondly, a word of rebuke...

"Nevertheless, I have a few things against you: You tolerate that woman Jezebel, who calls herself a prophet. By her teaching she misleads my servants into sexual immorality and the eating of food sacrificed to idols. (v. 20)

- 1.) Churches, like people, are not one-dimensional; we can have great strengths and weaknesses.
- 2.) "Jezebel" was likely not her real name, but a reference to her nature, (See 1 Kings 16-19).
- a.) She was apparently teaching that one could follow Christ and worship with the guilds.
- iii. Thirdly, a call to repentance...

"I have given her time to repent of her immorality, but she is unwilling. So I will cast her on a bed of suffering, and I will make those who commit adultery with her suffer intensely, unless they repent of her ways. I will strike her children dead. Then all the churches will know that I am he who searches hearts and minds, and I will repay each of you according to your deeds." (vv. 21-23)

- 1.) Christ has been patient with "Jezebel", but she remains stubborn, so He will increase the pressure.
- a.) "I will cast her on a bed of suffering and I will make those who commit adultery with her suffer..."
- b.) "I will strike her children dead": In the spirit of the apocalyptic genre, likely referring to Christ causing Jezebel's followers to perish as a way of rooting out her teaching.
- iv. Fourthly, the reward for faithfulness...

"Now I say to the rest of you in Thyatira, to you who do not hold to her teaching and have not learned Satan's so-called deep secrets, 'I will not impose any other burden on you, except to hold on to what you have until I come.' To the one who is victorious and does my will to the end, I will give authority over the nations – that one 'will rule them with an iron sceptre and will dash them to pieces like pottery – just as I have received authority from my Father. I will also give that one the morning star.

Whoever has ears, let them hear what the Spirit says to the churches." (vv. 24-29)

- 1.) "Satan's so-called deep secrets": Likely "Jezebel" was claiming that she was teaching "the deep things of God", but John is pulling back the veil and revealing the true source of her teaching.
- 2.) "I will not impose any other burden on you": An awkward way of saying that simply and purely following Christ is less burdensome than trying to follow Jezebel's "so-called deep secrets".
- 3.) "I will give authority over the nations...": Likely a reference to Psalm 2:8-9, depicting the Messiah's authority and our part in His end-time rule, (See Luke 22:28-30; 1 Corinthians 6:2)
- 4.) "The morning star": The star that usually appears at the darkest point of the night. Christ is called "the bright Morning Star" later in Revelation 22:16. Possibly a promise of us sharing in Christ's future glory.
