- <u>Entrepreneurship Programme</u> The Foundation takes groups of entrepreneurs and business leaders from New Zealand to Asia on industry-specific trips to build their knowledge and confidence in Asia and build connections. The Foundation will cover return flights, accommodation, on-ground transportation and most meals.

- <u>Student Grants</u>: Funding for tertiary students to bring technical expertise to a specific R&D project. There are various grants available, depending on the level of expertise required and the length of the project.
- <u>R&D Tax Incentive (RDTI)</u>: The RDTI offers a tax credit equal to 15% of eligible R&D expenditure. Businesses can use this credit to reduce the amount of income tax they pay. To determine eligibility, you can visit the RDTI website <u>here</u>.
- R&D Grants: Callaghan have launched new grants to assist businesses with funding to undertake R&D projects. This supports activities not covered by the RDTI. More information can be found here.

SFF Futures fund a range of projects – from smaller projects that cost less than \$100,000 to multi-million-dollar, multi-year programmes. The extent of MPI's investment will mainly be determined by the extent of the benefits made available to New Zealand (the public good).

The greater the public good, the larger the proportion of total project costs MPI is likely to co-invest. On the other hand the greater the commercial outcomes, the greater the amount of investment they require from the applicant

Poutama strives to create an environment for successful business ventures and economic growth for Māori.

FUNDING

Poutama takes a flexible approach to how they can use their funding to invest into a business. A few of the available options are:

- Poutama Investment Support Available on a 50-50 basis up to a maximum of \$10,000. The business must come up with a proportion of the amount that is at least equal to what Poutama is asked to fund. The business must have been operating for 12 months, have at least \$80,000 in annual turnover, and be at least 50% Māori owned. Note: If the business owners are from Waikato Tanui Iwi, there is potential to access an additional 50% funding of up to \$5,000.
- <u>Collectives, Clusters and Collaborations</u> Poutama supports the facilitation of collectives, clusters, and collaborations between Māori enterprises to identify and explore potential opportunities. E.g., Kāhui Fashion Collective, TUKU - Māori Wine Collective, and Indigenous Cuisine Cluster.

FUNDING AND RESOURCES

- <u>Climate and Sustainability Fund</u>: The Climate and Sustainability Fund is an initiative in the Council's Te Atakura First to Zero climate action plan to reduce carbon emissions by 2030, or create a culture of climate change action. Applicants must be a legal entity and be based in Wellington city, or deliver benefits within the Wellington City Council rate paying area.
- <u>Waste Minimisation Seed Fund</u>: Support new initiatives that complement and enhance existing programmes or address gaps or opportunities to target priority waste streams, reduce harm to the environment and improve efficiency of resource use. There is up to \$100,000 available every year, with two types of grant:
 - funding for small projects \$2000 and under
 - funding for medium/large projects over \$2000.
- <u>City Growth Fund:</u> The objective of the fund is to support projects, partnerships and programmes that contribute to the economic growth of the city. This funding is expected to be matched by the applicant for 50% of total proposed project costs.
- <u>Other funds</u> including Natural Environment Fund, Sports Event Partnership Fund, and Arts and Culture Fund.

Part Three: Incubators and Angels

The following section outlines the Incubator and Accelerator programmes which exist in New Zealand to support early stage ventures and start-up businesses. These offer in-kind support and expertise, along with connections to other entrepreneurs. Some may also offer small amounts of funding during the programme, or potential investment at the close of the programme.

Another potential avenue for investment is through angel investors. There are multiple angel investment groups across Aotearoa New Zealand which invest in start up and early stage businesses. Each group will have their own investment mandate and criteria, so it is important that you discuss this with each group.

INCUBATORS & ACCELERATORS

There are a number of incubator programmes across Aoteoroa that support start-ups and early stage ventures with resources, funding and pro-bono expertise. Current incubator programmes include:



PHASE ONE VENTURES

Phase One is an early-stage founder community, a product and growth incubator program, and a venture capital fund, based in Auckland. The program will pair startups with a product and growth mentor and may invest capital in companies that show great signals of progress.

CREATIVE CREATIVE HO

- <u>Incubator</u>: The Incubator is a 6-month hybrid programme open to startups based in Wellington. Includes \$5,000 of equity-free funding.
- Accelerator: 3-month virtual programmes, open to startups based in Aotearoa. Remote or in-person.



KŌKIRI

A Māori Business Acceleration programme based on kaupapa Māori values and focused on accelerating early stage Māori-led, tech-based start-ups. 12-week programme.



SPROUT AGRITECH

The Sprout Agritech Accelerator programme is a 12-week Accelerator aimed at agritech and foodtech entrepreneurs and businesses looking to turn IP into a scalable business. Sprout Agritech may invest in companies which show high potential for growth.



MINISTRY OF AWESOME

The Founder Catalyst is a nine-month incubation programme designed to support, nurture and accelerate the growth of early-stage startups.



HATCH PACIFIC

Offer programmes which seek to empower young Pacific entrepreneurs (ages 18 - 35 years) and transform their ideas into viable businesses.

- Foundation: For those thinking about business as a future pathway, or looking to develop their entrepreneurship skills
- Vaka: For those who already have a business idea

HTK GROUP

- The Whakatū Accelerator is a 12-week founder driven startup accelerator programme designed to unleash the ambitions of Māori and Pacifica entrepreneurs. The accelerator will focus on Māori and Pacifica knowledge intensive businesses. It is based in Tāmaki Makaurau but supports founders across Aotearoa.
- <u>Programming Māori & Pasifika Potential (PMP)</u> is a digital technology accelerator for rangatahi Māori and Pacifica 16 - 19 years. In 2023, PMP will accelerate across Auckland, Christchurch, and Hawkes Bay, connecting 80 rangatahi into business innovation and digital technology.



TECHNOLOGY INCUBATORS

There are four technology incubators across the country that deliver technology incubation programmes and funding on behalf of Callaghan Innovation. This programme has been designed to support the commercialisation of complex products and technologies, which are often derived out of research and development (R&D).

Eligible deep tech startups can access funding for a specific commercialisation project. Funding is available to startups, and potential startups, who are partnering with one of the technology incubators.

Successful applicants will receive a minimum of \$1,000,000 in funding, made up of \$750,000 in the form of a Repayable Grant from Callaghan Innovation, and a minimum of \$250,000 in private investment. To be considered for a Repayable Grant, the Technology Incubator will apply to Callaghan Innovation on behalf of the business, providing a business case, project plan, budget, and investment terms.

The repayable funding portion consists of two parts:

- Pre-incubation Grant of \$35,000 to conduct due diligence on the technology and test the commercial viability of an idea.
- Repayable Grant of up to \$750,000 to fund the start-up's costs associated with commercialising the technology. This is 'success-based' grant funding, where ventures only start making repayments when they start earning revenue at 3% of revenue per annum, or when they exit.
