Pastor's Message: Easter

Death is a common occurrence. Everyone knows that someday they will die, even if they don't want to think about it, plan for it or deal with it at all. It can be a surprise when it happens. Children passing away before their parents is a particularly hard reality to deal with. That's not the natural order of things. Even how it happens can be shocking. Accidents or a sudden illness surprise us when most of us expect to pass away from old age. But although there can be surprises about how and when death comes, death itself is expected by all.

But a resurrection is not. I do not know of anyone who has come back to life after being verifiably dead. Of course, hearts are re-started and people can wake up after a long coma; but someone coming back to life after they have died and been buried for 3 days is not something anyone alive today has seen or expects.

Which is why the confusion and fear of the women is so understandable. At the end of our Gospel reading for Easter, St. Mark writes, "And they (Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome) went out and fled from the tomb, for trembling and astonishment had seized them, and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid" (Mk 16:8). When you expect to find and attend to a dead body, which they had probably done several times before, their astonishment and fear is understandable when the tomb is open, Jesus is nowhere to be found, and an angel tells you that Jesus has come back to life. If I had been there, I'm not sure I would've told anyone either out of fear of being considered crazy or worse.

But as incredible and unbelievable as it was, it really did happen! Jesus appeared physically to Mary Magdalene on Easter morning, to two followers on the road to Emmaus that afternoon, to ten of the twelve disciples Easter evening, to the ten disciples plus Thomas a week later, and then eventually to over 500 people. There was no shortage of witnesses to the unprecedented event. More than that, He ate with the disciples Easter evening. A week later Thomas was privileged to touch Jesus's hands, His feet and His side; and then on the shore of the Sea of Galilee, Jesus ate breakfast with the disciples. This was no phantom or group hallucination. The impossibility of someone physically coming back to life after being crucified and buried was now an incredible and yet undeniable fact.

Although the women's first reaction was fear, trembling and astonishment, the end result is joyful and exuberant celebration. If one person can rise, physically from the grave, then others can do the same...and that is the excitement. Jesus's resurrection means that peace with God has been made. The rebellion that brought God's condemnation and caused death to be the inevitable end for all of us, has now been reversed. And although death is still the end which we all expect, it no longer has the last word. As Jesus proclaims, in Him pass from death to life. We will rise, physically, just as Jesus did to live forever in peace with our God. That is our Easter joy and celebration!



What that means for you today, is that although we need to face the reality of, and plan for our own eventual death, we don't have to live in fear of it. We can approach our planning and even the funerals of loved ones and friends knowing that the best is yet to come. We will see them all again because just as Jesus rose from the grave, we will too!


Here is what is happening at the BOOKClub:

The turnaround from our last meeting is very quick; but we have selected a short book to discuss with our visiting missionary, Rev. Paul Nelson. The next book on our list is *Ministering Cross-Culturally: An Incarnational Model for Personal Relationships* (ISBN 978-0801026478) by Sherwood G. Lingenfelter. This was a book we were required to read in seminary and should provide a good start to learn what missionary life is like in other cultures. The description reads:

In Ministering Cross-Culturally, the authors demonstrate that Jesus needed to learn and understand the culture in which he lived before he could undertake his public ministry. The authors examine how this can help us better understand what it means to establish relationships of grace with those from different cultural and social backgrounds.

With more than 70,000 copies of the first edition in print, this incarnational model of ministry has proven successful for many people. Several sections in this second edition have been rewritten, and the entire book has been updated to reflect development in the authors' thinking. Drawing from the authors' rich experience on the mission field, this book will benefit anyone who wants to be salt and light in a multicultural and multiethnic world.

The book is short (128 pages) and a very easy read. Because of the quick turnaround, multiple copies have been purchased for the church and can be found on the narthex counter next to the mailboxes. Unfortunately, Audible and Kindle editions are not available.
