Program Write-up

GEAR UP Waterbury hosted an "Introduction to Manufacturing" summer program at Naugatuck Valley Community College. Rising 10th-grade students from Waterbury Public School (WPS) participated in this program, receiving hands-on experience in the manufacturing industry **through**

the NVCC Advanced Manufacturing

<u>Technology Center</u>. Students represented multiple WPS schools, including Crosby High School, Kennedy High School, Enlightenment, Waterbury Arts Magnet School, Waterbury Career Academy, and Wilby High School. Students worked with manufacturing professionals, current NVCC students, and alums to build their projects while learning about the opportunities that NVCC can offer them.

The Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs (GEAR UP) is one of the largest and most effective federally-funded grant programs focused on increasing local students' college and career readiness to think beyond what they see today. GEAR UP is a partnership program between Connecticut State Colleges & Universities, the Waterbury Public Schools, and Naugatuck Valley Community College to support the class of 2025 across the City of Waterbury. This program aims to increase the number of students prepared for and ready to succeed in college and beyond!

GEAR UP summer programs help students improve their academic knowledge, spark new interests, explore potential career paths, learn about college, and help build new skill sets for future success.
