
Preparing to Scale

MISSION & VISION

Central Commons exists to revitalize a historic church building for the surrounding community.

We also help make other church buildings financially sustainable and accessible to new churches while serving the local community.

THE PROBLEM

We long for shalom, but we see alienation and fragmentation.


We believe the church is the primary means of bringing shalom to the world, but the church faces serious headwinds:

- 3,700 churches are closing annually in the United States
- 80% of American churches are in plateau or decline

OUR SOLUTION

The good news is that God's kingdom is advancing. New churches are starting all over the country, and we want to support them.

However, churches cannot find a place to meet, which complicates and distracts from mission.

Therefore, we help make church buildings financially sustainable and accessible to new churches while serving the local community.

This frees up resources and time for new churches to be on mission and serve their communities in new ways.



We measure our impact in three ways:

- Reach: Opportunities for the Gospel
- Results: Stories of Rescue
- Revenue: Sustainability through Programs

REACH

Our team and the pastors on our campus have regular contact (daily - weekly) with 500 non-churchgoers who come to Central Commons for community or care (the dog park, a recovery group, or one of the preschools). This is accelerating as the coffee shop has just opened and is gathering followers. If we include events, elections, concerts, etc., the number doubles.

Our approach on this campus has attracted global attention as we meet with churches from Dallas to Denver and Washington, D.C. to Paris, France. It is time to prepare to scale our efforts.



RESULTS


One 12-step attendee became a key volunteer before suffering a stroke. The community led by one of our staff has rallied to care for him and be his family, which has opened an opportunity to share the gospel with other members of that recovery group.

One employee comes from a recovery ministry that supports the formerly incarcerated. He is not only preaching the gospel but breaking racial and social barriers on campus.

One tenant, church attendee, and parent of a preschooler on campus recently took his own life. The whole campus has come together to care for the family. Believers and nonbelievers alike attended the memorial service in January.

This historic church building has become a gathering place where the surrounding community can come for friendship and care in the name of Jesus. Over the past 24 months, we have sought to build a sustainable ministry model that is able to offer worship space to churches at well below the market rate while at the same time creating meaningful interactions with our neighbors. This past year have we more than doubled our program revenue.






