Cultural heritage



Aboriginal people have a deep and continuous connection to the place now called Victoria, evidenced by the number of statewide cultural heritage places.

Greater Shepparton LGA has 567 registered cultural heritage places including Aboriginal historical places, burials, artefact scatters, earth features, low density artefact distributions, object collections, a quarry, scarred trees and shell middens.

Publicly known cultural heritage places include Daish's Paddock, Murchison Historical Aboriginal Graves, Murchison Protectorate Station, Undera Sand Hill (Burial Place) and Rumbalara Aboriginal Cooperative.

Throughout this document the term "Aboriginal" is used to refer to both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Use of the terms "Koori", "Koorie" and "Indigenous" are retained in the names of programs and initiatives, and, unless noted otherwise, are inclusive of both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.
















