Cultural heritage



Southern Grampians LGA has 355 registered cultural heritage places including artefact scatters, rock art, earth features, scarred trees, stone features, collections of objects, quarries, burials, historical places and shell middens.

Publicly known cultural heritage places include Koonongwotong Massacre Site at the Konongwootong Reservoir, Billimina Rock Shelter, Manja (Cave of Hands), Jananginjnjali (Emus Foot Shelter) and Drual Rock shelter.

Throughout this document the term "Aboriginal" is used to refer to both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Use of the terms "Koori", "Koorie" and "Indigenous" are retained in the names of programs and initiatives, and, unless noted otherwise, are inclusive of both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.


















Student distribution
