






When We **Started**

State of the Epidemic on 3/19

- COVID-19 will affect every city in the United States
- Every city should prepare for the possibility if not the likelihood of shortages of hospital beds and ventilators.
- Local action in every city sooner rather than later can save lives.



For Mayors

Instead of chasing after unproven therapies, mayors should support the gathering of high-quality evidence to find out what works.

For Mayors

Social distancing helps buy time for scientists to find new treatments like antibody therapy and prove that they work

For Mayors

Track data by race in your communities; Community engagement and outreach; Support access to testing and care; Develop services that permit isolation and quarantine

4/16



For Mayors

Weekly call with nursing homes; Help them obtain supplies to follow guidelines; Support robust response to infections.

4/23



For Mayors

Given potential for exponential spread again, go slow. As opening happens, watch multiple signals. A warning from Singapore.

For Mayors

Important to encourage people to seek medical attention for other life-threatening illnesses. Also: childhood vaccinations.





A Slow, **But Not Uniform Decline**


