The hunger of every human heart is to be happy. We want joy. We want goodness and pleasures to satisfy our weary hearts. When many think about God, they can believe that God does not care about their happiness and only cares about their holiness. But those two desires do not have to be at odds with one another. "In Your Presence" teaches us with rich, deep theological truths that it is in the presence of God—the holiest of all places—that we will be filled most fully with joy and freedom. This is where we get what our hearts are truly after.

The Spirit lets us see God and become more like Him.

For those who are apart from God, a veil remains over their hearts, preventing them from seeing the glory of God and keeping them from true joy and happiness. But when one turns to the Lord and comes into His presence, the Spirit frees us from the veil and allows us to see God for who He really is (2 Corinthians 3:14-18). This is manifested in the lyrics "Come Holy Spirit move in power / Come lift our eyes to meet Your gaze ..." As we all behold the glory of the Lord, we are being transformed into the same image.
