

You may qualify for SPBP if you:

- Are living in Pennsylvania
- Have a gross annual (individual or household) income of less than or equal to 500% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) or about \$72,900/year for a single person
- Have a diagnosis of HIV or AIDS
- · Are not eligible for medication coverage under the Medical Assistance (Medicaid) Program

Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program (RWHAP)

To qualify for coverage under the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program, you must:

- Have a diagnosis of HIV or AIDS
- Have a gross annual income of less than or equal to 500% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL)
- Have either no health insurance or your insurance does not pay for the care you need

Non-governmental programs can help pay for meds for uninsured & privately insured people

- PANfoundation.org: Support with co-pays for insured patients under 500% of FPL
- Patient Assistance Programs (PAP): Most drug manufacturers can help with co-pays

PrEP & nPEP Information

PrEP for HIV Prevention

Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP) is an HIV prevention option. It is a daily medication or an injection every other month that can reduce the chances of becoming infected with HIV by over 90% when taken as prescribed. There are two pills approved for use as PrEP: Truvada and Descovy. Truvada is for people at risk through sex or injection drug use. Descovy is for people at risk through sex. Apretude is the only injection approved for use as PrEP. If you would like to make a referral, a list of PrEP providers in Allegheny County is available at: www.aidsfreepittsburgh.org/prep

PEP for HIV Exposure

Post-Exposure Prophylaxis (PEP) is a 28-day course of antiretroviral medication (ART) that can be taken after a high-risk event (e.g. sex or shared needles) to prevent HIV seroconversion. PEP must be started as soon as possible to be effective—and always within 72 hours of a possible exposure. The preferred PEP regimen consists of tenofovir + emtricitabine (Truvada) plus either raltegravir or dolutegravir. Healthcare providers may prescribe PEP in cases of occupational exposure or non-occupational exposure (nPEP). Contact the UCSF Clinician Consultation Center (CCC) PEPline for consultation daily from 11 am-8pm (EST) or refer to their PEP Quick Guide for Occupational Exposures.

What
Happens
If I Test
Positive
for HIV?

Testing positive for HIV can make you feel uncertain about what to do next. The good news is that HIV is NOT a 'death sentence' and can be treated with medication. HIV medicines can't cure HIV, but they help people with HIV live long, healthy lives. The first thing a person should do after testing positive for HIV is to see a healthcare provider who knows how to treat HIV. The doctor will help to figure out which medications a person with HIV should take. These medications will help a person with HIV stay healthy and also prevent them from passing the virus on to someone else.
