With the enormous changes in our state economy compounded by the loss of big manufacturing employers, small business in our community will play an increasingly important role in the economic wellbeing of

It is no accident that our State Government has focussed its current and previous budgets on supporting small business; helping them to grow. While it's acknowledged we can do more, the cuts to a range of taxes that affect small business are most welcome.

Cutting taxes is only a small part of the story, as governments of all persuasions need to raise revenue to fund those works and services the community expects the state to provide. Good schools, hospitals, roads, etc.

In this budget, the State Government is investing millions of dollars to support small and start-up businesses. From the extension of the job accelerator program providing additional subsidies for employers who engage apprentices or trainees, the Future Jobs Fund to help small business get great ideas off the ground, to the infrastructure spend on schools, hospitals and roads are all designed to support small business and create new jobs.

These projects not only make good economic sense but deliver positive social outcomes - ensuring we all have access to good schools and health services.

While the budget seeks to reduce the burden on small business and ordinary hard working South Australians, the money has to come from somewhere. Despite all the fake outrage, the proposed levy on the super profits of the Big Banks is economically responsible and fair.

If the Big Banks can afford multi-million dollar salaries to its executives, it can pay a fraction more to support our community. The Federal Liberal Government has introduced a new tax on the Big Banks. Quite rightly, the Federal Labor Opposition has supported them.

The State Government has introduced a state based Big Bank tax, consistent with the Federal laws, but the Liberal Opposition is set to block it. Why is the Federal Liberal Big Bank tax a good one, and the State Labor Big Bank tax a bad one?

We need to support the battlers in our community, whether they are blue or whitecollar workers, mum and dad business owners, retirees or farmers on the land. The Big Banks should do the same!

# TONY PICCOLO CONTINUES FIGHT FOR LIGHT



Local Member of Parliament, Mr Tony Piccolo's desire to continue serving his local community has seen him successfully preselected as the ALP candidate for the seat of Light, for the next state election scheduled for March 2018.

"It is such an honour to be given the role of representing my community in State Parliament." Mr Piccolo said.

The decision was made at the ALP's state council meeting held in February. to again preselect him for the seat of Light which he has held since March

Mr Piccolo said despite holding a very marginal seat he had no desire, whatsoever, to seek a safer seat.

"I have only ever wanted to serve my local community, and I see the very small margin as a motivator, rather than a threat," Mr Piccolo said.

"In the end you have a duty to work hard for your community whether your margin is 2.8% like mine, or

"While the hours can be long and the

demands sometimes unforgiving, I consider myself blessed to have the opportunity to do the work I do,"

"It is such an honour to be given the job by my community, the role to represent them in State Parliament."

Starting his life in Naples, Italy as the son of poor parents who worked the land for a living, Mr Piccolo migrated to Australia with his family in March 1963, seeking a brighter future.

Mr Piccolo said his parents Raffaele and Maria Piccolo taught him the value of hard work, the importance of family and instilled in him a 'never give up' attitude.

"My priorities for the coming year and the following term, if re-elected, are to continue to work towards ensuring we have a safe and just community.

"I am keen to meet and engage with as many people as I can in the electorate to ensure I fully understand the changing needs of our community," Mr Piccolo said.

"Local people should not hesitate to contact me if they require any assistance, as no issue is too big or too small for my staff and me to assist them with," he said.

Local Member of Parliament, Tony Piccolo said that he has never given up hope for the electrification of the Gawler line.

"With the tender process for Stage 1 of the electrification underway, I was always hopeful that the remainder of the line would receive the funding needed to finish the project," Mr Piccolo said.

"We've committed more than \$200 million to our part of the project."

"I look forward to receiving advice from the Commonwealth that they will contribute to the project, which will support 135 jobs a year during construction.

Mr Piccolo said that while he was very happy with the projects for Light and its surrounds, he was disappointed that three major

projects he had been advocating for have not yet being funded.

"The Tulloch Road intersection must be fixed, along with the North Dalkeith/Main Road intersection.

"I have also been pushing for a Park'n'Ride to be constructed at the Tambelin Railway Station," he said.

Mr Piccolo believes that these projects would go a long way to reducing traffic congestion in the southern parts of Gawler.

"I will continue to knock on Ministers' doors and advocate for these projects to receive funding.

"I remain hopeful the State Government will find additional funding for these projects in during the financial year," he said.

### LOCALS ELECTRIFIED BY GAWLER RAIL ANNOUNCEMENT

The full electrification of the Gawler Rail Line is back on track with the State Government committing to its share of the cost in the 2017-18 State Budget handed down last week

The project requires matching funding from the Federal Government to guarantee the project goes ahead

Stage 1 of the Gawler Electrification is being fully funded by the State Government at a cost of \$152.5 million and will involve electrifying the rail line to Salisbury.

Stage 1 will support approximately 135 jobs per year during construction.

Local Member of Parliament, Tony Piccolo stated that this was a massive investment in rail for Gawler and the people of the Light electorate.

"I was disappointed when the electrification of the line was stalled after the Abbott Government withdrew their funding for the project in 2013," Mr Piccolo said.

"I have continued to fight for this project to be funded and for other improvements to our public transport network.

"The electrification of the Gawler rail line is a shovel ready project that will have an immediate and tremendous impact on our local economy," he said.

State Treasurer Tom Koutsantonis has written to Federal Treasurer Scott Morrison asking the Federal Government to provide its share of the funding for Stage 2 of the vital infrastructure project.

The State Budget allocates \$462.5 million for Stage 2 with South Australia seeking a 50/50 funding commitment from the Turnbull Government.

The electrification of the Gawler line will significantly increase capacity and deliver a faster, cleaner and more reliable service for the residents of the Light electorate.

In addition to the State Government's commitment to the electrification of the Gawler rail line, the State Budget has committed an additional \$22 million to services across the rail network.

This will see an increase in train frequency on all lines including the Gawler rail line.

Mr Koutsantonis stated that the benefits of investing in public transport flow right through the economy, reducing travel times for commuters, easing traffic congestion in the city, and creating jobs for South Australians during construction, upgrades and maintenance.

Families across Munno Para and Angle Vale are the big winners in the State Budget with the announcement of a new birth to year 12 school to be constructed in the Munno Para area.

The new school announced for the north will accommodate 1400 students, 100 specialschool students and a 55-place children's centre.

Local Member of Parliament, Tony Piccolo welcomed the news stating that he had written to the Education and Child Development Minister seeking the construction of an additional school in Adelaide's north last year.

"In my discussions with local

principals and parents it has become clear to me that an additional school in the Munno Para area is needed," Mr Piccolo said

"Rapid growth in the City of Playford has seen Mark Oliphant College reach its capacity much earlier than expected."

"The new school will alleviate pressure on other northern schools like Munno Para Primary School, Adelaide North Special School and Gawler & District College."

"Currently many children, who would otherwise have enrolled at MOC, are required to attend schools such as Munno Para Primary School and Gawler &

District College," he said.

The school will be built using a public/private partnership process like MOC, with the school being financed, designed, constructed and maintained by the private sector. This will allow the new principals and staff to focus on teaching, learning and care outcomes.

Treasurer Tom Koutsantonis said the new school will be a centre of educational excellence with state-of-the-art facilities to ensure that children can learn in the best possible environment.

"The school will also generate jobs for local businesses and trades people, and help stimulate the State's economy," he said.

The Education and Child Development Minister Susan Close stated it was more important than ever before that we invest in our schools to prepare children to be successful in a very different world to the one their grandparents grew up

"This thinking is at the heart of the State Government's direction for education and child development in South Australia," Ms Close said.

"It has been an exciting year for public education in South Australia. The benefits of the State Government's \$250 million STEM investment have been absolutely huge," she said.

# **SUPPORTING BUSINESS**

### STATE GRANT BOOSTS VALUE ADDING IN

The State Government has provided the Barossa Collaboration with a \$100,000 grant to help them kick start a number of projects that will promote the importance of value adding opportunities in the food and wine sectors in the Barossa and like regions.

The grant complements the \$50,000 allocated jointly by the Barossa and Light Regional Councils, through the Barossa RDA, to undertake an industry analysis to identify and address short, medium and long-term barriers for growth in business.

Barossa Council CEO, Mr Martin McCarthy said the industry analysis work advancing include current planning around opportunities for an effective Regional Planning Board, and regional governance structure. The Barossa Collaboration comprises representatives Tourism Barossa, Barossa Food, Barossa Grape and Wine, the Barossa RDA,

Light Regional and Barossa Council and is chaired by Barossa Businesswoman, Ms Jan Angas.

Over the past month the Collaboration has been working with the Member for Light, Mr Tony Piccolo to prepare an application for funding.

Mr Piccolo facilitated a series of roundtable discussions with the Collaboration members to bring together a range of ideas that could be developed into a series of projects that would deliver real outcomes on the ground.

Mr McCarthy said the The Barossa Council recognised the potential of this joint project from the outset, and has been working collaborative alongside the State Government, wine, tourism, food and arts industry representatives, RDA Barossa and Light Regional Council to develop an agreed project and seek funding to address opportunities aligned

with the Character Preservation area to drive economic development.

"We are confident this project will unlock economic growth potential and create economic benefit in the Character Preservation area including the food, wine, tourism sectors, and we welcome the State Government's leadership to progress the next phase of this regional initiative," Mr McCarthy said.

Mr Piccolo said the Barossa Collaboraion stakeholders have recognised complementary relationships exist between the region's key industry sectors and the tourism industry.

"The Barossa wine industry is recognised to be globally competitive. In supporting this position of economic strength, the continued development of the regional food and culinary tourism industries are anticipated to deliver greater economic returns to the region than the sum of its parts," Mr Piccolo said.

"In addition, development of the creative arts sector is anticipated to further complement these sectors."

The combined funds, with additional in-kind support from the two Councils, will undertake the following projects:

- Review of planning and licensing regulations applicable to artisan food production.
- Further development of the Barossa "Trust Mark" brand.
- The development of a "Barossa Prospectus" to attract investment in small and start-up food ventures (3), and creative arts ventures (4).
- Assessment of the effectiveness of the forthcoming "Be Consumed" Melbourne event as a marketing and industry development tool.
- Investigation into the establishment of a project of "culinary excellence".
- Local Government initiated rate limiter initiative.

# AN ADVOCATE FOR SOUTH AUSTRALIA'S SMALL BUSINESS

Small businesses in Light and across South Australia have a strong friend in the Industry Advocate.

The Industry Advocate Bill will provide the Industry Advocate with more power to recommend reforms to the state government to assist small business in winning Government contacts or subcontracts.

Local Member of Parliament, Tony Piccolo spoke in support of the Bill saying that the Bill gives the power to the Industry Advocate to investigate why competitive South Australian suppliers miss out on government contracts.

"The bill makes it very clear that this government is committed to putting small business at the centre of our State's economic policy," Mr Piccolo said.

"The new laws are designed to encourage the adoption of industry participation principles by local government."

"I think that is a very important function because one of the complaints I received from a local small business in my area is that some small businesses that win state government contracts, unfortunately do not even get invited to participate in the process for tenders for local government contracts.

"The small businesses I am talking about are not saying they should be given the contract automatically.

"They are saying that they would like to know when the local councils have contracts out and be invited to participate in the tender process."

"It is as simple as that, yet it does not happen."

"This policy, which is now a state government policy, encourages local government to do just that."

"It would be great to see local councils do what we are doing at a state level."

"That does not mean all local businesses will win that work, but at least it puts them in the running and, given their local knowledge, they may have a lower cost structure because they are local. They may be able to compete effectively for this business, which is very important.

"Small businesses in South Australia are the backbone of our economy and we need to ensure they remain competitive and be given an opportunity to compete on the open market," he said.

Mr Piccolo said he would be writing to all the Councils in his electorate to advise them of the new policy and seek their feedback.

# JOBS IN LIGHT ARE ACCELERATING

Businesses across the Light electorate embraced the Job Accelerate Grant Scheme that was announced in the 2016/17 State Budget.

More than 90 jobs were created since the scheme was announced across the Light electorate in a range of industries.

The Job Accelerator Grants Scheme has received a boosted in the 2017/18 State Budget with an additional \$5000 for apprentices and trainees.

The increase in the Grant for apprentices and trainees is a State Budget measure to boost employment among young people.

The expanded Grant means

businesses with payrolls between \$600,000 and \$5 million will receive up to \$15,000 for each apprentice above current staffing levels, while small businesses with payrolls up to \$600,000 will receive up to \$9000. The new Grant for apprentices and

trainees will be backdated to July 2016, meaning businesses that have already hired a new apprentice or trainee and registered them for a Job Accelerator Grant will be eligible for the increased payment. Local Member for Parliament, Tony Piccolo said that he was pleased about the 90 new jobs in the Light electorate across the financial services, civil construction, retail and professional services and

hospitality.

"I am extremely pleased by the reception of these grants from the business community and the number of new position that have been registered," Mr Piccolo said.

"The Grant will continue to provide up to \$10,000 to eligible business for each new workers employed above current staffing levels or \$4000 for small businesses."

"The Grant has helped Damien McGee, the licensee of The Exchange Hotel, to employee additional staff."

"If these grants end up being oversubscribed and costing the Budget more than planned I would be very happy because that would

### **MAJOR COURT WIN FOR PEOPLE LIVING WITH DISAB**

A recent Federal Court decision represents a major win for people living with a disability and their families.

Local Member of Parliament, Mr Tony Piccolo said the decision clarifies how a key criterion of the National Disability Insurance Scheme should be applied when determining the financial support plan for people under the scheme.

The financial support that a person living with disability receives is determined by what is "reasonable and necessary".

The Court found once a decision is made by the National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA) then those supports should be fully funded.

The case involved the funding of financial support for transport of a young man attending work and other activities.

Mr Piccolo said in this particular case the NDIA and family agreed that the provision of support for transport was "reasonable and necessary" but

the Agency then decided to only provide funding for 50% of the cost, then increased it to 75% upon

"The Court found that this decision did not reflect the clear intention of the law," Mr Piccolo said. "The NDIS was agreeing with families that a particular support was "reasonable and necessary" but then rationed the actual support."

"It is my understanding, that the Court found this action wrong at law."

"Families and the NDIA will still need to agree what is "reasonable and necessary" but once that agreement has been reached, this Court decision removes further uncertainly about the amount of financial support that should be

"While the decision dealt specifically with support for transport costs, I believe this has general application across all supports available under the scheme."

"I have been approached by a number of local families who have been concerned that while the NDIS creates new opportunities, the lack of transport support means that they could not take up those opportunities or they would need to quit their own jobs to support their children,"

Local mum, Mrs Gillian Taylor who contacted Mr Piccolo with her concerns, said this decision will make such a difference for [her daughter] Holly.

"She will be now be able to participate in work options and access a greater variety of programs," Mrs Taylor said.

Another local mum, Mrs Angela McFarlane agrees that while the decision has been a long time coming, this will now allow them [people living with disability] to access important services for continued learning and employment.

Mr Piccolo said the NDIS was an important reform introduced by the Gillard Labor Government to give people living with a disability a fair go and to ensure they were able to live a dignified life.

"This Court decision upholds that very clear goal of the scheme as envisaged by the (then) Federal Labor Government," Mr Piccolo said.

This decision is now subject to an appeal.

"I have been disappointed to hear that this case has been reopened. The certainty and relief these families had has now been taken away from them." Mr Piccolo

"It will also include a dedicated waiting room for children and families and a separate area for substance abuse patients."

"The State Labor Government understands the importance of delivering a high quality, modern health care system for all South Australians."

That is why Labor has upgraded every major hospital across the state, and our new Royal Adelaide Hospital will be one of the best hospitals in the world.

"People from the Gawler and surrounding districts who need to be transferred from Gawler Health Services to the Lyell McEwin for emergency experience treatment will shorter waiting times, in a much more comfortable environment," Mr Piccolo said.

We know access to local, modern health care facilities, which deliver high quality care for local families, is important.

This is part of a massive \$1.1 billion investment in our health system in the State Budget, ensuring our hospital infrastructure modern and cutting-edge.

"Expanding the Emergency Department will enable the Lyell McEwin to continue to respond to the needs of our growing local community.

"When the existing ED was opened 11 years ago it catered for about 35,000 patient visits, growing to over 70,000 in recent years."

"As part of the largest ever investment in health care, our local community will continue to access modern, world-class facilities and high quality health services - no matter where you live" he said.

Work on the upgrade is expected to start in mid 2018.

### **TEN YEARS SUGGESTS** A HEALTHY FUTURE

The Gawler Health Service 24 hour Accident and Emergency service and after hours, GP clinic provided by GP Inc recently celebrated its tenth birthday.

Dr Simon Hall, Chair of GP Inc said the origins of the service "says much about the collegial rather than competitive nature of the local GPs".

### NDIS ROLLS OUT THROUGHOUT THE LIGHT ELECTORATE

Adults started entering the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) in South Australia from Saturday 1 July 2017.

Local Member of Parliament, Mr Tony Piccolo said the NDIS is the biggest social reform since Medicare, introducing a new way of providing disability services that gives people with disability more choice about the support they receive.

Children up to age 14 started entering the NDIS under a trial in South Australia in 2013, followed by

young people aged 15 to 17 in January this year.

Mr Piccolo said between July 2017 and April 2018, adults

with disability around the State will start joining the scheme, based on their geographic area. Northern Adelaide, the Barossa, Light and Lower North are the first regions to enter the full scheme.

"South Australia was one of the first states to sign up to the NDIS and, at full rollout, the State

Government will be investing \$723 million annually into the scheme," Mr Piccolo said.

"More than 32,000 South Australians will receive services under the full scheme – increased from

around 17,000 pre-NDIS."

Jobs in the South Australian disability sector are expected to double from about 6000 to about 12,000.

Mr Piccolo said while the Commonwealth is responsible for the rollout of the NDIS through the National Disability Insurance Agency, the South Australian Government is deeply invested in the scheme.

"We'll be working to ensure that South Australians with disability have the smoothest possible transition to the scheme."

"The South Australian Government is supporting a range of skills and training programs to prepare

people for a broad variety of roles."said Mr Piccolo.

Mr Piccolo said Feros Care is partnering with the NDIS to provide Local Area Coordination (LAC) to help more people live healthy, fulfilling and connected lives.

"People living with disability have a lot to offer a prospective employer and there exist a number of programs to support them getting into an appropriate workplace," Mr Piccolo said.

"The exhibition and seminar was about showcasing new opportunities for people living with a disability, informing people of the new career opportunities and how small businesses can provide services to the sector."

"The exhibition and seminar was very successful with over 200 students, adults and exhibitors taking part on the day," he said.

The Expo and Seminar was broken into two parts with an afternoon session designed for senior school students and the evening session for the general public.

### **NEW REGO RULES** ARE A'CLASSIC'

New rules that simplify the conditional registration scheme for historic vehicles came into effect, 1 July 2017.Local Member of Parliament, Mr Tony Piccolo who has advocated on behalf of local historic car enthusiasts, said the simplified rules will make the lives of owners of the 15,000 vehicles registered under the 90 day limited use scheme much

Mr Piccolo said since announcing plans to change conditional registration last year, there has been an overwhelmingly positive response from the South Australian motoring community.

"Changing this scheme will help to preserve South Australia's motoring heritage by reducing costs and red tape for car enthusiasts," Mr Piccolo said.

"Many of these vehicles haven't been registered and driven, and have sat in sheds and garages because minor modifications meant they were not eligible for cheaper conditional registration which allows a vehicle to be driven up to 90 days a year."

"As most of these vehicles are prized collector items with huge value to the owner, they are usually driven on weekends and at infrequent times throughout the year."

To fully register a 6-cylinder vehicle in South Australia the cost can be up to \$846 while the Club Registration scheme offers 90 days use for eligible vehicles for \$90 per year.

The changes will remove red tape from the existing scheme designed to:

- · Provide flexibility to allow owners to improve the ride, handling and safety of these classic vehicles, as well as make cosmetic enhancements
- Move away from a fixed cut-off manufacture date of 1979 to a rolling 30-year vehicle age
- Remove bureaucratic requirements for motoring clubs to undertake vehicle inspections, reducing the administrative burden on these groups

• Reduce limitations which ban left-hand drive vehicles with safety improvements such as updated braking systems.

This is yet another example of the State Labor Government's commitment to reducing red tape as part of the Simplify Day reforms.

Mr Piccolo said one of the largest car clubs accessing the scheme is the Light's own Gawler Veteran Vintage & Classic Vehicle Club with over 500 cars currently registered under Club Registration.

Transport and Infrastructure, Hon Minister Stephen Mullighan MP said these common sense changes mean that car enthusiasts can make modifications to their vehicles, such as cosmetic and safety improvements, without forcing them off the road and into the garage.

"Thousands of previously unused vehicles are also now expected to join the scheme which will also support tourism events such as car runs, shows and concourse displays," said Mr Mulligan.

Gawler Veteran Vintage & Classic Vehicle Club Registrar Mr Peter Tooth said the Gawler Veteran Vintage & Classic Vehicle Clubs members and committee are very excited to see these changes to Club Registration.

"We hope the increased flexibility of the scheme will boost our membership base and increase our membership to a broader range of enthusiasts, particularly to owners of modified cars and younger classic cars from the 1980's."

"The changes also bring simplified procedures for our club, with over 500 cars registered under the scheme; this is pleasing news to our hard working committee."

"We expect an even greater turn out to the annual Gawler Swap Meet this September and believe the recent changes will attract more vehicles to also attend and form a display for the Gawler Community," said Mr Tooth.

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### NORTHERN ADELAIDE TO BECOME PREMIER'FOOD BOWL' IN AUSTRALIA

A commitment by the State Tony Piccolo who was present at Government to invest \$110 million to help expand the Northern Adelaide Plains irrigated food production area could make it the premier "food bowl" in Australia.

Premier Jay Weatherill, joined by Minister for Agriculture, Food and Fisheries Leon Bignell and Minister for Water Ian Hunter, announced the State Government has submitted an application to the Federal Government's National Water Infrastructure Development Fund (NWIDF) to help fund the project.

the announcement said the project would create 3700 jobs in and around Adelaide's northern suburbs and add more than \$500 million a year to the State's economy.

"If the application is successful, the State Government will invest \$110 million in the project - through SA Water – and is seeking a \$45.6 million funding commitment from the Federal Government," Mr Piccolo

"It would deliver an additional 12 gigalitres (GL) a year of recycled water Local Member of Parliament, Mr suitable for agricultural use from the

Bolivar Waste Water Treatment Plant - an increase of 60 per cent - to help expand the State's irrigated agriculture industry."

"New infrastructure would be built to deliver this recycled water to industry, with capacity to increase to 20 GL a year as demand and access to interstate and overseas markets grow."

"The State Government will continue to work with proponents, industry groups and growers in the region to ensure a fair, equitable and transparent process, and determine how they can participate in the additional recycled water allocation which delivers the greatest state benefit."

The announcement has been welcomed the Horticulture Coalition of South Australia, HortEx Alliance, SA Produce, and AUSVEG SA.

Mr Angelo Demasi, CEO of SA Produce said "We hope this investment will provide our local growers with much needed high grade affordable water which can expand our production volumes for export markets."

Jordan Brooke-Barnett, AusVeg National Manager, Public Affairs said, "Horticulture already contributes \$1 billion in farmgate value to our state per annum and can be a leader in driving economic growth in Adelaide's North. The growers of the Northern Adelaide Plains region will be able to put these water resources to use providing additional jobs."

### PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY SEEKS SUBMISSIONS FROM PRIMARY PRODUCERS

SA primary producers and other people in the food processing industry have until the end of June to make submissions on an issues paper released by a Parliamentary inquiry into organisational and market structures that prevent them receiving a fair deal.

Parliament's Economic Finance Committee is undertaking an inquiry recommended by the Member for Light, Mr Tony Piccolo, into the current public policy settings for the organisational and market structures of the horticultural, viticultural and agricultural sectors and associated processing.

Mr Piccolo said the inquiry has adopted a two-stage process to ensure the Committee has a good understanding of the issues it needs to tackle.

"During the first stage of the process, we asked interested parties to submit details of issues they believe should be investigated through the inquiry," Mr Piccolo

"The Committee has now published an issues paper that outlines the matters that it is investigating, and are now inviting new or further submissions, including oral evidence in person."

Mr Piccolo said the Committee is planning a series of regional meetings where producers will be encouraged to provide evidence in person.

"I am looking forward to hearing from primary producers about how we can make the industries more competitive and address the imbalance between producers and big players, particularly in the retail sector," Mr Piccolo said.

"The enquiry will be looking at all the various barriers that exist along the supply chain from farm gate to plate.

"I will be particularly interested in hearing how we can give producers a greater say in the supply chain, increase competition and grow the

"I am keen to explore how producer, market gardener, worker co-operatives consumer could be utilised to create a more financially sustainable sector," he said.

Primary Producers South Australia (PPSA) have welcomed the inquiry and suggested viticulture and grain markets could see particular benefits.

Chairman of PPSA Rob Kerrin has been quoted on the ABC as saying a look into supply chains was valuable.

"If the committee are willing to look into the supply chain, I think there will be a fair bit of interest across the state in all industries," Mr Kerin told the ABC.

### STATE GOVERNMENT IMPROVES **MOBILE COVERAGE FOR WASLEYS**

Wasleys will have improved mobile the tower will have increased phone and internet services following a State Government decision to make a significant contribution towards construction of a new tower in the area.

Local Member of Parliament, Mr Tony Piccolo said the State Government will provide \$115,517 towards the erection of a tower by Optus in the area.

"The State Government decision to locate a tower in Wasleys is based on high safety risk ratings for the locality, an area where Country Fire Service volunteers said blackspots impacted on firefighting during the 2015 Pinery bushfire, "Mr Piccolo

"The agreement was reached with Optus after \$2 million committed by the State Government towards the Federal Government's Mobile Black Spots Program was not fully utilised," he said.

The new base station means that residents, schools and businesses within a 10-kilometre radius of 4G coverage, with better call experiences and faster, more reliable mobile internet use.

Science and Information Economy Minister Kyam Maher said Wasleys was identified as a high priority due to its high fire risk, which sadly we saw play out during the Pinery fire in 2015.

"Despite the concerns raised by residents and emergency services in the wake of the Pinery fire, the Federal Government elected not to support the construction of a base station in the area," Minister Mayor

"I congratulate Optus in winning this tender, which supports the State Government's commitment to ensuring South Australians have access to the digital economy for their, and the state's, economic and social benefit," he said.

Mr Piccolo said the tower will provide greater mobile coverage to the region, increasing the safety of residents and tourists,

while also providing flow on benefits to local small businesses and the school.

"The people of Wasleys have called for improvements to mobile reception for many years and this shows that while the Federal Government may not be listening, the State Government is," Mr Piccolo said.

### PICCOLO WELCOMES PLAYFORD RATING POLICIES 'RETHINK'

The City of Playford have backed down on proposed controversial changes to their rating policies in the face of a ratepayer backlash.

Hundreds of local people jammed the Civic Centre on June 13 to hear councillors acknowledge that the proposals 'needed to be taken back to the drawing board' and a more genuine engagement process undertaken before any changes could be re-considered.

The decision mirrors representations made to the Council by local Member of Parliament, Mr Tony Piccolo who has welcomed the change of heart by elected members.

Mr Piccolo wrote to Mayor Glenn Docherty and councillors in May asking the Council "to rethink" the proposed changes to their rating policies following representations he received from angry ratepayers in the City of Playford Council area.

Mr Piccolo said the proposed changes would have seen some market gardeners paying double or even triple their current rate, while homeowners in the new Playford Alive area would have also be heavily hit.

"Properties with a capital value of more than about \$250,000 will incur rate increases, in addition to any general rate increases," Mr Piccolo warned in his letter.

"The proposed rate increases would certainly have had a negative financial impact on residents in the Munno Para, Munno Para West and Munno Para Downs areas." Mr Piccolo said.

In his letter, Mr Piccolo said that based on his own experience as an elected member, he urged the Council to engage with the community further and explore a broader range of rating policy models that may be more acceptable to a majority of ratepayers.

"While this may result in a delay in any policy implementation, it may be a small price to pay compared to the ongoing criticism Council is likely to receive from a community that believes the 'consultation' process has been tokenistic.

Mr Piccolo said that such a massive increase in rates would be too difficult for some landowners to absorb into their businesses in one year.

"I have received numerous representations from ratepayers regarding the proposals the Council was considering to adopt," Mr Piccolo said.

"Primary producers would have potentially be hit the hardest by the policy proposal," Mr Piccolo said.

"I can understand that Council is keen to

promote economic activity by reducing rates on 'commercial' properties, but I am at a loss to understand why 'primary producers' are not treated as small businesses.

"Primary Production properties currently attract a lower rate, however, the enormous increase proposed by Option 1 would have made it very difficult for some primary producers to absorb, and this can only result in lower employment in the horticulture sector.

"Primary Producers in the Munno Para West/Downs area and Angle Vale would have been hit by these increases.

"In my correspondence to Mayor Docherty, I noted that while a number of residential properties would have received some relatively minor rate relief, a number of residents would have experienced quite significant rate increases."

# REVIEW LOCAL COUNCIL BOUNDARIES SAYS LOCAL MP

The existing boundaries of Councils in the local area should be reviewed, according to Local Member of Parliament Mr Tony Piccolo.

Speaking in State Parliament in support of a new law to encourage the review of Council boundaries, Mr Piccolo stated that the existing boundaries of Gawler should be allowed to be modified to incorporate parts of the Light Regional and Barossa Councils.

"This is nothing new; I have been saying this since I was on the council many years ago, but the existing legal framework prevents that from occurring," Mr Piccolo said.

"We need a system that encourages councils to be able to review that also provides some certainty,"

"Some of the existing boundaries go back to the horse and buggy days. "Communities have grown over time and council boundaries should reflect the new communities of interest."

"The essence of this bill is about ensuring that council boundaries reflect those community boundaries."

"That is very important. That is important from a planning point of view, in other words planning for your community."

"That includes things like physical planning, transport corridors, transport routes and planning for delivery of services."

"This bill will enable that to happen."

"It should not be amalgamation for the sake of amalgamation either."

Mr Piccolo said he believes "boundaries need to be changed to make sure we have the best possible opportunities for communities to engage with their local government authority, to provide the best use of limited resources in that community and also to ensure that the boundaries provide an opportunity for those communities to plan effectively,"

"In the case of Gawler for example, I am not talking out of school when I say that most people think Hewett is part of the Gawler community,"

"The boundaries of the Councils in the local area should be reviewed,"

"That is also true for the Barossa; there are parts of the Barossa Council between Light and the Barossa that should change to ensure that the Barossa Council reflects the true Barossa region,"

"It would be silly to say there is no room for change,"

"Importantly, this proposal puts it in the hands of local government and an independent commission. It is not for us [parliament] to decide; it will be decided at the local level, which is very important,"

"I also support the voluntary nature of the proposed law."

"This bill goes a long way to enabling those sorts of boundary changes to take place, enabling those councils that believe things could be improved in regions to take place."

"The critical factor in deciding whether council boundaries ought to be changed or amalgamated is the issue of how communities can be best served."

"This is an issue that deserves attention and debate, and that simply has not happened in a formal, constructive manner for nearly 20 years." he said.

# CHURCH FOUNDATION NOT SET IN STONE

St George's Anglican Church on Church Hill celebrated the 170th anniversary of the laying of the foundation stone by Governor Robe on March 4.

The Church has had a chequered history, having been demolished, rebuilt and modified a number of times over the years.

To mark the occasion, Local Member of Parliament Mr Tony Piccolo met with parish priest, Fr Simon Bailey.

To their surprise, neither of them could locate the foundation stone.

Mr Piccolo said it would be great to hear from anybody who may know the current location of the foundation stone, or its history, if it no longer exists.

"While knowing the history of the foundation stone would be great, we should not forget the important role that the Churches have played in the local community," Mr Piccolo said.

Fr Bailey said that the six months that he has been the Parish Priest at the Anglican churches of St. George and The Transfiguration seem like a drop in the ocean compared to the 170 years that Anglicans have gathered on Church Hill for regular worship. "Given the geography of the area, a hilly rise above the confluence of two rivers merging in to one and then heading towards the ocean, it wouldn't surprise me at all if Church Hill has been a place of spiritual gathering for many, many more years than the relatively short time that Anglican, Roman Catholic and Lutheran Christians have been here," Fr Bailey said.

"There is a deep aura and sense of 'the other' around this hill-top that makes it a very significant place indeed and it is a privilege to be part of a long history and carrying that history on into the future." He said.

Mr Piccolo said Nathalie Johnstone, a former Trinity College Gawler student has been undertaking some research, in a volunteer capacity, into the history of significant events in the local community.

"We would love to hear from people who can fill in some of the gaps," added Mr Piccolo.

### **SMALL BIZ TAX SLASH**

RED TAPE and payroll tax will be slashed for small businesses, giving them the confidence to thrive and expand.

The State Government will legislate a new permanent payroll tax of 2.5 per cent for businesses with payrolls between \$600,000 and \$1 million.

The new payroll tax rate replaces the temporary small business payroll tax rebate, locking in discounts of up to \$9800 each year and removing the red tape of the rebate scheme.

Payroll tax discounts for businesses with payrolls between \$1 million and \$1.5 million will also be extended, benefiting another 1300 businesses in this bracket.

Under the current temporary payroll tax rebate, discounts phase out for businesses with payrolls between \$1 million and \$1.2 million.

Since 2004, the State Government has cut the payroll tax rate down to 4.95 per cent, and increased the taxfree threshold to \$600,000.

Treasurer Tom Koutsantonis said the new permanent tax rate would be a boon for small business owners.

"Small businesses are the biggest employers in South Australia and are crucial to creating jobs in our economy," he said.

"By permanently cutting payroll taxes for small business, we can give them the freedom and confidence to expand and take on more staff.

"We are also extending payroll tax discounts to about 1300 businesses with payrolls up to \$1.5 million, enhancing South Australia's credentials as an attractive, low-cost place to operate.

"With payroll tax relief and Job Accelerator Grants available for each new employee, now is a great time for businesses to consider growing and employing more staff."

### **BIGBANK\$** TO PAY UP

BIG banks made \$30 billion in profit last year - and now they are going to pay some of that back to the community.

The State Government has announced a major bank levy which will raise about \$370 million over the forward estimates period.

Only the five major banks will be liable, meaning smaller banks will not be

Treasurer Tom Koutsantonis said the banking sector was dramatically undertaxed - and it was time for that to change.

"Major banks make super profits and they make those profits on the mortgages of hardworking South Australians," he said.

"We are putting South Australians first by supporting growing industries that will create jobs for South Australians, and this measure will help raise the revenue we need to drive those initiatives.

"The profits of the big banks are large - in the last year alone the five banks have collectively made profits of about \$30 billion after tax.

"They can and should contribute more to economic growth and job creation in this state.

"This levy does not apply to mortgages or deposits under \$250,000, so there is no justification for the banks to pass on the costs to those customers."

#### **SEEING DOUBLE ON** MAIN SOUTH ROAD

THE DRIVE south of Seaford is about to become a lot easier with the duplication of Main South Rd.

The budget is in surplus - and those extra funds are being used to make a raft of improvements around the state, including the duplication of Main South Rd between Seaford and Sellicks Beach.

The \$305 million first stage duplication of the stretch - which includes significant works to duplicate the Pedler Creek Bridge at Seaford Rise - will make the trip along the stretch faster and easier.

The duplication is part of the record investments in transport infrastructure in southern Adelaide.

The investments include the duplication of the Southern Expressway, extension and electrification of the Seaford train line and the beginning of the Darlington upgrade and Oaklands Crossing upgrade.

Treasurer Tom Koutsantonis said the upgrade was important for the people of southern Adelaide and the Fleurieu Peninsula.

"The State Government is continuing its record investment in infrastructure, delivering significant projects - and jobs - for the people of South Australia," he said.

For the Southern Expressway duplication, about 60 per cent of the 1800 workers came from the south.

THE STATE Government is set to announce the successful tenderer for Australia's largest battery, part of its plan to create more affordable, reliable and clean energy for South Australians.

Today's State Budget fully funds the Government's energy plan, whilst maintaining healthy budget surpluses.

Since the State's energy plan was released in March, substantial progress has been made in implementing the reforms, which are the most significant since the Liberal government sold ETSA in 1999.

Premier Jay Weatherill says the plan is about taking charge of South Australia's energy future.

"Our plan will deliver reliable, affordable and clean power and ensure more of the State's power is sourced, generated and controlled here in South Australia," he said.

"South Australians have been let down by a broken national energy market that puts profits before people. We're putting people first. Our plan will restore security and put downward pressure on prices."

"The tender processes to install Australia's largest battery and a stateowned back-up generator have received considerable interest from across Australia and around the world."

The plan also highlights South Australia's ongoing global leadership in renewable energy, with the 100MW grid-scale battery on track to be in place by December 2017, as part of a \$150 million renewable energy fund focused on the next generation of renewable technology.

# YOUR BIG COMMUNITY FUND



From Aberfoyle Park to Wallaroo, Fund My Neighbourhood will support local communities to build the projects that are important to them

ONE of the world's largest community funds is coming to a street near you.

Premier Jay Weatherill has committed to a \$40 million Fund My Neighbourhood program, which will give all South Australians the power to decide how to improve their streets and suburbs.

Get your ideas ready, as Fund My Neighbourhood will be launched next month.

Once launched, the community will be able to nominate projects that will go live on the Fund My Neighbourhood website for the community to vote on.

The Premier is calling on communities to nominate a project that is important to their neighbourhood.

"If there's something you want fixed or something you think your neighbourhood deserves – you will be able to nominate that project. You are the experts," he said.



### WE ALL HAVE A ROLE TO PLAY IN COMMUNITY SAFETY

Emergency Services in the local region recently joined forces with the Member for Light, Mr Tony Piccolo, to host a Community Safety Day to help people prepare for natural disasters and other major disruptive events.

Mr Piccolo said the focus of the Community Safety Day was to provide information to local people about how they can reduce the risk of any harm to themselves and their families by making sure they are prepared for an emergency.

Dalkeith CFS joined the Concordia CFS, the Kapunda and Salisbury SES and local MFS to provide information at the Gawler Central Shopping Centre on Saturday 8 April 2017.

"People can take simple measures to make their

homes safer from fire and storm events. We all have a role to play in community safety, and being informed is a key element," Mr Piccolo said.

"Fires involving electrical air cooling equipment had caused nearly \$1.5 million damage in South Australia this past summer."

Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) and Country Fire Service (CFS) firefighters have responded to 12 fires across the state caused by air conditioners, evaporative coolers and fans, leaving \$1.429m in property damage since 1 December.

With winter approaching householders should check and consider changing their smoke alarm batteries. For homes that do not have working smoke alarms fitted,

the risk of a significant house fire increases.

The CFS say that most people are not aware that when you go to sleep, so does your sense of smell

"This is why it's so critical to have a working smoke alarm to give you the time you need to escape a house fire.

"Extreme or severe storms can bring heavy rain, strong wind, hail, thunder and lightning."

The State Emergency services (SES) recommend that householders develop an emergency plan in case they need to evacuate.

Mr Piccolo thanked the Gawler Central Shopping Centre for making their premises available for this important community event.

### **SES IN S.O.S. FOR GAWLER**

On the eve of National Volunteer's Week, the State Emergency Service (SES) announced that they are exploring the feasibility of opening a unit in the Gawler area.

Local Member of Parliament, Mr Tony Piccolo said that he has been working with the Salisbury SES Unit to explore the feasibility of opening a 'satellite unit' in Gawler under their auspices.

"A satellite unit would be stationed in Gawler but would be managed through the Salisbury Unit," Mr Piccolo said.

"Having a local presence would be very important in attracting new volunteers to the service."

"The existing units [Salisbury and Kapunda SES] do a great job in helping protect local people, but more volunteers are needed and a permanent presence in Gawler would help."

The feasibility of opening in Gawler would, to some extent, be determined by the level of interest

shown by the local community to volunteer.

"The SES is a great organisation to volunteer for and there are a range of activities volunteers could be involved in."

"No experience in emergency or rescue services is required to join the SES as a volunteer as they provide a very comprehensive training program."

"Volunteering for the SES is a great way of becoming involved in the community, and also helps you keep fit."

Research has shown that people who volunteer in their communities experience better health and quality of life. Volunteering provides opportunities to be connected to other people in their community.

"Lifelong friendships are often built through volunteering."

"This is an S.O.S. (Strengthen Our Service) call for volunteers in the Gawler area," he said.

"I was pleased to deliver the first box goods to UCare on Thursday, 29 June, less than two weeks after the launch of the program."

"UCARE Gawler have kindly agreed to be a distribution point for the items"

"Churches and other community organisations have also become collection and distribution points as the project develops," he said.

# FREEMASONS FOUNDATION CENTRE FOR MENS HEALTH WELCOMES GOVERNOR

The Freemasons Foundation Centre for Men's Health (FFCMH) was visited by His Excellency, the Honourable Hieu Van Le AC on Monday 24 April.

The visit was an opportunity for the Governor of South Australia to speak with students and researchers about their research into a range of men's health issues including depression, prostate cancer, chronic disease, health services and vulnerable populations.

Professor Gary Wittert, Director of the Centre, officially welcomed His Excellency, and used his speech to announce three new members to the Board of Patrons: Mr Andrew Lathlean JP, Chairman of the Freemasons Foundation, recently retired from strategic marketing, advertising and media, Dr Neil Jensen, General Practitioner and past Assistant Grand Master of Freemasons SA/NT, and the Hon Rev Dr Lynn Arnold AO, Anglican priest and former Premier of South Australia.

Prof Wittert highlighted that the programs of the Centre address some of the biggest health issues facing men which include Type 2 diabetes, cardiovascular disease, depression, prostate cancer, and other lower urinary tract, sexual, and reproductive disorders.

Prof Wittert noted that these are conditions that are pivotal to address, to ensure healthy and productive ageing and to mitigate the direct and indirect costs of an elderly, frail and dependent population. He reiterated that a sex-specific approach is crucial to achieve this. Also our programs focus on the most disadvantaged men, which are those living in rural and remote areas and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men.

He went on to say that the researchers in the centre continue to make significant contributions at a time when it has never been more difficult to obtain research funding and where ensuring the ongoing integrity and productivity of the Centre is of paramount concern.

He stated "Nevertheless, as we enter the second decade of operation we will face, with the encouragement and support of our Patrons, and hopefully the ongoing support of the Foundation and the University, the challenge of broadening our activities to young men's health, fathering, and closer engagement with industry to promote healthier work forces."

Member for Light, Mr Tony Piccolo also attended the Governor's visit.

"Men's health is an issue I am passionate about. It is wonderful to see the Freemason's Foundation giving this issue the attention it deserves." he said.

"I was highly impressed by the range of topics and the knowledge of the researchers who I spoke to" he added.

More can and should be done to promote and celebrate our Constitution Day, according to local Member of Parliament, Mr Tony Piccolo.

Mr Piccolo said Constitution Day was effectively the day the Australian colonies were presented with Australia's "birth certificate".

"On 9 July 1900, Queen Victoria signed into law the Commonwealth of Australia Act (UK) and the Federation of Australia was created," Mr Piccolo said.

"This act of the UK parliament gave effect to the Australian Constitution on 1 January 1901, uniting the Australian colonies.

"It is unfortunate that most Australians are not aware of the significance of the day nor the process or the journey the Australian colonies undertook to federate our continent into one nation.

"Previously each colony had its own defence force, customs control and different rail gauges.

"Federation brought us together, laying the foundation for modern Australia," he said.

In an endeavour to increase the awareness of Constitution Day, Mr. Piccolo held a

special seminar at Parliament House for a group of year 11 legal studies students from Xavier College.

The students celebrated the day with a tour of the South Australian Parliament and talks from Associate Professor Hayden Manning, the Chief Justice of the South Australian Supreme Court, His Honour Chris Kourakis, and the Deputy Premier and Attorney-General, the Hon John Rau MP.

Mr Piccolo said that the three speakers provided the students with the opportunity to hear about the three arms of government, from people who actively participate in the different areas.

"The conversations I had with a few of the students over lunch really showed a deep desire for a greater understanding of our democratic system of government," Mr Piccolo said.

"I see Constitution Day being a unifier of the Australian people, not just for those who were here at the turn of the century, but for all Australians, whether they came here 40,000 years ago, or more recently, and regardless of their country or origin," he said.

### HISTORIC WALK HONOURS THE LIFE AND TIMES OF EH COOMBE

A chance meeting between Gawler Mayor, Karen Redman and Mrs Patricia Booth at a History Month event at St Peters two years ago has led to a major historical project that honours the life and times of the first Labor Member of Parliament for the Gawler area.

On 6 April, the EH (Ephraim Henry) Coombe historic walk was launched by Mayor Redman in the presence of the descendants of Mr Coombe, including Mrs Booth and Ms Helen Hennessey who has coordinated the project.

Local Member of Parliament, Mr Tony Piccolo said EH Coombe was a Labor Member of Parliament from 1915-18.

"EH Coombe was highly

respected by the community for the enormous contribution he made, not only as a Member of Parliament, but also as editor of the local Bunyip newspaper for about 24 years," Mr Piccolo said.

"EH used his influence in the community to champion many social causes in an endeavour to create a fairer and more just society."

Mr Coombe initially entered parliament as a member for the Liberal Union, but when it merged with the more conservative parties, he fell out of favour, and joined the then fledgling, United Labor Party. The United Labour Party was the forerunner to the modern Australian Labor Party and

opened a sub-branch

Gawler on 13 November 1908. His social causes included temperance, votes for women, and during WW1, the defence

and during WW1, the defence of people with a German heritage. "Controversially, he opposed

"Controversially, he opposed conscription and the closure of Lutheran schools," said Mr Piccolo.

"EH was certainly a man who believed in a just and fair go for all," he said.

The historic walk around Gawler and Willaston is about 4 kms in length and takes approximately 1.5 hours to cover.

The walk includes places where EH Coombe had a direct or indirect association, including local churches, schools and

places where he worked or did business.

Mr Piccolo said EH Coombe's contribution to the wellbeing of the Gawler and Barossa community is not well known and this walk will hopefully

change that.

There is a publication planned to be launched in August 2017. A compilation of the research documents from this project to be lodged with the Gawler Heritage Collection.

# REMEMBERING THE SOUTH PARA RESERVOIR

For members of the commitee, the reservoir has a special place in their hearts with many of them living at the workers camps during the reservoir's construction. Founder of the committee and local historian, Martin Johnson, was born in Gawler in 1950 and spent the first twelve years of his life at the camp.


"I loved it out there. The people and the kids. The smell of the trees and the sound of the birds.

"The camp was a great place to learn about different cultures too." he said.

Many of the 200 workmen accomodated at the working camp were immigrants who had left Europe at the end of the Second World War.

The resevoir was opened in 1958 by, then Premier of South Australia, Sir Thomas Playford.

To commemorate the 60th anniversary, Mr Johnson will have his book 'Twenty Houses', containing stories from the workers who lived at the camps during the construction of the South Para reservoir, reprinted.

"The book also reveals an important part of SA's social and cultural development, in this instance, dating from 1948-58 when both our young local men and migrant labourers were able to find secure employment and establish a better life to raise their families." he said.

The committee also recently met with Matthew Green, Stakeholder Relationship Lead Consultant at SA Water.

"We are delighted to have had an opportunity to meet Martin and the Reservoir Committee at an early stage to discuss South Para Reservoir's 60th anniversary milestone." he said.

"It's clear the Reservoir Committee is an enthusiastic group of volunteers, dedicated to marking this anniversary in a fitting way.

"We will continue the conversation with the Committee as we explore options to mark the occasion." he said.

### THE GAWLER NATIONAL TRUST MUSEUM



The Gawler Branch of the National Trust was founded as a branch of the state body in February 1966 by a group of histroy enthusiasts who first met in the old Institute Building and later, in the old telegraph office and School of Mines at 59 Murray Street next door to the old post office and clocktower.

The museum grew around an eclectic collection from generously donated or loaned items of historical significance - some of it quite unique to the history of Gawler. The early volunteers had a mammoth job as the building was in poor repair and hard to keep clean.

In 2001 there was a fresh intake of new members who brought much needed energy and ideas to the museum. This group of both old and new members rejuvenated the collection and attracted several important grants to refurbish the museum and install some very important exhibitions that are unique to the history of this area.

These include:

- A magnificent entrance hall mural painted by well-known artist, George Aldrige. The mural depicts the meeting of the two rivers showing a Kaurna encampment and recognising traditional indigineous ownership and continuing importance of our region to the First People.
- An exhibition of the post-WWII migrant camp at Willaston, now home to the football club. This was extensively researched by Jeff Turner who did numerous oral and written histories with local people who lived there. His research has now been made into a book and is available from the museum.

A comprehensive exhibition about the Timer Clothing Factory, once on the corner of Murray Street and Adelaide Road where the Steinborner Car Sales now is. This factory flourished from the 1940's - 70's and employed hundreds of local people during that time. Its clothing sold all over Australia.

- A detailed exhibition about the many Foundries that existed in Gawler in the late 19th and early 20th centuries where locomotives, cast iron lace, mining equipment and agricultural machinery were produced.
- A mockup of a 19th century kitchen and laundry as well as an old shop with goods, scales and measurments going back to the pre-metric days.

-An exhibition showcasing 19th century pasttimes, furniture, musical instruments, and clothing of a past era.

One of the museum's important new initiatives has been an outreach to local schools and this has proved very successful with the children enjoying many 'hands-on' interactive activities. As well as learning a great deal about what it was like to live in the Gawler of the past.

The branch also runs successful bus tours of Gawler and surrounding areas that look at the various aspects of local history. We are currently developing further outreach programs from the museum to involve a wider audience.

# **NEW PONY JUMP MAKES A BIG SPLASH**

The new water jump at the Gawler River Pony Club (GRPC) grounds in Hillier has made a big splash on its first day.

Local Member Mr Tony Piccolo and GRPC Treasurer Jackie Zekov jointly officially opened the jump, in front of club members, families and friends.

Following the ribbon cutting ceremony, members were quick to try out the new facility, with a few of the horses requiring a little coaxing through the water and over the obstacles.

Water jumps are a key element of any cross country event and visually quite spectacular.

The new water jump consists of two shallow ponds each nearly

8m by 8m, each with various graded difficulties to enter and exit the water.

Volunteers at the club constructed the jump, with timber provided by R and M Timber Supplies.

Mr Piccolo said the new jump certainly made a big splash on the day.

Club president Joanne Lewis said the members love the water jump and it is great fun to watch. "Not all the horses are willing to

enter the water. It can take quite a bit of patience and skill just to get your horse in," Ms Lewis said. The Club, which celebrates its 60th birthday in 2018, has had many homes over the years.

Mr Piccolo said he had been advised the club has about 45 members now, ranging from 7 to 60 plus years and catering for beginners to experienced riders.

"The club is always looking for new members," said Mr Piccolo.

While she broke her wrist on the main race day, Tara gained a lot of experience and knowledge from being a part of the Nationals. She bought home a Victorian state plate, after travelling over in November 2016.

The 2017 Nationals competition in Brisbane, yielded rewards from three race classes for Tara - Australia plates in 20" retro and 24" cruiser class and a 9th position (Plates for 1st-8th place) in Australia for her 20" 10yo girls race class.

# **VOLUNTEERS AT WORK - WHAT A PICTURE!**

Piccolo's Light Electorate Office hosted a window display of photographs sent in from the local community of volunteers at work to celebrate and honour their work.

Mr Piccolo said a great deal of community activity, is powered by volunteers.

"Volunteers are present at schools, sporting clubs, churches, tourism offices, kindies, libraries, museums, in emergency services etc.," Mr Piccolo said.

"To appreciate the important work

community without volunteers for just one week; there would be no local weekend sport, church services, cultural activities, after school events and many more."

The Volunteering in South Australia in 2016 survey report undertaken by Harrison Research and involving more than 1,500 respondents aged 15 years or over, found that volunteer participation in South Australia continues to remain high with more than 68% of the population involved in some form of volunteering.

During National Volunteers Week, Tony volunteers undertake, imagine your Mr Piccolo said the 2016 report results show that more than 920,000 South Australians donated their time and energy to contribute to the community.

> "Approximately 42% of respondents volunteered formally with a local community organisation or group, while 49% volunteered on an informal basis, for example helping a neighbour with their grocery shopping," Mr Piccolo said.

> "These efforts contribute to a mammoth estimated 1.76 million volunteer hours per week."

"In 2016, sport and physical recreation groups (29%, up from 24% in 2014) surpassed welfare and community groups (25%, down from 27%), as the dominant type of organisation at which people volunteer," he said.

The report also states that the two most common reasons for volunteering have remained the same in 2016; these are to 'help others or help the community' (32% in 2016, down from 40% in 2014), 'giving something back' (15% decreasing slightly after an increase to 19% in 2014).

"The day is also about acknowledging and honouring the important role they play in providing primary health care."


"The reality is that, not so much in Australia but across the world, many communities would not have health care were it not for nurses," Mr Piccolo told Parliament.


