Volcano Talks with Auckland Museum

We started Week One of Term Three with a visit from Tom and Arie who work at the Auckland Museum, specialising in volcanoes.

Our students from Headstart to Year 9 were invited to listen to a talk all about volcanoes and learn about how they have formed many parts of New Zealand's landscape.

Students were shown a series of videos to understand the different types of volcanoes and the rocks that are formed from the explosions. There were samples of pumice, obsidian, lava bomb, and scoria.

In Auckland, there are 53 volcanoes, with Rangitoto being Auckland's biggest and youngest volcano at 600 years old! Mount Ruapehu is our biggest volcano, and Whakaari/White Island is our most active.

Tom and Arie also explained what people need to do in the event of a volcano eruption, and our Junior School students were shown how to create a volcano.











Nanogirl at Springbank

We were thrilled to host Michelle Dickinson aka Nanogirl at school on Monday 9th August. She presented a Science Superhero Assembly to our Headstart to Year 8 students. Nanogirl introduced our students to the science concept of centripetal force, how to create a hypothesis, and showed us how much fun and exciting the world of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) can be!

To continue her visit with us, Michelle spoke with our Year 9-13 students about the wonder of science and how her career in engineering evolved. Nanogirl's life story and experiences in the world of science and engineering was both fascinating and inspiring.

She spoke of the importance of "finding your passions and finding your mission". Michelle encouraged our students to take risks, accept challenges and to take notice of those unique opportunities that come knocking, as you never know how they could change your life.

To start, we were directed into a large room decorated with intricate sculptures and beautiful watercolor portraits depicting mystical creatures of all varieties. Here we were introduced to some very strange but amusing games to help us warm up our creativity.

After this we were taken on a tour of the behind the scenes of three Weta's movies. One new upcoming horror, one fantasy, and one Sci Fi. I am never one to spoil so I will limit myself to only talking about my two favorite things beginning with the horror movie. There are not enough words to describe all of the wonders in this singular movie experience but my favorite would have had to have been the tunnel. After seeing the monster animatronics and the fake blood recipe, we were led through a tunnel that was part of the movie set. With blood dripping from the walls and pig carcasses hanging from celling, our single-file line would have provided no protection against the monsters if the situation was real. My other favourite would have to be the bigature set for the fantasy movie. With a one-and-a-half-metre tall castle with stained glass windows surrounded by a sculpted hillside with an array of magical plant life, this realistic portrait of 3D beauty was a sharp contrast to the enemy camps across the river with tents that looked to be made of animal skin and a barren stone landscape.

Sadly, we eventually returned to the room where we had stored our bags, only to find that the journey wasn't quite over yet. In teams of three or four we had a chance to create a world, creature, or robot then make up a story involving it. After a couple hours' work, we were challenged to do a Shark Tank-like presentation to the one and only Sir Richard Taylor, founder of Weta Workshop, along with fellow students and a group of tour guides who would be showing around the lucky people who get to share our experience. Lions Young Ambassador Program

In early June, Malindi and I were nominated for the Lion's Young Ambassador awards by Springbank, and we decided to take up the opportunity.

The competition, hosted by the Okaihau Lions Club, is held annually and was created to recognise young people who take up leadership roles and give back to the community. It consisted of three components: an application consisting of multiple short essay questions and a CV handed in by early July (30%), a ten-minute interview (40%) and a five-minute speech (30%). Of 21 people nominated, 11 applied and six were chosen as finalists, two of those being Malindi and myself.

The in-person component of the competition was held at the Okaihau Town Hall on the 11th of August (a busy day for Malindi and me, as we also helped judge the school Science Fair that day). Upon arrival, I was pleasantly surprised to see the MC for the night was my auctioneering mentor Ross Paterson, his colleague Elaine Goodson being the organiser of the event. After a short waiting period I commenced my interview with a panel of three judges, most notable I commenced my interview with a panel of three judges, most notable being Matt King, where they asked me all sorts of questions about what I've done and how I feel about various topics. Malindi had her turn after that.

While it sounded like it would be the most nerve-wracking portion of the competition, it turned out to be the most enjoyable part of the experience for me., The judges were engaged and interested in what I had to say, and it wasn't too much of a struggle to come up with suitable answers to their questions on the spot.

After all the interviews were complete and everyone had experienced "the meet and greet" segment of the programme, we were served an excellent roast dinner and dessert (which made the whole thing worth it on its own) before kicking off the speeches. Our topic was rather loosely defined as something that we are "passionate" about, so Malindi strongly denounced harassment of women and girls, while I chose to speak about the point of life, with some talk about the shortest NBA player of all time sprinkled in. It was fun writing the speech – presenting it, not quite as much – but everyone at the event was super supportive and it didn't turn out to be so bad.

At the end of the night, Springbank was well represented – while we were only one third of the competitors, we took away two thirds of the prizes. I got third, which was great, but since I happen to be good friends with both people who beat me (including Malindi, who came second), it felt like a win. Overall, it was a very worthwhile and gratifying experience, and I would recommend anyone who has the opportunity to participate in the Lions Young Ambassador awards program, should definitely give it a go.


The high level of presentation was excellent and our students should be very proud of their efforts. Congratulations to the students below on their top placings.



The above strengthens my excitement to share with you all my new business venture; Child's Cove, quality afterschool and holiday programmes held at Springbank School for all Springbank families.

The afterschool program will run from 3.00pm - 5.30pm and the holiday program from 8.00am - 5.30pm; both services are for ages 5 – 13 years of age. Through these services, we will be providing experiences driven from a diverse range of life skills that nurture an enquiring mind. Child's Cove will build upon Springbank School's framework, allowing curiosity to lead, supporting foundations of 'kiwi ingenuity', with a focus on the formation of Capability, Character, and Confidence within every child.
